From a glance at the Division II table, it is only too easy to assess the outstanding importance today's match has for both the Town and Sheffield United.

Among the five front-runners, only a point separates them and, with so much at stake, this should prove to be a titanic struggle.

United come here with the fine record of not having been beaten in their last sixteen League matches while, the Town can point to having lost only two of their eighteen League games.

Town have the pull in defence

On paper, the Town have the pull in defence, since they have conceded eight goals fewer than their opponents and both have scored thirty-four times, only a goal behind the Division's top-scorers and leaders, Leicester City.

So, the stage should be set for a memorable struggle and, on their best home form, the Town can clinch both points and so give themselves encouragement for the local derby with Watford at Vicarage Road next Saturday.

Local derby should attract 30,000

Even though Watford are having a thin time, being anchored in the lower half of

the table, they have had a habit in the past of raising their game when meeting their old rivals and there certainly should be a crowd of over 30,000 to see this clash.

In point of fact, today's is the last home game before Christmas because, a fortnight today, the Town are due to visit Norwich City by whom they were held to a goalless draw on this ground on 22 August.

More confident and formidable now

However, at that time, the Town were more or less feeling their way in their new sphere and they have certainly

become a much more confident, formidable combination since then.

For both these games, the team is bound to take a strong following and it will be surprising if the one to Watford does not run into thousands.

That there is no wane in the popularity of the special trains which the club charter for away games is proved by the fact that there was a capacity load of 556 passengers on the one to Cardiff last Saturday.

Tribute to fitness of both teams

Even though no goals were scored, this was a memorable game, fought out in the most testing, muddy conditions at a pace that was a tribute to the fitness of both teams.

The result could have gone either way, but, at the end, no one could quibble about a division of the spoils and it would certainly have been a poor reward for the highly determined Town defence had they not qualified for half bonus.

John Moore's 200th appearance today

John Moore, who had to miss that encounter because of injury, was expected to be back today, in which case he will be completing his double century of League appearances for the club.

Through the years since he was signed from Motherwell on a free transfer, Moore has given the Town consistent service, especially this season, and in modern day football, a player of his type is an essential member of the back four.

Alan Slough is the next in here

Next to follow him to the 200 landmark should be Alan Slough who, today was playing his 184th League game for the club and the next in line is Tony Read, who reaches 155 today.

These three players are right out in front so far as the present first team squad is concerned.

This is the first time for some seasons that the Town have not had to play through the first and second rounds of the FA Cup, but their interest will be kindled on Monday week when they go into the hat for the third round, which is due to be played on 2 January.

Christmas presents no problems

So, before they go into Cup action, they have only one more home League match and that is against Millwall three weeks today.

With Boxing Day falling on a Saturday, the Christmas programme this year does not present any problems, and there is not even an extra match with which to contend.




Even though 200 extra stand tickets were secured from Watford for next Saturday's local derby, making 700 in all as our allocation, they were all sold to our supporters before lunch-time on Tuesday and there is no doubt that we could have disposed of at least double the quantity had they been available.

However, there was a similar heavy demand at Watford where tickets were being sold simultaneously and the result is that there is not a stand seat to be had which suggests that there will be a capacity attendance of well over 30,000 next week.

Watford taking precautions

In their efforts to cope with such a crowd without trouble, Watford have asked us to bring to the notice of our supporters the fact that, following discussion with the local police, Luton supporters are asked to use the turnstiles at the Vicarage Road end which will be open at 1.15 pm. Admission here is 6s (children 3s).

The train will leave Norwich at 5.48, arriving St Albans 8.35, Harpenden 8.45 and Luton 8.55 pm.

As our next home match is not until Boxing Day, when Millwall will be here, I wish all our supporters a most happy time at Christmas.

These objects are banned

Watford also ask us to point out that one of their ground regulations prohibits the carrying of flags, banners, sticks, bottles, or any object likely to lead to an obstruction or a breach of the peace.

