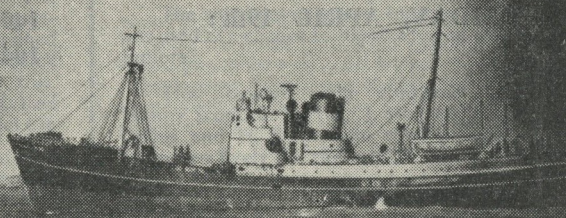

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CLUB NOTES

The strenuous Easter programme produced three very vital points. The Good Friday game against the one time proud Preston side did not produce the high class football expected. Perhaps the fact that both teams needed the points equally valuable made for more safety than adventurous football. Even so both goal-keepers had to make several good saves. Our team was the first to exert pressure, and one or two possible chances were missed, before a good run and centre by Jimmy Pennington safely netted by Ron Rafferty. Charlie Wright also had to bring off some good saves at times from the visitors. The second half was contested at an increased rate but a second goal by G. McLean clinched the result. The clever Preston forwards whose footwork was excellent were very weak in finishing. The home defence was again in good form and the half-back line was sound, although perhaps not so dominating as against Swansea. The forwards were not so accurate in their moves as of late, but nevertheless everyone worked hard to achieve success.

The return match with Chelsea in London was not the foregone conclusion that some people imagined. In actual fact a draw would have been a very fair result. A splendid run by Freddie Jones deputising for the injured Pennington was nearly finished off by G. McLean. This was a real shock for the Pensioners, and if pressure could have been maintained a real turn-up might have happened. Unfortunately for us, two very quick goals before half-time negated this. The second half was evenly contested and almost on time George McLean missed by inches.

Don Donovan was unable to play owing to illness and Brian Keeble very

ably deputised. Cliff Portwood came in at inside left in place of Ron Rafferty who was rested.

The London crowd gave our boys quite a good reception although doubtless disappointed in the form of their own team.

A goal-less draw at Preston completed the programme. This game never reached great heights. Our team was the same as on Good Friday. Both defences were too strong for the forwards to create many scoring chances. The remaining matches will now take on the characteristic form of Cup-Ties.

The Reserve team continues to gather in the points and now stand third in the League. The match at Rotherham produced a really fine game, played in the best sporting spirit. Both sides were all out and the result 2—1 in our favour was well deserved. Our team was the strongest we have played for some weeks. Dick Renwick had to play centre-half in place of Gil Wheaton who was taken ill on the journey. He did very well and was supported in good style by D. Welbourne and Tony Knights—Dick Young and C. Portwood scored the two well-taken goals.

Malcolm White brought off several splendid saves. An excellent match well received by a large crowd. It was the first home defeat of the season for Rotherham.

The third game against Lincoln City was used as a chance to blood a few of the Juniors.

The forward line consisted of Johnny Scott, E. Porter, J. Webster, D. Collus and H. Swift, and they proved much too lively for the Imps.

SOCCER TOPICS

Within the next few weeks the Footballer of the Year will be named. This distinction conferred by the Football Writers Association is a considerable one. The qualifications of the individual honoured must be his outstanding ability and good sportsmanship. In other words he must be a shining example of all that is best in the professional footballer.

In the past the choice has been a comparatively easy one to make. Players like Stanley Matthews, Johnny Carey, Joe Mercer, Harry Johnston, Billy Wright Nat Lofthouse, Tommy Finney (twice), Danny Blanchflower (twice) and others literally compelled their own selection.

But as I see it the selection is much more tricky this season. There are many rivals for the distinction but few with indisputable claims.

I've little doubt that Billy Nicholson would think it not amiss if the silver statuette again went to a Spurs player—perhaps Dave MacKay, Jimmy Greaves or Bill Brown.

Harry Catterick, of Everton, might be equally emphatic that Alex Young, or Brian Labone, to pick two at random of his collection of stars merit recognition. But by a process of elimination I've a feeling the winner will come from one of two clubs—Leicester City or Liverpool and I fancy a Liverpool player may be the eventual winner.

If the choice did rest with a Leicester player and Manager Matt Gillies were asked to name him I daresay he would find the task so difficult as to be almost impossible. Gillies diplomatic reply might be "our success has not been founded on the achievements of one individual player. Consistent team work and performance have been our passport."

