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TO-DAYS VISITORS

PEN PICTURES OF THE LUTON TOWN PLAYERS

With the visit of Luton Town this afternoon we welcome very old friends right from our earliest days in the Southern League. The Strawhatters were known to Ninian Parkites and in those days their large following of supporters used to invade Cardiff each wearing a straw hat, the emblem of the then main industry of Luton.

Pen pictures of Luton Town players from whom today's team is expected to be chosen :

J. STANDEN, (Goalkeeper)—Signed from Arsenal in October, 1960 following a serious head injury to Ron Baynham. When on his game very few goalkeepers are his better. Plays cricket for Worcestershire and was awarded his County Cap in July.

JOHN BRAMWELL, (Full back)—One of the two players who joined Luton from Everton when Billy Bingham, the Irish International was transferred to that club in October, 1960. Is a very capable player and worthy to be considered for International honours.

B. McNALLY, (Full back)—Can occupy either full back position. Came from the League of Ireland club, Shelbourne and has been with Luton since May, 1956. Played for Eire 'B' versus Rumania in Dublin in 1957 and also for Eire versus Czechoslovakia.

JOHN GROVES, (Wing half)—Won Derbyshire Schoolboy honours and was signed by Luton when only 15. Uses his height to great advantage and is a most accurate distributor of the ball.

RON COPE, (Centre half)—Signed from Manchester United just before the opening of the 1961/62 season. Signed for them as an amateur in 1950, turning Professional in 1951. Was an England Schoolboy International. Made 150 appearances for Manchester United's first team.

R. MORTON, (Wing half or centre forward)—Local born and has been with the Club since 1948. Played for England 'B' versus Switzerland 'B' team, the Football Combination versus the Dutch XI (on two occasions) and also for the Football Association versus the Army. Was chosen as Reserve for England at Wembley in 1955 and again when they played Ireland in 1958.

H. WALDEN, (Outside right)—Joined Luton from Kettering in January last year and stepped straight into the first team at Norwich making 34 League and Cup appearances last season. Has a very forceful shot.

T. McKECHNIE, (Inside forward)—Born Glasgow and came here direct from Rob Roy at the end of season 1960/61. Played consistently in the first team last season making 36 appearances in League and Cup.

G. TURNER, (Inside or centre forward)—Came to Luton as a wing half upon his demob. from the Navy but found his true position in the forward line. Represented the English League versus the Scottish League in 1955 and also played for the F.A. XI versus the Army in 1958. The town's leading goalscorer for eight seasons out of the last nine. Is a skilled player with a tremendous shot.

J. LORNI, (Centre forward)—An Aberdonian, he arrived here from Leicester City whom he joined in 1958 as an inside forward. Was converted to centre forward in which position he played several times in the City's first team.

JAMES FLEMING, (Outside left)—Came to Luton from Partick Thistle when they transferred Joe McBride, November, 1960. Is a very capable player with a tremendous shot and good turn of speed.

RON BAYNHAM, (Goalkeeper)—Has been with Luton Town since 1951. Secured from Southern League Club, Worcester City. He has represented England on several occasions. Played for the Football League on two occasions and also for England 'B' Team versus Yugoslavia 'B.' Was a member of the F.A. Touring party to South America in 1959.

ROBIN CHANDLER, (Centre forward)—A local lad who made a name playing for his County Youth team. Also holds England Schoolboy caps. Made quite an impression at Ipswich last season in our Cup clash. Is apprenticed to a local firm.

ALAN DANIEL, (Full back)—A player of considerable promise who has had many games in the first team. Signed professional for Luton in January, 1958, when 18. Son of Mel Daniel who played for us during and immediately after the war.

FRED JARDINE, (Outside left)—Born in Edinburgh. Played for Dundee for two seasons before coming to Luton at the end of season 1960/61. Has shown much promise since he arrived there.

TERRY KELLY, (Centre half)—Born in Luton. Played for Hitchin Town before joining in 1950. Originally played wing half, but was successfully converted into a centre half. A very strong player who holds his own with most centre forwards.

CLUB NOTES

Here we are with the season a bare 6 weeks old and the City are engaged in their 14th match, more than a quarter of the season behind us. At the time of writing these notes we have obtained 12 points from 13 games, and our displays this season have provided sharply contrasting sequences. We began the season with two draws and a win and then suffered four consecutive defeats, two of them at home. This poor spell was followed by victories in three consecutive matches and then a fortnight ago we beat Preston by 6 goals to 2 creating a record away win for the Club. Last Saturday it was our turn to take a 6 goal hiding against Chelsea at Stamford Bridge. This serves as a reminder that consistent form throughout a whole season is needed to gain a high place in the League table.

Watching last Saturday's match with Chelsea, I don't think anybody would have forecast the final result at half time. Chelsea whilst having the balance of the play, never really created any scoring chances and it was the writers impression that a solitary goal would decide this match, both defences seeming to be on top.

