During the weekend, Manager Alec Stock went on record as saying that a home draw against a First Division club in the League Cup would be the best means of sparking off the enthusiasm which he feels is missing at the moment.

At least tonight, the Town have an outstanding chance of going into the third round at which stage several plum ties have to develop and, on paper, with due respect to Workington, they should not have much difficulty in making progress.

Chance to set up a new record

In point of fact, the third round is the latest stage they have ever reached in this competition, but there must be a chance this season of them setting up a new record for themselves.

Especially would this be the case if, assuming, of course, that nothing goes wrong tonight, they are fortunate enough to be drawn at home again when the pairings are announced on Thursday morning.

No goal against at home yet

This is an obvious line to take after the Town's splendid record this season at Kenilworth Road where they have yet to

concede a goal and have taken five points out of six.

Add the point gained so courageously at Birmingham and it can be seen that the Town have made a highly respectable start to their new career in the Second Division.

In fact, their only setback came on the opening day at Bolton when they were obviously feeling their way, and after which changes were made which have proved a considerable improvement.

A matter of trial and error

Like everything else, football is a matter of trial and error and success goes to the clubs who spot their errors most quickly

and are able to do something about them.

In mentioning the need for more enthusiasm, Mr Stock was expressing the disappointment that is being felt that in the three home games to date, the crowd has been only marginally over 16,000.

Manager says he is baffled

After the rout of Oxford last Tuesday, there was confident expectation that the crowd for Middlesbrough's visit last Saturday would be much nearer to the 20,000 mark which just about represents the point of breaking even for the club.

Instead, the figures were the lowest yet and the manager admitted afterwards that he was baffled, though he did concede that car industry troubles are probably contributing to the fact that the support, so far, is below the mark which was expected.

However, success eventually brings its reward and if the Town can continue in their present winning vein, they must make the break-through soon.

Workington work on a shoe string

Six points out of the first ten can be regarded as a satisfactory start and the picture will be even brighter if no mistake is made against Workington tonight.

Although 'The Reds' are languishing at the moment in the lower reaches of Division IV, they have quite an impressive record in this competition and are being managed shrewdly, on a shoe string so far as finance is concerned, by Brian Doyle.

Manager is happy with them

Last week, he is said to have turned down a more lucrative job as assistant manager to Ipswich Town because he is happy at Workington though he says, 'It is difficult trying to manage on our small gates.'

Last season, only just over 48,000 watched their twenty-three home matches and, as a comparison, that number have seen the Town in their three home gates to date.

So, with an average crowd of only just over 2,000, there is no money to spare at Borough Park and Doyle has had to

rely on free transfer men for his signings. Yet, in re-building, he has managed to get together some very useful, experienced players.

Should a replay be necessary, then it will be at Workington next Wednesday (7.40 pm).

League programme is all-important

Meanwhile, despite their Cup commitments, the Town have to keep their league programme in the forefront and they are likely to face a tough test when they meet Leicester City at Filbert Street on Saturday.

Favourites for the Division II promotion stakes before the season began, Leicester have made a no more than average start with five points from five games, but these are early days yet, and Leicester, managed by Frank O'Farrell, formerly of Torquay United, have a wealth of talent on which to draw.

By a strange twist, the former Town manager, Allan Brown who was in line for the Leicester job, along with O'Farrell, is now in charge at Torquay.

