

Certainly, it looks as if the Town's Cup luck has taken a turn for the better because after a spell in which they have had some awkward away matches, they have come out of the League Cup hat first twice in succession.

The first occasion, the clash with Workington last week, can now be looked upon merely as an appetiser to what should be the *pièce de résistance* when they are assured of First Division opposition at Kenilworth Road in the next round.

On the face of things, it should be Arsenal who are their visitors because they have ground advantage in the replay with Ipswich Town.

Arsenal have other irons in the fire

That does not take place until Monday week because of Arsenal's preoccupation, just at the moment, with their bid to retain possession of the Cities Fairs Cup.

Certainly, so long as they make no mistake against Ipswich, the Gunners will be highly popular visitors to Kenilworth Road and some of the older supporters will recall a dramatic FA Cup-tie against this opposition way back in 1952.

When Town made an unlucky exit

Then, the Town, crippled by injuries, made their exit unluckily in the sixth round and the Gunners went on to reach

the Final in which they were beaten by the only goal by Newcastle United.

There is also post-war history of Cup clashes with Ipswich. En route to Wembley in 1959, the Town secured a fifth round success over them at Portman Road by 5-2, but there came a much more protracted meeting three years later when, after a draw on each other's grounds, they went to Highbury for the second replay.

Occasion the fans want to forget

This was an occasion Town fans wanted to forget quickly because they saw their team choose to kick against a strong wind, were three down early on and

crashed to a 5-1 defeat.

Matched City in most phases

No reward from an impressive enough display. That was the Town's portion at Leicester last Saturday when they found themselves beaten by a late goal, the legality of which they contested hotly, but to no avail.

However, the Town can be encouraged by the fact that they matched Leicester in nearly every phase of the game and certainly would not have been flattered had they returned with a point.

That, in fact, augurs well for the future, because the City will probably turn out to be among the strongest teams in the Second Division and it seems probable that the confidence that has been put in them by making them promotion favourites, has not been misplaced.

Partridge should give them a boost

And, they may well have given their hopes a further boost by their £50,000 signing this week of Malcolm Partridge, a forward from Mansfield Town, who knows the way to goal.

Today, there will be a warm welcome for Orient whom we accompanied into the Second Division at the end of last season when honours were even after two stirring tussles between the teams.

Teams played a classic in bad conditions

At Kenilworth Road, the Town grabbed victory with a couple of late goals after defeat had been staring them in the face and, the return, on Boxing Day, produced what could best be described as a classic encounter in view of the difficulty of the conditions.

These were represented by a heavily waterlogged pitch which, in the opinion of many, was barely playable, but these two teams put on a rousing display, with Orient securing the only goal.

No new faces in the Orient team

For their new career in the Second Division, Orient are relying solely on the players who gained them the title last season and they are certainly not finding life in the higher circle too much of a strain, judging from their record so far.

These teams are rivals, but friendly ones, and everything points to a highly attrac-

tive game this afternoon and one which should have attracted a better than the average gate.

'Crunching' weekend comes for Town

Next weekend, comes something of a crunch in that the Town are called upon to face two difficult away assignments in the course of four days.

First comes next Saturday at Swindon who, with Watford, were promoted the season before last and immediately found their feet in the Second Division, finishing in fifth position and being in touch with the promotion issue until almost the end.

Visit to Alec Stock's old club

On the following Tuesday, the Town are due to take on Queens Park Rangers, the club for whom Alec Stock did so much, at Loftus Road.

And, of course, Stock had a long association with Orient, so two of these matches hold more than average interest for him.

But the main thing he will be looking for, obviously is points and the Town are playing confidently enough to come through this testing period successfully.



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
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FROM BOB'S OFFICE

Attention is again drawn to the dangerous practice adopted by some people of sitting on the corrugated fencing at the back of the Kenilworth Road terrace.

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

Orient survived a crisis to fight way back to Division II

Orient, our partners in promotion last season, are back in the Second Division. And behind that statement of fact lies one of the most remarkable tales of a small band of men who refused to throw in the towel when those about them felt all hope was lost.

No one expected to see the club ever again in Division II - few of us expected to see them last more than a few weeks in any division. Only three short years ago they were poised to become another Accrington.

