THIS was the question on the lips of many of the nine and a half thousand spectators after last Tuesday's game. A top-class, exciting game, played at a cracking pace, was the reward of those who made the effort to turn up. Even Bill McGarry seemed cheerful—and that is really saying something. According to Palace officials we well deserved our win. In fact, it would have been by a wider margin with any ordinary goalkeeper against us, but Glazier was in fine form and we had to work hard to get the ball past him.

The team, on paper, looked a bit unfamiliar. Ward away to Brentford, Spelman dropped, Livesey doubtful through injury and Chung also injured—against us a team undefeated in nine games and hoping to take over the number one spot in the division and, of course, Holton, who hat-tricked us on his last visit. We were all set for a grim encounter—expecting a desperate struggle. In fact, we saw some delightful football and real all-round effort.

Only one thing marred the evening. As the players left the field a few stupid individuals so far forgot they had been watching a man's game as to aim missiles at our former player, Cliff Holton—because he had played a hard game for his club. Holton has given many hours of enjoyment to Watford supporters—let us not be childish. Our regret was expressed to Palace officials for this lapse in good manners.

Congratulations to Dai Ward on his debut for Brentford—a nine-goal win, and Dai, returning to devastating form, scored two and made three more—that's football. Quite a few clubs were after him following his refusal to sign for Luton Town.

Incidentally, the scouts were out on Tuesday, and West Bromwich and Leicester City representatives must have been quite impressed. We must hope that all players who wear the Watford shirt will settle down now and recognise that life at our club is better than at most, and the terms we offer

are more than fair for a third division club. We don't want to see anyone on the list but if they insist it would be wrong to refuse.

A word on finance—the present level of gate receipts and the worry of a large overdraft must be taken into consideration when planning ahead. A quick return to bigger support will ensure the manager the means to strengthen the team and pay our way.

So we come to the game today—many of our older supporters will remember gates of 27,000 for this local Derby in the old Division 3 (South). Luton have been right through to Division 1 and back again, and at present are not really enjoying the third division. We trust that we shall see a keenly-fought game with our team keeping up the form it showed against the Palace. Welcome back to Vicarage Road, Hatters—this time it will be our turn to tread the path to success. That is our intention, that is our aim, but it must be a success based on solid foundations, which money cannot provide unless accompanied with hard work and loyal effort.

Many supporters will be pleased to know how well Johnny Fairbrother is doing for Worcester City—he played with a fractured wrist in a cup game and scored two goals, the City beating Kidderminster 4-1.

On November 6th, at Wembley, Pat Jennings has been picked to play for the Rest of United Kingdom Youth team against England. Well done, Pat!


