COMMENT

There is no doubt about it. We took a bit of a beating at Ninian Park last Saturday. And with a scoreline of 1—5 against us a 'bit' of a beating may appear to many of our supporters to be the under-statement of the season. No one can deny that Cardiff City were well worth their win, and it would be just as foolish for us to try and gloss over this defeat as it would be to suggest that it was the end of our hopes of any honours at the end of the season. Equally it is true we had our problems off the field of play as well as on it. Injuries prevented us from fielding our accepted full strength side, and when Ian Butler became unfit to play just a couple of hours before kick-off time some re-shuffling of the side had to be done. Before our team had chance to settle down we found ourselves two goals in arrears but it was from this point that our team had its best spell of the match. We came back into the game with a goal from Geoff. Barker and in fact until the interval there always appeared to be a chance that we could gain some reward from the match. After the interval, however the game swung decisively and irrevocably in favour of Cardiff City.

We conceded a further three goals which put the outcome of the match well and truly out of our reach and allowed Cardiff City to inflict on us our heaviest defeat of the season to date. To summarise the match is easy. We had a 'bad un'. We were guilty of some bad defensive lapses and Cardiff City quite rightly made us pay the ultimate penalty for these mistakes. We never assumed, let alone maintained, any mid-field control of the game, and in modern football it is essential to at least hold one's own mid-field if one expects any success in a game. However as we have said after winning a game, that result is now in the past and we must look ahead to the next game. This also applies after a defeat. The next game is the important one. So our final words on the Cardiff match shall be of a brighter nature. As with our 'penalty kick' problem we are improving on our results at Ninian Park. After all 1—5 is better than last seasons' 0—6 reverse on that ground.

Today we have very great pleasure in welcoming everyone connected with Luton Town F.C. to Boothferry Park. Elsewhere in this programme we refer to the remarkable recovery that Luton Town is making to return to the 1st Division after plunging to the 4th Division. If our visitors do make a successful return to Division One this season, they will certainly be in favour with more than just their own supporters, for it will be as great a team and club recovery as has been known in the Football League for many many seasons, and all genuine supporters of soccer will see it as such. Apart

from this afternoon, which all connected with Luton Town will understand, we wish them well in their search for renewed glories. To say the least today's match should prove a most interesting one. Luton Town and ourselves are in very handy positions in the 2nd Division, and we both came a little unstuck last week-end. Both teams will be out to make up for lost ground. Just the right ingredients for a first rate match.

ENGLAND v. SWEDEN:

UNDER-23 INTERNATIONAL MATCH

The stage is now set for this match to be played NEXT WEDNESDAY, 11th

NOVEMBER AT BOOTHFERRY PARK,
KICK-OFF 7.30 p.m.

Most of our supporters, and indeed soccer followers everywhere will have seen the names of the players selected to play for the England Under-23 side, and have noted that they represent some of the finest young footballing talent in this country. In a recent Under-23 match at Leicester eight of the players named for the match at Boothferry Park took part in the Under-23 game against West Germany which England won 3—1. All the post-match reports gave glowing accounts of a really fine game and the match next Wednesday should continue in this vein. The England team will be opposed by the Under-23 team of Sweden. And this provides an interesting point. It will be the first time that Sweden has met England at Under-23 level. The visitors will without doubt be very keen to ensure they commence their Under-23 programme against England with a good result. Another major factor in the selection of Under-23 teams must of course be the linking of these players with possible places in the 1974 World Cup squads. Though 1974 may seem a long way off to most of us the fact is that planning for a World Cup series does begin as soon as the previous one is completed. And for England and Sweden, 1974 will be a most important year. We shall of course be hoping to regain the World Cup and Sweden would like very much to improve on their showing of 1962 when they were World Cup beaten finalists. It was in Mexico earlier this year that our grip on the World Cup was lost and Sweden did not make the progress in that competition that many football followers felt they would.

Therefore to the Under-23 players of the present day the chances of proving themselves for the 1974 World Cup matches is very real. It is in the Under-23 standard of matches that they can be assessed, and this fact has not been overlooked by many sporting journalists who have already begun to nominate certain players for the job of winning back the World Cup for England. Some of these players have been chosen for next Wednesday's match.

Sweden is still very jubilant, rightly so, that they recently defeated Russia 2—1 in an Under-23 match in Sweden. Though losing 0—1 at half time the reports on the match suggest that Sweden's ability to recover and gain a winning lead augers well for the future. Whether or not they will be able to hold the strong and very versatile England side will be most interesting to see, but there is very little doubt in many peoples' minds that quite a number of the players selected for the teams next Wednesday will in fact be part of the World Cup squads of their Countries in 1974.

