It seems to have escaped general notice, but the Town's victory at Hull last Saturday extended their unbeaten run away from home to five matches from which they have secured a rich haul of eight points.

That, of course, is one main reason why talk of the third successful promotion bid in four years, is no idle chatter, despite the fact that there is a very long way to go before the final reckoning comes.

Jimmy was welcomed back warmly

There can be no doubt at all that the players warmly welcomed back their coach, Jimmy Andrews, who had been away three weeks recovering from the effects of an operation.

At least, that can be the inference to be drawn from the thoroughly efficient way in which Hull City were disposed of on their own spacious Boothferry Park, and that was only their second home defeat of the season.

Over 500 on the special train

Once again, the team had a strong following, the number on the chartered train being 552 and there is every indication that just as many will be making the trip to Cardiff a fortnight today.

This is a journey that will appeal especially to the many Welsh people who have made their homes in this district, since it will provide them with a fleeting visit to the Principality at a highly economic price and with perhaps a chance to have a glimpse of relatives.

There can be no doubt that this mode of travel has been one of the most successful of the club's recent innovations. Not only that, the fans appreciate the fact and hundreds of miles have been travelled this season without the slightest trouble.

'Old firm' were the scorers again

Scorers at Hull were again what is becoming to be the well-known firm of

Malcolm Macdonald and Don Givens who, between them, have contributed twenty-one of the twenty-nine League goals secured by the Town this season.

Givens has developed the particularly happy knack of coming along with an early goal which has tipped the balance in the Town's favour in several matches recently.

Alec Stock puts up the 'no sale' notice

There can be no doubt that, if the Town gave the slightest hint that they would part with either, they would not be short of bidders, but Manager Alec Stock has gone on record repeatedly in recent weeks to the effect that they are not for sale.

After all, the First Division is the club's prime aim and such a height will not be attained by selling the star men who get the all-important goals.

Reserve team men being watched

Several members of the reserve team have been the subject of scrutiny by other clubs and, in dealing with any offers that come along, the Town are placing the interests of the player concerned first and foremost.

Such was the case last week when they allowed Matt Tees to return to Grimsby Town for what can only be regarded as a bargain fee of £5,000.

Tee's appearance doubled the gate

So popular was Tees during his previous spell with the Mariners that his presence doubled the Grimsby attendance last Saturday when he scored on his debut and followed up with another goal in the 4-1 beating of Barrow on Tuesday.

As have the Town in the past, Grimsby are now experiencing hard times down in Division IV, and they are hoping that Tees will be the man to revive their fortunes.

Certainly, he played his part in helping the Town into the Second Division and supporters will wish him well with his new club.

This is only Carlisle's second visit

Today's visitors, Carlisle United, are paying only their second visit to Kenilworth Road. On their first, they drew 1-1 and the same score resulted when the Town made their first appearance at Brunton Park.

Since then, Carlisle, like the Town have gone up in the world, so that they are now formidable members of the Second Division and it is no easy task that the Town face.

A former Luton player, goalkeeper, Allan Ross, will be in the visiting line-up and there is likely to be another next week when Portsmouth are here and Albert McCann will be in contention for a place in the side.

Chairman sees his first match today


Today is a special occasion for the Chairman, Tony Hunt, who will be seeing his first football match of the season following his recovery from a major operation, followed by a serious illness.






Carlisle might prove to be the dark horse in the race for promotion *by Tony Pullein*

No one mentions Carlisle as possible promotion prospects yet they've been quietly wending their way up the table, a run of only one defeat in fourteen League games lifting them from bottom place to eighth.

Tucked away up in the North-west as they are, Carlisle have more travelling to do than most clubs so maybe that's part of the reason why their poor away record is hindering a really virile bid for one of the top two places?

The Cumbrians haven't won an away League game since last Boxing Day when they succeeded 2-0 at Middlesbrough. Since then they've made fifteen unsuccessful attempts away from home though they did win an FA Cup replay at Aldershot.

But five away games have been drawn

Carlisle have drawn five of their seven away League games this season. The only teams to beat them so far are Middlesbrough, Sheffield Wednesday and Birmingham, the last-named being the only visiting team to gain a victory at Brunton Park.

Carlisle operate on a skeleton staff of only eighteen professionals and, when they struck a spate of injuries, they had to call upon trainer Hugh Neil to substitute in the game versus Orient! Hugh spent eight years as a Carlisle player but last appeared in the League team two years ago.

Have virtually kept a settled team

Apart from the odd upset through injury, though, Carlisle have kept virtually the same team together all season:

Ross (16 League appearances); Hemstead (16), Davis (15); Ternent (16), Winstanley (16), Sutton (16); Martin (15), Barton (16), Hatton (15), Owen (14), Balderstone (16).

The only other players to turn out were Tom Murray (2), Len Kinsella (2 plus 1 as sub), Peter Garbutt (2 substitutes) and George McVitie (1 plus 1 sub), who was sold to West Bromwich Albion at the beginning of the season. Goal-keeper Tom Clarke, mid-field man Willie O'Neill and John Gorman, a recent arrival from Celtic, have yet to kick a ball in competitive action.

Previous meetings were drawn

We have met Carlisle only twice before in League games, drawing 1-1 both home and away in 1964-65.

The Carlisle story opened in 1903 when Carlisle Red Rose FC and Shaddongate United amalgamated. In 1928 they were elected to Division III (North) in place of Durham City and finished eighth in their first campaign.

