





"A BLUES SUPPORTER for 40 years, I feel that the transfer of Trevor Hockey is the worst let-down the fans have had in that length of time" . . . said a letter writer in last Saturday's Sports Argus, the Birmingham equivalent of the Green 'Un (except that it is pink!).

Another Birmingham City supporter wrote that the St. Andrews team manager had sold "£40,000 worth of talent, leadership, effort and, not least of all, goodwill".

When the departure of such a player causes such a stir—and Sheffield supporters have had their say at times—then the very fact that followers are moved to written tribute proves a reason for buying. It is of little consolation to Birmingham, who made it plain that the decision to part with their captain was taken very reluctantly.

Trevor was surprised at the speed with which the Blades moved . . . and his transfer was just the start of what must rate the most incredible transfer day in the Blades history.

Hockey is one of a number of players who began life as wingers and are now better known for their generalship, if you like, in midfield. He revels in hard work, is fearless, hates losing . . . and thoroughly enjoyed starting with a win in his new career.

Among many other things, this particular Yorkshire 'terrier' with a reputation for being an extrovert off the field, wrote a weekly column for the paper I mentioned earlier. In his last article, he explained how happy he had been at St. Andrews, pointed out that United were a "go ahead club with a splendid chance of promotion this season" and that he would be returning to his native county.

He thanked the fans and his friends at the City club, and wound up wishing the Blues promotion in the not too distant future . . . "by then I hope to be a member of a Sheffield United team waiting to greet them in the First Division".

Trevor, everyone at Bramall Lane, and in Sheffield for that matter, hopes you get that wish!

The events of last week made the Hockey-signing day an unforgettable day and I would like to take this opportunity of wishing the former Birmingham skipper, David Ford and John Hope all the best . . . and that goes for John Tudor in his new career as well.

David Ford has already ensured himself a place in the history books, as one of the few to wear the colours of both city clubs, and not having been in on the Oxford victory is razor-keen to impress Blades followers as soon as possible.

So it is all 'go' at the moment, and this afternoon's match, with all its crucial implications for both teams should mean there is plenty to talk about afterwards!

When things happen at the Lane—they really do

WHAT A HECTIC DAY IT WAS, a week ago last Wednesday. The activity went on until late evening, by which time three new players had been signed and one had left us and, in between, an F.A. Disciplinary Commission had upheld Ted Hemsley's appeal against his caution. Both Mr. Wragg and Mr. Harris, who had been present at all the various talks and transactions, finally thought they had completed a good day's work.

The trip to Birmingham for Ted's personal hearing proved more eventful than anyone had imagined. But that is the way of things at Bramall Lane. At no time must our supporters feel that because nothing appears to be happening nothing is being done. This has been said before and the recent events have confirmed it. While some clubs advertise what sometimes turn out to be non-events, we make our announcements only when we have a 'fait accompli' and there is something concrete to tell our fans. What happened was no last-minute decision. Some time ago it was decided that certain things must happen. When the signatures were on the transfer forms the news was given out and everyone knew. Until then it was kept quiet. These are not the only players about whom inquiries had been made. But news of the fact that a club does not want to part with a player in whom we may be interested isn't really news.

Birmingham were not anxious to rid themselves of their captain, Trevor Hockey. They let it be known immediately after his transfer that financial circumstances had made it necessary. Newcastle United's manager, Mr. Joe Harvey, said money wasn't a consideration. He had been keen on obtaining John Tudor for some time, but had had to await a player-exchange deal. While we did not want to lose Tudor, he was Mr. Harvey's target. The former Sheffield Wednesday Under-23 international, David Ford, who scored in their 1966 Cup Final and Newcastle's reserve goalkeeper, John Hope, made the deal possible. Farewell, John Tudor. Welcome, newcomers.

We must mention inclusion in our First Team of 21-year-old John Hope, taking over from Alan Hodgkinson who for so long has been our premier choice. He himself realised that he could not go on for ever. This is, of course, not the last we shall see of "Hodgy" who, with 652 appearances in League and Cup games, has maintained a regular place for 16 seasons.

Alan has been a wonderful goalkeeper and a tremendous worker for the good of the club. Last Friday night, in the knowledge that he was to be displaced, he stayed behind while his colleagues went off to the cinema, and had a quiet chat with his successor, giving him the benefit of his experience. It takes a big man to do that. But it is typical. We salute a fine player and a great Unitedite!

The team's performance at Oxford was a splendid combined effort. Recent displays away from home had been disappointing to say the least. At Bolton it so happened that everyone seemed to have an off-day at the same time and this proved fatal. But all that was changed last week. Had we scored four it would have truly reflected our superiority.