Nevertheless I've a very strong feeling that goalkeeper Gordon Banks and inside forward Davie Gibson, to name only two City players, must run very close for the distinction.

But the man of my choice would be Jimmy Melia, of Liverpool. There is a romantic story behind the manner in which Melia has hit the head-lines this season and played his part in making Liverpool tick into one of the most attractive teams in the country.

When Local boy Melia, still in his teens, went into the Army Col. Gerry Mitchell, of the Army F.A. raved about him. "He is one of the most talented young players in the country and with reasonable luck he is certain to play for England" he kept telling me.

Whether Army football set Jimmy back a year or two is anyone's guess but the fact is that when he came out of the Services he went into the shadows for quite a bit and might well have considered he was in danger of becoming a forgotten man.

With the arrival of Bill Shankly on Merseyside, however, Jimmy Melia re-found himself and this season has handsomely vindicated his manager, Col. Gerry Mitchell and himself.

P.S. Don't imagine I'm psychic and Jimmy Melia is already home and dried. Another 170 other football writers have a say in this!

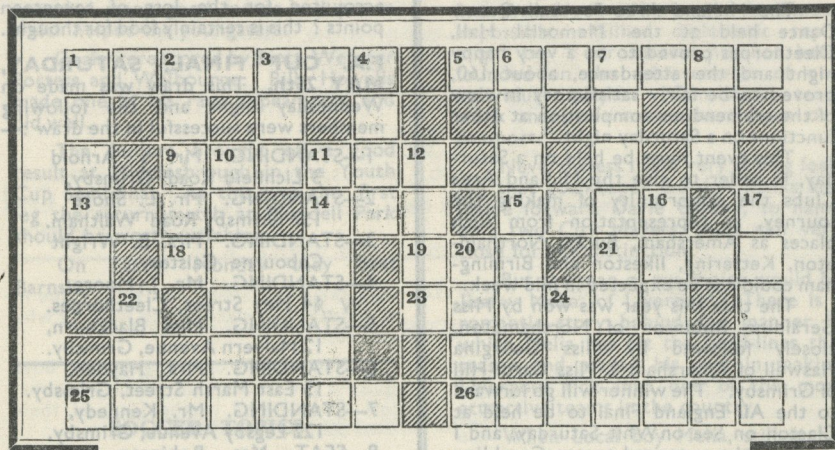
Looking back at the matches played it is amazing to recall that in seventeen of the games, a one goal deficit has accounted for the loss of seventeen points? this is certainly food for thought.

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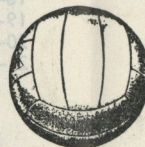

Luton Town, our visitors today, come to Blundell Park under the threat of relegation. Like Walsall, Charlton and ourselves, they are up against it and the result of this afternoon's encounter could play a major part in deciding in which division we or Luton play in during the next season or two.

Only a few years ago, Luton were a successful First Division club and F.A. Cup Finalists.

Just how fickle fortune can be is amply illustrated by their position today.

Luton's away record is grim. They have won only once so far and have drawn three in 18 away matches. Under the guidance of Bill Harvey, pre-war member of Grimsby Boys' team, Luton pulled off a stout win on Saturday when they hammered Norwich City 4-2, Ron Davies, at centre forward, scoring the lot.

Like so many teams these days, Luton lack forward punch and this combined with injuries has made the task of collecting points a tough one.

They lost 2-0 at Scunthorpe on Good Friday but made amends on Easter Monday by winning 1-0 so they got four out of a possible six points during the holiday.

Luton no doubt will stick to the side which beat Scunthorpe for today's match which means Ron Baynham, the former England player, will be in goal. John Bramwell, at right back, was formerly with Everton. His partner, Alan Daniel, is a 'local'.

