



news & views

This afternoon we welcome back old friends in Luton Town. They were members of the original Southern League, and became founders of the Division 3 of the Football League on its formation in season 1920/21. They were our first opponents in that League for the opening game of the season. It was a wonderful beginning for Swindon as the result was a 9-1 victory in our favour. Ted Nash and Bert Davies played in the game. I'm afraid we did not maintain that form as on the following Monday, Swindon lost at Southampton 0-4. We continued to meet each other in Division 3 until season 1936/37, when Luton gained promotion to Division 2. After World War II Luton progressed very rapidly and became a very strong team. Many supporters will remember Swindon's game at Luton in 1952, which ended the great Cup-run, which started in the Preliminary Rounds (1) before Christmas. In all Swindon played ten games defeating First Division teams Cardiff City and Stoke City. Swindon's team for most of the matches was Uprichard; Hunt, May; Kaye (Capt.), Hudson, Gray; Lunn, Onslow, R. (Millar), Owen, Betteridge, Bain. Luton went from strength to strength, and in season 1954/55 gained promotion to Division 1 by virtue of finishing in second position with 54 points, and a goal average of 88-53. Birmingham gained first position, again with 54 points, but a goal average of 92-47. They remained members of Division 1 until season 1959/60 when they were relegated, believe it or not, with Leeds United. Since then they have passed through the

Leagues, right down to Division 4. They are now on their way up again having gained promotion from Division 3 last season with the following record: played 46; won 23; drew 14; lost 9; goals for 77, against 43; points 60. This took them into second position. The previous season they were finally placed third, three points behind Swindon. Incidentally, Bournemouth were in fourth place, but last season finished fourth from bottom, and so were relegated to Division 4. Such is football. Now they have one ambition - to be back in Division 1 before 1975. We last visited Luton on the 9th November, 1968, when both clubs were fighting desperately at the top of the League table. A splendidly hard fought game resulted in a victory of 2-0 in favour of the home team, but only after a fine display by the goalkeeper, and an injury to Peter Downsborough. The return game on the 18th January, 1969, was a really great game, in spite of very muddy conditions. Swindon enjoyed quite eighty per cent of the play, but failed to score because of a wonderful display by goalkeeper Davie. Swindon: Downsborough; Dawson, Thomas; Butler, Burrows, Harland; Heath, Smart, Penman, Noble, Rogers. Luton: Davie; Dougan, Bannister; Slough, Branston, Moore; French, Lewis, Allen, Rioch, Harrison. Result: 0-0. Attendance: 18,900. Supporters will be sorry to hear of the serious illness of Jimmy Cross. I understand he is in the Intensive Care Unit of the Princess Margaret Hospital. Jimmy came to us from Everton with Manager Maurice Lindley in 1953, and played many fine games at right-half and later at right-back.



David Court (Wing-half)

Most expensive ever signing by Luton, he cost £35,000 from Arsenal during the summer. In securing him, Manager Stock showed a good deal of determination because he first began negotiations before last season's deadline, only to see them break down. Court, who is 26, had spent all his playing career at Highbury and made 55 Division 1 appearances in the last two seasons. Luton see in him the strong midfield player to complete their side for their move into Division 2 football.

John Moore (Defender)

Has had five years with Luton whom he joined when Motherwell unexpectedly gave him a free transfer. Is nearing the 200 mark in League appearances for Luton, 22 of them last season. A strong defensive player, he excels as a member of the back four.

Jack Bannister (Left-back)

Cost a fee of £8,000 from Crystal Palace about two years ago and was signed as a midfield player. However, he showed an aptitude for a place in the back four where he is neat and effective and missed only six games last season. Born at Chesterfield, he had spells with Scunthorpe United and West Bromwich before going to the Palace.

Freddie Jardine (Left-back)

Luton's longest serving player who joined the Club on a free transfer as an outside-left from Dundee. It was by accident during a private trial that he showed that he could be of value as a defender and has given the Club fine service. Last season he was unfortunate with injuries which kept the number of League appearances he made down to nine.

Peter Woods (Left-back)

One of the close season signings he went to Kenilworth Road along with three other Manchester United players in a package deal of £35,000. Has the reputation of being a hard tackler, gained as a regular member of United's Central League side. Is still in his teens.

Mike Keen (Wing-half)

The Club captain who had 10 years with Queen's Park Rangers, some of them under the present Luton Manager, Alec Stock, before moving to Kenilworth Road. A fee of £18,500 was involved. During his spell with the Rangers he led them into Division 1 and was skipper when they won the League Cup. Was born at High Wycombe where he still lives and he joined Queen's Park Rangers as a junior.

