As Alec Stock said after last Saturday's match with Rochdale, 'If you want to win promotion, you must win the important matches and this was one of them.'

Even though Fulham can be regarded as being no more than on the fringe of the promotion battle at the moment, there is no doubt that tonight's clash is equally vital for the Town as they contemplate the pleasant position of being two points clear of all opposition.

#### Can insure themselves

Two more tonight, and they will be able to contemplate the future with a certain amount of detachment and also give themselves some insurance for the sort of setback that is always likely to overtake a team just when it is least expected.

In fact, this sort of thing has happened only rarely to the Town during 1969 and Manager Stock's reckoning last Saturday was that only two of the last twenty-nine League matches have been lost.

#### Only two setbacks

With the rush there has been to publish three programmes in the course of eight

days, I have not had chance to check his figures, but I have no reason to query them, and it is easy to remember that the two setbacks came at Doncaster fairly recently and at Mansfield last Easter Monday.

On the latter occasion, it was a disputed penalty that led to defeat, and the chance to gain revenge comes next Saturday when the Town will be at Field Mill.

#### No train to Mansfield

On this occasion, they will not take their usual massive following by train because of the difficulty that would be caused by disembarkment at Nottingham and the

consequent use of coaches from there.

However, expectations are that hundreds will make the comparatively easy journey by road, in order to cheer the team a stage further on their way to the Second Division.

#### Hot promotion favourites now

Certainly, after disposing of Rochdale who, after all, were their nearest challengers, in a match which was virtually worth four points, the Town cannot be regarded as other than hot favourites for the promotion prize, and they can take themselves a decisive step further tonight.

Like the Town some years ago, Fulham have found themselves on the slippery slide and have discovered that life in the lower divisions can be no less complicated than that in Division I.

#### Things are not working out

When they were relegated at the end of last season, the feeling was that their class and experience might well enable them to make a speedy return to the Second Division, but they have found that things are not quite working out that way.

One or two spectacular results have come their way such as the 8-0 thrashing of Halifax at The Shay but, all in all, they have not shown the consistency that earmarks promotion material.

#### Should not under estimate them

At the same time, it will not pay to underestimate the threat they might pose to the Town. Even though he can be regarded as in the twilight of his career, Johnny Haynes, 56 times an England International, is still one of the most skilful distributors of the ball in the game.

If his passes are being pin-pointed and Steve Earle and Jimmy Conway, both of whom have proved their worth as strikers this season, are on the mark, then the Town defence could be in for a testing time tonight.

#### Can achieve a difficult victory

At the same time, the team showed against Rochdale on Saturday that they have the character and the experience to haul themselves out of a sticky position to win victory.

Although there is not much room for sentiment in this game, I personally

could not help feeling sorry for Rochdale, who played so well for most of the game, yet had nothing to show for their efforts at the end.

#### All a matter of scoring goals

That, however, is the way football goes. It is all a matter of getting the goals. Rochdale had their chances and did not accept them, though they had some bad luck in the process.

Then, when the openings, belatedly, came the way of the Town, they had the men to take them and that, I suppose, is what the game is all about.

But, for my money, it is a matter of satisfaction that home spun Rochdale, living in the shadow of the giant Manchester clubs and, at one time, living on the bread-line, have been able to get together such an attractive combination.

#### All credit to them

Nowadays, they are better supported and, on this showing, they deserve to be. All credit to them.

After next Saturday's trip to Mansfield comes the second round FA Cup-tie at Hillingdon.

To be drawn away to a non-League team is something most League clubs would give a lot to avoid, but the Town have had this sort of experience in the past, and I do not feel that they have cause to fear this one.

#### Accommodation problems here

Certainly, it will not be easy, and there may be some problems so far as accommodating a limited crowd of 12,000 is concerned, but the state of the pitch looks reasonable enough and that is mainly what matters so far as professional footballers are concerned.

So, unless a replay is necessary, there will be a gap of nearly three weeks before the Town are at home again, in another vital promotion struggle, this time against Bradford City, who keep accumulating points in a quiet, but effective way.

By now, everyone will be aware that our second round FA Cup-tie at Hillingdon on Saturday week, is an all ticket affair, with a police imposed limit of 12,000 on the attendance.

#### **Honoured by the Football Association**

Price of tickets are 10s (seats), 7s enclosure and 5s for the remainder of the ground. Should a replay be necessary, it will be here on the following Tuesday, kick-off 7.30 p.m.

