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## INSIDE THE CITY GROUND

Nowhere more than at the City Ground is there reason for expressing the hope for a brighter New Year than applied to the old year of now departed 1970, a year of travail and ill-fortune in every conceivable way. The fervent wish of all is that this fresh new year of 1971 will bring much better fortune.

### NEW YEAR CUP START

Of major importance is the Cup start to this year of 1971 and today's home draw with Luton Town, our Cup Final opponents of 1959, is the right occasion to cast aside the year-long frustrations which have bedevilled us during the past twelve months. Luton have undergone their own periods of deep depression since that Wembley day of more than a decade ago but are now continuing their rise from the depths and visit us with a strong challenge from their status as contenders for a return to the First Division.

Naturally we have taken the opportunity to size up this quite redoubtable opposition and our manager, Mr. Gillies, from his own personal scrutiny of the "Hatters", considers them to be a very fine football unit.

We are reminded that amongst show business people in football Luton have on their board that great character, Eric Morecambe, but we hope to be raising the laughs ourselves. Not that we can do anything but show great respect to any Cup opposition, even that from a lower division. In the past two years we have gone out of the Cup to teams of lesser League status in Preston and Carlisle, and to-day there must be an all-out effort to prevent that kind of hat-trick.

### THE WASTED JOURNEY

It seems typical of the ill-fortunes of 1970 that our final match of the year, the so-important trip to West Ham last week, should end before

our team even reached Upton Park. Having made enquiry about the possibilities of the game being ice-bound before we left Nottingham, we had the bad news at lunch-time at St. Albans. We commiserate with those supporters who travelled the whole way on a fruitless mission.

And of course our Central League match against Manchester City was also deferred this week because of the wintry weather conditions.

On the question of deferring there is another wait for Bob Chapman whose appeal against the first of two such measures being taken on his behalf had to be postponed because the match officials were not able to attend. In addition our club is considering yet a third appeal, relating to his booking in the Chelsea match which we contend was made at the time he was suffering from concussion.

Once again, all the best for you and for us, in this New Year.

All football will be watching their future progress closely doubtless admiring their hard work and the astute management that has taken them to this high pinnacle of success.

Currently at their helm is Mr. Alec Stock, one of soccer's most respected Managers, who, over the years, both with his present club and his several others (including Leyton (now Orient), Queens Park Rangers and Yeovil) always showed himself to be very adroit at signing players for moderate fees and getting the best out of them.

On the other hand he has always managed to "balance the books" very well by knowing exactly when—and at what stage—he could afford to sell a player to the financial benefit of the club yet not weaken the strength of the side at any time.

Chairman of Luton Town, Mr. Tony Hunt, is a reputed millionaire who's certainly spared

Looking at Luton Town on the field today we see a club that has experienced the full cycle of luck, good and bad, in the space of a little over eleven years.

In 1959, as members of the First Division, Town were our Wembley Cup Final opponents and helped make that particular May afternoon one always to remember.

But a bare twelve months afterwards they were relegated into the Second Division where they were to remain until 1963. That was not the end for them... nor was it the beginning either.

Luton very soon floundered into further trouble, dropped into the Third Division and then, worse still, plunged into the Fourth Division where they remained until the end of the 1967/68 campaign.

### BRINK OF PREMIER DIVISION SOCCER

Support, quite naturally, had dwindled at that stage and it was a long time before the club got over this disastrous spell. Yet they come here today on the very brink of premier Division soccer again occupying as they do, at just over the half-way stage of the season, a very eminent rung on the Second Division ladder.

Can they make it from Division Four (in 1968) to Division One in three years?

no effort to put "The Hatters" back into the forefront of soccer and another member of the Directorate of the club is a former player and manager in the person of Mr. Tom Hodgson.

Recently, of course, Town acquired a new Director well-known to many people, namely Mr. J. E. Bartholomew, better known as Eric Morecambe of the famous comedy duo, Morecambe and Wise!

Town have won a reputation this season in the manner in which they have transposed their winning ways of Division Three last term into the more difficult sphere of the Second. They'll see this as an opportune moment to show the football world they are not to be overawed by opponents from the top section.

Small wonder then we respect their challenge, their ability, and their recent past record which stands as a tribute to the team's hard work and undoubted potential.

# LUTON TOWN

## Players Parade

**TONY READ** (Goalkeeper): At one time last season he found it difficult to get a game in his correct position and had some outings in the Luton Reserve side at inside-forward. When Starling was injured Read was preferred to the former Scottish Under-23 international Sandy Davie, now with Southampton. Born at Haydock, Read's first senior club was Sheffield Wednesday and he joined Luton from Peterborough United.

