Notes from the General Manager

Cup talk has filled the air all week with the intriguing third round line-up of ties and reflections on last Saturday's action and the replays that resulted. Since these notes are being compiled before the rearranged replay against Southport, I think that Cup comment as far as our club is concerned is best reserved for a later programme issue.

There has been activity in other directions, as most people will have noted through last week's newspaper headlines. But our attempts to sign Blackburn Rovers' international wing-half Mick McGrath came unstuck because of a difficulty over the player's terms.

The fee had been agreed between the clubs and eight days ago our chairman, Mr. Victor Bernard, and myself met the Eire star to try and coax him into the move. The reason for the breakdown of negotiations 24 hours later is a personal affair between club and player—but I can assure our fans that there seems no likelihood of these differences being resolved at present.

Several players in our Cheshire League side have been showing form which has resulted in approaches from a number of non-league clubs in the competition. It is true that we have had a careful study of the staff position within the last fortnight and that certain changes are in mind for the early part of the New Year as we increase our attempts to make up lost ground in the League.

While we are reluctant to drain our resources at this stage, it would be unfair to stand in the way of a player who feels his first team future is uncertain. This is why we did not refuse transfer requests from inside-forwards Derek Hodgkinson and Dennis Hoggart. That is why some of these approaches will have to be relayed to the players under surveillance—those players with limited opportunity to claim a League spot at present—and the decision will be theirs.

On the subject of reserve team football I must say, at this stage of the season, what a successful venture our return to the Cheshire

League has turned out to be. I feel that the clubs in the League who finally decided to vote our return have been suitably satisfied with the support we have achieved.

Out of the eleven home gates, eight of them have been over the 1,000 mark—which is extremely encouraging since the side has only managed to better itself a little way over the mid-table mark. One of the crowd returns, for a mid-week match with Altrincham, was only a few fans short of 2,500.

From our point of view the League has been a blessing. With the competition centred in the Cheshire area all away games are within comfortable striking distance, and the standard must be rated the best for non-league football in the north. Not only this, but we have been very impressed with the friendliness that every club seems to specialise in.

Indeed, one of our prize items for the scrap book this season is a letter from Ellesmere Port secretary Mr. Stan Jenkins, who thanked us for the hospitality and praised our fans for their sportsmanship. It's little items like this that make that little extra effort all worthwhile in soccer. And prove that beneath that hard-headed, back-stabbing reputation the game has, there are a tremendous amount of folk who are very nice to know.

LUTON TOWN have been engaged in an extra share of F.A. Cup action. Like ourselves, they earned a replay last Saturday and took Corby Town to a replay at their Kenilworth Road ground.

Just like County, too, they left it late before snatching the second chance. It took a Ray Whittaker penalty six minutes from time to clinch the draw—and it took a David Shawcross spot kick four minutes from time for County to level their tie.

But Luton have got more important matters on their mind. It's 1958-59 since they last roared through to Cup fame, winning a Wembley final chance against Notts Forest—but losing 2-1. Those days are easy to remember . . . for First Division status went with them and its League status the "Hatters" are anxious to re-claim.

For the story since the club wallowed in that Wembley glory has been a sad one. In 1959-60 . . . relegation from the First Division; in 1962-63 demotion to the Third Division; and only last May the plunge into the Fourth. They were three points poorer than the team above them who dodged the drop—Oldham Athletic.

This season Luton have made a promising start on the come-back route. Before tonight's match they were holding joint fourth place with Colchester United, six points behind leaders Torquay United with two games in hand. With a sparkling home record, and the sharp-shooting of 14-goal John O'Rourke—joint second top scorer in the Fourth—they must rate among this season's promotion favourites.

Another revival they will be looking for at Kenilworth Road—improved attendances. Inside four years the League average has been halved. From a 12,572 average in their Division Two days in '60-61 they slumped to 6,663 last winter . . . a small deterioration on the 6,982 in '63-64. Yet 15,000 was once an easily-attained figure, though the record stands from their 1959 Cup run when they had a home tie against Blackpool which pulled in 30,069.

