For the Town, it has been quite a testing start to the new season with two tough away matches behind them and, the pre-season games apart, this is the first sight the home fans have had of the re-built team in action.

After a promising enough start, the result at Bolton was a trifle disappointing but, possibly, some of the pain induced was removed by the fact that the Wanderers overcame Sheffield Wednesday, who are expected to be a power in the Second Division.

Team was re-cast

For the League Cup-tie at Gillingham on Wednesday, some re-casting of the team was done, with David Court, perhaps surprisingly omitted on Saturday, coming in to do a worthwhile job in the middle of the field.

With Tony Read and Chris Nicholl also recalled, there was a notable tightening up in defence which was plainly necessary after the way in which some of the goals were literally gifted away at Burnden Park.

Macdonald winner

As is usual, Gillingham were doughty fighters, but they really had not much

more than determination to offer and the Town won more comfortably than the one goal margin in their favour would suggest.

Decider came from Malcolm Macdonald on whom, judging by the evidence so far, a great responsibility will devolve for getting the goals this season.

However, the main thing was that the display at Gillingham showed that there is the all-important command in the middle of the field without which no team can hope for success.

Hoping for 20,000 today

Today, Norwich City are the visitors and, with something of the local derby atmosphere surrounding the clash, there

will be some disappointment if the attendance does not verge on the 20,000 mark.

Big money has been spent during the summer and the club are obviously hoping to re-coup some of it through the turnstiles.

Tough test next week

A convincing win today would do much for the confidence of the team, especially as they are called upon to face a stiff task in taking on Birmingham City at St Andrew's next Saturday.

Whenever Norwich is mentioned, one, of course, recalls the two semi-final battles between the two clubs in 1959 and it was a goal from Billy Bingham, strangely enough on the Birmingham ground in the replay that took the Town to Wembley, after the first match at Tottenham had ended at 1-1.

Operation on Chairman

Supporters will be sorry to hear that the club Chairman, Tony Hunt, who has done much to galvanise the Town's fortunes since he joined the Board, has had a major operation in the London Clinic.

News is that he is progressing favourably, but it is likely to be over two months before he will be able to watch the team in action.

Shook football world

Far from uneventful was the close season, for no sooner had it begun than the Town shook the football world by going to Old Trafford and signing four Manchester United players for a combined fee of £35,000.

Most of this was for Jimmy Ryan and Don Givens, both of whom have gone straight into the first team and the other two Ken Goodeve and Peter Woods are youngsters of quite a deal of experience and much promise.

All except Givens, who was in Europe with the Eire party, were included by the Town for their fortnight's tour of Spain which proved to be most successful.

Hope for repeat

This was the first venture of this kind the club had undertaken for about ten years and it is something that everyone who was in the party, myself included, hope will be repeated at the end of this season.

Certainly, it was a fine reward for the

feat of the team in making such a great burst in the closing weeks to clinch promotion.

Clinched Hoy deal


Whilst in Spain, Manager Alec Stock took the opportunity to agree a £20,000 fee with Crystal Palace for Roger Hoy, who duly signed when he returned to this country and preparations for the season were completed when David Court, after protracted negotiations with Arsenal, agreed to become a Luton player.

Two outward transfers were made, Sandy Davie going to Southampton for £12,500 and £10,000 being collected from Plymouth Argyle for that highly useful player, Keith Allen, who gave the Town such unstinting service.

Results were mixed

In the pre-season games, mixed results were achieved, beginning with a 1-1 draw with Royal Antwerp in Blankenberge and followed by a 4-3 victory over the Dutch team from Arnhem, Vitesse.

Then came a visit from Burnley, the club reputed to have the finest crop of youngsters in the country, and a little unluckily, the Town went down by 2-1.

Norwich found they have some problems after all

Norwich City's failure to get off the mark with a win over Portsmouth last Saturday was a big disappointment to all Canaries' fans who have been building big hopes for their heroes this season.

With only four minutes to go, it looked like both points for Norwich . . . until Pompey snatched a simple equaliser.

So manager Ron Saunders, who felt he had solved his most serious team problems, may have still more re-shuffling to do before he gets the best from his team. His only consolation is that the situation is not nearly so bad as it was when he took over a year ago.

Ironical situation

Then, he had a serious weakness in attack. At that time the Canaries had perhaps the most impotent attack in the Second Division.

An ironical situation when it's remembered that only two years ago they released such outstanding hot shots as Hugh Curran and John Manning and that other renowned strikers as Ron Davies and Laurie Sheffield were both transferred during the past four years!

Newcomers improved it

The signing of two new forwards — Graham Paddon (from Coventry) and Peter Silvester (Reading) — did much to improve the position and, when the re-shaped attack had settled down, the goals began to flow again. In two end-of-season games the Canaries hit Portsmouth 4-1 on their own ground and crushed Birmingham City 6-0 at Carrow Road.

Norwich remained unbeaten in their final twelve games of the campaign. The corner had been turned — or so it seemed.

Better away form

Another big improvement was shown in their away form which had deteriorated so badly. After winning at Villa Park on the opening day, they won only one of their next eighteen away games — and scored only six goals in the process.

But, though they drew several times, Norwich haven't lost since they went tumbling 0-4 at Queen's Park Rangers on 17 February.

This is the first time we've met in the League since 1962-63 when we won

4-2 at Kenilworth Road and drew 3-3 away. Our full League record against them is:

Epic Semi-Final clash

Our most famous clash was, of course, when we opposed each other in that epic FA Cup semi-final of 1959, drawing 1-1 at White Hart Lane with the Hatters squeezing through by a solitary goal in the Birmingham replay.

The Norwich club was formed in 1905 and immediately joined the Southern League. For the first three years of their existence Norwich played on a ground at Newmarket Road; they moved to The Nest in 1908 and remained there until 1935 when their present ground at Carrow Road was opened.

Division III founder members

They were founder-members of Division III (South) in 1920 and won promotion to Division II in 1934. They remained up only five years, though, and reverted to Division III until 1960 when they recaptured the Second Division status they have since held.


If their achievements in the Football League have been modest, their Cup exploits have been outstanding. Three seasons back they defeated First Division Sunderland 1-0 on their own ground in the FA Cup; the previous year they won 2-0 at Old Trafford to shock champions-to-be Manchester United.

Impressive list of scalps

In 1959 they reached the semi-final — one of only four Third Division clubs to get that far — after knocking out Manchester United (3-0), Cardiff (3-2), Spurs (1-0) and Sheffield United (3-2).

Married with two children, Simon, aged 14, and Kathryn 9, Mr New is employed as a chartered electrical engineer. His main hobbies are bee-keeping and country walks, and he is a past President of the Portsmouth Referees' Society.

Has officiated in over 400 Football League matches and FA Cup-ties, and has also been in charge of every round of the League Cup up to the semi-final.

With the exception of York City he has refereed matches in which all League clubs have been concerned.




