Without doubt, everyone concerned with the club is feeling a whole lot better now that the ice has been broken and the first victory in Division II achieved.

More than that it came in such impressive style that Oxford United, who came here as unbeaten joint leaders, were never in the hunt.

Three goals in the first half saw to that and Malcolm Macdonald rounded off a nice tidy 4-0 success with his second goal soon after the interval.

Two superb goals by Matt Tees

Thus he emulated the feat of Matt Tees, who has made a successful return to the team by heading two superb goals during the first half.

On their form during this period, the Town will take some stopping and it indicated that those Jeremiahs who have been predicting that the Town would have difficulty in holding their own in their new sphere, were well wide of the mark.

Represents a solid start

Four points out of eight may not be exactly world-shaking, but it is a solid start, especially bearing in mind the fact that the first match was lost.

One thing that the display against Oxford suggested to me was that the Town have now got the measure of things and that the new players, after a tentative sort of start in some cases, have now settled down as valuable members of the side and have fitted into the general plan.

Penalty expert Macdonald

This success followed the partial one at Birmingham on Saturday when a point was rescued by a late penalty by the expert Macdonald, who makes the taking of such kicks in vital circumstances look so easy.

Certainly, there was plenty of tension and frayed nerves about on this occasion, but he did not show that he was affected and he has probably never placed the ball more accurately.

Roger Hoy was a casualty

Casualty on Tuesday was Roger Hoy who slightly pulled a muscle just before half-time. He was kept off the field and replaced by Jimmy Ryan who thus had the opportunity to show the quality of his football.

Expectations were that Hoy would be fit for this afternoon's match with Middlesbrough, but it may well have had to be a late decision.

On anybody's list, Middlesbrough must have been among the top four clubs fancied for promotion this season, because they have had two near misses and have had three remarkably consistent seasons in the Second Division.

Did no 'shopping' in close season

So consistent, in fact, that they did not deem it necessary to do any close season 'shopping', and are relying on the players, the vast majority of them local products, who took them so close to the prize last April.

At the same time, a note of despondency must have crept in when they went down 2-0 at home to Oxford last Saturday. However, re-adjustment came at Birmingham on Tuesday when they won 1-0 with a team that showed several changes.

Tough assignment at Leicester

Another win for the Town today would put them in good heart for what is likely to be a very tough assignment indeed — their meeting with Leicester City at Filbert Street next Saturday.

Third in the table last time, only two points behind promoted Blackpool, they must have begun this campaign as firm favourites. Yet, in their first two home matches against Cardiff City and Carlisle United, they dropped three points, and that must have set them thinking.

Looks like being an open affair

These are early days in which to be thinking of promotion and relegation, but the early evidence would seem to point to the fact that the Second Division will be a very open affair this season

which, of course, is all for the good of the game.

A great chance for the Town to go through to the third round of the League Cup comes on Tuesday when they receive Workington from the Fourth Division, at Kenilworth Road.

Experienced Workington

Despite their obvious financial difficulties, they have got together for this season an experienced side which they hope will enable them to be among the leaders before long.

Without setting anything alight, they have made an encouraging sort of start and they have the reputation for trying to play constructive football.

Goals expected from these two

So far, however, the goals have not been coming from their forwards, despite the obvious potential of such players as Les Massie, who had ten seasons with Huddersfield Town and Tommy Spratt, who earned the reputation for being a marksman with Bradford and Torquay United.

So, this could prove a much more interesting match than would appear to be the case on paper and in view of the disparity of the status of the two teams.

Certainly, Workington will be out to cause a surprise, but the Town have only to touch their first half form against Oxford, to make absolutely certain of Cup progress.

First Division again is Middlesbrough's ambition *by Tony Pullein*

Middlesbrough's promotion hopes took a severe jolt following successive defeats at Hull (0-1) and at home to Oxford United (0-2) last Saturday. Real coupon busters those results. For Middlesbrough were among the hottest promotion favourites as the season kicked off.

Late collapses cost them promotion in each of the last two seasons. Two years ago they looked booked for second place — then failed to win any of their last seven games. Last season they forfeited a good chance when they collected only eight points from their last seven matches.

Must withstand loss of key men

It should be said that Middlesbrough opened the season without one of their chief strikers, Hugh McIlmoyle, who was injured. Yet, a promotion-minded club must be able to withstand the temporary loss of key players if they hope to achieve their ambitions.