They trod a fairly uneventful path until the outbreak of war, the only black spot being 1934-35 when they had to apply for re-election after finishing bottom with only twenty-three points, nine behind the next club.

Gloom was lightened only occasionally

The pattern continued in post-war years with just the occasional bright incident to lighten the gloom. In 1951 they were third in the Northern Section - their best at that stage.

When the time came to form the Fourth Division from the bottom twelve clubs of each section of Division III in 1958, Carlisle were among them.

In 1962 they rose out of the basement for the first time. Most of us expected them to suffer immediate relegation - and they did. But the next season they were promoted again, missing the championship on goal-average. Then, twelve months later they rose to the Second Division.

Nearly achieved the impossible

Their first campaign in the Second Division was, quite naturally, tough going, but they finished around the middle of the table.

The following year they almost achieved the 'impossible' when they missed promotion to Division I by only six points. Now they threaten to do even better.

Allan Ross is back on the ground where his 'pro' career started *by Tony Pullein*

These are the Carlisle players who are most likely to be seen in action this afternoon.

ALLAN ROSS (Goalkeeper). Allan didn't make the senior side at Luton, but has had over 200 League appearances in goal for Carlisle in five years. He was ever-present last season. Was selected for the Scottish full international squad for the game against Republic of Ireland last season. Though he wasn't picked, his superb form suggests he could become the second Carlisle player to gain an international cap quite soon.

League record: Carlisle 220 (1) aps.

DEREK HEMSTEAD (Right-back). Derek was signed from Scunthorpe United during the 1969 close season. He made his League debut with Scunthorpe in 1960-61, when they were in Division II, and completed more than 250 senior games for them prior to his transfer. He doesn't often score goals, but he got the one which knocked Chelsea out of the League Cup last season.

League record: Scunthorpe 249 aps, 2 gls; Carlisle 50 aps.

JOE DAVIS (Left-back). The now defunct Third Lanark introduced Joe to senior football in 1961-62. He moved to Hibernian in 1964 and was an ever-present member of their Scottish First Division side for four seasons before moving to Carlisle early last season. Formerly a forward, he has now settled well in defence.

League record: Third Lanark 59 aps; Hibernian 157 aps, 33 gls; Carlisle 35 aps.

STAN TERNENT (Right-half). Stan got his big chance of League football after joining Carlisle from a First Division club. He came through Burnley's junior sides, got an occasional game in the League team but has held a regular place following his move to Carlisle during the 1968 close-season. Stan scored the first League goal of his career in Carlisle's last away game at Sheffield United — a late point-saving equaliser.

League record: Burnley 5 aps; Carlisle 89 aps, 1 gl.

GRAHAM WINSTANLEY (Centre-half). A Durham lad who spent several seasons with Newcastle United. Because of the big names at St James's Park, Graham got only a handful of League games, so was pleased to accept the chance of regular League football when he moved to Carlisle at the beginning of last season. He has now well established himself at centre-half.

League record: Newcastle 5 (2) aps; Carlisle 53 aps, 3 gls.

MICK SUTTON (Left-half). Mick started with Norwich, making fifty League appearances, before moving to Chester. In three years he missed only one game, Carlisle signed him this summer.

League record: Norwich 49 (6) aps, 3 gls; Chester 137 (1) aps, 9 gls; Carlisle 16 aps, 1 gl.

DENNIS MARTIN (Outside-right). Carlisle signed Dennis from West Bromwich for £20,000 this summer. Edinburgh-born Dennis joined Albion from Kettering three years ago and made his First Division debut against Stoke in March 1968.

League record: WBA 14 (2) aps, 1 gl; Carlisle 15 aps, 2 gls.

FRANK BARTON (Inside-right). Frank, an England youth cap of five years ago, joined Carlisle in January 1968 from Scunthorpe, where he had been since his schooldays. He was Scunthorpe's top scorer with thirteen in 1966-67.

League record: Scunthorpe 93 aps, 26 gls; Carlisle 99 (3) aps, 12 gls.

BOB HATTON (Centre-forward). Carlisle's top scorer with eight goals, including a League Cup hat-trick against Oxford, Bob was also top marksman with fifteen last season. He started in League football with Wolves in 1966 and commanded a £30,000 fee when Bolton signed him, though he had played only ten League games at that time. After just over a year at Burnden Park, he joined Northampton Town.

League record: Wolves 10 aps, 7 gls; Bolton 23 aps, 2 gls; Northampton 29 (4) aps, 8 gls; Carlisle 54 aps, 17 gls.

BOBBY OWEN (Inside-left). Carlisle paid a club record £25,000 fee for Bobby this summer. Bobby made his League debut for Bury in 1964-65 and, after joining Manchester City for £45,000 in July 1968, scored with his first kick for his new club in the FA Charity Shield. Unfortunately, Bobby's early luck didn't stick. He found difficulty holding a regular place and, after a spell on loan to Swansea last season, is making a fresh start at Carlisle.

League record: Bury 81 (2) aps, 38 gls; Manchester City 18 (4) aps, 3 gls; Swansea 5 (1) aps, 1 gl; Carlisle 14 aps, 5 gls.

CHRIS BALDERSTONE (Outside-left). Chris, a Yorkshire cricketer, arrived from Huddersfield Town in 1965 and was Carlisle's leading scorer four seasons ago. When Carlisle are awarded a penalty, Balderstone is usually the man they entrust to take it. He converted one last Saturday against Oxford United to being his goals tally this season to six.

League record: Huddersfield 117 aps, 23 gls; Carlisle 219 (1) aps, 48 gls.






