and it will be a matter of interest whether today's figures will approach that total.

Strangely, the decision to make this an all-ticket affair with a ground limit of 27,500, did not meet with the response that was expected.

On the face of things, one would have thought that this was a natural for a sell-out but, in mid-week, the Town still had plenty of tickets left and the gate then stood at around the 20,000 mark.

Postal strike had an effect

Expectations were that this would increase materially by kick-off time, and the line of thought is that the postal strike which has particularly hit the out-of-town regulars, has had a major part in causing the demand to drag its feet.

With a couple of tough away games looming up, the Town simply must win today in order to keep closely in touch with the promotion issue.

Next week, they visit unpredictable Portsmouth, who followed their two brave Cup efforts against Arsenal and an away win over Hull City, by crashing 4-1 at home to Carlisle last Saturday.

Sunderland yield little at home

Then, a fortnight today, they are due at Sunderland, who have not done so well

as was expected. Though, it is significant that they do not give a great deal away at Roker Park where they have been beaten only twice this season.

One way or another, there have been some significant changes in the playing staff since the last programme. Three players have joined Allan Brown at Torquay, who are plagued by injuries.

Two on loan transfer

Peter Phillips and reserve goalkeeper, Alan Starling have joined the Devon club on loan transfers, but subject to immediate recall if necessary, while Freddie Jardine, always a popular figure at Kenilworth Road, has been signed by them on a free transfer.

Another to go was John Collins, who is now with the League's babes, Cambridge United. On the other side of the scales, Keith Barber, a goalkeeper who has been on the books as an amateur, has now signed professional forms.

Was in the Royal Navy in 1943 when he began refereeing and, afterwards, he progressed through his local league to the Northern and North-Eastern Leagues.

Then came promotion to the Central League and to the Football League linesmen's list in 1953.

A year later, his progress was recognised when he was appointed a League referee and in 1958 he was put on the FIFA panel.

In 1960 he had charge of the FA Cup final between Wolves and Blackburn Rovers and of the Inter-Cities Fairs Cup final two years later.

He has also refereed two European Cup semi-finals and seventy other representative matches.




In this case, a much earlier start is entailed, with departure timed for 7.56 am, Bedford 8.17, arriving Seaburn (Sunderland) 1.46 pm. Depart from the same station at 5.32 pm, arrive Bedford 10.27, Luton 10.55. Seaburn station is quite close to the Sunderland ground.



Watford turned to youth after Cup defeat by Oxford United

Far reaching changes after the Cup dismissal by Oxford United have brought Watford four badly needed points. Aiding in the revival are three youngsters having their first sample of League football.

DEREK EDMONDS (Goalkeeper). Derek was one of several younger players drafted into the team following Watford's recent FA Cup defeat by Oxford. In his first League game at Bolton, Watford won 1-0 to end a run of ten League games without a win. A former Luton schoolboy who afterwards played for Limbury OB, Derek started his career with Leeds, didn't get into the first team and transferred to Watford in May 1970. He is a former England Youth International.
League record: Watford 2 aps.

DAVID BUTLER (Right-back). Watford signed David from Workington in November and he has played in every match since. Born in Stockton, David rose through Workington's junior teams to make his League debut in 1964-65 and for his last three campaigns at Borough Park he missed only five games.
League record: Workington 195 (4) aps, 7 gls; Watford 9 aps.

JOHN WILLIAMS (Left-back). John has been one of Watford's most consistent defenders over the past four years. He learned his game at Vicarage Road, getting his first chance in the League eleven during 1964-65. Is now available for transfer.
Division Three Championship Medal (1969).

League record: Watford 222 (1) aps.

TERRY GARBETT (Right-half). A former striker who is now playing in mid-field, Terry got his League chance with Middlesbrough in 1965-66, moving to Watford at the end of that season. He was top scorer with eighteen goals in his first season and continued to score regularly until last term when he switched positions.
Division Three Championship Medal (1969).

League record: Middlesbrough 7 aps, 1 gl; Watford 175 (4) aps, 47 gls.

WALTER LEES (Centre-half). Walter is now in his second full season as Watford's regular centre-half. He was originally spotted playing in Scottish junior football and Watford signed him as a professional in June 1968, giving him his League debut the following season.
League record: Watford 68 (3) aps, 4 gls.

TOM WALLEY (Left-half). Joined Arsenal in December 1964 from Caernarvon Town and won his first Welsh Under-23 cap while at Highbury. But he only began to make his mark in League football after his move to Watford in 1967.
Wales Under-23 4 aps.
Division Three Championship Medal (1969).

League record: Arsenal 10 (4) aps, 1 gl; Watford 170 aps, 16 gls.

DUNCAN WELBOURNE (Outside-right). Has been performing at full-back for about fourteen years in League football, but lost his place in Watford's team when they signed David Butler.