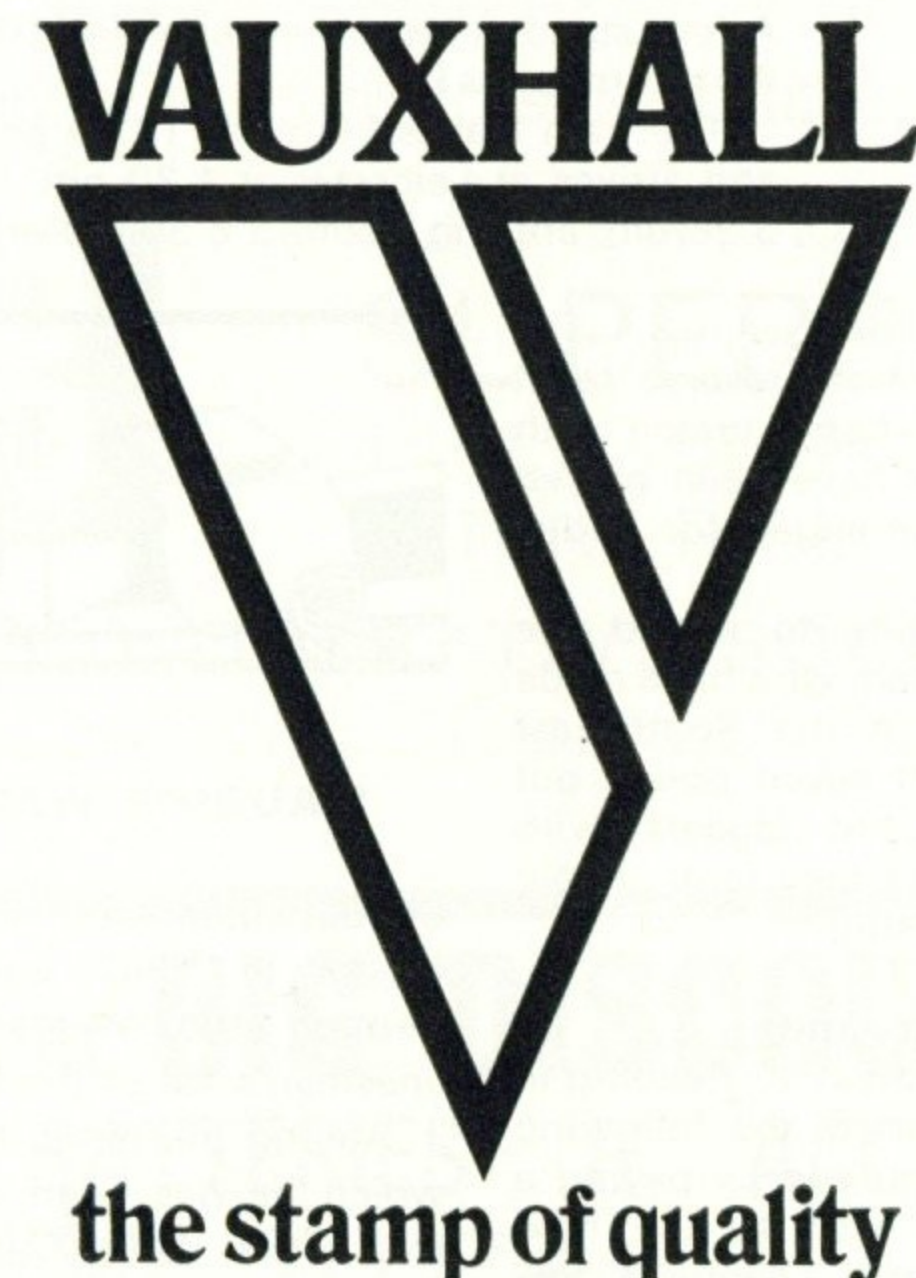
Malcolm Macdonald who caused the Oxford defence so much trouble, closes in dangerously once again.

Finally, congratulations to our assistant secretary, Terry Newman, who is being married on Saturday week and thus will be missing from our next home match with Orient.