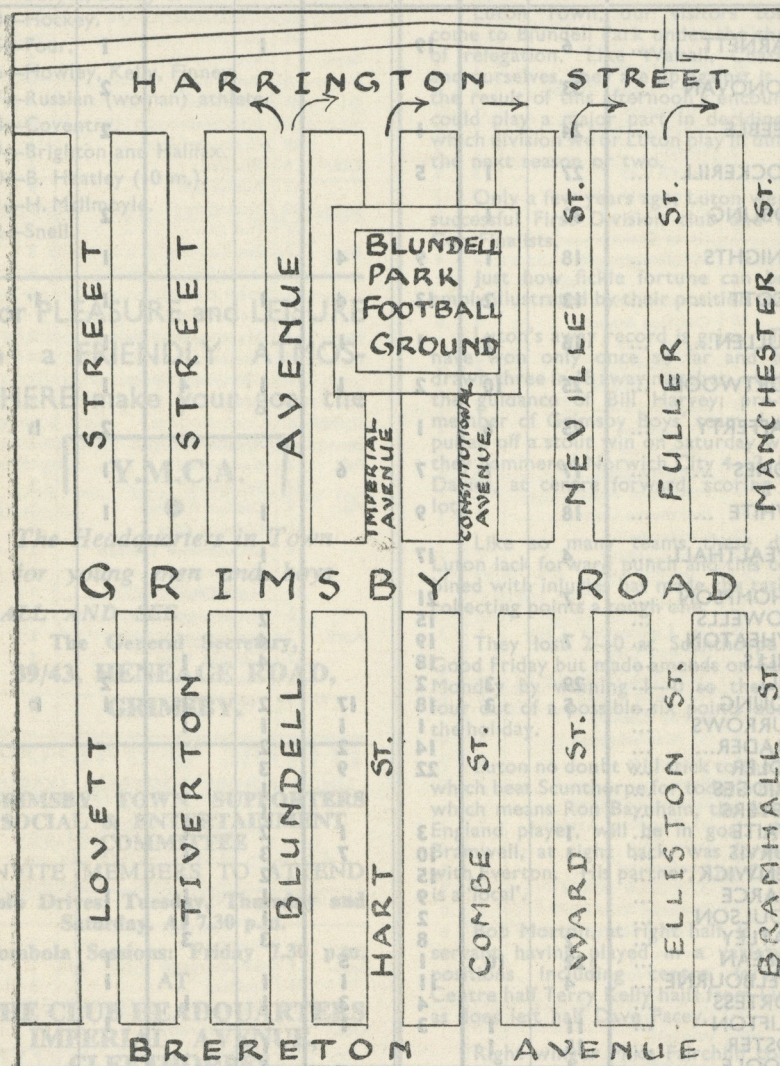
Bob Morton, at right half, is a fine servant having played in a variety of positions including centre forward. Centre half Terry Kelly hails from Luton as does left half Dave Pacey.

Right winger Mike Fairchild comes from Northampton, inside right Gordon Turner, another player with a good number of years sound service to the club behind him, was born in Hull; Ron Davies, who leads the attack, was signed from Chester, while two Scots, McKechnie and Jardine, form the left flank.

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POLICE NOTICE RE CAR PARKING.

The arrangements are similar to those that have been customary for a number of years. The only one-way street will be HARRINGTON STREET, in a southerly direction from BLUNDELL AVENUE to MANCHESTER STREET. No PARKING will be allowed in GRIMSBY ROAD or BRERETON AVENUE, as these are main roads which it is desired to keep clear, nor in that part of HARRINGTON STREET behind the football ground between the main entrance and MANCHESTER STREET, the west side of HARRINGTON STREET, that part of BLUNDELL AVENUE east of GRIMSBY ROAD, CONSTITUTIONAL AVENUE, IMPERIAL AVENUE and COMBE STREET which is reserved for buses.

PARKING will be allowed on both sides of all other minor streets and it is particularly requested, to assist dispersal after the match, that motorists approaching from CLEETHORPE ROAD, GRIMSBY, would park their cars in HART STREET, DAUBNEY STREET, BARCROFT STREET, LOVETT STREET, TIVERTON STREET or HARRINGTON STREET, and those from CLEETHORPES and elsewhere in any of the minor streets south of the football ground.

It is also requested that so far as possible, all cars should be parked with the near side next to the kerb and facing in the same direction. If a motorist should enter any minor street and find there is no space available on the left hand side, he is requested to continue into the next street where space may be available, always going with the stream on whichever main road he happens to turn.
