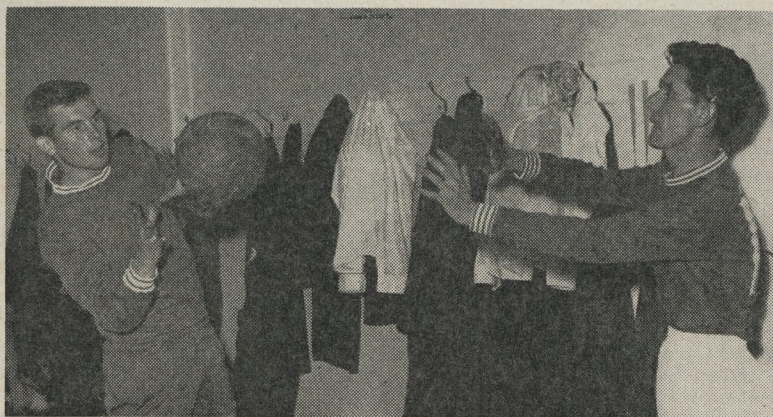

The Talk of Stamford Bridge

ELEVEN games to go—seven of them, including tonight's, at Stamford Bridge. And the intriguing question is: How many points are going to be required by the teams who win promotion to the First Division at the end of this season?

Or perhaps it is going to be a matter of "How few?" rather than "How many?" For, as manager Tommy Docherty points out, the way all the teams in the race—ourselves no exception—have been through a lean spell at one time or another, this season could provide a new "low" promotion-winning points total.

Since the Second Division was extended to 22 clubs in 1919, promotion has never been won with fewer than 51 points, and on the three occasions when that was the marginal figure (1923, 1924 and 1952) it was a case of the runners-up gaining promotion merely on goal average.

On Saturday we go to Norwich, and then comes the Easter Soccer Parade, in which we have two home games out of

three and meet Bury, one of our main challengers, both home and away. They come here on Good Friday (3 p.m.), Grimsby Town visit us on Easter Saturday (3 p.m.) and we complete the holiday programme at Bury on the Tuesday.

At this stage every club "in the running" begin to eye their opponents' fixture lists as closely as their own. In view of the mounting interest, we list the remaining games of the current leaders and will continue to do so in future programmes.

It will be realised that a team at present half-way in the table can leap right into the promotion picture by a spell of, say, three wins; equally, at this juncture, a run of three games without success can put a club out of the reckoning. In short, promotion could be won by any two of the top ten as the table stood this week-end. For space reasons we cannot append the remaining fixtures of that many clubs, but the list will be adjusted on forthcoming home match-days according to how the promotion position fluctuates.

An additional fixture will take place at Stamford Bridge on Easter Monday when, as part of the International Youth tournament—the "Junior World Cup"—being staged by the Football Association, Belgium will meet Sweden here (3 p.m.). Centre Stand seats (10/-) available in advance.

Our long-awaited Fourth Round F.A. Youth Cup-tie at home to Wolves has now been arranged. The match will take place at Stamford Bridge on Wednesday, April 24th, kick-off 7.30 p.m.

OUR VISITORS TONIGHT

FOR a directly opposite reason, tonight's match is as important to Luton Town as it is to us. They come to Stamford Bridge anxiously seeking points which will help to keep them out of the Third Division.

It is as long ago as 1937 that Luton left Division III as champions of the Southern Section. In 1955 they were promoted on goal average to the First Division and only four years ago they were Cup finalists at Wembley.

But, as we know ourselves, for every "up" in football there is also a "down". Luton dropped back into Division II in 1960 and now they have another relegation fight on their hands.

Tonight's fixture is the one that should have been played on December 29th, three days after we had won 2-0 at Kenilworth Road.

Luton went into Saturday's game against Newcastle with hopes revived by victory in their two previous home matches—3-2 against Huddersfield and 4-3 against Middlesbrough.