**JOHN RYAN** (Right-back): A real bargain came the way of Luton some eighteen months ago when they picked up this talented player on a free transfer from Fulham, despite the fact that he had had considerable first team experience at Craven Cottage. He began the 1969/70 season in the senior side, lost his place temporarily, but fought his way back to make 36 League appearances. Was born at Maidstone and had spells with Tonbridge and Arsenal before joining Fulham.

**JACK BANNISTER** (Left-back): Cost a fee of £8,000 when joining the "Hatters" from Crystal Palace about two years ago and was signed as a midfield player. However, he showed an aptitude for a place in the back four where he is neat and effective and missed only six games last season. Born at Chesterfield, he had spells with Scunthorpe United and West Brom. before joining the Palace.

**MIKE KEEN** (Wing-half): The club captain, he had ten years with Queens Park Rangers, some of them under the present Luton manager, Mr. Alec Stock, before moving to Kenilworth Road in exchange for a fee of £18,500. During his spell with the Rangers he led them into the First Division and was skipper of the side when they won the League Cup. Was born at High Wycombe where he still lives, and he joined Queens Park Rangers as a junior.

**DAVID COURT** (Wing-half): The most expensive-ever signing by Town for he cost a fee of £35,000 when he joined the club from Arsenal during the summer. In securing him, Manager Stock showed a good deal of determination because he first began negotiations before last season's deadline only to see them break down. Court, who is 26 years of age, had spent all his playing career at Highbury and made 55 senior appearances in all for the "Gunners".

**ROGER HOY** (Wing-half): Another costly close-season signing for he cost £20,000 from Crystal Palace and the details of the transfer were ironed out when both clubs were on tour in Southern Spain during May. Hoy, strong and forceful, began his career with Tottenham before moving to Selhurst Park and although his role for Palace had been mostly midfield, Luton use him in the back four.

**ALAN SLOUGH** (Wing-half): Probably Luton's most valuable young asset who has long been wanted by several First Division clubs. However, Slough has made it very clear that he wants to continue to play for his home-town club and, to that end, 12 months ago, asked for a long-term contract. This he was given, one of three years with the option of a further three. Missed only one match in Town's promotion drive last season and has the added value of being able to play equally well in midfield or as a sweeper at the back.

**CHRIS. NICHOLL** (Centre-half): After this 22-years-old 6 feet 2 inches tall player had been instrumental in Halifax Town gaining a completely unexpected draw at Kenilworth Road last season, Luton went in with a big bid. Next day, the deal was completed at £30,000 which was then a record fee for the club. Yet, Nicholl had had barely a season in League football, having gone to The Shay from the Cheshire County League side, Witton Albion. Lost his place towards the end of last season, but has established himself this time.

**JOHN MOORE** (Half-back): Has had five years with Luton whom he joined when Motherwell unexpectedly gave him a free transfer. Is now nearing the 200 mark in League appearances for Luton, 22 of them last season. A strong defensive player, he excels as a member of the back four.

**JIMMY RYAN** (Outside-right): Almost certainly cost the greater part of the £35,000 which Luton paid Manchester United with whom he could not secure a regular place because of keen competition for both wing positions. As a result, he became known as one of the best players in the Central League and he was most impressive when he played in all four matches for his new club during their tour of Spain. A Scot from Stirling, he is two-footed and can play on either wing.

**VIVIAN BUSBY** (Inside-right): Made a quite remarkable impact when he was brought into the Luton side towards the end of last season, only weeks after having left the amateur ranks with Wycombe Wanderers. Rising 21 years of age, he developed a fine understanding as a striker with top marksman Malcolm MacDonald and scored some vital goals. Well built, he plays with a poise and experience that belie his comparatively short spell as a professional.

**MALCOLM MACDONALD** (Centre-forward): Wore a variety of numbers during last season, but was always to be found taking the shortest route to goal as his 25 successes in 46 League matches verifies. When Town paid £17,500 for a 19-year-old who had been alternating between full-back and inside-forward for Fulham, there was some eye-raising. Their original intention was to use him in defence, but this thinking

was changed during the 1969/70 pre-season games when he showed his powers of opportunism.

**KEN GOODEVE** (Centre-half): One of the quartet of players secured from Manchester United, he stands nearly six feet and joined Town with a big reputation built up in Central League football. Manchester born, he went to Old Trafford as a youth and Luton regard him as a fine prospect for the future.

**DAN GIVENS** (Outside-left): One of the quartet signed from Manchester United and he probably figured in the deal at a five figure fee. Born in Dubin, he followed the well-trodden path to Old Trafford and, is regarded as a very promising prospect. Indeed, he has already been recognised by the Eire selectors and went with the national team on their summer

tour. Has now won a regular place in Town's promotion-seeking forward line.