Tony Read (Goalkeeper)

At one time last season he found it difficult to get a game in his correct position, and had some outings in the Reserves at inside-forward. When Starling was injured Read was preferred to the former Scottish Under-23 International Sandy Davie, now with Southampton. Born at Haydock, Read's first club was Sheffield Wednesday and he joined Luton from Peterborough United.

John Ryan (Right-back)

A real bargain came the way of Luton twelve months ago when they picked up this talented player free from Fulham, despite the fact that he had considerable first team experience at Craven Cottage. He began the season in the side, lost his place temporarily, but fought his way back to make 36 League appearances. Was born at Maidstone and had spells with Tonbridge and Arsenal before joining Fulham.

Chris Nicholl (Centre-half)

After this 22-year-old 6ft 2in tall player had been instrumental in Halifax Town gaining a completely unexpected draw at Kenilworth Road last season, Luton went in with a big bid and, next day, the deal was completed at £30,000 which was then a record fee for the Club. Yet, Nicholl has had barely a season in League football, having gone to The Shay from the Cheshire County League football club Witton Albion. At one time, he had a trial with Burnley, but was turned down. Lost his place towards the end of last season, but is expected to establish himself this time.

Alan Slough (Wing-half)

Is probably Luton's most valuable young asset because he has long been wanted by several Division 1 clubs. However, Slough has made it very clear that he wants to continue to play for his home town club and, to that end, 12 months ago, asked for a long term contract. This he was given, one of three years with the option of a further three. Missed only one match in the promotion drive last season and has the added value of being able to play equally well in midfield or as a sweeper at the back.

Vivian Busby (Inside-right)

Made a quite remarkable impact when he was brought into the team towards the end of last season, only weeks after having left the amateur ranks with Wycombe Wanderers. Rising 21, he developed a fine understanding as a striker with top marksman, Malcolm Macdonald, and scored some vital goals. Well built, he plays with poise and experience that belie his comparatively short spell as a professional and could well reach the top flight. Had a short spell with Queen's Park Rangers as an amateur.

Malcolm Macdonald (Centre-forward)

Wore a variety of numbers during last season, but was always to be found taking the shortest route to goal as his 25 successes in 47 League matches show. When Luton paid £17,500 for a 19-year-old who had been alternating between full-back and inside-forward for Fulham, there was some eye-raising. Original intention was to use him in defence, but this thinking was changed during the pre-season matches when he showed his powers of opportunism. Was with Tonbridge before he went to Fulham.

Robin Wainwright (Inside-forward)

Tall, clever player who has yet to make his League debut, but shows a good deal of promise of developing into a more than useful performer in midfield. A local, he joined Luton as an apprentice professional from school and there was no hesitation about offering him full-time terms when the time came.

Roger Hoy (Wing-half)

Another costly close season signing, he cost £20,000 from Crystal Palace and the details of the transfer were ironed out when both clubs were on tour in Southern Spain during May. Hoy, strong and forceful, began his career with Tottenham before moving to Selhurst Park and although his role for the Palace has been mostly in midfield, Luton may use him in the back four.

Matt Tees (Centre-forward)

Another big money buy because Luton paid £25,000 to Charlton Athletic for him the day after they signed Nicholl from Halifax Town last August. Made 30 appearances, plus three as substitute and scored 11 goals, so could be said to have played a significant part in the promotion bid. However, he lost his place to Busby in the closing weeks of the season. A Scot, he came south to join Grimsby Town who collected a big fee when he moved to Charlton.

Alan Guild (Wing-half)

Last season was the first for this tall stalwart Scot as a full-time professional and his League team chances were limited to one appearance as a substitute. Born in Forfar, he played for the local club as an amateur whilst studying at St. Andrew's University where he gained a degree.

Paul Thompson (Wing-half)

Almost qualifies as a local since he comes from Kempston, near Bedford. He has been at Luton as an amateur and apprentice professional and was signed full-time during the summer.

Jimmy Ryan (Outside-right)

Almost certainly cost the greater part of the £35,000 which Luton paid Manchester United with whom he could not secure a regular place because of competition for both wing positions. As a result, he became known as one of the best players in the Central League and he was most impressive when he played in all four matches for his new club during their tour of Spain. A Scot from Stirling, he is two-footed and can take a turn on either wing.