Hopes are that the majority of our followers will be accommodated at the Vicarage Road end, with the Watford supporters at the opposite end and it is hoped to obviate the risk of trouble between the rival factions.

A specially-chartered train is being run, bookings for which are going well. It leaves Luton at 12.50 pm, arriving Watford 2 o'clock. Return is at 5.20, arriving Luton 6.30 pm. Return fare is 8s.

Brisk bookings for trip to Norwich

Another train, which is already well filled has been booked for Norwich a fortnight today. This is described as a 'surprise trip' and the fare is 25s.

Time of departure is 10.05, Harpenden 10.14, St Albans 10.23 and arriving Norwich at 1.18 p.m.

Disappointing start was overcome — now United are promotion aspirants

After a disappointing start to the season, Sheffield United have emerged as the most consistent team in the country.

In September they were level with the 21st club. Now unbeaten in sixteen League games — longer than any other team in the country — the Blades are one of our most serious promotion rivals.

To date, they have lost only two League games their complete results reading:

League — Orient (a) 1-3; Swindon (h) 2-1; Norwich (a) 0-1; Cardiff (a) 1-1; Bristol City (h) 3-3; Millwall (a) 2-1; Middlesbrough (h) 1-1; Watford (a) 0-0; Portsmouth (a) 5-1; Sheffield Wednesday (h) 3-2; Birmingham (a) 1-0; Orient (h) 3-1; Bolton (h) 2-2; Hull (a) 1-1; Carlisle (h) 2-2; Blackburn (a) 3-1; Queens Park Rangers (h) 1-1; Sunderland (a) 0-0; Oxford (h) 3-0.

League Cup — Leeds (h) 1-0; Tottenham (a) 1-2.

Woodward is tops

Top scorer is Alan Woodward with eight goals. But the curious thing is that — apart from Woodward's hat-trick at Portsmouth — no player has scored more than once in any game though the Blades have hit thirty-six goals to date.

This is the first time we have met Sheffield United in the League for ten years. Our League record against them is:

Were formed after most others

United were one of the last major clubs formed in Sheffield. Before they came into being in 1889, Sheffield FC, Sheffield Wednesday, Sheffield Providence, Sheffield Healey, Athercliffe, Park Grange, Owlerton, Ecclesfield and Lockwood Brothers were prominent in the FA Cup competition.

But it was the Blades who were ultimately to scoop most of them in that tournament. They won the FA Cup four times in six finals. Their solitary League championship was taken in 1898.

Championship double

In 1898, incidentally, United's Bramall Lane ground claimed a record which

remains unique to this day. Yorkshire CCC won the county cricket championship and it became the only ground ever to house England's soccer and cricket champions in the same year.

Bramall Lane is one of two League grounds — Northampton is the other — which also stages county cricket. Cricket was played there many years before soccer arrived and football spectators are still restricted to three sides of the pitch.

In First Division for thirty-seven seasons

The Blades became one of the founder members of Division II in 1892 and won promotion at the first attempt.

They remained in the top sphere for thirty-seven seasons — one of the longest runs on record — until they hit a bad patch in 1933-34 and dropped down again.

They regained their First Division status, after a thrilling struggle with neighbouring Sheffield Wednesday, in 1939, but were unable to resume their 'rightful' place until after the war.

The post-war years have seen the Blades floating up and down between the top two divisions. Relegation in 1949 was followed by promotion in 1953, relegation again in 1956, promotion in 1961, and, finally, relegation in 1968.

Now they are endeavouring to switch divisions yet again.



**Tremendously consistent record of
United's fine goalkeeper, Hodgkinson**

First team squad of United is freely sprinkled with Internationals at all age levels and even though only Hodgkinson has a full England cap, there are others on the verge of it.