Around and About Division Two

Ninian Park Hoodoo Strikes Again

There's something about Ninian Park that seems to haunt the Tigers these days. Last Saturday's 1-5 defeat by Cardiff City brought our tally of goals conceded in our last three visits to that ground to 14!

Nevertheless, the size of the reverse was something of a disappointment, particularly as we had conceded only two goals in our previous eight games. Yet, all teams must accept their off days and, if we look upon it philosophically, it was far better that we should concede five in one match than, perhaps, two one week and three the next — which might cost us four, rather than two points.

Welsh international striker Toshack confirmed that his recent return to scoring form was no fluke. His hat-trick, only the second he has ever scored in senior football brought his goals tally to seven in his past four games and his season's haul to 12. He is now the third highest scorer in this division:

Another Second Division hat-trickster was that remarkable character Mike Trebilcock of Portsmouth.

He made his first League appearance of the season a month ago, and hit a hat-trick in half-an-hour against Watford. Then last Saturday, in only his fifth game of the season he collected another trio — all in eight minutes! Pompey, thus aided, swamped Blackburn 4-1.

An "I'll show you" goal for Millwall's Barry Bridges, against his old colleagues Queen's Park Rangers, clinched a 3-0 win for the Lions and pushed them further away from the relegation area. After winning only one of their first ten League games. Millwall have dropped only one point in their last five games and Bridges has scored in four of them

Leicester City took over our place at the top when they beat Bolton 1-0. This was Leicester City's 14th League and Cup game without defeat.

Our defeat at Cardiff, though, was not as costly as it might have been. True, we lost top place — only temporarily we hope! but both Luton Town who lost at home to Sunderland and Sheffield United dropped points. The Blades built up a 2-0 half time home lead over Carlisle United but lost it in the last seven minutes when Balderstone and Ternent struck for the Cumbrians.

Oxford United shook off the effects of successive home defeats by Millwall and Queen's Park Rangers to win at Sunderland then overcome lowly Charlton Athletic at the Manor last Saturday. But they made hard going of it, coming out only 2-1 victors though their supremacy suggested a far wider scoreline.

The situation is already beginning to look quite desperate for Charlton, now three points behind at the bottom of the chart. They have only one League victory to their name all season, but fortunately for them clubs like Blackburn (one win in ten games) and Bristol City (six defeats on the trot) are casting away points to keep their survival hopes alive.

There's a decidedly James Bond look about Swindon Town's away record after going down by the odd goal in three at Birmingham. Now their away W D L record reads 007 — the only club in the Football League without an away point.

Introducing . . . Luton Town

This afternoon we welcome to Boothferry Park, Luton Town, one of our closest promotion challengers, for what promises to be a real cracker of a match. It is possible that few people, outside our own circle of supporters, could have expected the Tigers and Luton Town to turn up among the divisional leaders. But we have. And both teams have attained their present lofty positions by combining attacking football with some very good defensive play when needed.

We both suffered severe set-backs last Saturday, though. While we were losing heavily at Cardiff, Luton Town conceded their first home League goals of the season, and surrendered their unbeaten home record when going down 1-2 to Sunderland.

The Hatters, who dropped from the First to the Fourth Division in five dramatic years in the early 'sixties, are threatening to make the return to the top in equally breathtaking fashion. They won the Fourth Division championship in 1968, then last season gained promotion to the Second Division. Today, as we well know, they are challenging strongly for promotion to Division One.

Should Luton Town regain their place at the top this season it would be an unprecedented achievement. Few clubs who slide from the First Division to Division Four ever get back to the top again — much less, to achieve such a thing in 11 years!

TONY READ (Goalkeeper) Tony didn't make the League team at Sheffield Wednesday and only got a couple of chances at Peterborough. When he did make the grade at Luton it was as a striker — he hit 12 goals in 1965/66! He soon reverted to goalkeeping and, after losing his place, he returned this season.

JOHN RYAN (Right-back) Fulham gave John his chance in their League eleven during the 1967/68 season and he played regularly for about a year. Luton signed him during the following campaign and he formed a vital link in the side which gained promotion last season.



MALCOLM MACDONALD (Centre-forward). Fulham signed him, converted him into a striker and he hit five goals in ten full League games for them. He joined Luton in 1969.

MIKE KEEN (Inside-left). Mike rejoined manager Alec Stock at Luton two years ago after serving together at Queen's Park Rangers. 




Jarvis and Simpkin watch Chilton as he tries to overcome the Sheffield Utd. defence.