Made collection in a bucket

One Sunday morning club officials passed a bucket around among fans pleading for pennies to save the club following a crisis meeting. All players, except goalkeeper Ray Goddard, were placed on offer in the hope of raising cash.

Orient still have financial problems. And, as one would have expected, all these pressures reflected themselves in the team's performances. In 1968-69 they struggled to keep out of Division IV. Then, magically, last season they rose to the championship of Division III.

Credit to Jimmy Bloomfield

Much of the credit for this transformation is due to manager Jimmy Bloomfield who, working on a shoestring, has knocked a bunch of local lads, plus a few bargain buys, into such a fine side. And this is no kick and hope team - they play fast, direct football with plenty of zip.

They made a good start to the League programme this season, winning their opening game at home to Sheffield United (3-1) then drawing successive games with Blackburn (a) 0-0, Charlton (h) 0-0, and Portsmouth (a) 1-1.

They suffered their first defeat at Carlisle (0-2) but recovered to beat Sunderland 1-0 at Brisbane Road last Saturday. They were knocked out of the League Cup at Fulham (0-1) in the first round.

Problems are not new to them

Financial problems are nothing new to Orient. Living, as they do, within the shadow of so many big clubs, Orient have spent most of their life fighting for survival.

Formed in 1881, they turned pro-

fessional and adopted the Clapton Orient title in 1901.

Four years later they were elected to Division II of the Football League where - apart from successive seasons when they rose to fourth - they usually struggled in the lower half of the table.

In 1929 they dropped into the Third Division for the first time, remaining there until 1956 when they began the improvement which, in 1962, was to take them into Division I.

They dropped the 'Leyton' prefix

They altered their name to Leyton Orient after the last war then, when the borough of Leyton disappeared in the re-organisation of the Greater London Council three years ago, they dropped the 'Leyton' prefix.

A last game victory over Bury clinched their promotion to the First Division in 1962 with Liverpool. But they never really had the chance to establish themselves in the top grade. They collected only one point from their opening four games and struggled from the outset.

Were bottom from end of October

They made a game fight for a couple of months but when they fell to bottom place on 27 October they remained there for the remainder of the season, eventually trailing ten points behind Manchester City, their companions in relegation.

Only three years after losing their First Division place, they dropped into the Third. And that's when their most serious problems arose.

When Orient jumped back up this year, Mr Bloomfield couldn't enjoy the luxury of buying one or two established stars to consolidate the position. He is relying entirely upon the men who gained him promotion. And, judging by those early results, they are not going to let him down.

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

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EDWARD WALLACE (Swindon)

Way back in 1949 he started refereeing in local competitions, progressing to the Wiltshire and Western Leagues before being appointed to the Football League line in 1960. Four years later, he was promoted to the referees' list.

One of the most important matches in which he was one of the officials was the 1966 FA Cup Final between Everton and Sheffield Wednesday. He has also been an official in European Cup matches in Holland and Belgium.

A production technician with British Rail, Mr Wallace is married with two children, a daughter of nine and a son of five.

His hobbies are all connected with his work for his local Referees' Association and he also coaches candidates for examination, including physical fitness.

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Lazarus had three separate spells with Queens Park Rangers

These are details of the Orient's first team squad which has remained unaltered from last season.

RAY GODDARD (Goalkeeper). Ray didn't get a senior game at Fulham, but has been the Orient keeper for the past two seasons. His safe handling and confident command of his area were some of the reasons why Orient had one of the best defensive records in the country last season.
*Division III Championship medal (1970).
League record: Orient 136 aps.*

MICK JONES (Right-back). Mick tried his luck with both Fulham and Chelsea but made little headway. Orient gave him his League debut in 1965-66, when they were previously in the Second Division, and he has missed very few games since.
*Division III Championship medal (1970).
League record: Orient 178 (3) aps, 15 gls.*

DENNIS ROFE (Left-back). A local lad who rose to first-team status in 1967-68. Won a regular place the following season and now looks set for a long stay. Orient could solve much of their financial problems by cashing in on him, but prefer to keep him.
*Division III Championship medal (1970).
League record: Orient 92 (1) aps, 6 gls.*

