After collecting two more League points from Bristol City on Saturday and, with all the tensions off for the moment, Town manager, Alec Stock permitted himself the luxury of a comment on tonight's League Cup-tie.

'We do not fear the reputation of Arsenal. It is the sort of match a club has to have now and again. We have all these young supporters who did not remember the 1959 Cup final. What they want is something to talk about and they should be given it tonight', he said.

Hope for tremendous game

'What I hope is that they see a tremendous game, that we win and that will really give them something to talk about in the dark evenings of winter,' he added.

There will be, of course, a warm welcome for the Gunners, who have always been attractive visitors to Kenilworth Road and with whom the Town have had a couple of desperate, long remembered tussles in the FA Cup.

Last met before Town's decline

Last meetings between the clubs were, of course, in the First Division before the Town's rapid decline began after their Cup final defeat.

Since then, the Town have sampled



life in the basement of Division IV, have pulled themselves out of it by spirit and application.

From the way in which they are playing at the moment, it would surprise none of the regulars if Division I football should return to Kenilworth Road next season.

Before the final reckoning comes, though, a lot of water has to pass under the bridge and I have a shrewd suspicion that one or two of the teams who will be knocking at the Second Division promotion door next April are still to be found in the ruck.

No awesome opposition yet

However, in the opposition that has been

met so far, there has been nothing awesome and since what has proved to be the best formation was found after the first day defeat at Bolton, the Town have not been in dire trouble.

In fact, they have settled down into a hard-fighting, solid side, capable of playing a fluid type of football, as is proved by Alan Slough, who has suddenly taken upon himself the task of scoring goals from left-back.

As the side is playing at the moment, a real weakness cannot be pin-pointed and that is why even high-flying Arsenal may be in for a surprise tonight.

Determination of Tony Read

In six home matches, Tony Read has the distinction of not having conceded a goal and that will be a record he will not lose lightly on this occasion.

So keen was he that the record should be preserved, that he was having attention to a bruised muscle almost until the last minute before the start of the game with Bristol City.

Then, he was allowed to play only on the strict understanding that he did not kick any dead balls, which is why Slough was taking the majority of the goal kicks.

Great night for David Court

This is a great night for David Court who is thus given an early opportunity of demonstrating to Arsenal with whom he spent the whole of his previous career of nearly ten years, that they did wrong to allow him to move during the summer.

Since then Court has blended finely into the scheme of things in midfield where the tightening up brought by him and Roger Hoy, undoubtedly, has had much to do with the early season success.

To a lesser extent, John Ryan will be glad of a similar opportunity because he was also on the Arsenal books for a short time between his move from Tonbridge to Fulham, without receiving a real chance.

Stock's brief association

And, of course, Stock himself had a brief association with Arsenal as assistant manager before finally deciding that his destiny, for the time being at any rate, lay in Italy with Roma FC.

But the whole team will be bristling with determination to get a good result tonight and, in my view, it would be a decided feather in their caps if they could take

the Gunners to a replay at Highbury next Wednesday (7.30 pm).

After the heady Cup-tie stuff, it is back to the search for League points on Saturday when the Town meet Sheffield Wednesday, demoted at the end of last season, on their splendidly appointed Hillsborough ground.

Wednesday fallen on hard times

From the playing point of view, Wednesday have fallen on hard times, despite the investment of some hefty sums in new players and it is taking the ex-Swindon chief, Danny Williams, longer in which to pull things together than he envisaged on taking over.

That things will come right in the end, I have no doubt and there have been signs recently of an improvement, despite a 3-2 setback against local rivals, United at Bramall Lane on Saturday.



That our manager, Alec Stock, completed twenty-one years in football management last week, a rare accomplishment these days, rather caught us unaware.

Belatedly, I hasten to add my congratulations and hope that he will achieve his ambition of being allowed to pick a team to play in a First Division match – for us, of course.

Should tonight's match be drawn, the replay will be at Highbury tomorrow week (7.30 pm) and stand tickets will be on sale at our ticket office in Kenilworth Road from 9 am tomorrow.

Allocation should be sufficient

These are priced at 25s, 20s, 15s and 12s and our allocation is about 2,800 which should be enough to satisfy demands at this end.

In addition, unreserved seats at 12s will be available by paying at the turnstiles and there is standing at 6s (adults) and 3s (children).