Luton was formed in 1885 by an amalgamation of Luton Excelsior and Luton Wanderers. Five years later they became a limited company. Their start in soccer was made in the Southern League, but considering the scope of the competition too restricted they made a bid for League status in 1896. Just a few years beforehand they had become the first club in the south to pay its players—5s. a week being the "pay packet" for three players and 2s. 6d. to each first teamer in home games and 3s. for away fixtures. Wages lost by leaving work before lunch were also compensated.

Admission to the League was gained in 1897, but three years later they returned to the Southern League. They dropped out of the top division in 1911-12 before regaining their status in 1914. It was from this League, with several rivals, they became members of the Third Division (South) in 1920.

They first gained promotion to the Second Division in 1937, and the next step up came in 1955 after some careful calculations had been made on goal averages. Like champions Birmingham City they finished with 54 points—and Rotherham United had a similar total. But the Yorkshire club had the weakest goal average.

It's been a long drop since that celebration season 10 years ago. The wheel of fortune is due a spin the other way now.

The GOALKEEPER berth is held by **Colin Tinsley**, who joined the club in August 1963. Before this season had only figured in 21 League games and 3s. for away fixtures. Wages lost by leaving work before Born at Middlesbrough, his first club was Grimsby Town. Then he served Exeter City. A six-footer, he tips the scales at 11st. 12lb.

At RIGHT-BACK is **Bobby Thomson**, who was raised at Menstrie in Scotland. He first came into prominence with Partick Thistle, who sold him to Liverpool for a big fee. Luton clinched his signing from the Merseyside club on August 2nd this year. 5ft. 10in. and 11st. 4½lb. His partner at LEFT-BACK was recommended to the club by a local scout, beginning as an amateur in October 1963. It wasn't until June 1964 that **Dick Edwards** was offered professional terms after consolidating himself in their Football Combination team. Last winter was given one first team chance, but now the club look to him to establish himself as a regular.

RIGHT-HALF is **John Reid**, who previously played for Bradford and Northampton, to whom the "Hatters" paid a substantial transfer fee in November 1963. A tireless and energetic worker, he gave valuable service last season missing only two matches. Born at Newmales, he's 5ft. 10in. and 11st. 7lb. The CENTRE-HALF spot belongs to **Matt Woods**, a native of Skelmersdale in Lancashire. His first club was Blackburn Rovers, for whom he made 126 appearances out of a possible 128, including a Cup Final. Went to Australia in 1963 before returning to this country in the summer. Luton immediately offered him terms.

PEN PICTURES—continued

The LEFT-HALF is **John Moore**, a newcomer to Luton, having been signed from Motherwell in May 1965. Was recommended by the club's Scottish scout, who forecasts a bright future for him.

On the RIGHT-WING is **Billy Harber**, who was practically born on Luton's doorstep—at Hitchin. Signed from Swindon, where he played inside-forward, being a free transfer player in September 1964. Made his debut for Luton as a winger, and had 15 first team appearances last campaign. Occupying the INSIDE-RIGHT role is **Tony Read**, who hails from Haydock. His first club was Sheffield Wednesday and in 1964 he left them to go to Peterborough—playing at centre-forward. Transferred to Luton in March 1965, but a broken foot bone prevented him playing last season. Can fill the goalkeeping bill (his customary position), but his adaptability leaves the club wondering what his best position will be.

The CENTRE-FORWARD sharp-shooter is **John O'Rourke**, who was previously with the Arsenal and Chelsea. Was a free transfer player in December 1964. Made his mark by scoring 22 goals in 23 matches but was dogged by injuries last term. Played for London Schoolboys and the England Youth team. 5ft. 9in. and 11st.

INSIDE-LEFT is **Graham French**. He first hit the mark with Shrewsbury Town, gaining international honours for the England youth team. Later sold to Swindon and then to Watford for large fees, before turning to non-league soccer with Wellington Town. Signed in mid-October from the Southern League side. The LEFT-WINGER is **Ray Whittaker**, a Londoner from Bow who was at Arsenal. Another ex-England Youth player, he starred in the side with O'Rourke in 1962 and 1963. Became a Luton player in March 1964 and has been a regular choice since.
