While the match in the forefront of everybody's mind, at the moment, is the League Cup visit of Arsenal next Tuesday, no one at Kenilworth Road is tending to lose sight of the fact that it is the bread and butter of the League that is most important in the end.

A Cup run is good for morale, both that of players and supporters and, certainly, there should be enough excitement among a near capacity crowd on Tuesday to satisfy those most avaricious for thrills.

Have seen with their own eyes

The Town players know, only too well, that they will be up against a tough proposition in the Gunners, having seen with their own eyes the comfortable way in which they dismissed Ipswich Town from the competition in the High-bury replay.

However, Manager Alec Stock is confident that his team are playing so well that they may well upset the Arsenal calculations and he says, 'It should be a very good game indeed and we are good enough to run them very close.'

Is tasting like very palatable cake

As for the League, the bread and butter

at the moment is tasting like very palatable cake, with a draw at Swindon last Saturday being followed by the first Division II away victory over Queen's Park Rangers on Tuesday.

What must be giving rise for satisfaction is the size of the following the Town are taking to away matches. The specially-chartered train to Swindon carried just over 500 and there must have been hundreds of others who made the trip by road.

Like old times on Tuesday

And, at Loftus Road on Tuesday, it was like old times, with the Town following which must have been well into four

figures, really making their presence heard. Enthusiasm is at its height at the moment and it remains to be seen whether this can be reflected this afternoon in the size of the home attendance for the visit of Bristol City.

Tantalising size of home gates

So far, it has kept tantalisingly around the 16,000 mark, but after those two fine away feats, it must surely approach 20,000 today.

No one would be inclined to tempt the fates by talking in terms of further promotion—it is far too early in the season for that—and, as in politics, a week can be a long time in football and change things drastically.

At the same time, the Town are very well placed among the leading positions and have the chance to take a further stride forward by winning today.

No goal conceded at home yet!

It will not have escaped the notice of the City that Luton have yet to concede a goal before their own fans and it was the utter reliability of the defence that was largely responsible for the netting of three points in four days.

Nothing has been more illuminating than the way in which Chris Nicholl has come back to peak form since the start of the season and the soundness down the middle of the defence has had much to do with the recent success.

Reminiscent of Owen and Shanks

In this, he is aided and abetted by John Moore and the pair have formed an understanding and a partnership that is reminiscent of the hey-day of Sid Owen and Wally Shanks.

No one will be inclined to underestimate the magnitude of the task that awaits the Town on Tuesday, but the run of success has given the players confidence and they are convinced that they can hold the Gunners.

Apart from what they have seen themselves, they will have the benefit of a thorough analysis of the Arsenal tactics and players and, of course, David Court has an intimate knowledge of their strength and weakness.

Reserve strength in depth

At the moment, Arsenal are riding high in the League table, have overcome their first tough hurdle in the Fairs Cup and have firm ideas of making certain of their entry into Europe next season by winning the League Cup.

This may not be beyond them because the depth of their reserve strength has been demonstrated by the fact that they have been able to shrug off the effects of injuries to key players like Jon Samuels, Charlie George and Peter Simpson without losing their momentum.

£100,000 signing on the side-line

In addition, they are also able to keep in the background their £100,000 signing from Hibernian, Peter Marinello, who does not look like figuring in Tuesday's Cup team, unless he secures the substitute's spot.

After that flutter of excitement, it will be back to the quest for League points for the Town next Saturday when they visit Sheffield Wednesday at Hillsbrough.


Struggle for Wednesday



If a replay of the League Cup-tie with Arsenal is necessary, it will take place at Highbury Stadium on Wednesday week, kick-off 7.30 pm.

This will not be all-ticket but, if the match takes place, our allocation of reserved seats will be about 2,800 which should be more than enough to satisfy the demand.

These will be at various prices - 25s, 20s and 15s for the upper tiers and 12s for the lower tier of the East Stand. Sale of these, if necessary, will begin at 9 am on Wednesday.

No difficulty expected

Seats in the lower tier of the West Stand can be secured

only by payment at the turnstiles and admission for standing on the terraces, will also be by paying at the gate, 6s for adults and 3s for children.

Certainly, there should be no difficulty in accommodating all our supporters who want to see a possible replay, but the situation has been a little different so far as next Tuesday's match is concerned.

Plenty of room on terraces

With regard to this, I do plead, 'Do not ask for stand tickets because there just are none available'.

However, in order to correct some misunderstanding that seems to exist, I would emphasise that the match is not an all-ticket affair and that there will be room for the best part of 25,000 on the terraces by payment at the turnstiles.

I would like to say 'Thank you' to the hundreds of fans who gave the team such loyal support against QPR on Tuesday.

Train times for Sheffield


It does make a tremendous amount of difference to the away team and we hope that there will be a similar-size following to Sheffield next Saturday for the match with the Wednesday.



Bristol City seem to be trying to change that defensive image

We've come to look upon Bristol City as basically a defensive side. They don't often run up big totals, but they're very difficult to score against. Last season, for instance, only eight visiting teams managed to find the net at Ashton Gate.

But City seem to be trying to change their image. On the opening day they beat Sunderland 4-3 at home and in a recent away League match at Sheffield United they squandered a three goals lead in the last twenty-five minutes to draw 3-3.

The goals are coming - even if the defence doesn't look so steady - so maybe the City aren't going to feel the loss of Bobby Kellard, transferred to Leicester City for £55,000 at the beginning of the season, as much as we had expected. Kellard always seemed to be the driving force behind them last season.

Need to improve away from home

City are now out to improve another aspect of their play - their away form. If they had been able to reproduce their home form when travelling, City would have been among the promotion candidates last term.

