These are stirring times, with the Town not only having shown their worthiness for promotion to Division II, but shaping at the moment as if the First Division is only just around the corner.

Certainly, with the possible exception of Leicester City, by whom they were beaten somewhat unluckily, their new range of opponents has not produced anything very menacing, and the success over Bolton Wanderers on Saturday provided them with their eleventh point from the last twelve.

This is promotion form

Whatever may happen in the future, this is promotion form and, probably, unlike some of the early front-runners, some of whom are beginning to crack, they have the reserve resources to cover any contingencies that may arise through injuries.

In this respect, they have been fortunate so far, though two or three members of the side received knocks against Bolton.

Most serious of these was thought to be ankle damage to Don Givens, but there was some confidence that he would be in tonight's line-up, even though a late fitness test may have been necessary.

Town lost early sparkle

Unfortunately, on Saturday, the Town after playing for twenty-five minutes like world-beaters, could not maintain their sparkle, and there was a somewhat drab second half during which their lead was in jeopardy on more than one occasion.

The goals, both good ones, came in the first twenty-two minutes. First Chris Nicholl stole up into the penalty area for a corner from David Court to open his scoring account for the season with a glancing header.

Givens spectacular

Thirteen minutes later, Givens brought

down the house, with a spectacular header that really rattled into the back of the net.

Givens is now beginning to be a consistent scorer and he has certainly made his mark by his great enthusiasm and speed.

Quite conceivably, there could have been further goals during this purple patch and there were certainly several near things.

Biggest League crowd yet

Somehow or another, the same standard was not regained, to the disappointment of the biggest League crowd of the season and, certainly, to the chagrin of Manager Alec Stock, who particularly wanted his players to impress on this occasion.

However, the main thing was that two more points were landed safely and adequate revenge was taken for the 4-2 defeat at Burnden Park on the opening day of the season.

The crowd totted up to a considerably more healthy 19,055, the vast majority of which can be regarded as potential regular customers, because the Wanderers did not bring a great following.

Advance sale of tickets for tonight's meeting with Blackburn Rovers are reported to have been healthy, which is usually an indication of a big attendance and it could well be that the elusive 20,000 mark will be reached.

Unproductive Rovers

Rovers are having a thoroughly unproductive time which must have come as a sharp disappointment to them, especially as they were promotion candidates for a long period last season.

So far, they have mustered only one victory in twelve matches and their situation was worsened on Saturday when they lost 3-2 at home to Watford.

Most of their trouble can be traced to lack of penetration in attack, and they have been seeking desperately to remedy this.

Tried for Fred Pickering

In fact, they had hoped to have in their line-up tonight, former England centre-forward, Fred Pickering, now with Blackpool.

While negotiations are apparently still proceeding, they could not be completed to meet the statutory forty-eight hours period before tonight's game.

Pickering, of course, was born in Blackburn, began his career with Rovers, who transferred him to Everton for around £80,000. From there, he moved on to Birmingham and he helped Blackpool regain their place in Division I last season.

Position looks ominous


Certainly, Blackburn's position at the moment looks ominous indeed, and there may well be more than a hint of desperation about their play tonight. For this, the Town will be well prepared and there should certainly be two more points to add to the growing total.

Then, they will go to the 'troubled' Valley on Saturday to meet the bottom team, Charlton Athletic, brimful of confidence.

Recently, Charlton have been involved in much transfer activity, mostly of an outward nature, but they are hoping to reinforce their team by Saturday.




Season ticket demand



Blackburn's fortunes have been swinging violently in recent years

Blackburn's fortunes have been swinging violently lately. Two seasons ago they almost went down into the Third Division for the first time in their history. Last term they were strong challengers for promotion.

Now - with only one win in eleven League games before Saturday's clash with Watford - the relegation bogey is rearing its head again.

Problems are all in the attack

Rovers' problems appear almost solely in attack. On only one occasion had they scored more than once in a game - when they drew 2-2 at home to Leicester - and their goals total for twelve League and Cup games was just seven. Their top scorers, Eamonn Rogers and Bryan Conlon, had only two each.

The loss of Don Martin, through injury, early in the season has proved an even bigger set-back than had been expected. He was top scorer with fifteen goals last season and quickly got off the mark with a goal on the opening day this season. Then, after only three games, he was ruled out.

Defence looks sound enough

Even though it is being over-worked this season, Rovers' defence looks sound enough. No one has managed to get more than two goals past them, anyway.

Their results so far - Watford (a) 1-2, Orient (h) 0-0, Sheffield Wednesday (a) 1-1, QPR (h) 0-2, Swindon (h) 1-0, Middlesbrough (a) 1-1, Bolton (h) 0-2, Oxford (h) 0-0, Bristol City (a) 1-1, Leicester (h) 2-2, Millwall (a) 0-2 in the League; Bolton (a) 0-1 in the League Cup.

Blackburn, who haven't won away from home this season, don't usually get much change at Kenilworth Road. They have never won a League game here. Full record:

The club was formed by old boys of Blackburn Grammar School in 1874 and they initially played in a rented field with a pond in the centre of the pitch! This was covered with boards and sods of grass.

Were one of League's original twelve

Blackburn were one of the League's original twelve members in 1888 and, together with Aston Villa until 1936, they maintained the longest unbroken sequence of First Division membership from its formation - forty-four seasons.

Rovers have won the FA Cup six times and the League Championship twice and only Aston Villa (FA Cup seven, Championship six and League Cup one) and Everton (Championship six, FA Cup three) of the original members have won more top honours.

