Building up to a tremendous climax to the season is the Division II promotion race in which seven teams are in with a chance, and the Town, with two re-arranged home games in hand, look to be slightly better off than their rivals.

New dates have now been fixed for the two postponed games. Millwall will come here on Tuesday, 30 March and Cardiff City, also involved in the struggle, will ring down the Kenilworth Road curtain with a visit on Tuesday, 4 May.

So, the Town have the undeniable advantage of rounding off their fixtures with two home matches and, should the issue turn on the clash with Cardiff, as it well might, then Kenilworth Road will be tested to capacity.

Has been a famine of home games

For various reasons, today's meeting with Charlton Athletic will only be the Town's third at home in the League in 1971.

It is three weeks since the fans last saw them in action in what proved to be a disappointing affair with Watford, although the result was in the Town's favour, thus completing a double over their near rivals.

Town should win today

On paper, Charlton should not provide the Town with an insurmountable obstacle because they are anchored at the bottom of the table and obviously have a tremendous struggle on their hands to avoid relegation.

However, these days, it does not pay to take anything for granted and, with the Londoners in desperate mood, this could well be close fought.



On the other hand, should the Town strike their best, then they could well end the comparative famine of goals which has been inflicting them recently.

Manful job done by the defence

Fortunately, while goals have not been accruing freely, the defence has been doing a manful job, as three clean sheets in a row plainly prove.

In twenty-eight League games, they have conceded only nineteen goals, easily the best defensive record in the Second Division and, if goal average is decisive in the final reckoning, then the odds are heavily in favour of the Town on this count.

At Portsmouth and Sunderland, not the easiest grounds on which to gain points, the defence was seldom in real trouble, and will need to show similar resolution next Saturday when they visit Carlisle United who also have ideas about First Division football next season.

Carlisle visit is a tough one

Only five points have been conceded at home this season by Carlisle, who have not been beaten on their Brunton Park pitch since Birmingham won there by 3-0 way back on 22 August.

In their whole history, the Town have paid only one previous visit to Carlisle which was six years ago and they returned with a 1-1 draw. A repeat next week would be regarded as a very useful performance.

March looks like being a month of more than usual significance because, on the following Saturday, the powerful Hull City combination, now reinforced by the acquisition of Bill Baxter, the ex-Ipswich Town centre-half, will be here.

Then comes another formidable test
And to complete a trio of really tough matches which will obviously have an absolutely vital bearing on the final Division II line-up, the Town will be at Middlesbrough three weeks today.

Middlesbrough are another team who owe their place in the promotion race to the strength of their home record which, like that of Carlisle, includes only one home defeat and that also was back in August when Oxford United beat them at Ayresome Park.

April brings crowded programme

When this series of games is over, together with the one against Millwall at the end of the month, we shall have a much clearer idea of the Town's prospects for next season.

Then, it is into a testing April which brings seven matches, including the hectic Easter period in which the Town are due to visit Bristol and Millwall on successive days and have Leicester City here on Easter Monday.

All-ticket idea was abandoned

There had been ideas about making the Leicester game an all-ticket affair, but after the near fiasco of Watford's visit when the crowd was nearly 7,000 below the ground's capacity, the plan was shelved.

In an attempt to give the players extra zip for the crucial period that remains, fourteen of them have spent four days this week in Jersey for special training.

One hopes that there will be ample evidence this afternoon that this break from routine has been beneficial.

No doubt those with longer memories, will recall that it was after a spell of special training at Blackpool that the Town made the first step back to their present eminence by winning promotion from the Fourth Division.


Maybe, that can be regarded as a happy augury!

Charlton are putting up a brave fight against bogey of relegation

Charlton's position at the bottom of the table has become increasingly more uncomfortable as the weeks go by.

In spite of some occasionally outstanding results – their draw at Cardiff, for instance, which gave them three points from the Welshmen this season, and a 4–1 win at Queen's Park Rangers – it begins to look as though they have a real fight on their hands to avoid a return to Division III for the first time since 1935.

Charlton's unhappy experiences do tend to outline how fine is the dividing line between success and failure. Apart from a 4–0 trouncing at Bolton, most of Charlton's defeats have been by narrow margins as this full list of their season's results indicates:

Comings and goings have been many

There have been many comings and goings at the Valley as manager Theo Foley has fought to arrest the slide. He sold Scottish Under-23 cap Alan Campbell, a fine mid-field player, to Birmingham City, Gordon Riddick, a versatile player who joined them as a striker, but finished up playing centre-half, to Orient and Harry Gregory to Aston Villa.

All three deals were completed on the same day, netting Charlton some £87,000 and they immediately re-invested £15,000 of it in Coventry defender Dietmar Bruck.

Then they paid £25,000 for Tottenham's mid-field player Dennis Bond. Another new recruit was Gillingham's goal-keeper Derek Bellotti who played his first game for them in November.

Signed Endean from Watford

Last month another cash deal took Barry Endean, the Watford striker, to The Valley.

When we visited The Valley in October we were held to a 1–1 draw, our League record against them now reading:

The Charlton club was formed in 1905, playing in local competitions until adopting professionalism and joining the

Southern League in 1920. Within a year they were elected to the Third Division (South) of the Football League.

A feat which we hope to equal

During the 30s they rose from the Third to the First Division in consecutive seasons, a feat which only Queen's Park Rangers subsequently managed to equal but which we hope will occur again this season – for the Hatters!

Charlton's really great days were packed into eleven years between 1936 and 1947. Runners-up in Division I, four Cup finals in five years (including two war-time competitions) were some of the heights attained in those golden days.