**ALAN STARLING** (Goalkeeper) : Former youth star who fought his way into the first team late last season at the age of 18 and showed such brilliant form that he would have been an automatic choice for the remainder of the time. However, in his sixth match, he went down awkwardly and was carried off with a knee injury that necessitated a cartilage operation. Has now fully recovered. A six-footer, he was born in Dagenham, but all his footballing career has been with Luton.

**JOHN COLLINS** (Inside-right) : Was used mostly in midfield during last season, but can act as a striker as his 16 goals in 44 matches, five as substitute, showed. A Londoner, he first came to the fore with Queens Park Rangers, and was then transferred to Oldham Athletic for a five figure fee. After a spell there, Reading bought him and Luton paid £10,000 to secure his services early last season.

**PETER WOODS** (Left-back) : One of the close season signings he came to Kenilworth Road along with three other Manchester United players in a package deal of £35,000. Has the reputation of being a hard tackler, gained as a regular member of United's Central League side. Is still in his teens.

## CAR PARKING FACILITIES In and Around the City Ground

Where to park a car when visiting Nottingham Forest Football Ground for senior games is always a problem so we take this opportunity of making a few things clear to assist those fans and visitors who have difficulty.

There is a large Car Park at the Rear of the **EAST STAND** and, for a modest fee, you can park your vehicle here. It is under official supervision throughout and run by the club.

The entrance is on Colwick Road which is off Radcliffe Road, West Bridgford (The Nottingham-Grantham Road A52) and is well signposted. Direct entrance to the ground can be gained through turnstiles situated on this Car Park.

Space is available on the Car Park at the Notts. County Cricket Ground (from early September to mid-March only) and entrance is gained from Fox Road, which is also on the Radcliffe Road, West Bridgford side of the Nottingham-Grantham A52 Road.

On the City side of the River Trent, cars are able to be parked on the Victoria Embankment and in the Cattle Market on Meadow Lane (near the Notts. County F.C. Ground). Both are run by the Nottingham Corporation and are about five minutes walk, over Trent Bridge, to the City Ground.

Car Parking facilities at the Pavilion Road entrances to the Ground (at the rear of the **MAIN STAND**) are **not** available to the general public. **Restricted space here means facilities are only available to those people who have in advance purchased a Car Park Season Ticket from the club.** All space is allocated.

At the request of the Nottinghamshire Combined Constabulary we are asked to point out that it is dangerous to indiscriminately park your car in the roads surrounding the ground. It is particularly foolish—and a hazard to pedestrians and especially children—to block entrances and driveways.

The Police announce they will strictly enforce their authority in respect of unauthorised parking, so **PLEASE** use the Car Parks available.

You will enjoy your visit to the game a lot more if you know your vehicle is safely parked and under supervision and it will greatly assist the Police and other road users.

Thanks are extended to everyone who generously donated towards the cost and to the helpers who so willingly gave their time and assistance in making this first party such an enjoyable occasion for the children.

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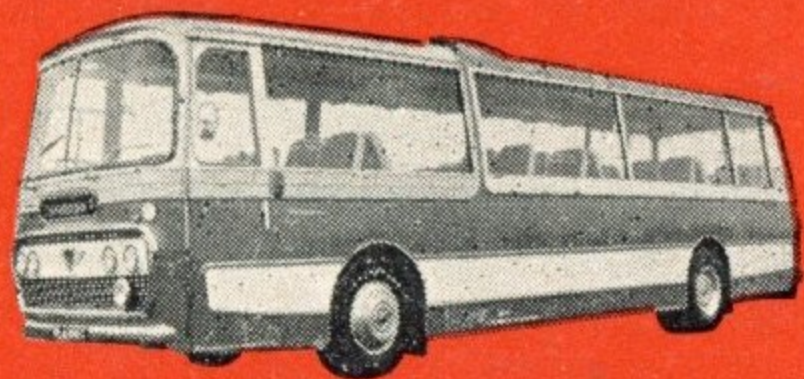

# Nottingham Forest v. Luton Town

# CHATTER

● Luton Town are perhaps the only team in modern times ever to reach a Cup Final without a Manager in charge. They were led on to the field at Wembley against us in May, 1959, by one of their Directors, Mr. Tom Hodgson because, at that time, their then Manager, Mr. Dally Duncan, the former Derby County and Scotland international forward, had left their employ earlier in the season.

