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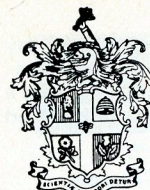

By now, our loyal supporters will have got over the disappointment of last Saturday's fiasco when more than 300 of them made a fruitless journey to Bristol - or at least to Swindon - which was the point at which their westward journey ended with the news that the match with the Rovers was off.

Much has been said and written about the rights and wrongs of it all, but for me, the big point was the model behaviour of the fans who swallowed their evident disappointment with good grace.

Chairman made a gesture

So well did they accept it, in fact, that after a short consultation with Manager Alec Stock, the Chairman, Tony Hunt, decided that those who made that trip would each receive a 10s rebate off tickets for the next rail journey.

This news was certainly well received and it is a clear indication of the regard the club has for those thousands of supporters, in aggregate, who have taken advantage of the chartered train arrangements this season and have travelled hundreds of miles without the slightest untoward incident.

Fans have now been highly commended

Once again, Luton supporters were mentioned in connection with last month's John White awards in which they were highly commended, along with those of Bournemouth, Mansfield Town and Torquay United. Winners in the Third Division were Shrewsbury Town.

Without even kicking a ball last Saturday, the Town found their already very strong position at the top further consolidated by the defeats of Rochdale and Barnsley and through Orient dropping a home point.

Importance of the clash yesterday
Before yesterday's clash at Brisbane Road, Orient and Bradford City looked to be the main rivals to the Town and a great deal attached to yesterday's clash, result of which, of course, was not known when this programme was compiled.

One thing that was certain was that the Leyton club were expecting to house their biggest attendance for some years and estimated that it would top the 20,000 mark.

Hoped for more devastation

Certainly, many hundreds of Town supporters were making the comparatively short trip in the hope of seeing the team strike, once again, the devastating form they showed in destroying Bradford City a fortnight ago.

Certainly, coming as it did immediately after the shock Cup defeat at Hillingdon, there could have been no greater nor more welcome tonic for both team and fans.

Apart from being the biggest victory of the season, I regard it as the Town's best display so far and they would have tested to the full most of the Second Division teams during their brilliant first 45 minutes when they could so easily have had more than three goals.

Unexpected drop in the gate

One rather discordant note was that the attendance slipped below the 12,000 mark for the first time this season. Various reasons were advanced for this, of which the Cup-tie 'hangover' must be regarded as one, but that such an attractive game should not have pulled in more of the regulars came as a sharp surprise.

At the same time, there was no undue concern in official circles where it is known that there is great support on which to draw especially if, as seems likely now, the team will be appearing in the Second Division next season.

No complacency will be allowed

Not that there is any complacency in the camp, nor will this be allowed to develop because the season is only halfway through and there are some tough battles to be faced.

In point of fact, today's visit from Gillingham marks exactly the midway stage for the Town who, afterwards, find themselves faced with two difficult assignments at Reading and Shrewsbury.

The match at Elm Park next Saturday has been brought forward from mid-March to replace what should have been a visit from Walsall, who will be involved in a Cup-tie.

Saturday dates in short supply

Saturday dates in this shortened season are too precious to allow to be vacant.

In view of the postponement last Saturday which means that there are visits to Bristol and Mansfield still to be fitted in somewhere, it is as well that the Town will be in action next week - weather permitting of course.

Today's visitors are having a particularly rough passage in the League this season and, at this stage, along with Barrow and Stockport County, look in desperate straits so far as holding their Third Division status is concerned.

Hayward has friends in the county

Very little has gone right for them and there is considerable sympathy for their manager, Basil Hayward, who has many friends within this county dating back to the time of his association with Bedford Town.

Stemming from that, several Bedford players have made their way to Gillingham and some of them are still on the books.

Riddick has moved on

Familiar figure who will be missing from their line-up is Gordon Riddick, who left the Town to join the Kent club and who was transferred to Charlton Athletic recently for a five-figure fee.

At the Valley he has seemed to find his feet very quickly, has already scored some valuable goals and the move seems to have benefited both the player and his new club.

Gills will be fighting

One thing about which we can be certain today is that Gillingham certainly have not conceded that relegation is inevitable and they will be fighting to try to put an end to the Town's unbeaten home League record.

However, there should be very little danger of this not being extended to thirty-seven matches this afternoon.