Since winning at Aston Villa (2-0) in February, they failed to succeed in any of their remaining five away games and have not won any of their five away League and Cup games this term.

City's League goalscorers this season are: Skirton 4, Galley 3, Sharpe 3, Garland 2, Gow 1, Wimshurst 1.

Known as 'own-goal' experts

Last season City gained a reputation as 'own-goal' experts - even if they didn't score that many themselves, they could at least slip them past their own keeper. Dickie Rooks 'scored' twice against his side while Jack Connor, Terry Bush and Ken Wimshurst all conceded unwanted goals.

The habit seemed catching, for several of their opponents repaid their hospitality - including Graham Moore (Charlton), Jim Standen (Millwall), Frank Burrows (Swindon) and Peter Garbutt (Carlisle).

City men who scored at the right end were: Gerry Sharpe 10, Terry Bush 9, John Galley 9, Alan Skirton 7, Chris Garland 5, Danny Bartley 3, Bobby Kellard 3, Jack Connor 1, Trevor Jacobs 1, Trevor Tainton 1, Dickie Rooks 1 in

League games. Kellard 2, Galley 1, Rooks 1 and Sharpe 1 in the League Cup and Skirton 1 in the FA Cup.

Solitary appearance in Cup final

The club was formed as Bristol South End in 1894, adopted its present title three years later and won a place in the Football League (Division II) in 1901.

Five years later they were Second Division champions, winning promotion with Manchester United - the club that was to beat them by a solitary goal in the 1909 FA Cup final at Crystal Palace.

They have never again managed to reach the final but in 1920 they were beaten 2-1 by Huddersfield in the semi-final.

City soon settled in Division I and were runners-up in their first season - missing the title by only three points - but that remains their best League achievement.

Narrowest margin ever recorded

Following their relegation in 1911 they remained in Division II until suffering a further drop into the then new Third Division (South) in 1922. That was the start of a couple of yo-yo campaigns. They were clear Third Division champions by six points in 1923, bottom of Division II in 1924.


Three years later they regained Second Division status which was maintained for only a further five campaigns. A long stint of Third Division fare followed until they eventually fought their way back in 1955, but by 1960 they were down again.

When they won promotion on the most recent occasion (in 1965) it was by the narrowest margin ever recorded in Third Division history - by 0.116 of a goal better than Mansfield.





Goalkeeper has missed only ten games in six seasons

This is the City's first team squad:

MIKE GIBSON (Goalkeeper). One of the most consistent performers in the country, missing only ten games — through injuries — since joining City from Shrewsbury Town over six years ago. His solidarity, sound handling and fine positional sense had impressed City scouts who watched him mature in three seasons of Third Division soccer with Shrewsbury.

League record: Shrewsbury 76 aps; Bristol C 298 aps.

TREVOR JACOBS (Right-back). Trevor had early doubts about his potential, reverting to amateur status after eighteen months as an apprentice. But he was persuaded to sign full time in 1965, made his League debut at Rotherham in November 1966 and he established himself as first-choice for this position two seasons ago.

League record: Bristol City 95 aps, 2 gls.

BRIAN DRYSDALE (Left-back). Brian was discovered by Lincoln City though he never really seriously broke into the first-team. After moving to Hartlepool in 1965 he held down a firm place in their League team, missing only three games in three years. Bristol City signed him in 1969 and he was ever-present last season.

League record: Lincoln 14 aps; Hartlepool 169 (1) aps, 2 gls; Bristol City 50 aps.

TREVOR TANTON (Right-half). A local lad who developed in City's junior sides. Got his chance in the League side against Carlisle in September 1967 but it took him two years before he was playing regularly in the side. This season he has been named as substitute for several games.

League record: Bristol City 34 (11) aps, 1 gl.

DICKIE ROOKS (Centre-half). City signed strong man Dickie from Middlesbrough during the 1969 close-season. He started with his home-town club Sunderland but never made a really big hit with them. Middlesbrough invested £20,000 in him in 1965 and he walked straight into their first-team, remaining until he fell into dispute with the club. Today he is one of the Second Division's outstanding defenders.

League record: Sunderland 34 aps, 2 gls; Middlesbrough 136 (1) aps, 14 gls; Bristol City 44 aps, 1 gl.

JACK CONNOR (Centre-half). Jack spent eight years with Huddersfield prior to joining City in 1960. For nine years he was City's regular centre-half but lost his place when Rooks arrived. He has on two occasions remained ever-present during a season.

League record: Huddersfield 85 aps, 10 gls; Bristol City 360 (1) aps, 10 gls.

GORDON PARR (Left-half). Gordon's early days at Ashton Gate were frustrating. Though he made a couple of League appearances in 1957-58 he had to wait five years for another chance. But it was worthwhile for he has been enjoying regular Second Division football for the past seven years.

League record: Bristol City 254 (1) aps, 4 gls.

KEN WIMSHURST (Wing-half). Newcastle didn't regard Ken good enough for their first team

so he broke into League football with Gateshead. He spent a while in Wolves Reserves, but really made his name at Southampton, helping them into Division I in 1966. He is now in his fourth season with City.

League record: Gateshead 7 aps; Southampton 147 (3) aps, 9 gls; Bristol City 95 (3) aps, 5 gls.

STEVE STACEY (Full-back). Five clubs in one year — that's Steve Stacey's recent record! Now he's back with his first club again. Initially, he couldn't get into City's League team so he moved to Wrexham. Ipswich signed him in 1968 but he got only a few senior games with them. Last season he spent spells on loan to Northampton, Chester and Charlton then returned to Ipswich before signing for City this season, also on loan.

League record: Wrexham 101 (3) aps, 6 gls; Ipswich 3 aps; Charlton 3 aps, 1 gl; Bristol City 4 aps.