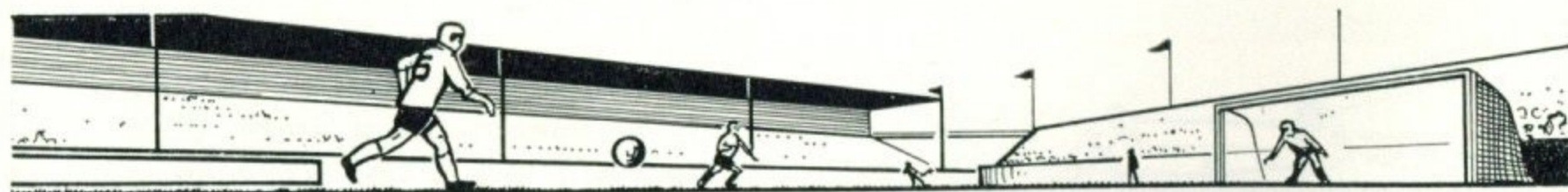
MAURICE WASHER (Bristol)

Workington need some watching in Cup-ties

When Cup-tie time comes around Workington are a team to fear! All right—I know a glance at the League tables shows them fairly moderately placed in Division IV. Yet something seems to come over this Cumbrian side when the challenge of a Cup is placed before it.

They have battled their way into the quarter finals of the League Cup on two occasions. In 1963–64 their hopes ultimately ended at Upton Park where West Ham, then at their peak, crushed them 6–0. The following year they strode on again, this time holding Chelsea to 2–2 in the quarter-final. But they lost the Stamford Bridge replay 0–2 – both goals coming from a bright young starlet making his Chelsea debut... Peter Osgood.

Failed only once

In fact, only once in the past seven seasons have Workington failed to reach the third round. That was last season when Barrow ousted them in a first round replay. They gained quick revenge for they faced Barrow again this season in round one – two goals from new boy Brian Wood giving them a 2–0 victory.

Workington hold the record for the biggest victory in a League Cup tie – they dazed Barrow with a 9–1 romp in 1964.

First of the Cup giant-killers

The Reds also gained something of a reputation in the FA Cup. Apart from the famous Corinthians – who were not a club playing in regular competitive football – Workington were the first great Cup giant-killers of modern times when they reached the FA Cup's last thirty-two in 1933–34. They were the first non-League club to reach the fourth round.

Ironically, though they are now a well established Football League club, they have never again progressed to round four!

The Hatters prevented them doing just that in 1955 when we beat them 5–0 at Kenilworth Road in a third round tie.

Elected to League in 1951

The Workington club was founded in 1884 and re-formed in 1921. They were elected to the Football League Division III (North), in place of New Brighton, in 1951.

They were bottom at the end of their first campaign and, when they had to apply for re-election again the following year it was felt that their brief period of membership would be ended.

But they were able to repel Wigan Athletic's challenge for their place and thereafter showed a gradual improvement.

Went into the Fourth Division

In 1967 they took fourth place in Division III (North) but the following year dropped to the bottom half which meant they became a founder member of Division IV.

After several near-misses, the Reds crept into the third promotion place in 1964 and two years later were concerned in the chase for a place in Division II – they finished fifth.

Then came a dramatic decline. In 1967 they were bottom of Division III. The following season they were 23rd in Division IV, having to apply for re-election.

Pendulum swung their way again

The pendulum swung back again, briefly, in 1968–69. For quite a while the Reds, so pitifully supported by the Cumberland public, kept up with the promotion pace-setters though they eventually had to settle for 12th position.

Last season they got back to their bad old ways, avoiding the re-election group by only one point.

Hopes seem brighter now

This season hopes look brighter. After drawing at home to Crewe (1–1), they grabbed a point from Hartlepool in another 1–1 draw.

Then they gained a 1–0 home win over Chester before suffering their first defeat at York (0–1) last week.

Workington kept the same team for all their five opening League and Cup games:

Rogan; Wilson, Butler; Geidmintis, Spencer, Wood; Tyrer, Spratt, Massie, Goodfellow, Martin.

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Two players are in their second spell with 'The Reds'

These are the players who have represented Workington consistently since the start of the season.

MIKE ROGAN (Goalkeeper). Mike joined Workington straight from school as an apprentice. He got into the League team in 1966-67 and, apart from a short spell on loan to Carlisle two seasons ago, he has been their regular keeper for almost three years.
League record: Workington 123 aps.