A free kick cleverly taken by Chelsea started them on a goal spree. This was not the Chelsea we had seen in the first half exploiting the long ball from their own half and with their fast eager forwards chasing everything our defence had no answer to these tactics.

Graham Moore did not figure among the goal scorers and had a quiet day. The goals were scored by Upton, Venables, Murray, Bridges and Tambling 2.

OUR VISITORS

This afternoon we renew acquaintance with Luton Town. The Strawhatters last appeared at Ninian Park in April, 1957, the game resulting in a goalless draw in a First Division match.

Luton Town were promoted to Division I in season 1954/5 and remained in the First Division until 1959/60.

Their position in the League table at the moment is not a happy one, having only gained 6 points from 12 matches.

WALES v. SCOTLAND

I wish to draw your attention to the need for exercising great care when purchasing your programme. If you don't want to get ROBBED don't buy Pirate Programmes. The official programme in Red, White and Blue is clearly marked "Official" and will be on sale at 1/- per copy with 16 pages of new pictures and stories.

A complaint has been received from the National Union of Journalists that photographers covering the games at the Grange-town goal near the present Boys enclosure have been subjected to the throwing of missiles and on September 22nd last during the City's match with Portsmouth fireworks thrown, landed dangerously near the photographers.

Coupled with the above complaint it is also becoming the practice of boys to invade the pitch at the final whistle. This not only damages the turf but contravenes a Football Association rule. The Football Association have issued a stern warning to all clubs regarding spectators encroaching the field of play and have made it quite clear that most serious consequences will follow any club who fail to heed their warning.

This is a final warning to the Boys enclosure. If there is any repetition of throwing all privileges given to boys will be withdrawn.

The Boys enclosure has been a familiar part of Ninian Park for a good many years and it could be a great pity if it has to be removed through a small element of unruly boys.

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Players' Benefits

Vic Crowe, Aston Villa's Welsh International wing half qualifies for a £1,000 benefit in March—the reward for 18 years loyal service to the club. Crowe has decided to forego the £1,000 and instead he will take advantage of the comparatively new clause in the Football League's regulations which says "A testimonial match may be arranged in lieu of a second benefit."

Crowe is a wise fellow. His £1,000 benefit would be subject to income tax but his testimonial will be governed by the principle applied to cricketers benefits and will not be taxed. If there is a moral in this perhaps you have guessed what it is!

Nevertheless isn't it time that all benefits whether they are awarded, given or earned by footballers and cricketers should be governed by the same principle?

I have always felt the footballer has a serious and justifiable bone of contention compared with the cricketer. On the face of it it is unfair that whereas footballers benefits are limited—a maximum of £750 after five years service and £1,000 after ten years—and subject to tax there is no limit to the amount a cricketer may receive and his is all tax free.

In post war years Cyril Washbrook (Lancashire), Alec Bedser (Surrey), Len Hutton (Yorkshire), Denis Compton (Middlesex), Brian Statham (Lancashire), Jim Laker (Surrey) and Freddie Trueman (Yorkshire) have all received windfalls of well over £10,000 in tax free benefits while benefits of from £5,000 to £7,000 to other county cricketers have been commonplace.

Compare this with the lot of Sam Bartram who was one of the greatest uncapped goalkeepers of all time but who when he retired after 21 years service with Charlton told me he was left with less than £400 out of his final benefit of £750. The experience of Bartram has been multiplied a thousand times in the case of other footballers.

Cricketers are, I hope, eternally grateful to James Seymour, of Kent, who way back in about 1912 was awarded a benefit which added up to a few hundred pounds. Seymour was immediately pounced on by the income tax authorities who claimed their share but Seymour decided to contest it in the Law Courts and not only won his case but succeeded in establishing for all time the principle that cricketers benefits are gifts and not subject to tax.

Because of Seymour's action there is nothing in the county cricketers contract to say he is entitled to or may qualify for a benefit but benefits are awarded by rich counties and poor counties alike to the complete satisfaction of cricketers as a whole.

In the case of the footballer there is a clause in his agreement which says he may qualify for a benefit—subject to the fulfilment of this and that and with the consent of the Management Committee of the Football League—and his benefit, therefore, is considered in law to be part of his earnings—a fine but irritating distinction, and one made all the harder to bear because the playing life of a cricketer is almost double that of the footballer. Nevertheless here's wishing Vic Crowe a bumper testimonial and let's hope it drives home to other Footballers the fact that loyalty does pay.

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A very hearty welcome to all our visitors for today's match with Luton Town, and any supporters of the visiting team are invited to visit our Social Club after the match where they will be very welcome. 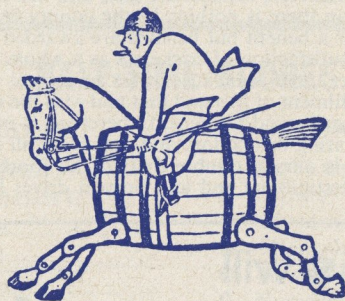