Costly Win

But last Tuesday's win over Middlesbrough was gained at the expense of a knee injury to right-winger Harry Walden that was expected to keep him out of action for the rest of the season. Mike Fairchild is his expected deputy tonight.

It is Luton's poor away form—only one point from their last seven "out" games—that has provided the major problem for manager Bill Harvey in his first season.

Mr. Harvey, previously trainer-coach to Bristol City, was appointed by Luton last summer in succession to former Charlton goalkeeper Sam Bartram.

One of the most encouraging features for the club this season has been the bright form shown by Ron Davies since he joined them from Fourth Division Chester in October.

Bright Recruit

Davies, who is 21, became Luton's leading scorer by hitting six goals in his first three games following a switch from inside-right to centre-forward, and he has continued to do extremely well for a player just up from the Fourth Division.

Ron Baynham, former England International, has been regular choice in goal this season apart from three games when Jim Standen (since transferred to West Ham) took his place.

Baynham, born in Birmingham, has been 12 years with Luton, joining them from Worcester City in 1951.

Injury to Eire International Brenden McNally has given Alan Daniel a recent chance at right-back, partnered by the experienced John Bramwell.

Luton secured Bramwell in October, 1960, from Everton—whom he had joined as a junior two years previously—as part of the deal which took Ireland winger Billy Bingham to Goodison Park.

Dave Pacey, signed from Hitchin Town in 1956, has played in all three half-back positions this season, and is currently at right-half. A former England Under-23 International, he was Luton's scorer in the 1959 Cup final against Nottingham Forest, when at left-half.

Terry Kelly has been restored at centre-half—a position filled earlier in the season by Ron Cope as well as by Pacey—and

Mark Lownds, a well-built lad from the Sunderland area, has come into the side at left-half.

Turner's 350 Games

Leading Luton marksman in seven of the past nine seasons has been evergreen Gordon Turner. A Yorkshireman from Doncaster, he has made more than 350 League appearances for the club he joined in 1950. Originally a centre-forward, he has proved just as opportune a marksman in either of the inside-forward positions.

Scotsmen are prominent among Luton's forwards. Recently at centre-forward has been Jim Goldie, who was signed from Kilsyth Rangers, and left-winger Jack Lornie—previous club Leicester City—is a native of Aberdeen.

Another Scottish outside-left is Freddie Jardine, ex-Dundee, and big Alwyn McGuffie, recruited from Scottish junior football in 1955, hails from Stranraer.

YOUR

REFEREE TONIGHT

Mr. Ken Stokes comes from Newark, Notts., and is a foreman-electrician at Ollerton Colliery. He was born at Bolsover, near Chesterfield, 43 years ago.

This is his seventh season on the Football League list. He graduated through the local Notts. leagues, the Midland Counties and the Midland League.

He played in minor football before he began refereeing in 1948.

Mr. Stokes devotes most of his spare time to football meetings, lectures and referee-coaching. He has refereed many County and Youth cup finals.

Half-backs Pacey and Kelly are both Luton-born. So is Robin Chandler, an up-and-coming centre-forward who was in the side that played Huddersfield recently.

Transfer Bid

In an attempt to give the line more goalscoring power, Luton made a substantial offer last week for Chesterfield's Charlie Rackstraw and, at the time of writing, were awaiting a decision.

In addition to the difficulties confronting them in their actual League position, the club have had another blow to contend with this season. Three months ago fire ravaged the centre portion of their main stand and also destroyed the boardroom beneath.

Considering Luton's low placing in the table, there is one surprising aspect in their record this season: In no match (up to Saturday's home fixture with Newcastle) had they conceded more than three goals, home or away.