● When the draw was recently made for the Third Round games for this current season we came out of the "bag" at home for the 27th time in the post-war period—against 23 away. We have had six replays here, nine away, four games on neutral grounds, two semi-finals (both at Hillsborough) and one Cup Final.

● Since 1961/62, when in the Fourth Round we lost at home to Sheffield Wednesday, we have played twelve ties at City Ground without loss. We have won eight and drawn four, including last season when Carlisle United were visitors and the score was nil-nil.

● We have played in eight ties since the end of the war that went to extra time, three at City Ground and five away.

We haven't won an away tie in which extra time was played but we did win two of the three played here.

● Today's game is our 72nd post-war Cup game and, for the statistically minded here's the breakdown of the ties.

These figures include replayed cup-ties and those games played on neutral territory such as semi-finals and the 1959 Cup Final.

● When one thinks of Luton Town in connection with players who have made the journey from Kenilworth Road in the post-war years, or made the journey in reverse, very familiar names to Forest fans of that period immediately spring to mind.

Horace Gager, who played centre-half here from 1948 to 1955 (267 senior appearances), joined Forest from Luton and became a very firm favourite. Horace still resides in West Bridgford by the way.

West Bridgford was also the home of the man who went from Forest to Luton, namely Stewart Imlach. Voted Forest's "Man of the Match" at Wembley against Luton Town in 1959, Stewart played 166 senior games for us from 1956 to 1960 (following his transfer from Derby County) and he then joined Town before moving on to Coventry City, Crystal Palace, Notts. County and Goodison Park where he's now a coach with Everton.

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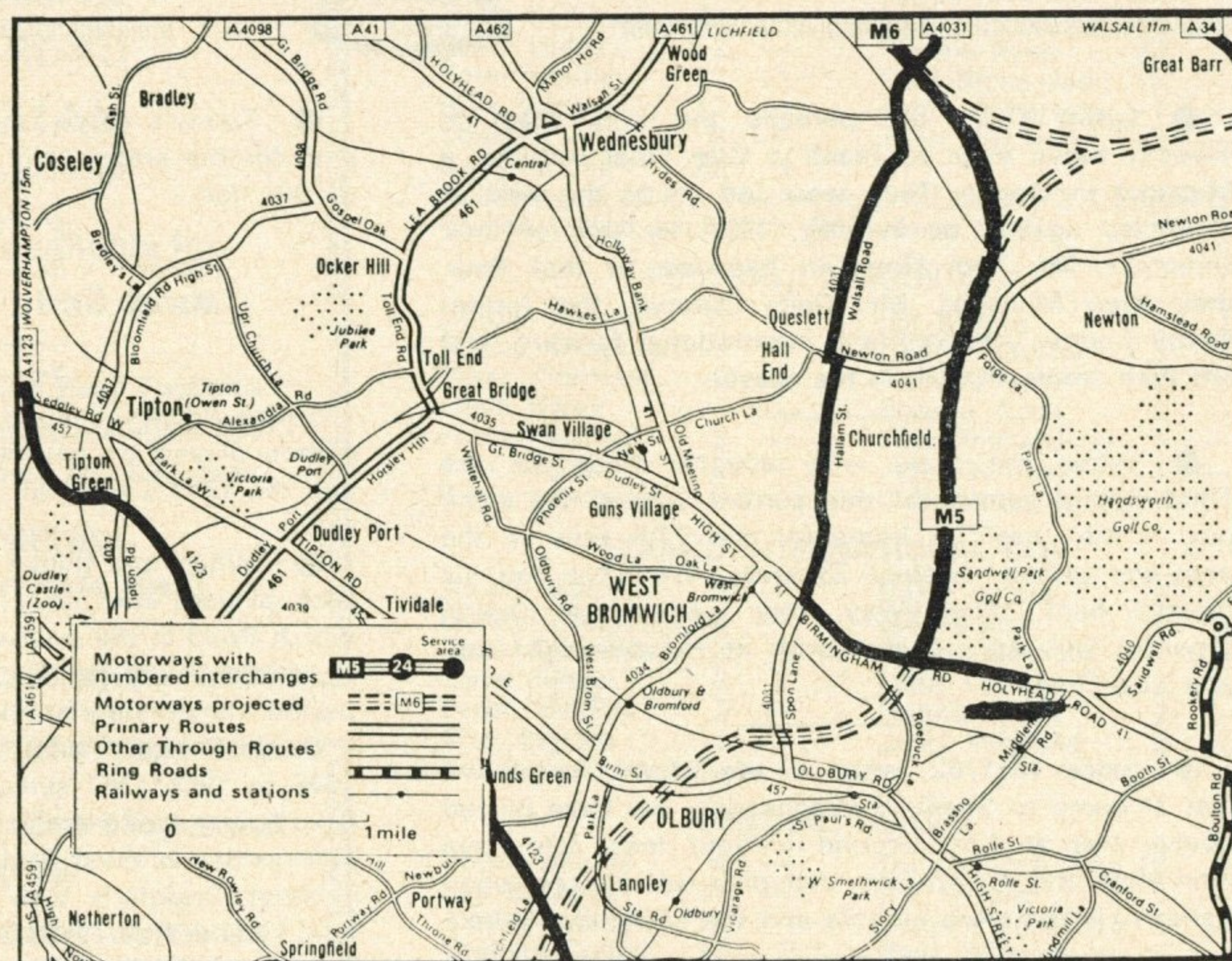