He was re-introduced as an extra defender in the number seven shirt – but found time to hit the winning goal at Bolton in their last away game. Duncan opened his professional career at Scunthorpe but didn't get a League game with them. A move to Grimsby gave him his chance in the League in 1957-58. Watford signed him in 1964 and he had been a regular until this season – he was everpresent for five consecutive seasons.
Division Three Championship Medal (1969).
League record: Grimsby 129 aps, 3 gls; Watford 307 (1) aps, 17 gls.

JOHN FARLEY (Outside-left). John joined Watford as a professional in July 1969 and got his first opportunity in the first team at Bolton a fortnight ago.
League record: Watford 2 aps.

ROY SINCLAIR (Inside-forward). Roy was originally an amateur with Liverpool but he saw more chance of success with his local club at Tranmere. He made his League debut for them against Oxford in May 1964 and did well enough to earn himself a regular place for the following five seasons until joining Watford just before the 1969 transfer deadline.
League record: Tranmere 130 (5) aps, 17 gls; Watford 20 (10) aps, 2 gls.

RON WIGG (Inside-forward). Watford's top scorer with thirteen League and Cup goals, Ron is enjoying his best-ever campaign. He started with Orient, didn't get a League game, so he signed for Ipswich in 1967. By last season he had won a regular place in their First Division team, but he left for Watford in June.
League record: Ipswich 36 (2) aps, 8 gls; Watford 25 aps, 9 gls.

BILLY JENNINGS (Centre-forward). Another reserve player to get his chance at Bolton two weeks back, Billy has been a Watford professional since April 1970. Billy was picked for the England youth team against Ireland last season. Was with Tottenham for a spell as a youth.
League record: Watford 2 aps.

COLIN FRANKS (Wing-half). Colin once left Watford to sign for Wealdstone, but returned when Watford offered him a professional contract in July 1969. He made his League bow last season, then hit a fabulous goal which knocked First Division Stoke out of the FA Cup in his first cup-tie. Unfortunately, he has been unable to hold a regular place this season.
League record: Watford 15 (6) aps, 1 gl.

MIKE PACKER (Half-back). Mike has been filling the role of substitute for some recent games. A Watford discovery, he made his League debut two seasons ago and held his place for a while last term.
League record: Watford 24 (9) aps, 2 gls.



Nightmare slide towards the bottom halted by Watford revival

A season which opened full of hope turned into another nightmare for Watford. Last season, their first as a Second Division club, they struggled desperately against relegation throughout, a last match draw at Norwich ultimately saving them.

In October this time, they seemed to be coasting comfortably along in mid-table until a spell of ten League games without a win plunged them back into the relegation sector.

Manager Ken Furphy, who had been loyal to his regular players, finally realised he would have to take drastic action after Oxford had beaten them on their own ground in a fourth round FA Cup replay. He wielded his axe swiftly – out went Welsh Under-23 goalkeeper Mike Walker, skipper Keith Eddy and forwards Stewart Scullion and Barry Endean.

In, for their first-ever League games, came goalkeeper Derek Edmonds plus forwards John Farley and Billy Jenkins.

Result: Watford won 1-0 at Bolton to end that dismal run without a victory!

Cannot afford reckless chances

Whether or not Mr Furphy has completed his experiments remains to be seen. Watford's League position is such that he can't afford to take any reckless chances. The threat of relegation is still too real for him to proceed with anything but the utmost caution.

The irony of Watford's present situation is that Mr Furphy had succeeded in overcoming their biggest problem of last season – a feeble attack.

The signing of Ron Wigg from Ipswich, who early on struck up a fine partnership with Charlie Woods, who also came from Ipswich last summer, gave the front line considerably more bite.

Team lost confidence

Then Woods lost his place, cracks began to show in a previously solid defence and the team rapidly lost confidence. Mr Furphy's recent measures seem to have halted the slide, though.

In December we scored our first League goal at Watford since before the war, when Mike Keen's first-half effort gave us a 1-0 victory. Our League record against the Hornets now reads:

Formed by amalgamation

The Watford club was formed by the amalgamation of West Hertfordshire FC

and Watford St Mary's FC in 1898. Professionalism was immediately adopted as they entered the second division of the Southern League.

They became founder members of Division III (South) in 1920, applied for re-election in 1927 and 1951 and then became one of the original members of the Fourth Division in 1958.

But they stormed back into Division III in 1960 – Cliff Holton creating a new club record with forty-two League goals – and reached the fifth round of the FA Cup.

They almost gained promotion again the next year, but finally settled into fourth position.

Promotion after two near misses

They had two incredibly near-misses before they finally got promotion to Division II. In 1964 they dropped three points in their last two games and missed by two points.

Two years later they went even closer. Three points from the final two games would have done the trick. But they collected only two! And Middlesbrough overhauled them.


They finally made it in 1969 and, in spite of their precarious League position last season, they created a club record by reaching the semi-final of the FA Cup, only to be beaten by the ultimate winners, Chelsea.




