Quite remarkably, it is five weeks since the Town made their last appearance on their home ground, a fact that can be partly attributed to the extreme weather, the fact that they had two consecutive away League games just before Christmas, and the luck of the Cup draw going against them in the third round.

Taking the points in chronological order, one records, officially, with a good deal of satisfaction, the success achieved in the two away games.

Watford win was a shot in the arm

Certainly, there could have been no greater shot in the arm for all concerned with the club than for the team to beat Watford on their own Vicarage Road ground.

A crowd of 24,456 saw the Town clearly superior to their old rivals and it is expected that these figures will be exceeded when the return is played at Kenilworth Road on Saturday, 13 February — though Cup tie arrangements could, conceivably, upset this date.

Weather beat the Boxing Day game

Unfortunately, what was to have been a top attraction on Boxing Day and, doubtless, would have attracted the



biggest gate of the season, had to be put off by the Christmas card nature of the weather.

It was impossible for a decision to be made earlier than it was and, inevitably, some fans made a fruitless journey.

However, postponements, especially at holiday times always pose their own problems. Now a new date for the visit of Millwall is awaited and nothing can be finalised until the Town's interest in the FA Cup is ended.

Of course, hopes are running high that they will go through to the fifth round in which they could well look forward to a money-spinning tie.

Monday's task will not be easy

First, of course, next Monday's obstacle, when Forest come here for the replay, has to be surmounted, after which, at least, there is ground advantage for the Town in this competition at last.

The original date, last Tuesday, for the replay was another casualty of the weather but, in this case, the decision was made early enough by the local referee, Roy Sheppard, of Dunstable, who devoted much time to his various inspections, to prevent people from being disappointed by travelling in vain.

Judging by the big demand for stand tickets and the vast number of enquiries by telephone which followed one after another on Tuesday, this match is attracting tremendous interest.

Could verge on the season's best

Indeed, it may well pull in a crowd verging on the season's best, set up when Arsenal were here in the League Cup.

However, the Forest, who are somewhat in the doldrums, will not be bringing anything like the following that accompanied the Gunners to help to swell the gate receipts to record proportions.

For the Town to progress to a home tie with either Sunderland or Orient, either of whom would be an attractive proposition at that stage of the competition, they will have to be at their best to eliminate the Forest.

Disappointing time for the Forest

Considering the talent they have available, this has been a vastly disappointing season for them, because a Cup win would leave them with nothing to fight for during the remainder of the season, except a possible struggle against the spectre of relegation.

Before that hurdle is tackled, the Town have a vastly important match this afternoon when Queen's Park Rangers will be here seeking revenge for the 1-0 defeat inflicted earlier this season.

Rangers' promise not fulfilled

Rangers are another side who have had a disappointing time because, before the season began, their chances of a quick return to Division I were fancied in several influential quarters.

However, this has not happened and their lack of success in the last ten matches, was reflected this week by the resignation of their manager, Les Allen,

who was a notable performer for Tottenham Hotspur in their most palmy days.

Particular interest for Alec Stock

For the moment, the managerial duties are in the hands of the chief coach, Gordon Jago who had the task of choosing the team for as tough an assignment as Rangers could have been called upon to face at this critical stage.


This clash, of course, poses particular interest for the Town chief, Alec Stock, who was in charge of Rangers through the heady days when they went through from Division III to Division I and became the first Third Division team to play at Wembley, when they won the League Cup.

And, of course, Mike Keen also has a special interest in today's clash because he was Rangers' skipper during their years of high success.




Although all seats have been sold for Monday's Cup-tie replay with Nottingham Forest on this ground, there seems to be an impression that this is to be an all-ticket game.

This, of course, is *not* the case, admission to the covered and open terraces being by payment at the turnstiles and ordinary League match prices will apply.

To avoid congestion, supporters are asked to arrive as early as possible and the gates will be opened as soon as our staff of part-time gate-men arrive.