TOMMY TAYLOR (Right-half). A local discovery who developed in the junior sides. Orient gave him his League chance in 1967-68, he rose to the bait and claimed a permanent place in the team. Was England's youth captain last season, is wanted by several big clubs, but Orient prefer to hang on to their asset.
*Division III Championship medal (1970).
League record: Orient 107 (2) aps, 6 gls.*

TERRY MANCINI (Centre-half). Terry was an established League player with Watford until he emigrated to South Africa in 1966. But he returned within a year to sign for Orient.
*Division III Championship medal (1970).
League record: Watford 66 aps; Orient 121 aps, 14 gls.*

PETER ALLEN (Left-half). Was an amateur with Tottenham before Orient gave him his big chance to become professional. Made the League side in 1965-66 and has remained in possession almost constantly since then.
*Division III Championship medal (1970).
League record: Orient 183 (3) aps, 17 gls.*

MARK LAZARUS (Outside-right). One of soccer's famous wanderers has now returned to his original club. Orient set his remarkable League career in motion in 1958-59, then he left for Queens Park Rangers in 1960. From there he went to Wolves, back to Rangers, then to Brentford, then . . . back for a third spell with Rangers! He finally left the Bush in 1968 to help Palace, sharing in their Second Division promotion triumph of 1969. Rejoined Orient at the beginning of last season. Mark crashed two remarkable goals against Sheffield United on the opening day of the season when Orient recovered from 0-1 to win 3-1.

*League Cup winners medal (1967), Division III Championship medals (1967 and 1970).
League record: Orient 20 aps, 4 gls; QPR 53 aps, 24 gls; Wolves 9 aps, 3 gls; QPR 65 aps, 24 gls; Brentford 62 aps, 20 gls; QPR 86 (1) aps, 29 gls; C Palace 63 aps, 17 gls; Orient 34 aps, 9 gls.*

TERRY PARMENTER (Inside-forward). Terry spent several years at Fulham, making only occasional first-team appearances, before joining Orient two years ago. Last Saturday he came on as substitute to hit the only goal of the game against Sunderland.
League record: Fulham 18 aps, 1 gl; Orient 31 (3) aps, 4 gls.

MIKE BULLOCK (Inside-forward). A former England schoolboy international, Mike was only 16 when he made his debut in the First Division for Birmingham City in 1963-64—and he hit the winning goal against Manchester United! Somehow, though, he couldn't find consistency at St Andrew's and it was only after joining Oxford United, where he was leading scorer in their Third Division promotion side three seasons ago, that he began to establish himself. He joined Orient in 1968 and was top scorer with eighteen goals last term.

*Division III Championship medals (1968 and 1970).
League record: Birmingham 27 aps, 10 gls; Oxford 58 (1) aps, 15 gls; Orient 81 aps, 25 gls.*

BERNIE FAIRBROTHER (Centre-forward). Born in Harlow and was an associated schoolboy forms for Orient before being signed as a professional in December 1968. Has scored over 175 goals since joining the club. Was in the first team thirty-seven times last season and scored thirteen goals.

BARRY DYSON (Inside-left). Barry started with Bury, didn't make the senior side, but really made his name at Tranmere. In four seasons he led their scorers three times, banging home a total of 101 goals in 174 League games before moving to Crystal Palace. His next stop was Watford, where he was top scorer in 1967-68, then he switched to Orient to top their list in his first season.
*Division III Championship medal (1970).
League record: Tranmere 174 aps, 101 gls; C Palace 33 (1) aps, 9 gls; Watford 20 aps, 15 gls; Orient 77 aps, 16 gls.*

PETER BRABROOK (Outside-left). Peter, the former Chelsea and West Ham star, returned to the side last season after nearly a year's absence through injury to help their promotion drive. He gained full and Under-23 honours for England and was a member of West Ham's FA Cup winning side in 1964.

*England 3 aps; England Under-23 9 aps, 1 gl; FA Cup Winners medal (1964); Division III Championship medal (1970).
League record: Chelsea 251 aps, 47 gls; West Ham 167 aps, 32 gls; Orient 50 aps, 5 gls.*

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
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