Fathers and sons presented problems

A problem which we have had to face in several matches this season is that of fathers wanting to go through the same turnstile as their sons. They do not seem to understand that two persons cannot go through at the same time, nor can two different prices be registered on the turnstile.

In sections around the ground, certainly at the Maple Road bridge and in Oak Road, there are children's entrances adjacent to those for adults.

However, this has not been the case at the Kenilworth Road end, but a change is being made from tonight. Adjacent turnstiles for fathers and children have been placed at the corner of Beech Hill path and we hope that the difficulty will now be eliminated.

Youth Cup-tie here on Tuesday

Next Tuesday (7.30 pm), we shall be meeting Southend United in the second round of the Southern Junior Floodlit Cup at Kenilworth Road where on 23 November, we shall be meeting the Australian national side which is on a world tour and will be playing only two games in this country.

A specially chartered train will be run to Sheffield, leaving Luton 10.45 am,





Fairs Cup ended Arsenal's run of 17 years without winning major honour

When Arsenal won the European Fairs Cup last season it ended a run of seventeen years without an honour and convinced their players there was no mysterious jinx on them in cup-ties.

The Gunners had begun to believe they were destined never to win another cup following Wembley defeats in 1968 and 1969.

Arsenal didn't enter the League Cup until 1966-67 when they took three matches to dispose of Gillingham, then went out to West Ham. The following season they stormed to Wembley but struck an incredibly bad day and lost 0-1 to Leeds.

A year later they returned, this time to face Third Division Swindon Town. Again the Gunners were too bad to be true and were beaten 3-1 after extra-time. Last season they lost to Everton in a third round replay.

On the cup scent again

Now the Gunners, having survived the first stages of both the Fairs Cup and the League Cup, are on the cup scent once again. After being held to a goalless draw at Ipswich in the last round of the League Cup they cruised to a 4-0 win in last week's replay. In the Fairs Cup they defeated Lazio (Italy) 4-2 on aggregate.

The Gunners have adopted a strong attacking policy this season as their League results indicate:

Everton (a) 2-2; West Ham (a) 0-0; Manchester United (h) 4-0; Huddersfield (h) 1-0; Chelsea (a) 1-2; Leeds (h) 0-0; Tottenham (h) 2-0; Burnley (a) 2-1; West Bromwich (h) 6-2; Stoke (a) 0-5.

Their scorers:

League – Graham 4, Kennedy 4, Radford 4, Armstrong 3, George 1, Kelly 1, Cantello (West Brom) 1.

League Cup – Kennedy 2, Radford 1, Roberts 1.

Fairs Cup – Radford 3, Armstrong 1.

Been in Division 1 longer than any club

Founded in 1886, Arsenal first entered the Football League (Division II) in 1893 and won promotion to the top section in 1904. They suffered relegation in 1913, then regained their place at the top in 1919 when they were *elected* following an extension of the First Division. They have remained in the top section since – longer than any other club.

Arsenal have suffered several shock FA Cup defeats by teams of lower status. Five years ago Peterborough fired the Gunners 2-1 after being in arrears at the interval.

More red faces

In 1958 Northampton defeated them 3-1 and in 1954 Norwich City, later to cause a few more red faces, won at *Highbury* 2-1. Then in 1933 Arsenal were involved in what was, at the time, probably the most sensational Cup upheaval of all time. At the height of their power they went to Walsall and lost 0-2.

In 1967 Birmingham beat the Gunners 1-0 in a fifth round tie at St Andrews, then repeated the process in the corresponding round a year later. Last season Arsenal were knocked out of the FA Cup by Blackpool, who were then in the Second Division.

How susceptible the Gunners are against clubs of lower status!

Seven times champions

Arsenal have won the League Championship on seven occasions, including one sequence of four titles in five years. In 1935 they became only the second club to win three championships in a row and no club has since equalled that.

The Gunners have appeared in six FA Cup finals, winning that trophy three times.

Last title in 1953


Before winning the Fairs Cup this year, their last major honour was the League Championship in 1953. After that long spell in the doldrums, the Gunners are once again bracketed alongside the country's top teams.

And they hope for more trophies this season to compensate for that long wait.

Famous for Flavour



KENNETH BURNS (Stourbridge)

An all-round sportsman, Mr Burns has had trials at cricket with Warwickshire and Worcestershire and, in addition to his soccer interests, plays golf and snooker.

It was back in 1949 that he began refereeing in local leagues, moving on to the Worcestershire Football Combination and the West Midlands League.