In 1943 and 1944 they reached the final of the League South Cup, winning the trophy on the second occasion. They were beaten in extra-time by Derby in the 1946 FA Cup final but returned to Wembley a year later to defeat Burnley 1–0. Then fortunes faded and they were relegated in 1957.

Have been very near to the drop

Several times since they have almost dropped into the Third Division. A rain-storm saved them in 1963. They were two points below Walsall before the final game when the two sides met at Walsall.

Only a win could save them. The first match was 0–0 when it was abandoned at half-time due to a storm.

Charlton's squad made up of a blend of youth and experience

Experienced players, plus a leavening of those who still have to make their mark in the game, make up Charlton's first team squad.

CHARLIE WRIGHT (Goalkeeper). Charlie started with Morton and served Glasgow Rangers before trying his luck in English football with Workington. Grimsby took him on strength in 1963 and it was three years later that he linked with Charlton. During his national service he played for Hong Kong against Peru. He was dropped earlier in the season but returned to the team at Christmas. *League record: Workington 80 aps; Grimsby 129 aps; Charlton 180 aps.*

BOB CURTIS (Right-back). Bob joined Charlton as an apprentice in 1965, turning professional two years later. Charlton gave him a single chance in the League team in 1966–67, since when he has made steady progress and is now holding down a regular place. He is ever-present this season. *League record: Charlton 123 (1) aps, 7 gls.*

DIETMAR BRUCK (Left-back). Charlton signed Dietmar from Coventry for £15,000 earlier this season. He had developed in the Sky Blues' junior sides and made his League debut in 1960–61 when they were still in the Third Division. For several seasons he held a regular place but hadn't been so fortunate for the past couple of campaigns. *Second Division Championship Medal (1967).*

League record: Coventry 182 (6) aps, 7 gls; Charlton 16 aps.

PAUL WENT (Centre-half). A former England schoolboy and youth international, Paul established himself in Orient's Second Division side in 1965–66 but was anxious for better football when the club dropped into Division III. Charlton paid £27,000 for him in June 1967. He is ever-present this season. *League record: Orient 48 (2) aps, 5 gls; Charlton 103 (2) aps, 7 gls.*

PETER REEVES (Left-half). Another product from Charlton's nursery sides, Peter signed professional on his 17th birthday after serving as an apprentice. He won a string of England youth caps, captaining the side for a period. He made his League debut in 1965–66. *League record: Charlton 154 (3) aps, 1 gl.*

DAVID SHIPPERLEY (Wing-half). One of Charlton's junior discoveries who was given his chance in the League eleven this season. David scored his first League goal two weeks ago – a vital one which gained a surprise point at Cardiff. *League record: Charlton 7 aps, 1 gl.*

MIKE KENNING (Outside-right). Mike returned for his second stint with Charlton two seasons ago. He started with Aston Villa and went to Shrewsbury before initially signing for Charlton in 1962. Four years later he went to Norwich, then had a spell with Wolves before journeying back to The Valley. *League record: Aston Villa 3 aps; Shrewsbury 62 aps, 17 gls; Charlton 152 (1) aps, 43 gls; Norwich 42 aps, 9 gls; Wolves 35 (1) aps, 5 gls; Charlton 39 (5) aps, 10 gls.*

CYRIL DAVIES (Inside-forward). Cyril kicked off with Swansea Town, failed to make the League grade so had another try at Carlisle. He wasn't too successful there, either, but he is now beginning to enjoy regular League football with Charlton after a spell with Yeovil Town. He scored his first League goal against Millwall this season and was also given his chance in the Welsh Under-23 team against England and Scotland. *Wales Under-23 2 aps.*

League record: Carlisle 1 (1) aps, Charlton 18 (2) aps, 1 gl.

BOBBY HUNT (Centre-forward). Bobby created a big impression during his early days at Colchester. He established their club record with thirty-seven League goals in 1961–62. Two years later he moved to Northampton, playing First Division football for the Cobblers, and then spent a couple of years with Millwall before linking with Ipswich three seasons ago. Unfortunately, luck didn't run for him at Portman Road and he signed for Charlton last September. *League record: Colchester 149 aps, 80 gls; Northampton 40 aps, 10 gls; Millwall 43 aps, 13 gls; Ipswich 16 (8) aps, 4 gls; Charlton 4 (1) aps.*

BARRY ENDEAN (Inside-left). A recent acquisition from Watford, where he had been top scorer for the past two seasons. But he was allowed a transfer after losing his place this term. Watford discovered Barry playing for a pub team in the North-East and gave him his chance in League football two seasons ago. *Third Division Championship Medal (1969).*

League record: Watford 72 (5) aps, 28 gls; Charlton 2 aps.

RAY TREACY (Inside-forward). Ray has represented the Republic of Ireland at schoolboy, Under-23 and full international levels. He started his career in English football with West Bromwich, scoring on his League debut in 1967. But he never managed to break into the senior team regularly. Charlton signed him in February 1968. *Republic of Ireland: 11 (3) aps, 1 gl; Republic of Ireland Under-23 1 ap.*

League record: WBA 2 (1) aps, 1 gl; Charlton 92 (4) aps, 25 gls.

KEITH PEACOCK (Outside-left). Keith, who joined the club from school, was joint leading scorer in his first campaign in the senior side in 1962–63. He now needs only two goals for his fifty in League football. *League record: Charlton 223 (10) aps, 48 gls.*

When they replayed the score was again 0–0 at the interval (had the ninety minutes play counted, Charlton would have been down) but, fortunately, they finally won the match 2–1.