We have been honoured by the Football Association in being asked to stage the Youth International match between England and the Republic of Ireland on our ground on Wednesday, 4 February (7.30 p.m).

#### **'Little World Cup'**

This is in the competition more popularly known as the 'Little World Cup' and should prove to be a major attraction in that the most promising under-18 professionals in the country will be on view in the England side.

Details of prices and arrangements for tickets are not known yet, but will be published on this page as soon as they become available.

#### **Mansfield tickets**

Tickets for the match at Mansfield on Saturday are on sale at 8s each (stand) and I would remind keen followers that, next Monday, we meet Friern Barnet in the FA Youth Cup (7.30 p.m).

With so many matches crowding together, it has been impossible yet to make an award for the last competition for which, incidentally, we received an entry from Leicester. Winners will be announced in the programme for the match with Bradford City.

#### **Another competition**

Meanwhile, here is another for you to get your teeth into.



## Fulham slip again after further relegation

For a short while after Fulham had created a new record away win in Division Three – they won 8–0 at Halifax in September – it seemed they might keep up with the pacemakers and, perhaps, regain the Second Division status forfeited last season.

But, soon, they started to slide again and, before Saturday's game with Mansfield, they had played nine games without a win.

In spite of their mid-table position, though, Fulham possess two of the Division's top strikers in Jimmy Conway and Steve Earle.

Top scorer is Republic of Ireland international Jimmy Conway, who has netted thirteen times in League games – more than he collected during the three previous completed seasons! – plus two more in the League Cup.

Jimmy, who recently scored in five consecutive League games, joined Fulham from Bohemians three years ago.

### Hit five at Halifax

Steve Earle, who couldn't hold a regular place last season, hit five of their goals at Halifax – the best individual performance in the Football League this season – and now has thirteen goals to his credit. Steve, a Fulham discovery, was introduced to their League team in 1963–64.

### Haynes changed his mind

After playing a 'farewell' game at the end of last season, Johnny Haynes changed his mind and decided to remain with Fulham, his only club, for a while longer.

Fifty-six times an England international, Johnny is now approaching his 600th League game for his only club.

Pity he is nearing the close of his career with the club in such sorry straits, but he is still as brilliant as ever in mid-field and maybe he'll be able to see them on the road to recovery before he finally packs up.

England under-23 winger Les Barrett, who once thought of breaking into pop-singing, is now in his fifth season as a Fulham first-teamer.

Barry Lloyd who rose with Chelsea, but couldn't hold down a regular first-team place, joined Fulham as part of a £68,000 deal which took Republic of Ireland centre-half John Dempsey to Chelsea last season.

### Was told to give up the game

Stan Horne was an up-and-coming Aston Villa star in 1964 when he was told to give up the game because of high

blood pressure. But he fought against this, moved to Manchester City and helped the club back into Division I in 1966. He couldn't get into City's side last term, so he joined Fulham in February.

Reg Matthewson spent several years with Sheffield United, won a regular place in their First Division side four years ago and made over 150 senior appearances prior to his departure for Fulham in 1967–68.

Stan Brown, who turned professional with the club at 17, made his 250th League appearance this season and John Richardson, who once played for Millwall, joined Fulham from Brentford this summer.

### Distinguished ex-Lion

John Gilchrist arrived at Craven Cottage this summer following a distinguished career at Millwall. He had been an established member of the Lions' defence for seven seasons, making almost 300 League appearances for them.

Fred Callaghan developed through the club's junior teams, making his League debut in 1963–64. Goalkeeper Ian Seymour made Fulham's senior team in 1966–67, but is only now enjoying a regular game.

This is Fulham's first League visit to Kenilworth Road since 1959–60 when we beat them 4–1. Our League record against them is:



## HARRY ELLIS (Goole)



Mention of the success the club has achieved in chartering trains for away matches and the fine behaviour of the supporters was made in the House of Commons recently by the Home Secretary, Mr James Callaghan, who pin-pointed our methods as an example to others.

In fact, I have been invited by British Railways to attend a meeting of representatives of other League clubs to explain exactly how our scheme works.

### **Have set a pattern**

So, it is perfectly plain that we have set a pattern for future travel. This will be continued next Saturday week when a train seating 690 will go to Hillingdon for the second round Cup-tie.