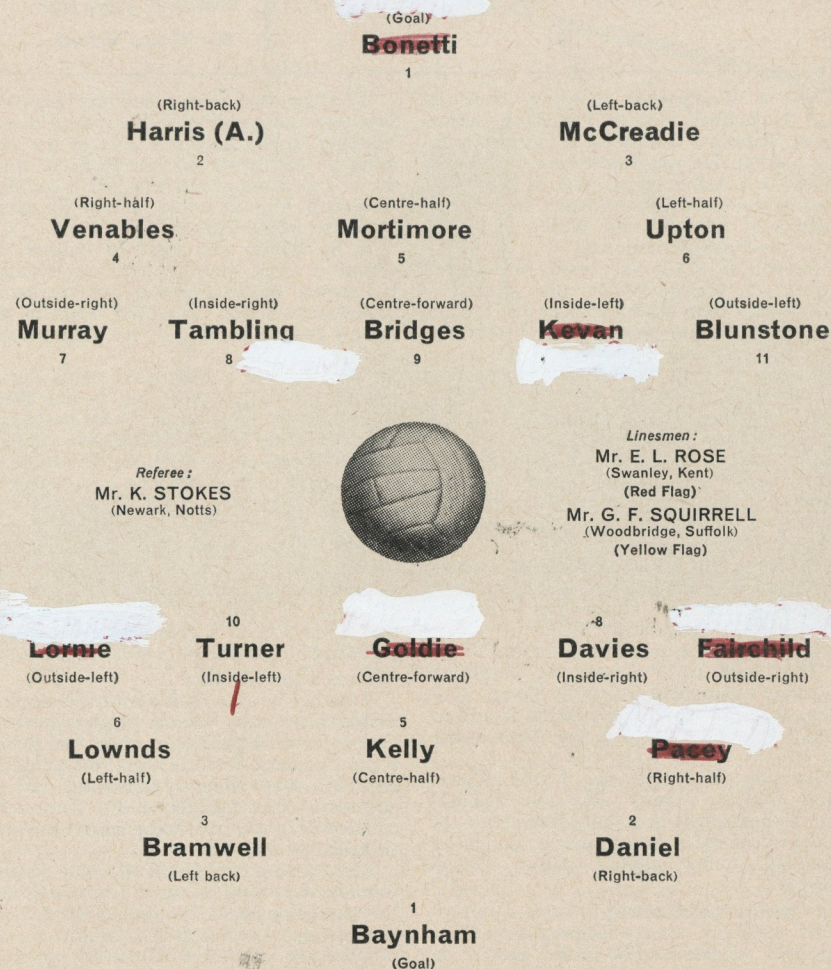

Chelsea Stars we remember

JOE PAYNE

his ten-goal record still stands 27 years later

By True Blue

ON a Wednesday morning, back in November, Bobby Tambling turned up at Stamford Bridge for a routine training session. He was wondering whether it might be possible to get over to Wembley during the afternoon to watch the chosen players of England and Wales face each other in a full International.

As you all know very well, he did get across to Wembley for the afternoon match, and soon after the clock had struck two he was going on to the pitch wearing an England shirt—a last minute choice for his country. Fame in a day. What did it matter to him that he was picked for a position with which he was something of a stranger?

Just how many footballers, through the years, have taken one such mighty and unexpected leap into the limelight I have no means of knowing. The game remains wide open for those on the brink.

By night and by day we dream, but we never know which of them will come true. There are even happenings—on the football field and away from it—which have had no place in our imagination.

That bald truth brings us, naturally, to today's opponents—Luton Town. And from there we get a story which is still as well remembered as the man responsible for it.

Just on 27 years ago Luton Town, then in the Third Division (South) found themselves in a quandary about the make-up of the forward line for an Easter Monday home game against Bristol Rovers.

He Couldn't Believe it

At last, in sheer desperation, their manager decided. For that game, on the thirteenth day of April, he decided to give the centre-forward position to Joe Payne. The proposed experiment was described in different ways—with the words "A wild gamble," prominent among them.

The "gamble" phrase had its origin in the fact that although Payne had played in odd matches in the half-back line of the first team he had never previously been called on as a member of the attack. He couldn't believe it himself when he saw his name at centre-forward on the team-sheet.

