In conclusion, may we say that we hope that the Luton officials and supporters enjoy their visit to Oxford and that we shall witness a game worthy of the occasion. We for our part, whilst not being able to wish our visitors luck this afternoon, would extend to them the best wishes of us all in their bid for promotion to the 3rd Division of the Football League.



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## LUTON TOWN

### A SHORT HISTORY OF THE CLUB

On the 11th day of April, 1885, at the Council Chamber, Town Hall, Luton, a public meeting was "convened for the purpose of considering the advisability of forming a Town Football Club", and after a few preliminary remarks by the Chairman, Mr. John Cotchin, the following Resolution was duly passed: "That this Meeting establish a Luton Town Football Club". A later Resolution at the same meeting decided "that the colours of the club be navy blue and pink, a shirt and cap to be worn by each member when playing". At the meeting held at the Alexandra Coffee Tavern, Luton, on 9th September, 1885, it was proposed "that the first Practice Match of the season be on Saturday next, September 12th, in the Club's meadow in Dallow Lane", and a further Minute reads "Mr. Long and Mr. Knowles are authorised to buy scaffold poles to be made into goal posts, and also a ball for practice". It was also proposed at that meeting "that the Midland Hotel be the Headquarters of the Club", which, we observe, was "carried unanimously". There is much such interesting reading in the Minute Books which fortunately have been preserved, but it would take too long here to relate it all. Nevertheless we would like to add the following two Minutes: (1) dated 15th December, 1890, when "It was resolved that 5/- per week be offered to the brothers F. and H. Whitby and Reed"; and (2) dated 10th August, 1891, which was passed after the players Saunders, Wright, Hoy, Deacon, Burley, Cheshire, F.E. and H. Whitby had taken part in a meeting specially called for the purpose "that the players be allowed 2/6 per week for matches played at home, 6d. extra for out matches, while time lost before 12 a.m. to be made up to them on reasonable terms". So Luton Town Football Club entered full professional status as early as 1891 and our first "gate" as such, on 5th September in that year, was £3 0. 1. It is interesting to note that we were the first professional club in the South of England.

Friendly matches were the order of the day from 1885 until 1894, when we became one of the original members of the Southern League. In our first season, 1894/95, we finished second to Millwall Athletic, and the same thing happened in the following season. In the year 1888 the Football League was formed and six years later, in 1896, we made our first application for inclusion as members. We were not elected as we cast only ten votes, but in the following year were more successful and were received into the Second Division. In that first year we finished eighth in the table, the following season finished fifteenth, and the following season, 1899/1900, finished bottom place but one. Support during those last two seasons had been very poor and the Club was in sore financial straits. The Directors stepped in and took over the whole burden on their shoulders, otherwise the Club would most probably have passed out of existence. At the same time the Board felt that a return to the Southern League would be more beneficial in every way, and so application was made, and accepted. In an attempt to put the Club on a sound financial basis, the Board decided to form a limited liability company, appealing to the public to take up shares. The response was very good and as a result the Club was registered as a Public Company on 28th June, 1897. We had meanwhile moved from Dallow Lane (the site now occupied by Brown's Saw Mills) to Dunstable Road (where the Odeon Cinema now stands), but this also was too confined. Negotiations were then opened up for the present site in Kenilworth Road, which were successful, and the official opening took place on the evening of Monday, 4th September, 1905—in the first match of the 1905/06 season, our opponents being Plymouth Argyle. There was a remarkable coincidence about this match in connection with the word "Green". The ball was kicked off by Mr. J. W. Green (of J. W. Green Ltd.), the referee's name was a Mr. Green, the name of the Luton Town secretary was Mr. Charles Green, Plymouth Argyle's shirt colours then, as now, were green, and of course, being the opening match of the season, the pitch was a lovely green. Quite a number of coincidences which were freely remarked upon at the time.

We continued as members of the Southern League until 1920, when the Football League formed a Third Division (Southern Section); and we decided to join it. In that first season we finished in the ninth place, but in the following two seasons did much better, 1921/22 finishing in fourth place and 1922/23 in fifth place. During that time we had such players as Harry Baille and Tom Gibbon (goalkeepers), George Lennon, Alfred Tirrell, Sid Hoar, George Butcher, Sidney Reid, Bill Jennings, Harry Higginbotham, Ernie Simms, Allan Mathieson, Louis Bookman, Arthur Row, and many others we would like to mention. We had many ups and downs after that until 1934/35, when we finished fourth; in 1935/36 we finished second to Coventry City, and in 1936/37 came our greatest triumph to date, when we were promoted to the Second Division. In that season we won 27, lost 11, drew 4, scoring 103 goals against 53, Joe Payne sharing with Harston of Mansfield the honour of being the highest goal scorer with 55 each that season. We must not forget also that other splendid feat by Joe Payne when, on Easter Monday, 1936, he scored ten goals in the match at Kenilworth Road against Bristol Rovers, a record which still stands today and will probably stand for all time.