Received about 8,000 calls

On the face of things, this match is creating tremendous interest. Not only was there a queue of people, wanting tickets, beginning to form at 7 am on Sunday but, on Tuesday, when the game was eventually put off, we estimate that we had at least 8,000 phone calls enquiring about the decision.

Tickets for main stand only

Should we win on Monday, then we will be at home to either Sunderland or Orient, who have yet to meet because of the frozen state of the Roker Park pitch, and they are due to try to reach a conclusion on Monday, too.

Tickets will be issued for the main stand only at 14s and 11s, and will if we win the replay go on sale at 9 am on Tuesday. Season-ticket holders, using docket number 5, must claim their seats by 5 pm on Wednesday, 20 January.

Where postal application is made, it must be accompanied by the correct remittance and a stamped, addressed envelope. Fourth round matches will be played a fortnight today.

Interest now in Blackburn trip



High hopes by Rangers at the outset, but are out of the running now by Tony Pullein

Queen's Park Rangers set out with such high hopes but a series of below average performances has ruled them out of this season's prizes share-out.

Their last hope went last Saturday when they were knocked out of the FA Cup on their own ground by Swindon. Now their main concern is to pull out of the relegation zone.

Dreams of a return to Division I are certainly out of the question. They spent one so-brief campaign (1968-69) in the top section, never really getting the chance to establish themselves, and everyone at The Bush has set their hearts on seeing them get back for another crack.

They made a bold bid last season but failed, primarily because of indifferent away form.

Still suspect

Their away form is still suspect though, in their last away game, they took a splendid point from leaders Leicester City in a 0-0 draw.

Manager Les Allen fielded a new-look team for that game, dropping established first-team men like Terry Venables, Tony Hazell, Allan Harris and Mike Ferguson.

Venables returned for last week's cup-tie but, after yet another disappointment, Allen resigned and changes may well have been rung again today.

Rangers have failed to win any of their last nine League and Cup games. This is how their results have gone this season:

How the club came into being

A group of young urchins from the Droop Street Board School formed the club originally in 1885. Later it became known as St Jude's Institute FC and then, under the present title, they turned professional in 1899 when they joined the Southern League.

They became founder members of Division III (South) in 1920, but had to apply for re-election in 1924 and 1926, the latter being their worst season on record - they finished bottom fourteen points behind the next club, Charlton.

When their star began to rise

It was after the last war that Rangers' star began to rise. In 1946-47 they were runners-up to Cardiff, then the following season they pipped Bournemouth to the championship and promotion to Division II for the first time.

Four years later they returned to Division III and rarely raised an eyebrow until 1967 when they became the first Third Division side to win the League Cup and the first club from outside the top two divisions to play in a Wembley final.

Widest margin

At the same time they won the divisional championship by the widest margin in Third Division history - they were twelve points clear of runners-up Middlesbrough - and they created a Third Division defensive record, since beaten, by conceding only thirty-eight goals.

In 1968 they equalled Charlton's thirty-two-year-old record by rising from the Third to the First Division in successive seasons.

But their First Division career was a disaster. They suffered immediate relegation, creating several unwanted new records.

One day, maybe, they'll get back again and, having learned from that traumatic experience, do a lot better.





Three former Chelsea men are in the Rangers' first-team squad

Here are pen portraits of QPR's senior squad.

PHIL PARKES (Goalkeeper). Rangers secured Phil from Walsall during the summer for about £15,000 and he made a rapid rise to the top. Walsall signed him as a professional in January 1968 and he made his League debut only a couple of months later.

League record: Walsall 52 aps; QPR 21 aps.

DAVE CLEMENT (Right-back). Dave was chosen to travel with the England youth squad for the 1966 UEFA Youth tournament in Yugoslavia and played against France and Italy at centre-half. He made his League debut during Rangers' Third Division championship campaign of 1966-67 and has, for the past couple of seasons, been a fairly regular member of the senior squad.

