Since the last programme was published, there have been big events in the club's affairs, including two more fine League victories which have taken the team into a highly challenging position at the top of Division II.

If they maintain this form during the two home matches that now loom up against Lancashire opposition, and follow up that with some reward from the visit to Charlton next Saturday, then the position will be looking very healthy indeed.

Proved that reservoir of support is there

In between the two wins there was the visit of Arsenal in the League Cup which drew the biggest crowd the ground has housed for over eleven years and created new record gate receipts in the process.

The attendance figure of 27,023 created a new 'high' in the recent history of the club and it merely went to show that there is a deep reservoir of support when the opposition is of the best.

Town went out with colours flying

Of course, Arsenal were a natural crowd-puller, anyway, because, apart from their obvious attraction, there have been some

rare old tussles between the teams, mostly in Cup-ties in the past.

Nor was the latest one any exception and the Town went out with colours flying, defeated by a goal that came into the distinctly 'streaky' category.

What would have happened could the Town have snatched the goal they deserved in the first twenty minutes when they were infinitely the more dangerous team, can only be a matter for conjecture.

Super-efficient containment

Certainly, they gave Arsenal some unpleasant shocks in the early stages and it was only the brilliant goalkeeping of Bob Wilson that kept them on an even keel.

Thereafter, Arsenal were content to contain the Town, something they did with super efficiency and, even though they had much of the play, an equaliser to the Town appeared somewhat remote.

Quickly showed that there was no reaction

Anyone who wondered what sort of reaction that exit would produce among the team, received the best of answers at Sheffield last Saturday when the Town gave one of their best performances in recent memory by whipping the Wednesday 5-1.

Once Malcolm Macdonald scored the first of his three goals early in the game, there was never much doubt about the destination of the points.

Coup de grace for Wednesday really came in two minutes immediately before half-time when the Town scored twice, and the final score did not over-estimate the clear superiority of the Luton team.

Macdonald speculation firmly denied

Once again Macdonald hit the headlines with three brilliant goals to bring his total for the season to thirteen and the feat induced further speculation early this week about his future.

Manchester United were said to be on the point of signing him, but this was speedily discounted in a 'categorical denial' by Manager Alec Stock.

Then came a statement from Chairman Tony Hunt, who said quite bluntly that Macdonald is not for sale at any price - nor is any other member of the first team squad.

This sort of forthright statement is exactly what the fans wanted to hear and there can no longer be any doubt, if ever it existed, that the number one aim of the club is to re-establish itself in Division I.

Would be really tremendous feat

If this should come about at the end of the present season, it would be a tremendous feat in itself and the team is doing well enough to bring consecutive promotion for Alec Stock for the second time in his managerial career.

Other goals last Saturday came from Don Givens, who had made a remarkable recovery from knee ligament trouble and his brace of successes was a fine tonic for

him immediately before playing for Eire in Dublin on Wednesday.

Bolton's glories are in the past

Glories of today's visitors, Bolton, are mainly in the past when they were known for a time as the most dangerous cup-fighting combination in the land.

Struggling hard to revive some of that glory is their former centre-forward, and now manager, ex-England man, Nat Lofthouse who is having an uphill battle, but who is basing his hopes for the future on a wealth of young talent that is coming through.



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


Big win over Charlton ended a dismal run for the Trotters

Bolton's 4-2 victory over us on the opening day of the season had vastly contrasting effects on the two sides.

Since then we have conceded only four more goals in thirteen League and Cup games and shot way up the table while the Trotters have struggled to re-discover that opening form.

And it wasn't until last Saturday, when they beat Charlton 4-0 at Burnden Park, that they ended a dismal run which had brought them only one win in nine League games.

Away form is poor

The Trotters have won only one away League game this season - 2-0 at Blackburn - and their only other away point was the result of a 1-1 draw at Sheffield Wednesday. They were well beaten at Portsmouth (0-4), Hull (0-1) and Sunderland (1-4).

Neither of Bolton's strikers have met with much success so far. John Byrom, best marksman with twenty-five goals last season, had netted only once before hitting two against Charlton last week and former England forward Roger Hunt has scored only twice. In desperation, manager Nat Lofthouse has dropped both of them for the occasional game or two.

Struggled to avoid relegation

Bolton seem to make a habit of starting well, then fading. Last season they were unbeaten in their first five games, hit fourteen goals . . . but ended the campaign struggling desperately to avoid relegation to Division III for the first time in their history!

A final run-in of six games without defeat ultimately saved them. But it was far too close for peace of mind, and something Mr Lofthouse wants to avoid this season.

Cannot afford ready-made stars often

But, with cash scarce, Mr Lofthouse can't enjoy the benefit of buying ready-made stars too often. Bolton have for many years relied mainly upon home-produced players and today's side is likely to contain only three or four players signed from other League clubs.

Living, as they do, within the shadows of such famous clubs as Manchester City and Manchester United, Bolton naturally have to struggle for support.

Last season their average home attendance dipped to 10,041 - almost 500 down on the previous season and a drop

of 1,500 on 1968-69. So, even if they wanted to, Bolton cannot afford to spend liberally in the transfer market.

Had to part with best young players

Yet there is a certain satisfaction in turning out a virtually home-made team, though this in itself creates problems at times.

When they come up with a real star, like Francis Lee, it is difficult for a club in their position to refuse a £60,000 offer.

That's what Manchester City paid for Lee in 1967. In Lee's case, he wanted better football anyway - and that's yet another problem.

In 1966 they lost Wyn Davies to Newcastle though he was not one of their own discoveries. And only last season Dave Hatton left for Blackpool, a fee of £40,000 being involved.

Longest spell out of the First Division

The loss of men of this calibre naturally takes its toll on the team's performances and in recent years Bolton have been struggling at the wrong end of the Second Division table - last season they finished sixteenth.