ALAN HODGKINSON (Goalkeeper). One of the United's most famous discoveries, Alan completed 600 League and Cup appearances for the Blades this season. In fact he has been missing from the United line-up only five times in the past six seasons. He made his League debut in 1954-55 and won a senior place three years later. His consistently good displays earned him full and Under-23 England caps.
*England 5 aps; England Under-23 7 aps.
League record: Sheffield United 570 aps.*

LEN BADGER (Right-back). Another home-made Blade who made the International scene. Len made his League debut in April 1963 and now looks back on over 250 appearances for them. A former England youth international - he won seven caps - Len also made it at Under-23 level and was selected for the Football League XI.
*England Under-23 13 aps.
League record: Sheffield United 263 aps, 5 gls.*

TED HEMSLEY (Left-back). Shrewsbury gave Ted his chance in League soccer in 1960-61 and he made some 250 senior appearances for them prior to his transfer to United at the beginning of the 1968-69 season. Plays cricket for Worcestershire.
*League record: Shrewsbury 243 (1) aps, 21 gls;
Sheffield United 63 aps, 3 gls.*

MIKE HEATON (Left-back). Mike rose through the junior sides to make his League debut two seasons ago. He's not a regular yet, but is pressing his claim hard.
League record: Sheffield United 32 (1) aps.

DAVID POWELL (Right-half). David Powell made his name with Wrexham before joining the Blades two seasons ago. He quickly settled into Second Division football and became a regular in the Welsh international team.
*Wales 11 aps; Wales Under-23 4 aps.
League record: Wrexham 132 (2) aps, 4 gls;
Sheffield United 77 aps, 1 gl.*

EDDIE COLQUHOUN. (Centre-half). Eddie started his professional career at Bury, making their League team in 1963-64. West Bromwich signed him during the 1966-67 campaign and, for some eighteen months, he held a regular place in their First Division side. Then injuries troubled him and he was unable to get back into the senior team so he switched to Sheffield United, early in the 1968-69 season.
League record: Bury 81 aps, 2 gls; West Bromwich 46 aps, 1 gl; Sheffield United 85 aps, 12 gls.

COLIN ADDISON (Left-half). Colin lost his place in the Blades' team this season, but he persevered and recently got back in again. Colin served York, Nottingham Forest and Arsenal before joining Sheffield United two years ago.
League record: York 87 aps, 27 gls; Nottingham

*Forest 159 aps, 61 gls; Arsenal 27 (1) aps, 9 gls;
Sheffield United 93 aps, 22 gls.*

ALAN WOODWARD (Outside-right). The Blades' top scorer for the past two seasons, Alan looks set to lead the way again. He hit a recent hat-trick at Portsmouth and now totals eight. A local discovery, Alan won England youth honours and made his bow in the Blades' first-team in 1964-65.
League record: Sheffield United 226 (1) aps, 65 gls.

JOHN TUDOR (Inside-right). John celebrated his return to the side, after being dropped, by scoring in three consecutive games. Two seasons ago he was a £65,000 purchase from Coventry City who gave him his chance in League football in 1966-67.
*League record: Coventry 63 (4) aps, 13 gls;
Sheffield United 60 (7) aps, 28 gls.*

BILLY DEARDEN (Centre-forward). A close season signing from Chester, Billy is applying his scoring ability in Second Division play as well as ever he did in the Fourth. He has seven goals to his credit so far. He opened his League career with Oldham in 1964-65 joined Crewe two years later and then spent another two-year period at Chester.
League record: Oldham 29 (3) aps, 2 gls; Crewe 45 (3) aps, 7 gls; Chester 85 aps, 22 gls; Sheffield United 18 (1) aps, 7 gls.

TONY CURRIE (Inside-left). Sir Alf Ramsey still has Tony under close review as he showed when picking him for the England Under-23 side against West Germany this season. Tony, an England youth cap, quickly made a name for himself at Watford and, with less than twenty League games behind him, he signed for the Blades in 1968.
*England Under-23 3 aps, 2 gls.