League record: QPR 102 (2) aps, 9 gls.

ALLAN HARRIS (Left-back). Allan joined Chelsea in 1958, gaining a place in their First Division side two years later. He spent just over a year with Coventry, from 1965, before returning to Stamford Bridge. Though he was not a regular first-teamer in 1966-67, he played with his brother Ron in Chelsea's FA Cup final team beaten by Spurs a few weeks before signing for Rangers.

League record: Chelsea (first spell) 70 aps; Coventry 60 aps; Chelsea (second spell) 12 (5) aps; QPR 90 (3) aps.

IAN WATSON (Full-back). Ian recently returned to the team following the shake-up after a run of poor results. Another ex-Chelsea player, Ian moved to Rangers in 1965.

League record: Chelsea 5 aps; QPR 146 (5) aps, 1 gl.

MARTYN BUSBY (Right-half). Martyn got his chance in the first-team earlier this season. He's the latest in a long line of Rangers' youth players to make the grade and the brother of Luton's Viv. Is on the verge of Youth International honours.

League record: QPR 10 aps.

RON HUNT (Centre-half). Ron hit the first goal of his League career to secure a last-minute point at Sheffield United in November. Though he was a Rangers' fan as a boy, Ron first sought soccer fame with West Ham, where he was a ground-staff boy. Things didn't work out so he joined Reading, again failing to fulfil his ambition to become a League player. But he has proved a wonderful servant to Rangers, since making his League bow in 1964-65.

Third Division Championship Medal (1967).

League record: QPR 166 (3) aps, 1 gl.

TONY HAZELL (Wing-half). Tony joined Rangers shortly after leaving school and made his way through the junior ranks to the League

eleven in 1964-65 – the season he won the first of his five England youth caps. He was right-back in Rangers' League Cup winning side at Wembley in 1967.

League Cup Winners Medal (1967).

Third Division Championship Medal (1967).

League record: QPR 224 (3) aps, 4 gls.

GERRY FRANCIS (Outside-right). Yet another product of the junior sides, Gerry had a brief taste of First Division soccer two seasons ago when he played as a substitute. Now he has won a regular place.

League record: QPR 24 (4) aps, 3 gls.

MICK McGOVERN (Outside-right). Mick was called up for his first game of the season in Rangers' last League game at Leicester. So far he has made only occasional first-team appearances, but he has shown high promise when he has played.

League record: QPR 6 aps.

TERRY VENABLES (Inside-forward). Though Terry's job is in mid-field, he is Rangers' second highest scorer with eight goals – five from penalties. He has already justified the £80,000 club record fee Rangers invested in him in 1969 when signing him from Spurs. A Chelsea debutant at 17, Terry played for England at schoolboy, youth, amateur, under-23 and full international levels. Tottenham parted with £80,000 for his signature in 1966.

League Cup Winner Medal (1965).

League record: Chelsea 202 aps, 26 gls; Tottenham 114 (1) aps, 5 gls; QPR 54 aps, 12 gls.

MICK LEACH (Centre-forward). Mick, capped twice for the England Youth XI in 1962-63, really established himself as a regular first teamer last season though he has only recently got into the team this term. As the club struggled to survive in the First Division two seasons back, Mick hit eight goals to make him level top scorer in League games.

League record: QPR 109 (4) aps, 28 gls.

FRANK SAUL (Centre-forward). Rangers bought Frank from Southampton in the summer of 1970. A former England youth cap, he started his career with Spurs, making his League debut in 1960-61. He hit their winning goal in the 1967 FA Cup final against Chelsea and joined Southampton a few months later.

FA Cup Winners Medal (1967).

League record: Tottenham 112 (4) aps, 37 gls; Southampton 46 (7) aps, 2 gls; QPR 14 aps, 1 gl.

RODNEY MARSH (Inside-left). Rodney made his League debut for Fulham against Aston Villa in March 1963 but soon encountered the first of