This is Middlesbrough's first League game at Kenilworth Road since 1962-64 when we completed a double over them, winning 4-3 here and 2-0 at Ayresome Park.

They have never beaten us at Kenilworth Road in League games, our record against them being:

Won the Amateur Cup twice

Middlesbrough are the only Football League club to have won the FA Amateur Cup, succeeding in 1895 and 1898. The club was formed in 1876 and initially turned professional in 1892.

But they reverted to amateurism two years later and subsequently won the Amateur Cup twice in four years. They were admitted to the Football League Division II in 1899 and three years later won promotion to the First Division for the first time.

A long spell of top grade football was enjoyed until a disastrous season in 1923-24, when they finished bottom ten points behind the next club, and went tumbling down.

Three years later they won the Second Division championship, creating two scoring records which stand to this day.

Their 122 goals has never been surpassed in Division II and no other Second Division player has bettered the late George Camsell's fifty-nine goals that season. They were relegated the following year but regained their place within twelve months.

Division I again is their ambition

Middlesbrough left Division I for the last time in 1954 and their greatest ambition is to win back a place in the highest sphere, particularly as they have a ground so worthy of the best the game has to offer. Pre-World Cup improvements increased seating accommodation to almost 9,000.

Ayresome Park, the club's present headquarters which was one of the stadiums for the 1966 World Cup games, was acquired in 1904 and, by good fortune, the official opening match was a First Division encounter with local rivals, Sunderland, on 12 September 1904. The visitors won 3-2.

Was used for internationals

Seventeen months after the official opening Ayresome Park was awarded the England v Ireland match and staged the corresponding international championship fixture again in 1914.

Wales were England's opponents there in 1947 but since then the ground has not played host on England's behalf.

There was an Under-24 international with Scotland in 1961 then the most important games of all in 1966 when North Korea met USSR, Chile and Italy.

Middlesbrough were relegated to the Third Division in 1966 but regained their place at the first attempt. Now nothing less than a return to Division I will satisfy manager Stan Anderson and his men.

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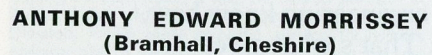

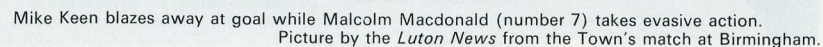

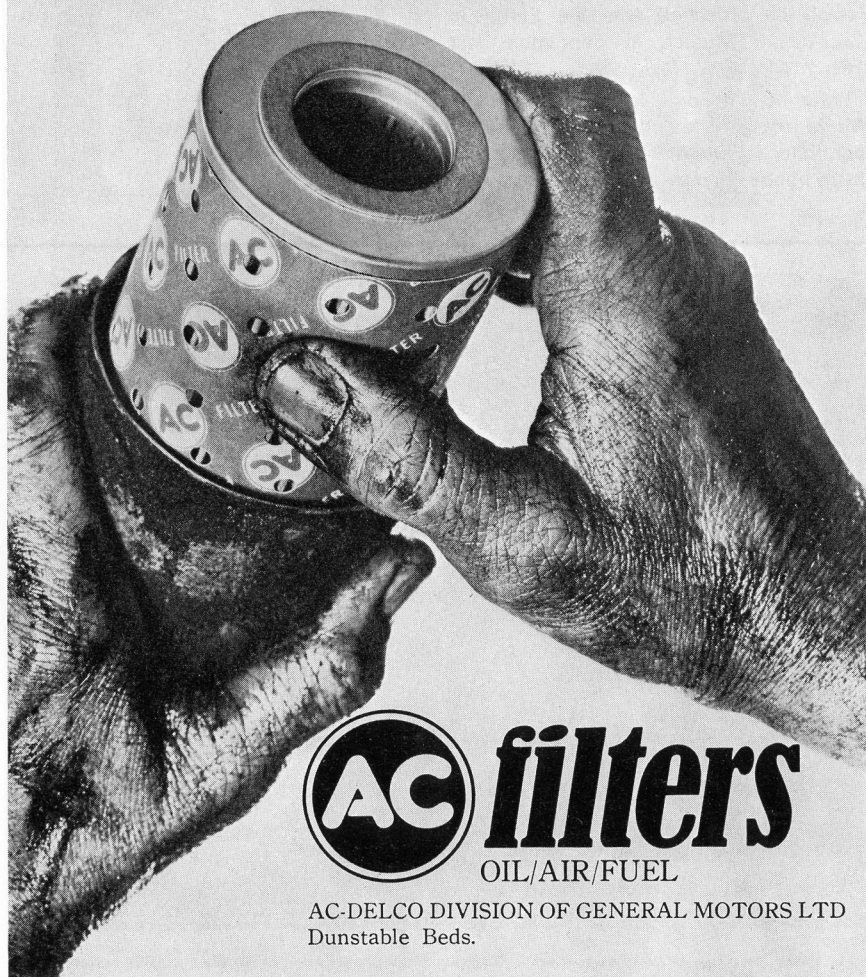
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£55,000 striker Hugh McIlmoyle, now with his sixth club

