goal, scored by Alan Sealey, now with West Ham. Orient's first goal was bagged by Sid Bishop. The return match, at Luton, is on Easter Monday.

Orient were obliged to make this an early evening match in view of the competition in their midst. Both Spurs and West Ham have home games today, and Orient, avoiding a clash with the kick-off times of their First Division neighbours, decided on an evening match and brought the time forward an hour than is usual so as to allow our opponents to return to the Midlands the same evening.

This Eastertide is just about as critical as any in the history of the Leyton Orient club. It is fair to surmise that the fate of the Orient will be established by Easter Monday evening. Is it going to be First Division football on this ground next season, or will the O's be written off as jolly good failures? There are a thousand "ifs" and "buts" and one, of course, has to bear in mind what Orient's nearest challengers do as well. On the other hand, the destiny of Orient may depend on their very last match of all this season—against Bury, on this ground, on Saturday week. Who knows?

What it amounts to is that Orient have four matches in the span of eight days, two at home, including today's fixture, and two away. Tomorrow, Orient visit Norwich which, by and large, is always a tough assignment, but Orient, this season in particular, seem to pull something out of the points-bag when they go travelling. Their League figures, prior to today's match, read exactly the same for home and away—Won 10, Drawn 4, Lost 5. The goals "for" and "against," of course, show a difference, but not much—"for" 32 (for both home and away games); goals "against" (home) 17, goals "against" (away) 22. Liverpool are hard and fast at the top of the table with 53 points for 36 games. Orient, with 48 points for 38 matches, are now being hotly pursued by new challengers, Sunderland, who for the same number of games are only two points behind Orient. Ironically enough, Sunderland won at Luton last Saturday by 2-1.

Orient's disappointing showing against Scunthorpe last Saturday was a big blow to all Orient fans and followers and that goal by the visitors in the opening 30 seconds was even a bigger blow to our promotion chances. But there you are, that goal

proved to be the winner. Orient failed to recover from this electrifying setback and make the frank admission that since the 3-0 victory over Walsall on January 13th, they have captured but three points in seven succeeding home matches. That is not promotion form. But as against that, the O's have taken six points from five away games during the same period.

What a pity the Orient did not beat Scunthorpe. It would have eased their situation no end. Let's be fair to the "Boys in Blue" in this match. I am not going to say they played anything like First Division candidates, but surely on the run of the play—the O's had three-parts of it—they deserved at least one goal. I can recall two outstanding instances in each half when nine times out of ten the ball would have found the net for Orient. But no, this was not Orient's day, and believe you me, there is a lot to be said for trying too hard. And say what **you** will, but I say that you must get the breaks and the run of the ball, not all the time, but sometimes. You know, the Orient got neither in this particular game. Now they must make every effort to attain their goal and I feel sure that with your help and encouragement at all times they will not give up without a worthwhile fight. So now more than ever lads and lassies, it is **UP, UP, UP** the O's. Good luck, Boys.

LUTON

R. COPE (Centre-half)

Signed from Manchester United just before the opening of the season. Has spent all his footballing career with Manchester United, signing as an amateur with them in 1950, turning professional in 1951. Was an England Schoolboy International. Has made 150 appearances for Manchester United first team.

J. FLEMING (Outside-left)

Went to Luton from Partick Thistle when they transferred Joe McBride in November, 1960. Is a very capable player with a tremendous shot and good turn of speed.

J. GROVES (Wing Half or Inside Forward)

Won Derbyshire Schoolboy honours and was signed by Luton when only 15. Uses his height to great advantage and is a most accurate distributor of the ball.

B. McNALLY (Full Back)

Can occupy either full back position. Came from the League of Ireland club, Shelbourne, and has been with Luton since May, 1956. Played for Eire "B" versus Rumania in Dublin in 1957, and also for Eire versus Czechoslovakia.

D. PACEY (Wing Half)

First signed for the Club in 1956. Since his demob from the Army he has played for the F.A. versus the R.A.F. and was also a member of the England Under-23 team against Germany and Italy. Very strong player with a liking for getting among the goalscorers.

J. STANDEN (Goalkeeper)

Signed from Arsenal last year following a serious head injury to Ron Baynham. Plays County cricket for Worcestershire. When on his game very few goalkeepers are his better.