Willing to change

Reading were only too willing to bring forward the game at Elm Park which was scheduled for Wednesday, 11 March, and we shall now visit them next week (3 o'clock).

At the same time, this arrangement enabled us to fit in one of the four reserve team games outstanding, that against Leicester City at Kenilworth Road in the Combination Cup.

New date for Walsall

If Walsall secure a decisive result in their Cup-tie at Crystal Palace, they will visit us on the following Tuesday, 6 January (7.30 p.m.).

Two other home dates for reserve team matches now agreed are those against Walsall on Monday, 12 January, and Ipswich Town on Tuesday, 10 March.

So far, nothing has been able to be done about the visit to Mansfield Town, postponed on 29 November and it looks as if this will have to be held over until next month, at least, and may even have to wait until the closing weeks of the season.

Youth match confirmed

Meanwhile, confirmation has been received from the Football Association of the Youth International which we will be staging for them on Wednesday, 4 February (7.30 p.m.).

This is between England and the Republic of Ireland and further details of prices will be available in our next programme.

Next season starts on 15 August

We have now received confirmation that League matches next season begin on Saturday, 15 August, which is convenient so far as we are concerned because that is a week after the end of the Vauxhall holiday. Doubtless, we shall be staging some attractive, friendly matches before that date.

Last week, we received a nice letter from the Bradford City wing-half, Tony Leighton, who developed cartilage trouble during the match a fortnight ago and had to be carried off.

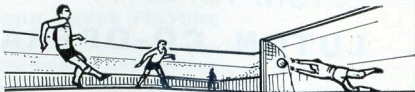
Thanks to the doctors

He wishes us all the best for the future and hopes that Bradford City will accompany us into the Second Division!