Here are the pen pictures of the leading players on Middlesbrough's books.

WILLIE WHIGHAM (Goalkeeper). Now considered one of the best in the division, Willie is hoping he can repeat a feat he helped perform at Falkirk—rise with the club from Second to First Division. Willie gave splendid service to Falkirk, missing only a handful of matches during his last five seasons there. Middlesbrough signed him in 1966 and, apart from a short spell last season, he has remained first-choice since.
League record: Falkirk 159 aps. Middlesbrough 139 aps.

ALEC SMITH (Right-back). Alec, a local lad, has really established himself over the past two seasons. He initially stepped into the League team in 1965–66 but had several lengthy spells out of action through injury.
League record: Middlesbrough 87 aps, 1 gl.

GORDON JONES (Left-back). Captain of the side, Gordon is Middlesbrough's longest serving player. He joined the club from school in 1958, made the first-team in a couple of years and won selection on several occasions for England Under-23s. Hopes to complete his fourth century of League games this season.
*England Under-23 9 aps.
League record: Middlesbrough 367 (2) aps, 4 gls.*

GEORGE SMITH (Right-half). Signed from Portsmouth for £50,000 in January 1969, thus returning to his native north-east after an extensive tour. He failed to make Newcastle's first-team so he shifted across to the west coast to Barrow. He became the star of their 1966–67 Fourth Division promotion team, Portsmouth being one of many clubs to note his form. A £20,000 fee was agreed and he moved down south for a couple of years.
League record: Barrow 91 (1) aps, 11 gls; Portsmouth 64 aps, 2 gls; Middlesbrough 59 aps.

BILL GATES (Centre-half). Bill, a former England youth international, is now entering his tenth season as a League player with Middlesbrough but he's a long way from the veteran stage as the club originally blooded him while he was still 16. Last season he missed several games after breaking his jaw.
League record: Middlesbrough 185 (2) aps, 7 gls.

FRANK SPRAGGON (Left-half). Frank made Middlesbrough's first-team in 1963–64 and has been a fixture for the past three seasons. Passed one milestone in his career last season when he netted his first League goal, against Birmingham.
League record: Middlesbrough 127 (1) aps, 1 gl.

DAVID MILLS (Outside-right). David is a young lad for whom the club has tremendous hopes. He had very little League experience prior to this season, but he shone so well in pre-season matches he earned himself a place in the senior squad for the opening games.
League record: Middlesbrough 4 (5) aps, 1 gl.

ERIC McMORDIE (Inside-forward). Eric came across from Dundella in 1964, won his way into Middlesbrough's senior team in 1965–66 and

the following season he was picked for Northern Ireland's Under-23 side. Now he is a regular member of Ireland's full international eleven.
*N Ireland 10 aps, 3 gls; N Ireland Under-23 1 ap.
League record: Middlesbrough 135 (5) aps, 15 gls.*

HUGH McILMOYLE (Centre-forward). The club signed Hugh from Carlisle for £55,000 in September 1969. He sprang to early prominence when he was selected for Leicester City's 1961 FA Cup final team though he had only a handful of League games behind him. He moved on for a short while to Rotherham before opening the first of his two spells with Carlisle, where he set up a club record with forty-four League and Cup goals in 1963–64, thirty-nine of them in League matches. Later he moved to Wolves, then Bristol City, before rejoining Carlisle for a club record £22,000 fee two seasons ago.
League record: Leicester 21 aps, 5 gls; Rotherham 12 aps, 4 gls; Carlisle (first spell) 77 aps, 44 gls; Wolves 90 aps, 35 gls; Bristol City 20 aps, 4 gls; Carlisle (second spell) 79 aps, 30 gls; Middlesbrough 31 aps, 6 gls.