If he found that hard to believe, he found it even more difficult to swallow the sequel. In the course of that emergency experiment match he scored TEN of the twelve goals registered by his side without reply.

No player in a Football League match has ever equalled those ten in one game registered by Joe Payne. There has never been anything quite like it and—sticking my neck out—may I add never will be.

Asked how it happened, Joe explained in words which he really meant. "Every time I touched the ball when I was within shooting distance the target loomed up so large that I felt I couldn't fail to hit it, and I didn't." Right through his career, however, he remained convinced that he would have been a greater success in the game had he stuck to the centre-half position.

A Dozen for Chelsea

Whether he was right about this doesn't matter a lot now, but the chance move to centre-forward paid more than one handsome dividend. In the season following his day of days, Payne continued to be successful as a goalgetter. For Luton he totalled 55 goals in League games towards the club total of 103.

The scoring exploits of the new centre-forward were a big factor in Luton winning the championship of the Southern section, thus rising to the Second Division.

That big individual connection seemed to give the lie to the generally accepted statement—especially in relation to goal-scoring—that it is easier to spring into the headlines than to keep there. We needn't dwell on that beyond the mere statement that opponents are apt to watch, much

more closely, a fellow who has made a reputation than a youngster who is only learning how it should be done.

Anyway, the fame of Payne had spread, and other clubs began to take a goodly amount of interest in his future. The upshot was his transfer to Chelsea in March 1938. In the games of the remaining weeks of that season Joe scored four times. In the following campaign, during which he played in other than the centre-forward position, he scored 17 goals in League games in addition to helping Chelsea through to the Sixth Round of the F.A. Cup.

Keeping It Up

The war came to put an end to first-class football, but even at that Payne continued, intermittently, to play his

part for the Blues. Whenever his wartime duties with the R.A.F. permitted he would turn up, sometimes almost breathless, wherever the Blues were playing.

Even such spasmodic assistance as he was able to render helped Chelsea to the South Cup Final twice. And when the war was over and things were getting back to near normal, the popular Joe had the distinction of scoring at least one goal in twelve successive games for the Blues.

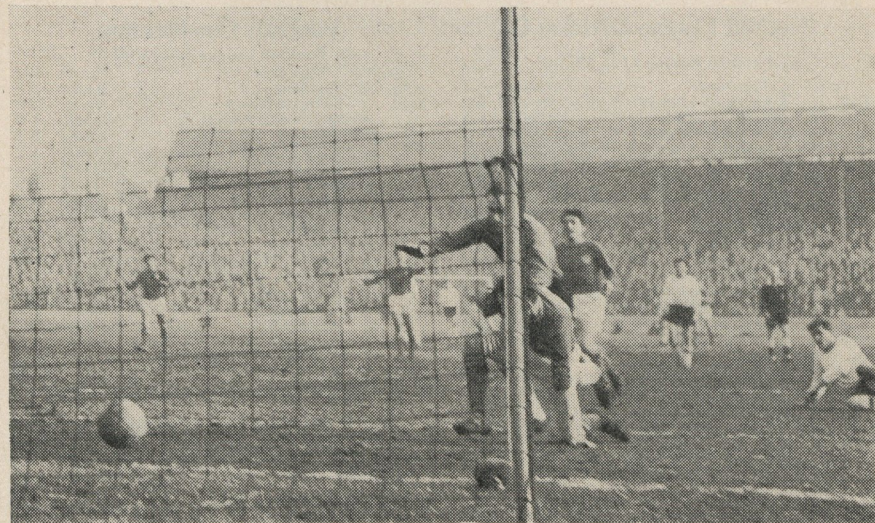
From Chelsea he went to West Ham, and then on to Worcester via Millwall. Chelsea officials must have felt that he had done his job for the club. When another centre-forward was required Luton was again the place where the enquiries were made and the signing of Hugh Billington the sequel.