JOE WILSON (Right-back). Joe originally made the Reds' League side in 1955-56. Nottingham Forest signed him in 1962 and he spent three years in their First Division side before moving to Wolves. Later he spent a single season with Newport County, returning to his original club in 1968.
League record: Workington (first spell) 153 aps, 2 gls; Notts Forest 85 aps, 1 gl; Wolves 59 aps; Newport 42 aps; Workington (second spell) 79 aps, 3 gls.

DAVID BUTLER (Left-back). A Workington discovery who made his way into the League team in 1964-65. He has missed only five games over the last three seasons.
League record: Workington 180 (4) aps, 8 gls.

TONY GEIDMINTIS (Right-half). Another product of the club's youth scheme, Tony was given his chance in League football in 1964-65. It took him a couple of years to claim a regular place but now he's one of the fixtures.
League record: Workington 132 (4) aps, 9 gls.

TOMMY SPENCER (Centre-half). Tommy, once a striker, has settled well into a defensive role. Tommy moved into English football with Southampton, whom he joined from Celtic. York City signed him in 1966 and he was their top scorer with seventeen goals in his first season there. He arrived at Workington three years ago.
League record: Southampton 3 aps; York 54 (3) aps, 20 gls; Workington 105 aps, 8 gls.

BRIAN WOOD (Left-half). Brian couldn't get into West Bromwich Albion's first-team so he signed for Crystal Palace, who played him regularly for four years. In 1966 he moved across London to Orient and two years later signed for Colchester United. For the past two campaigns he had done regular duty for them. He signed for Workington this summer.
League record: C Palace 142 (1) aps, 1 gl; Orient 58 aps, 3 gls; Colchester 71 aps, 1 gl; Workington 4 aps.

ALAN TYRER (Outside-right). Bury introduced Alan to League football in 1967-68 but he didn't

make a great deal of progress at Gigg Lane. Life has been quite sweet for him following his transfer to Workington in 1968.
League record: Bury 2 aps; Workington 83 (2) aps, 9 gls.

TOMMY SPRATT (Inside-forward). Tommy was schooled by Manchester United but didn't make the League grade until joining Bradford. He topped their scorers with twenty-two League goals in 1961-62 then, after a spell in non-League soccer, he set the Torquay attack alight with seventeen goals in 1965-66. He first signed for Workington in 1966 but then went off for a spell with York City before returning in 1968.
League record: Bradford 118 aps, 45 gls; Torquay 60 (1) aps, 18 gls; Workington (first spell) 51 aps, 14 gls; York 26 (3) aps, 1 gl; Workington (second spell) 58 (2) aps, 8 gls.

LES MASSIE (Centre-forward). A renowned striker who has spent his career with Northern clubs. He started his League career with Huddersfield in 1956-57 and spent ten years as their chief scorer, topping the club list on four occasions. He spent one season at Darlington then two rip-roaring campaigns with Halifax—topping the scorers both times with twenty-five and sixteen League goals. After spending part of last season with Bradford, he moved to Workington and ended top scorer with eight League goals.
League record: Huddersfield 334 (1) aps, 98 gls; Darlington 20 aps, 2 gls; Halifax 89 aps, 41 gls; Bradford 14 aps, 2 gls; Workington 29 aps, 8 gls.

JIM GOODFELLOW (Inside-forward). A former Bishop Auckland player who made his mark in League football with Port Vale. After three seasons in their senior team he shifted to Workington in 1969 and hasn't missed a match since he arrived.
League record: Port Vale 77 (8) aps, 11 gls; Workington 50 aps, 4 gls.

JACK MARTIN (Outside-left). Aston Villa were still in the First Division when Jack made his debut for them in 1964-65. It wasn't until he joined Colchester in 1966, though, that he enjoyed a regular game. Workington signed him in 1969 and he hit five goals for them last season.
League record: A Villa 1 ap; Colchester 76 (1) aps, 11 gls; Workington 47 aps, 6 gls.