Was appointed to the Football League's list of linesmen in 1958 and promoted to

referee three years later. In 1969, he was put on the FIFA list of referees.

On the line in Cup final

Among the more important matches that have come his way were the FA Youth Cup final and the Channel Islands Cup final in 1963 and the FA Cup semi-final four years later.

Then, in 1969, he officiated in one of the Football League Cup semi-finals and was senior linesman in the FA Cup final. In addition, he has taken part in games in the Fairs Cup and in Internationals.

A legal executive, he is married with two daughters. Was Chairman of the Midlands section of the Association of Football League Referees and Linesmen from 1966 and is President of that body.

Loss of players through injury has not been felt too keenly

Here are pen pictures of the Arsenal first team squad which has been playing together regularly in recent weeks.

So good has been their form that the injuries to Jon Sammels and Peter Simpson have not proved too much of a handicap.

BOB WILSON (Goalkeeper). Bob was once with Wolves, who asked a five-figure transfer fee . . . when he was still an amateur! Bob had delayed turning professional because he had hoped to get a trial with the British Olympic team. In the end he became a paid player with Arsenal, to which Wolves objected. A Football League enquiry settled the dispute by ordering Arsenal to pay £5,500. Wilson became a regular in the Gunners' side two seasons ago.

European Fairs Cup winners medal (1970).
League record: Arsenal 102 aps.

PAT RICE (Right-back). At one time Pat had more international appearances to his credit than League games for Arsenal. He became an Arsenal apprentice in December 1964, signed full-time in March 1966 and made his League debut in 1967-68. But not until now has he held a regular place in the team. Born in Belfast.

N Ireland 2 aps; N Ireland Under-23 2 aps.
League record: Arsenal 18 (4) aps.

BOB McNAB (Left-back). A £50,000 signing from Huddersfield in 1966, Bob later became an England international and was among the original forty squad for this year's World Cup. Went to Mexico, but was discarded along with five others in the final reckoning.

England 4 aps; European Fairs Cup winners medal (1970).
League record: Huddersfield 68 aps; Arsenal 144 (1) aps, 2 gls.

EDDIE KELLY (Right-half). Eddie broke into Arsenal's first-team last season and played in the Fairs Cup final. He joined Arsenal as an amateur in August 1967, signing professional the following February. A Scot from Glasgow.

European Fairs Cup winners medal (1970).
League record: Arsenal 24 (2) aps, 3 gls.

FRANK McINTOCK (Centre-half). Two seasons ago Frank created a sad record when he became the only player to appear in four Wembley finals and finish on the losing side each time. Hard in defence, difficult to shift when in possession and with a keen eye to the telling pass to open up a path to goal for a colleague, Frank commanded an £80,000 fee as long ago as 1964 when he left Leicester for Highbury. Last season he was recalled to Scotland's team, after a three years absence, and appointed captain!

Scotland 5 aps, 1 gl; Scotland Under-23 1 ap.
European Fairs Cup winners medal (1970).
League record: Leicester 107 aps, 25 gls; Arsenal 217 aps, 18 gls.

JOHN ROBERTS (Left-half). John took an unorthodox route to success in soccer. He was relegated to Division IV with Swansea and would

have suffered the same fate with Northampton had Arsenal not signed him at the end of 1968-69. He is a Welsh Under-23 international. The injury to Peter Simpson has given him his big chance this season.

Wales Under-23 5 aps.

League record: Swansea 36 (1) aps, 16 gls; Northampton 62 aps, 11 gls; Arsenal 21 aps, 1 gl.

GEORGE ARMSTRONG (Outside-right). One of Arsenal's longest-serving players, George is a former England Under-23 player. He lost his place last season but is back in favour now. Spotted in the north-east he has spent all his professional career at Highbury.

England Under-23 5 aps, 2 gls; European Fairs Cup winners medal (1970).
League record: Arsenal 262 (3) aps, 39 gls.

PETER STOREY (Inside-right). Peter has been wearing the number eight shirt this season though for five years he has been one of the most consistent members of the defence. A former England schoolboy international, he joined Arsenal as an apprentice in 1961.

European Fairs Cup winners medal (1970).
League record: Arsenal 192 aps, 2 gls.

JOHN RADFORD (Centre-forward). Arsenal's chief striker for the past two seasons, he scored nineteen goals last season. His shooting impressed Sir Alf Ramsey who introduced him to the England team two seasons ago. John hit a hat-trick against Manchester United a few weeks ago.