WILLIE MADDREN (Centre-half or Centre-forward). Though normally a defender, Willie deputised, with some success, for centre-forward Hugh McIlmoyle in the opening friendly and League matches. But he's not entirely fresh to an attacking role for he began his career as an inside-forward—and made his League debut at outside-left! Bill has been a professional since June 1968.
League record: Middlesbrough 12 aps, 1 gl.

JOHN HICKTON (Inside-forward). John was the Second Division's top scorer with twenty-four goals last season—he hit four more in cup-ties—and must now be one of the most feared strikers in the game. It was the third year running he has finished the club's top scorer and, since joining them from Sheffield Wednesday in 1966, he has hit ninety-three League and Cup goals for them.
League record: Sheffield Wednesday 52 (1) aps, 21 gls; Middlesbrough 159 (3) aps, 82 gls.

JOE LAIDLAW (Outside-right). Joe was introduced to Middlesbrough's senior team three seasons ago after making a big impression in the reserves with his great determination and hard shooting. Last term, his first as a regular, he was second highest scorer with twelve goals.
League record: Middlesbrough 42 (2) aps, 12 gls.

DERRICK DOWNING (Outside-right). Derrick joined Middlesbrough from Frickley Colliery as an outside-right but has performed equally well on the left-wing. He became a regular during Middlesbrough's 1966–67 Third Division promotion year but the following year was struck down by injury. He recovered to reclaim the place he has held for the past two seasons. But he was named substitute for early games this season.
League record: Middlesbrough 114 (8) aps, 24 gls.

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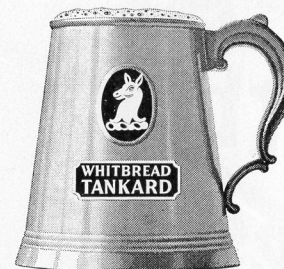
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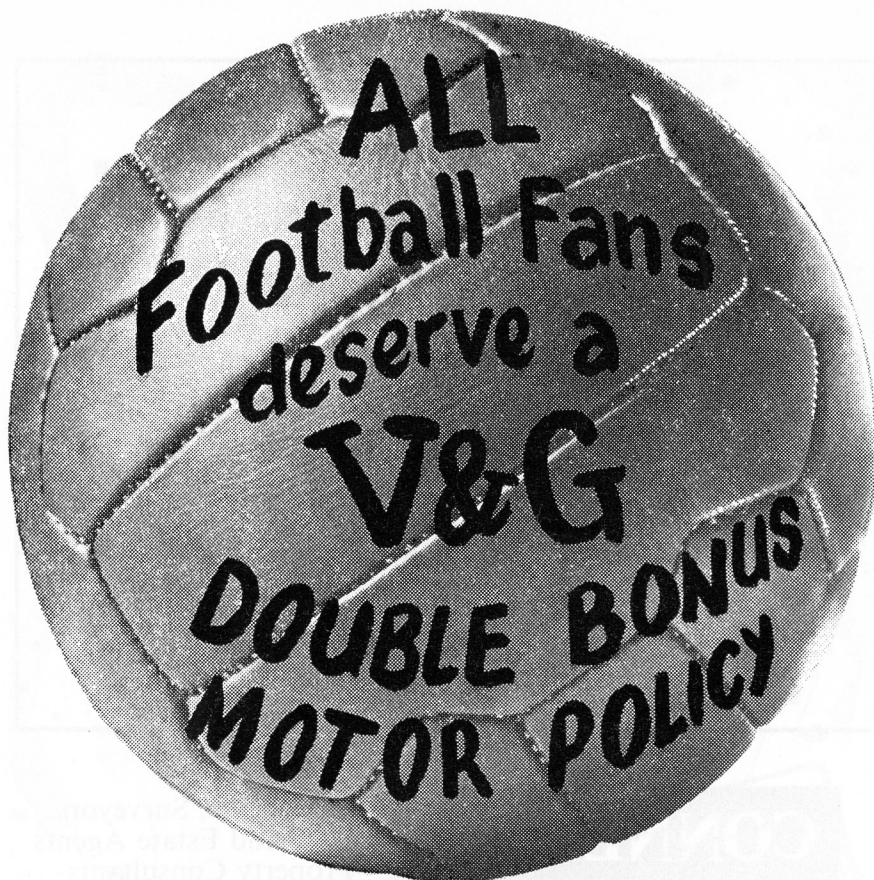