We have been called upon on quite a number of occasions to provide players to represent their country, and the name which most readily comes to mind, especially to our older supporters when International matches are mentioned, is that of Bob Hawkes. Bob was born in the little village of Breachwood Green, just outside Luton, and first played for us in season 1901/02. He was the idol of the Luton supporters for many years and no praise is high enough for the splendid service Bob rendered the Club until his retirement season, 1919/20, and was appointed a life member in appreciation of that service. While on the subject of International players, there is one unique record this Club holds of which we are very proud. This is that while still a member of the Third League three of our players were chosen to represent their country in the same match. The occasion was the International match between Ireland and England at Windsor Park, Belfast, on 22nd October, 1921, when Allan Mathieson (inside-left) and Louis Bookman (outside-left) were chosen for Ireland and Ernie Simms was chosen to play at centre-forward for England. All three were chosen several times but this was the only occasion on which they all played in the same International match.

Coming to the officials, who have served the Club so faithfully for a number of years, first and foremost is Mr. Harry Arnold, who joined the Board on 19th May, 1893, was appointed President and Life Member on 1st July, 1929, and continued to be a very interested member until his death in 1946, a total service of fifty-four years. Another name we feel we must mention is Mr. Charles Green, whom we are very glad to say is still with us and who was a regular spectator until a serious illness overcame him last season. He was appointed secretary in 1901 and continued so until he retired on 31st October, 1928, when he was appointed a life member—another official of the Club whose connection has lasted over fifty years.

This must of necessity be only a very brief history of the Luton Town Football Club, but we hope it has been the means of recalling very pleasant memories to our older supporters and at the same time stimulated fresh interest in the minds of our more recent supporters and younger members. The present season has begun very well for us and we are hoping that this happy state of affairs will continue so that our Chairman's dearest wish of seeing Luton Town in the First Division will be accomplished.

### PEN PORTRAITS

KEITH ALLEN (inside-forward). Joined this club from Stockport in exchange for Derek Kevan in March, 1967. Quickly became a favourite here. He previously played for Grimsby and Portsmouth. A native of the Isle of Wight.

KEN BEAVEN (winger). On our apprentice staff. A local boy who we feel sure has a bright future.

TERRY BRANSTON (centre-half). Signed in June from Northampton Town, for whom he played regularly, and has appeared in all four divisions of the Football League. He was born at Rugby.

MICKY BROWN (forward). Was born at Slough and made his League debut for Fulham, where he spent five seasons, followed by two seasons at Millwall. Joined Luton July, 1967.

MAX DOUGAN (half-back). Cost Luton a sizeable transfer fee in December, 1966. His two previous clubs were Queens Park (Scotland) and Leicester City. Gained five Amateur International Caps whilst with the former.

GRAHAM FRENCH (winger). Born at Wolverhampton. Has previously played for Shrewsbury, Swindon, Watford and Wellington before joining Luton in October, 1965. Has several Youth International Caps for England.

TOMMY HARE (full-back). Signed from Southampton in July, 1967. A Scot whose birthplace is Motherwell.

FREDDIE JARDINE (full-back). Another Scot, from Edinburgh, he played for Dundee before coming south to Luton in 1961. Although originally an outside-left, he has now settled into the left-back position.

BRIAN JOHNSON (winger). Born at Newcastle. Played for Sunderland before coming to Luton in July, 1966. Only 19 years of age, he has already made appearances in the first team.

PETER MOONEY (winger). A Luton boy on our staff as an apprentice. Already has made his mark in our reserve side, although still eligible for youth football.

JOHN MOORE (wing-half). His third season at Luton, being a regular member of our first team. Previously played for Motherwell. Was born at Hart Hill (Scotland).

BILLY McDEIMENT (wing-half). Born at Paisley. Was transferred from Leicester City in July, 1967, and comes with a reputation of being a rugged type player.

TONY READ (goalkeeper). Born at Haydock. His first club was Sheffield Wednesday, later going to Peterborough, from whom we secured him in March, 1965. Is equally well at home in the centre-forward position.

BRUCE RIOCH (inside-forward). Born at Aldershot. Lived in Luton most of his life. First signed for Luton as an apprentice in 1963. Taking the full-time ticket in September, 1964, and is a regular member of the first team.

NEIL RIOCH (half-back). A brother of Bruce. Born at Paddington. Joined Luton straight from school in July, 1966. A player who shows great promise and is on our apprentice staff.

ALAN SLOUGH (full-back). Born at Luton, he has graduated through the ranks of schoolboy, amateur and apprentice before accepting full terms in May, 1965. Can also play with distinction at wing-half or inside-forward.

RAY WHITTAKER (winger). A Londoner from Bow, he played for the Arsenal, with whom he gained England Youth International Caps before coming to Luton in March, 1964. He has been a regular member of our first team ever since.

ROBIN WAINWRIGHT (inside-forward). Born at Luton, our newest recruit, having signed apprentice forms in July, 1967. Played four times for England Boys Club last season.