We can but hope this will now be maintained. Today we have a crucial match. All are important, but this is vital. Despite their ups-and-downs, Luton have always had an attractive side. They have beaten us once this season, so we have something to repay. In all, Town have visited Bramall Lane eight times in the League. They have won here only once, in 1955-56 when they scored four. We have won four times and we also beat them 3-0 in the League Cup last season. We look forward to a good game.





HERE'S ANOTHER OF OUR PLAYERS who likes to do coaching in his spare time. Frank has been coaching at Sheffield University and at Parson Cross. He's well qualified academically. To play for Sheffield United he gave up the chance of a place at Hull University. But he says it was a decision he has not regretted. "I would do the same again. After all, it is something to be able to do a job you enjoy", he said.

Echoing what we have always believed, that players these days are better educated than ever before and take pride in that knowledge, Frank points to the training facilities at Sheffield University which are up to professional standards and better than some. "If a professional footballer is able to go to University he has the best of both worlds". He points to the success of players who have been at Bramall Lane—Billy Russell, Jack Cross and Tom Fenoughty, to mention only a few. Facilities at Sheffield University are exceptionally good, he says. There they are playing Wednesdays and Saturdays and have innumerable training sessions, combining their studies with fitness training. He points out that the U.A.U. is run on a professional basis and more and more students are coming into first-class football. "Colin Addison is coaching Sheffield College. They have beaten us once this season, but we shall win the next game", he said.

Our team were relegated the season Frank got married, though he doesn't believe that had anything to do with it! He met his wife, Linda, when they both attended the Swinton Youth Club. Their son, Matthew, is now nearly a year old.





Their aim to get back is showing progress

INDICATIONS are that the next decade will be much happier for Luton Town than the last has been. In 1959 they were in the First Division and played at Wembley in the F.A. Cup Final. Only 12 months later Town, whose history goes back to 1895, were relegated along with Leeds United. And they kept on going down.

In 1963 they were in Division Three and another two years saw them in Division Four. Fortunately, they had the determination to fight back and the end of season 1967-68 saw the start of the upwards climb. They make no secret of the fact that their aim this season is to regain what they believe to be their rightful place in Division One. They are making a good attempt.

Can they possibly make it from Division Four to the top Division in three years? Manager Alec Stock, who took them into Division Two when they finished second to Orient last season, is confident they can. Their first action was to announce plans for ground improvements costing £500,000.

Mr. Stock was in charge of Q.P.R. when they started their climb from the Third Division and it was he who spotted that prolific goal-scorer Rodney Marsh. On a tour of Spain he met up with Bert Head, manager of Crystal Palace, who were also touring that country, and the result was his signing of Palace's midfield player, Roger Hoy, for £20,000. Previously with Spurs, Hoy played a

big part in Palace's rise to the First Division. Mr. Stock hopes he'll do the same for Luton.

A great deal of their success this season, however, can justifiably be attributed to striker Malcolm Macdonald who, not so long ago, was a full-back with Fulham. So successful has been his transition to the attack that he is leading the scoring for the Second Division. Originally with Tonbridge, he always took the shortest route to goal, no matter from what position and, though it was intended to use him in defence when Town paid £17,500 for him, pre-season matches showed his capabilities up front. He's only 20.

Mr. Stock is an able administrator. Without knowing any Italian he managed Roma to their League Championship. He recently celebrated 21 years in Football League management. Yet, he captained the Dartford school team at RUGBY! After playing for Charlton and Q.P.R. he ventured into management with those heroic Cup-fighters, Yeovil Town, and saw his Southern League team reach the F.A. Cup fifth round.

Luton's most expensive signing was £35,000 David Court, a wing-half who came from Arsenal in the summer after 55 First Division appearances in two seasons. In November they transferred Matt Tees, who cost £25,000 when he came from Charlton last year, to Grimsby Town for £5,000.

They have a wealthy chairman, Mr. Tony Hunt, reputed to be a millionaire, who will not be satisfied until they are again among the top teams in the country. Not long ago Town acquired a new director, Mr. J. E. Bartholomew, who, of course, is known to everyone. No doubt you know him better as Eric Morecambe of the comedy duo, Morecambe and Wise!

This capable goalkeeper has seized the chance which came his way late. His first senior club was Sheffield Wednesday and he joined Luton from Peterborough United. But at one time last season he had difficulty in getting a game in his correct position and played several times with the Reserves at inside-forward. When Alan Starling was injured he was preferred to former Scottish Under-23 international Sandy Davie, now with Southampton. Read was born at Haydock.