Have figured in eight cup finals

Apart from the main honours listed above, Rovers were Division II champions in 1939 and runners-up in 1958. They appeared in eight FA Cup finals and sixteen semi-finals. Season 1968-69, when they finished 19th in Division II, was their worst on record.

They first entered the FA Cup, which was to bring them fame, in 1879 and in only their third attempt they reached the final . . . in 1881-2. Two years later Blackburn won the first of three successive finals to equal the record of the now-defunct Wanderers FC.

Bought freehold of ground for £2,500

In 1890 and 1891 they won the trophy again and, between those successes, they invested some of their profits in acquiring their present headquarters at Ewood Park.

They took a ten year lease and spent £1,000 preparing it for first-class football. In 1893 they purchased the freehold for £2,500.

Blackburn had to wait until 1928 for their sixth, and final, Cup success - though they reached Wembley in 1960 - but they plugged the gap by taking the League Championship in 1912 and 1914.






Blackburn spend to try to solve their problems in attack

Certainly, Blackburn cannot be accused of sitting back and doing nothing to solve their problems in attack and they spent quite heavily this year on three forwards.

ROGER JONES (Goalkeeper). Roger was discarded by Portsmouth but won early fame with Third Division Bournemouth. His fine goalkeeping displays earned him an England Under-23 cap three seasons ago and Blackburn had to pay £30,000 to persuade the Southern club to release him last season.

*England Under-23 1 ap.
League record: Bournemouth 160 aps; Blackburn 16 aps.*

FREDDIE GOODWIN (Right-back). Freddie was signed from Stockport County in March this year. A Wolves' discovery, Freddie played First Division football with the Molineux club for some four years before joining Stockport in 1965, since when he helped County from the Fourth to the Third Division.

*Division IV championship medal (1967).
League record: Wolves 44 (1) aps; Stockport 171 aps, 20 gls; Blackburn 22 aps, 3 gls.*

BILLY WILSON (Left-back). A product of Blackburn's youth side, Billy rose to the first-team in 1964-65 and has held a regular place since. During the past three and a quarter seasons he has missed only two games.

League record: Blackburn 208 aps.

ALLAN HUNTER (Right-half). Allan entered League soccer with Oldham, whom he joined from Coleraine, four seasons ago. Two seasons ago he was one of few stars in the Oldham side which suffered relegation to the Fourth Division, then last season he was a regular member of Rovers' promotion-chasing team. He won his first full international cap last season when selected for Northern Ireland's World Cup clash in the USSR.

*Northern Ireland 1 ap.
League record: Oldham 83 aps, 1 gl; Blackburn 48 aps, 1 gl.*

DICK MULVANEY (Centre-half). Blackburn spotted Dick playing in North-east junior football, signed him in February 1964 and gave him his first-team chance the following season. He has been a fixture in defence for the past two seasons.

League record: Blackburn 118 (6) aps, 3 gls.

KEN KNIGHTON (Left-half). Wolves introduced Ken to League football in 1964-65 but, with only limited first-team chances, he preferred to try his luck with Oldham. He did well with the Latics, who received a club record £30,000 when he moved to Preston in 1967. Blackburn signed him in July 1969 and now he is club captain. He toured New Zealand with an FA XI in 1969.

League record: Wolves 13 (3) aps; Oldham 45 aps, 5 gls; Preston 62 aps, 3 gls; Blackburn 51 aps, 7 gls.

STUART METCALF (Outside-right). A local lad who went to Ewood Park straight from school. Graduated to Blackburn's League team three seasons ago and, in 1968-69, he won England youth honours. Originally a winger, Stuart usually plays in mid-field these days.

League record: Blackburn 87 (1) aps, 2 gls.

ALEX RUSSELL (Inside-right). A recent signing from Southport, Alex has something of a reputation for scoring goals. He didn't make much headway with Everton so he moved to Southport in 1963. In 1964-65 he was their top scorer and he totalled sixty-three League goals when he left.

League record: Southport 262 (1) aps, 63 gls; Blackburn 10 aps.

JIMMY KERR (Centre-forward). A former Scottish youth international, Jimmy got his chance in English League football with Bury in 1965-66. Developed well as a striker and last season he collected twenty goals for the Shakers. He moved to Rovers this summer.

League record: Bury 150 (2) aps 37 gls; Blackburn 6 aps.

BRYAN CONLON (Centre-forward). Another 1970 summer signing, Bryan arrived from Norwich. He started his career with Newcastle, but didn't make the first-team. Darlington introduced him to League football in 1964-65 and he was their top scorer two years later. He joined Millwall in 1967 but, little over a year later, switched to Norwich City.

League record: Darlington 72 aps, 26 gls; Millwall 40 (1) aps, 14 gls; Norwich 29 aps, 8 gls; Blackburn 10 aps, 2 gls.

EAMONN ROGERS (Inside-left). Eamonn started at Ewood Park as an apprentice, making his debut in 1965-66. Made such an impact that he was selected for the Republic of Ireland versus Czechoslovakia in November 1967 and has remained a regular member of his national side since.

*Republic of Ireland: 12 aps, 2 gls.
League record: Blackburn 127 (2) aps, 24 gls.*

BRIAN HILL (Outside-left). Brian made his name with Grimsby Town when they were playing in Divisions II and III. Huddersfield signed him in 1966 and for three years he was a regular first-teamer. He signed for Blackburn in June 1969.

League record: Grimsby 180 aps, 25 gls; Huddersfield 84 aps, 6 gls; Blackburn 27 (2) aps, 3 gls.






