

Three points out of four
Three points out of four from the last two away games can only be regarded as good going and is somewhat symptomatic of the fact that, by and large, the Town's form on opponents' grounds has been more consistent than that which they have shown before their own supporters.

Certainly, they will need this consistency in the period immediately ahead because, after today's clash with Doncaster, they face three away games in rapid succession.

Rovers keen for revenge
First comes on Tuesday on Bristol

Rover's Eastville pitch which is notoriously heavy at this time of the season and the Rovers, with their open style, will be keen to avenge their 4-0 defeat at Luton earlier this season.

After they return from Bristol, the day after the match, the Town players will have only a slight breather before they leave on Friday for Windermere where they will make their headquarters before the match at Barrow.

Barrow disappointing
For the Lancashire club, who have to rub along on a shoestring budget, this has been a vastly disappointing season. This

morning, they were at the bottom of the Third Division and nothing looked more certain than that they are due for another stay in Division IV.

Yet, they have been showing some fighting spirit, having held promotion contenders, Reading and Barnsley, to draws at Holker Street on consecutive Saturdays.

Mixed bag of results

On their three previous visits to Barrow, the Town have had a mixed bag of results, winning one, drawing one and losing one.

Of the three away games confronting them this would appear to pose the least difficulty, but football continues to be an unpredictable game in which no one can take anything for granted.

Brown keen to win this one

Last of the trio comes at Plainmoor, Torquay, a fortnight today, and the Devon team will have extra incentive to win this one because their manager is Allan Brown, who was in charge here and also gave the club distinguished service as a player.

There was nearly a deal between the two clubs last week when Brown made a bid, that was accepted, for goalkeeper, Tony Read, but it fell down because Read wanted to continue to live in Luton and this did not suit Brown's plans.

Transfer speculation

For quite a fortnight, there has been speculation about the Town entering the transfer market in a big way. In fact, Manager Alec Stock has gone on record as saying that this particularly difficult period presents the ideal time to reinforce the playing staff.

This has certainly been done, but at the other end of the age scale from that which had been expected. In the past couple of weeks, three youngsters have been signed, designed to bolster the reserve strength and to provide insurance for the future.

Big money is available

Of the two experienced players Stock says he wants, there is no sign yet. Some famous names have been bandied about in connection with a possible

arrival at Luton and, possibly, in one case, there is an element of truth in it.

That money, and big money, is available, Chairman Tony Hunt has averred more than once, but he has also stressed the difficulty of persuading top-line players to step down in class.

Obviously, this is the difficulty which has been facing the Town in their enquiries and there is no doubt in my mind that these have been both full and exhaustive.

Fans must be patient

That there will be arrivals, I am certain, but supporters will have to be patient because, as I write, there is no sign of a deal looming on the horizon.

On the other hand, the fact that the team seems to have got over its bad patch, has made the need less urgent and, when one looks at the general situation, there is pretty adequate cover within the club for most positions.

Not that that will lesson the determination to go in for a big name, but this is the sort of business that cannot be hurried and a club simply must be selective when the sort of money that is envisaged is involved.

Welcome, Eric Morecambe!

On the more domestic front, there is considerable approval about the appointment of top comedian, Eric Morecambe, as a Director of the club.

At a specially convened meeting of the Board at Stockport last Saturday, he was unanimously co-opted and will be elected in the normal fashion at the annual meeting next month.

Always ready to help out

For some time, Eric has been a keen supporter and season ticket-holder, always ready to help out in any way in which he could, and there is no doubt about his popularity.

Next home match is three weeks today, against Brighton, who have quietly edged their way back into the promotion picture and this could well prove to be one of the most exciting, and best supported matches, of the season.

Sting has been lost – but Doncaster have done much better this time

Though Doncaster still have a good chance of gaining one of the promotion places this season, their challenge lost much of its sting when they recently endured a barren run of six games which produced only one point.

But even if they don't win one of the prizes Doncaster, Fourth Division champions last season, will feel happy to have done so much better than on the last occasion they rose out of the basement in 1966. Then they dropped back after only one season.

Sheffield the wanderer

Former Luton striker Laurie Sheffield, who moved to Doncaster last October, hasn't been able to hold a regular place lately, but mostly because of injury.

Laurie scored on his Doncaster debut and got another vital point-saver two games later but then he seemed to lose his edge. This is his second spell with the Rovers.

He originally joined them from Newport in 1965 and he was their top scorer with 28 goals in his first season.

