OLD CUP RIVALS

WELCOME to-night to Luton Town for our fourth-round League Cup-tie in which the City players will be looking for a quick return to winning ways following last Saturday's defeat at Burnden Park which ended a long, unbeaten run. Although no one would pretend that the League Cup competition has yet achieved its full glamour potential it is true to say that the players, at least, take it very seriously and there has been a growing determination in the Maine Road dressing room as we have made progress to go through and win the trophy. Our second-round replay at home with Blackpool—which provided one of the best games at Maine Road this season—was proof of the effort the players have been prepared to put into the competition and with victory to-night seeing the winners in the last sixteen another entertaining tussle is in prospect.

It is one of those odd twists of Cup draw coincidence that sees us once more paired in a knockout competition with Luton Town, who are old City rivals in the F.A. Cup. In 1953 we drew Luton at home in the 4th round of the F.A. Cup and after only managing a 1-1 draw we were soundly thrashed 5-1 in the replay at Kenilworth Road. But in 1955 the City team already had the scent of Wembley in their nostrils when they were drawn away to Luton in the fifth round. Snow-storms threatened the match almost to the last minute but the match was finally played in arctic conditions and City gained revenge for their 1953 defeat with a 2-0 victory.

But the most sensational match between the two clubs was in January 1961 when once again we clashed in the F.A. Cup—again in the fourth round. Once more weather threatened the game but a start was made and within an hour Denis Law had scored six goals. With passage to the fifth round virtually assured torrential rain forced the referee to abandon the game. In the replay four days later the City tale of woe was completed. The team failed to touch the brilliant heights of the previous game and once more Luton Town ended Maine Road hopes of Wembley glory. If to-night's match lives up to the sensational tradition of those earlier Cup encounters between the clubs it will serve Soccer well in helping to promote the much-criticized League Cup competition to its proper eminence in the annual programme.

Introducing Our Visitors . . .

RON BAYNHAM (Goalkeeper). A native of Birmingham, Baynham joined Luton from Worcester City in 1951, making his first-team debut in September the following year. He has played for England on three occasions, and has given the Hatters very consistent service over the past ten years.

BRENDAN McNALLY (Right-back). An Eire international, McNally was born in Dublin and played for Shelbourne before moving to Luton in the summer of 1956. He made his senior debut in October that year, and won his first Eire cap in 1959 after playing in 'B' internationals.

JOHN BRAMWELL (Left-back). Bramwell joined Luton in October 1960, together with forward Alec Ashworth—now with Northampton—when Billy Bingham went to Everton. A native of Ashton-in-Makerfield, Bramwell was originally with Wigan Athletic, from where he went to Everton in 1958. He has missed only one game for the Hatters in the past two years.

BOB MORTON (Right-half). Easily the longest-serving member of the Luton team, Morton first signed professional forms at Kenilworth Road in 1946. Although best known as a wing-half, he has figured in several other positions in both the defence and attack. Morton, who was born at Aston Clinton (Bucks) has gained England 'B' and F.A. representative honours.

DAVE PACEY (Centre-half). Luton-born Pacey was with Hitchin Town before signing for the Hatters in 1956. He played his first senior game on Christmas Day, 1957, at right-half, and has subsequently occupied all three positions in the middle line as well as inside-forward. An England Under-23 international, Pacey scored the Hatters' goal in the 1959 Cup Final with Nottingham Forest.

JOHN GROVES (Left-half). The son of Arthur Groves, a pre-war Derby County and Portsmouth player, Groves was born at Derby. He joined Luton's professional staff in 1951, making his debut in April 1954 at inside-left. Like several of his colleagues, he has played in many positions.

HARRY WALDEN (Outside-right). Walden was signed by the Hatters from Kettering, his home-town club, in 1960, having his first outing in their senior side on January 21st, 1961. He has subsequently done duty on both wings, and this season has been among the most effective members of the Luton attack.

ALWYN McGUFFIE (Inside-right). A Scot from Stranraer, McGuffie was signed by Luton from a Scottish junior club in 1955. He was first included in the Hatters' senior side at right-half in March, 1958, since when he has alternated between the middle line and the inside-forward positions.

GORDON TURNER (Centre-forward). Luton's leading marksman in seven of the last nine seasons, Turner has made over 350 League appearances for the Hatters. A native of Doncaster, he joined them in 1950. He is just as effective in either of the inside-forward positions as at centre-forward.

TOM McKECHNIE (Inside-left). Signed from Rob Roy, a Glasgow junior club in April, 1961, McKechnie made his debut in the third match of last season, and ended the campaign as the Hatters' third highest marksman with ten goals in 33 League outings. This season he has played in both inside-forward positions.

JIM FLEMING (Outside-left). Fleming was signed by Luton at a small fee from Partick Thistle on November 28th, 1960. A month later he was in the Hatters' senior side, and has remained a regular choice since, figuring on both flanks of the attack and at inside-right. A native of Glasgow, 20-year-old Fleming looks to have a fine future.

DANNY CLAPTON (Forward). While with Arsenal, Clapton won England international recognition. Born in London, and signing professional forms for the Gunners in August, 1953, he had a fair amount of senior experience at Highbury, before being transferred to Luton on September 20th and making his debut two days later.

MARK LOWNDS (Wing-half or Inside-forward). Sunderland-born Lownds had his first outing of the season ten days ago, at left-half. Prior to this he had played in only three previous League games, when he played at inside-left last season.