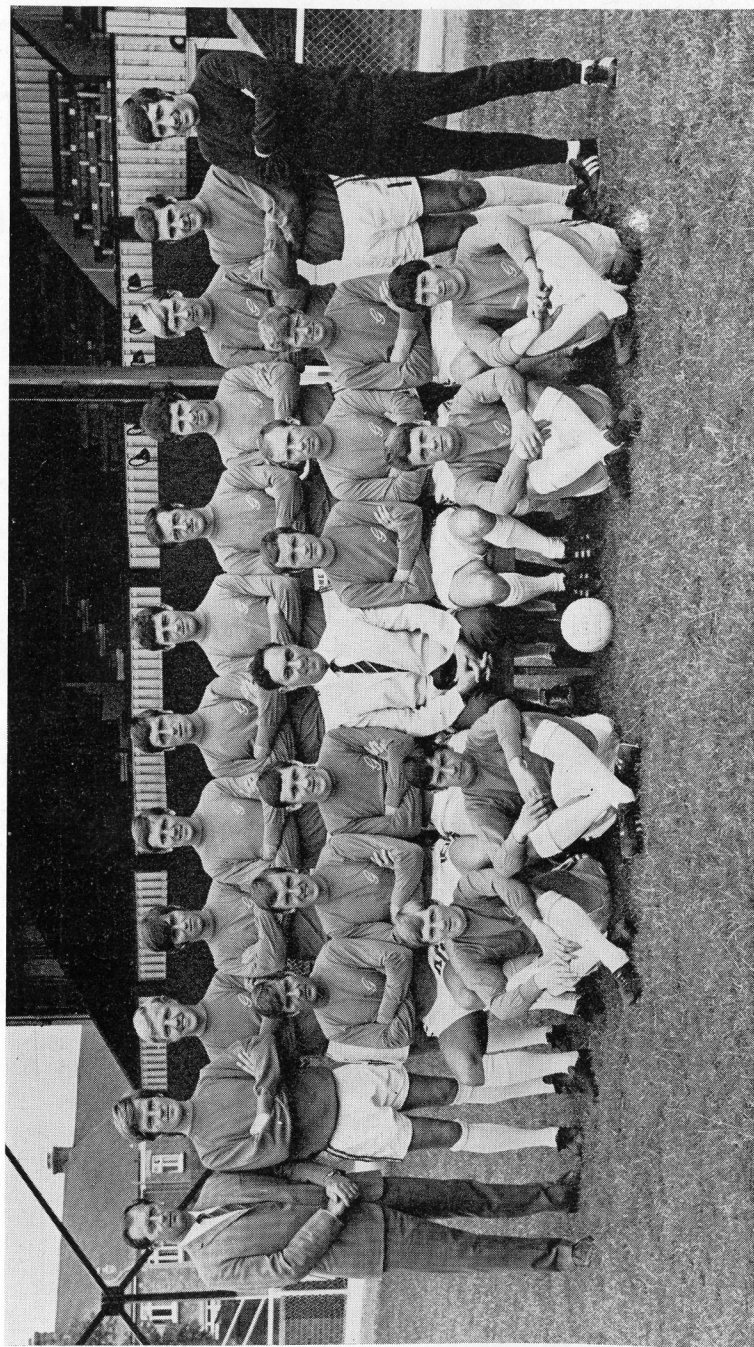

Gillingham's hopes fade *By Tony Pullein*

Though the season is but half completed, Gillingham's chances of avoiding relegation to Division Four are already beginning to look very slim indeed.

The Gills have struggled from the outset. After losing their first six matches, they later endured a spell of twelve League games without a win and it's not difficult to pinpoint the main reason for their failure — they have one of the poorest attacks in the Division.

Defenders chief marksmen

Unless the Christmas games altered the situation, Gillingham's chief goal-getters are a wing-half and a converted full-back!

Ray Bailey, a tall wing-half, was level top scorer with five goals before last Saturday's game, including a hat-trick against Tamworth in the FA Cup.

Full-back Mike Green, who joined Gillingham in 1968 after four seasons with Carlisle, moved up into attack this season and collected four goals.

Brian Yeo, last season's leading scorer with 18 goals, has been slow off the mark this term, netting only five times. A former Portsmouth player, Brian joined Gillingham in 1963 but last season was his most successful to date.

Former Hammers

Former England schoolboy international Derek Woodley started his League career with West Ham in 1959–60. Three years later he shifted to Southend where he enjoyed over five happy years before signing for Charlton.

He didn't remain at The Valley, switching to Gillingham within weeks.

Andy Smillie also started with West Ham, but served Crystal Palace, Scunthorpe and Southend before arriving at Gillingham last November.

Previous association

Ken Pound was a colleague of manager Basil Hayward at Portsmouth. When Mr Hayward left to manage Yeovil Town he took Ken with him. Ken later joined Swansea where he remained for two seasons until joining Bournemouth. Gillingham signed him this year.

Bobby Folds was the first Gillingham apprentice to make the professional grade in 1967. Two other ex-apprentices have followed him into the first-team this season — left-back Dave Peach and inside-forward Dick Tydeman.

Value for money

Veteran goalkeeper John Simpson, who is fast approaching his 500th League appearance for Gillingham, has already broken the club appearance record.

Lincoln City originally introduced him to League football in 1957 but he moved to Gillingham during the summer of that year for a £750 fee. No club could have received better value for its money.

Promoted as apprentice

Mel Machin, bundled into League football while still an apprentice with Port Vale, signed professional when he was 17 and moved to Gillingham as a winger in 1966.

He has since developed into a very good wing-half or full-back. Dave Quirke, a Gillingham discovery, made his League bow last year and has now established himself at left-half.

Dave Galvin was signed from Wolves on a temporary transfer in October. He had spent several seasons at Molineux but had to wait until last season for his chance in their First Division side.

Poor away record

Gillingham have scored only nine goals in fourteen away League and Cup games so far and their only victories away from the Priestfield Stadium were at Rotherham (1–0), in the League, and Aldershot (1–0) in the League Cup.

They drew at Barrow (1–1) and Rochdale (0–0) in the League and Southend (0–0) in the FA Cup but lost all their other away matches: Mansfield (0–1), Fulham (1–2), Stockport (0–1), Brighton (1–3), Torquay (2–3), Reading (0–1), Bradford City (0–1), and Bournemouth (1–2). They also lost at Blackpool (1–3) in the League Cup.

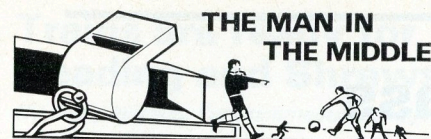

His progress took him through the Norfolk and Suffolk leagues to more important competitions such as the East Anglian League and the Eastern Counties League.

He also served on the Midland League before gaining promotion as a Football League linesman in 1953. He went into the middle three years later.