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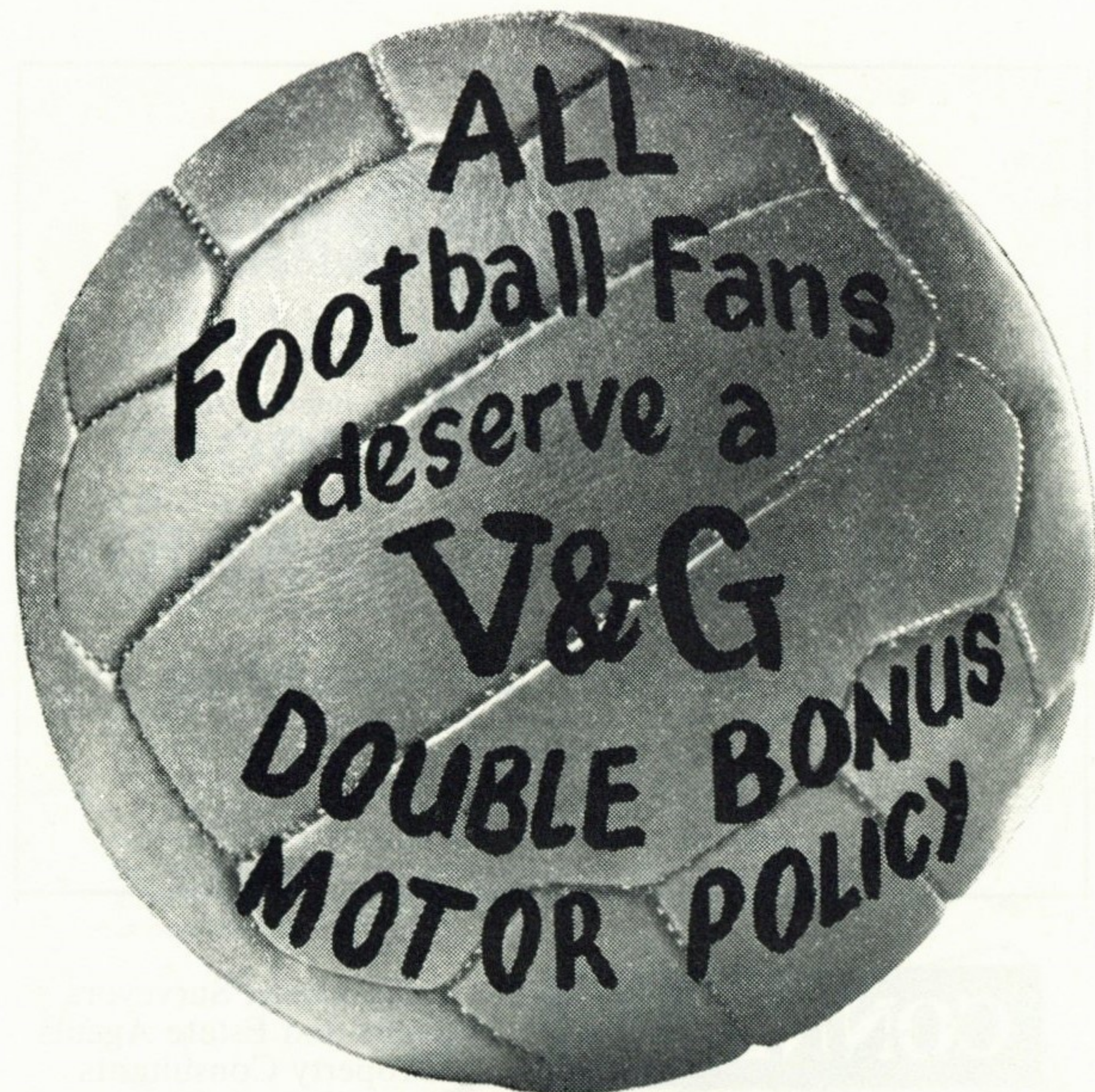