Soon he was off again – to Norwich, Rotherham, Oldham and Luton before returning to Belle Vue.

Move suited Regan

The move to Doncaster last season seems to have suited wandering boy John Regan who began his League career with Birmingham City then drifted off to Shrewsbury, Brentford and Crewe without really making his mark with any of them.

Last season he was Rovers' level top scorer with twelve goals, and now he holds a clear lead with twelve – five more than his closest challenger, Stephen Briggs.

No chance at Leeds

Briggs did his groundwork with Leeds United but didn't appear to have much chance with all their stars shining so brightly. He got his break in League soccer with Rovers last season.

Stephen hit the decisive goal when we suffered our first League defeat of the season (0-2) at Doncaster in October.

Bobby Gilfillan gained quite a reputation as a striker with Southend United, whom he joined from Raith Rovers in 1963. He was the Shrimpers' best marksman with twenty-two goals in 1964-65 and it was at the end of that season that he moved on to Doncaster. But he hasn't been able to recapture his best scoring form this season.

Two from Wednesday

Doncaster signed full-back, Ian Branfoot, and winger Archie Irvine from Sheffield Wednesday last December in an exchange deal which took Harold Wilcockson to Hillsborough.

Branfoot joined Wednesday from Gateshead in 1965, made his First Division debut in May 1966 but never managed to hold down a regular place.

Irvine's Hillsborough stay was quite short. Wednesday signed him from Airdrie in September 1968 and he gained a place in the senior team within a fortnight.

Two from Division I

Another former Sheffield Wednesday player is Brian Usher who arrived last season after gaining considerable experience in First and Second Division football with both Sunderland and Wednesday.

Rodney Johnson also played in the First Division, with Leeds, but he didn't manage to claim a regular game at that level. Rodney is now in his third campaign with Rovers.

Ambitions thwarted

One of Doncaster's most experienced players is goalkeeper John Ogston. He first kept goal for Aberdeen in 1958-59 and he missed only a handful of Scottish First Division matches over the following six years.

Liverpool signed him in 1965 but his ambitions to make a hit at Anfield were thwarted by the continued brilliance of Scottish international Tommy Lawrence.

He joined Doncaster in August 1968 and his experience had much to do with the club's sound defensive records last season – one of the best in Division Four.

Ex-Rotherham men

Colin Clish, who began his career with Newcastle, made over 100 League ap-





DAVID SMITH (Stonehouse)

David Smith, the goalkeeper, was once a severe critic of referees. His local matches were often punctuated with one or two verbal exchanges with the official.

Then, one day, a frustrated referee replied: 'O.K. then. If you can do better why don't you try?'

'I took him up', smiled Mr Smith. 'And here I am!'

He soon began to enjoy refereeing in Gloucestershire amateur football and eventually rose through the Western League and, in 1954, was appointed to the Football League linesmen's list. Five years later he was a League referee and last year he was promoted to the FIFA panel.

Had league cup final

He has refereed the League Cup final (in 1966) the FA Amateur Cup final (1964) and the Channel Islands' Muratti Vase final in 1963. He has refereed two FA Cup semi-finals and, last year, was linesman for the USSR v. Poland international.

Mr Smith believes in working himself hard. He handles almost 100 games per season — 'the more games, the more experience gained' is his philosophy — and in his 'spare' time he is secretary of the Stroud & District League.

He lives with his wife and son in Stonehouse, Gloucestershire, where he works as a chargehand linesman for the Midlands Electricity Board.

Tall, and now gaining in strength, he is clever in possession of the ball and it is mainly in a midfield role that he is being used at the moment.



Nearly 400 went to Stockport

That display at Gigg Lane made an enormous difference, so that we took nearly 400 to Stockport last week and that sort of support makes the whole venture more than worthwhile.

More than that, our supporters have now travelled some thousands of miles without the slightest hint of trouble on the trains.

Train chartered for Barrow

Next week, we make our longest journey since the one to Plymouth early in the season when a chartered train will go to Barrow and we are able to offer this at the bargain price of £1 5s return.

Time of departure from Luton is 9.05 a.m., leaving Bedford twenty minutes later and arriving at Barrow at 2 p.m. Kick-off is timed for 3.15 p.m.

Return timings are – Leave Barrow 5.40 p.m., arriving Bedford 10.42, Luton 11.10 p.m.

A train will also be run to Torquay a fortnight today but, at the moment, timings are not known, nor is the exact amount of the fare, though I calculate that it will be in the region of £1.