A52 to the outskirts of Derby. Turn left along the Derby Ring Road (A5111) and continue to the roundabout junction with the A38 Burton Road. 19 Miles. Turn left along the A38 by-passing Burton-on-Trent to Walsall. A461 to Walsall, then the A454 to the M6 Motorway. 57 Miles. M6 South for 3 miles then continue along the M5 as signed "South-West" to Intersection (1). A41 Birmingham (North-West), West Bromwich (see plan). 63 Miles. A41 Birmingham Road and Holyhead Road to: THE HAWTHORNS. 64 Miles.



## Cup Roll Call . . .

Before kick-off today, here's the roll call of appearances made in our colours (with goals scored) of the current playing staff.

John Winfield 21 (1 goal), Peter Hindley 20 (1), Ian Storey-Moore 14 (3), Barry Lyons 13 (2), Bobby Chapman 7 (1), Dave Hilley 3 (1), Paul Richardson 3, Alan Hill 2, Liam O'Kane 2, Ronnie Rees 2, and Jimmy McCaffrey (as a substitute) scored our goal at Carlisle last season in the Third Round replay.

An odd thing about those three goals in the Cup scored by Ian Moore . . . the most prolific of our goalscorers. They all came in one match . . . and those present will never ever forget his memorable "hat-trick". It was in 1966/67, in the Sixth Round tie here between ourselves and the then Cup-holders Everton . . . The visitors netted twice (through Jimmy

Husband) and amid scenes of frantic goalmouth excitement (with crowd participation on the ground at its height) Ian's third ensured us a place in the semi-finals with a well-won 3-2 victory.

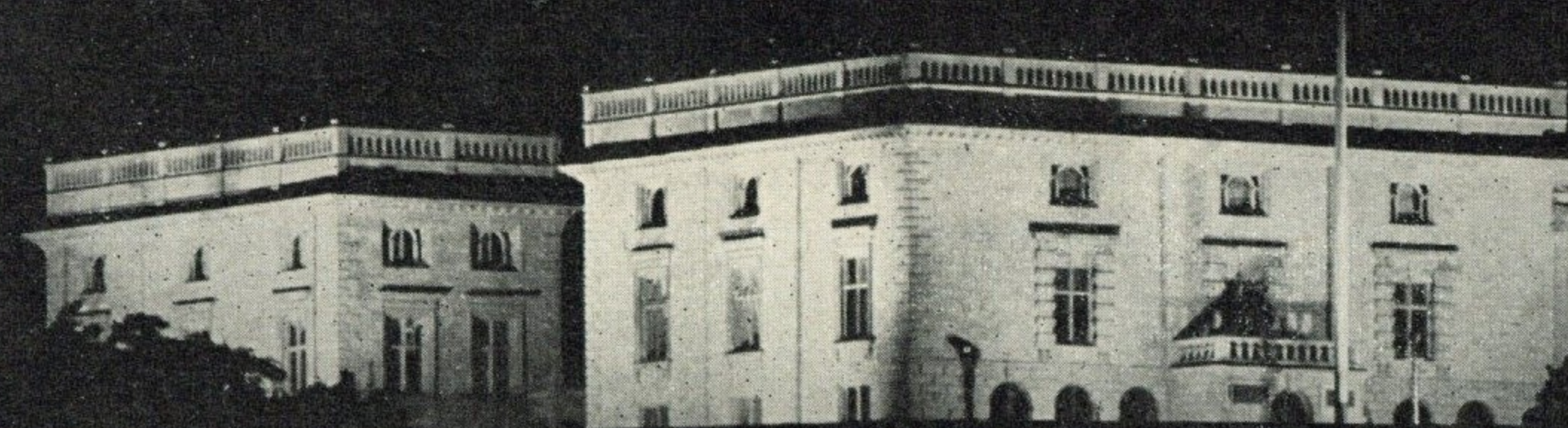