Bolton are now enduring their longest-ever spell out of the First Division. This is their seventh season in Division Two following relegation in 1964. Relegated five times previously, the Trotters had never taken more than two seasons to regain their place.

Have won the Cup on four occasions


The Bolton club was founded in 1874 and became original members of the Football League in 1888. Their highest League positions were 3rd in Division I 1892, 1921 and 1925. In 1909 they were Second Division champions and they finished runners-up in 1900, 1905, 1911 and 1935.



How Bolton received a £20,000 goalkeeper for nothing

Here are pen pictures of the Bolton players.

ALAN BOSWELL (Goalkeeper). Alan caused a sensation early last season when he told Wolves he intended to quit football — only a few months after they had paid £20,000 for him! As he was no longer a regular first-teamer, the Molineux club cancelled his contract leaving him free to sign for Bolton in October. Walsall introduced him to League football in 1961 and he joined Shrewsbury two years later. He made over 200 League appearances for them prior to his big-money transfer to Wolves.
League record: Walsall 66 aps, Shrewsbury 222 aps, Wolves 10 aps, Bolton 31 aps.

PAUL HALLOWS (Right-back). Paul came into the Bolton side two seasons ago, establishing himself last term. He lost his place for opening matches this season but got another chance when John Ritson was injured at Portsmouth.
League record: Bolton 31 aps.

SYD FARRIMOND (Left-back). A former England youth international, he first came into the Bolton side in 1958-59. For ten years he held a regular place but he lost it last season. But he has now firmly re-established himself.
League record: Bolton 357 (1) aps., 1 gl.

GARETH WILLIAMS (Right-half). Gareth was introduced to League football by Cardiff in 1962-63 and rarely missed a game during his last four years there. Bolton signed him in 1967 and, after losing his place last season, was restored to first-team duty this term.
League record: Cardiff 161 aps., 14 gls; Bolton 93 aps, 10 gls.

JOHN HULME (Centre-half). John joined Bolton from school and worked his way into the first team in 1962-63. For a long while he was the regular centre-half, but Charlie Hurley's arrival last season presented a new challenge which he seems to have won. After being relegated to the reserves for much of last season he has won his way back into favour, but Hurley, Eire International and former Sunderland star, is back in the line-up too.
League record: Bolton 138 (2) aps, 6 gls.

WARWICK RIMMER (Left-half). Warwick, former England schoolboy international, comes from a famous footballing family. His father, Sid, was a familiar figure in Third Division circles with Tranmere and Watford while his uncle, Ellis, was the Sheffield Wednesday and England star of the thirties.
League record: Bolton 340 (4) aps, 17 gls.

TERRY WHARTON (Outside-right). Terry opened the season in cracking style, hitting a hat-trick against Luton on the opening day. Has four goals to date, three of them from penalties. Bolton invested £70,000 in Terry when they signed him from Wolves in 1967. He had held a regular place in Wolves' line-up since his debut in 1961-62.
League record: Wolves 223 (1) aps, 69 gls; Bolton 97 aps, 28 gls.

PAUL FLETCHER (Outside-right). A product of Bolton's junior sides, Paul made his League bow in 1968-69, is now trying to win a regular place.
League record: Bolton 20 (2) aps, 4 gls.

JOHN BYROM (Inside-forward). Bolton's top scorer with twenty-five goals last season, including hat-tricks in the opening two games of the season. John, a former England youth international, first hit the headlines as a 17-year-old at Blackburn in 1961-62. When Fred Pickering left for Everton, John took over the striker's roll and in his previous best season, 1964-65, he scored twenty-five goals. Bolton signed him in 1966 but until last season he had never quite recaptured his old goal-scoring form.
League record: Blackburn 106 (2) aps, 45 gls; Bolton 118 aps, 44 gls.

ROGER HUNT (Centre-forward). When former England star, Roger Hunt, left Liverpool for Bolton last December, he left behind a set of Liverpool goalscoring records which look certain to stand for many years. In 1961-62 he hit forty-one goals to become the Football Leagues top scorer and break the previous club record of thirty-six in a season by Gordon Hodgson in 1930-31. In 1968-69 he surpassed the club's previous best aggregate total — 233, also by Hodgson — and when he made his final count at Liverpool it came to 245 goals in League games alone. He also bagged forty in various European and domestic cup competitions. Roger played for England on thirty-four occasions and was a member of the 1966 World Cup side.
England 34 aps, 18 gls; World Cup winners medal (1966); League Championship medal (1964, 1966); FA Cup winners medal (1965); Div. Two championship medal (1962).
League record: Liverpool 401 (2) aps, 245 gls; Bolton 28 aps, 7 gls.

JOHN MANNING (Inside-forward). John started as an amateur centre-half with Liverpool but Tranmere, who signed him professionally in 1962, moved him to a striking role — with good effect. Shrewsbury signed him and he was their top scorer three seasons ago. He then moved to Norwich and, after some eighteen months at Carrow Road, joined Bolton in February 1969.
League record: Tranmere 110 aps, 70 gls; Shrewsbury 39 aps, 18 gls; Norwich 60 aps, 21 gls; Bolton 17 (1) aps, 5 gls.

ROY GREAVES (Inside-forward). A local discovery, Roy emerged as a striker in 1967-68, topping the scoring list that season and the next. Last season he reverted to a mid-field role.
League record: Bolton 125 (4) aps., 30 gls.

GORDON TAYLOR (Outside-left). Gordon, a former Bolton amateur worked his way up through the junior ranks, made his League debut in 1962-63 and has been a member of the first-team squad for seven years.
League record: Bolton 245 (4) aps, 41 gls.

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
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

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
