With the inevitable setbacks and difficulty of mounting a consistent run during this time of tension and stress, there is no sign yet of an early solution to the Division II promotion problem.

Despite their narrow defeat at Middlesbrough, which was a disappointment to all Luton enthusiasts, not least the players, the Town are still in with a fine chance of achieving First Division football next season.

Number one priority, of course, is to make certain that no more home points are allowed to escape and this week has assumed a most critical look with the chance to make up leeway being presented by two home matches.

Millwall are old rivals

First comes tonight against Millwall, old rivals during the years, whose previous visit to Kenilworth Road was ill-fated in that snow prevented the match being played on Boxing Day.

For Millwall, this has been a mixed season which they began badly, but gradually improved to the point at which, at one time before Christmas, there seemed a possibility that they might join those in the leading positions.

However, the moment passed because they did not have sufficient consistency and they will have to be content with a

respectable, perfectly safe, midway position in the table.

Lions will be looking for revenge

Not that that means they will be any less keen to lower the colours of the Town tonight, because this is in the nature of a local Derby and the Lions are only too keenly aware that the Town caused their exit from the League Cup at The Den last season.

When Keith Weller was transferred to Chelsea for £100,000 last May, there was considerable discontent among a section of supporters, who failed to understand

that it is difficult to stand in the way of a player's progress.

Bridges filled the gap left by Weller
Eventually, Manager Benny Fenton filled the gap by going to Queen's Park Rangers for the experienced, former England forward, Barry Bridges, who has alleviated to a marked extent, the loss felt by the transfer of Weller and who has become highly popular with the Millwall fans.

This, in point of fact, is one of the two home matches which the Town have in hand over most of their rivals, an undeniable advantage at this stage of the season.

The other is with Cardiff City on Tuesday 4 May, and circumstances could well dictate that this will be the most thrilling finale to the season imaginable.

Birmingham have had a spectacular run

After Millwall come, on Saturday, Birmingham City who, by dint of a run of fourteen matches which have yielded them twenty-five points, have shot themselves right up among the contenders for promotion.

Their spectacular improvement dates from the introduction into the team of the 16-years-old apprentice professional, Trevor Francis.

Fifteen goals in fifteen League games

Carefully, Birmingham avoided pitching him into the Maelstrom of League football too early, but when he forced his way to the forefront, things certainly began to happen.

In fifteen League games, Francis has scored fifteen goals and he will be given a full-time contract on his seventeenth birthday next month.

Francis is quite the most exciting young prospect to come through to the League scene for years and the accuracy of his marksmanship suggests that the top honours in the game might come his way at an unusually early age.

Those clubs who have been fighting it out at the top for many weeks, must be viewing the advance of Birmingham with some trepidation because, the danger to them is that the Midlands' team may continue their momentum and extend their unbeaten run while others, not quite so consistent, are dropping vital points.

Could be season's biggest gate

While, in view of the somewhat disappointing gate figures recently, one hesitates to forecast the size of the crowd, there are indications that Saturday's will be the biggest of the season.

Last Saturday, with Cardiff as their visitors, Birmingham pulled in a massive 49,025 and the obvious inference after deposing the leaders, is that they will have a tremendous following here.

Certainly, the M1 should be busier than usual on Saturday, with hundreds of Birmingham fans coming to boost the Town's gates.

Town in role of rescuers again

Not for the first time this season, the Town have come to the rescue of a club in trouble through injuries. On Friday they loaned Peter Phillips and Robin Wainwright to hard-hit Cambridge United.

Phillips had previously had a spell on loan with Torquay United, while the temporary transfer enabled young Wainwright to make his League debut against Scunthorpe United on Saturday.

For Wainwright, particularly, this move can provide valuable experience at a higher level than is available to him with the Town at the moment and this is one case in which there is advantage to both clubs.

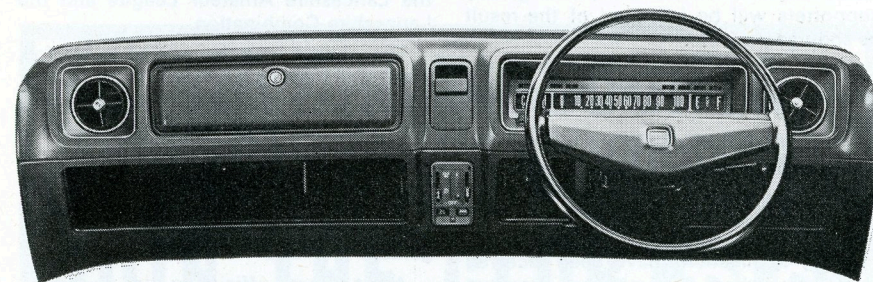
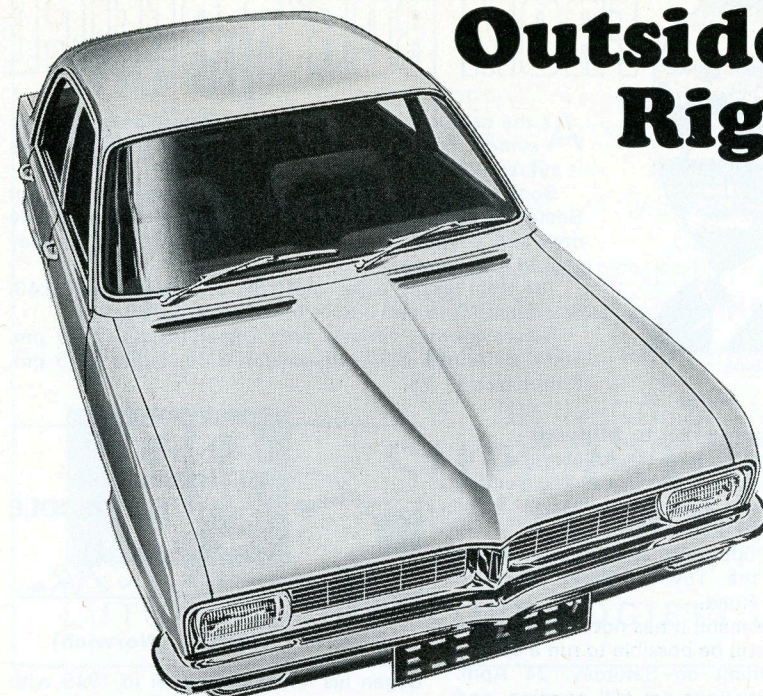

Bookings have been so heavy for the special train for Bristol on Good Friday, that only a few seats are available now and anyone who contemplates making this journey should act at once.

The train leaves Luton at 10.30 am, Harpenden 10.40, St Albans 10.48 and arrives in Bristol at 1.30 pm.

Coaches being run to Millwall

There will be no train the following day to Millwall, but coaches are being run by Bunty-Costin, leaving the Maple Road end of the ground at 12.30 pm.

Fare is 50p and bookings must be made at the Town's ticket office in Kenilworth Road.

At the moment, it has not been decided whether it will be possible to run a special train to Orient on Saturday, 24 April. Some negotiations are still pending, and supporters will be informed of the result as soon as possible.

Seats for these games virtually sold out

So far as home matches are concerned, there is a virtual sell-out of the main stand for the visit of Birmingham City on Saturday and Leicester City on Easter Monday.

Many applications have been received from Birmingham fans who are expected here in their thousands. There may be an even bigger following from Leicester and it could well be that the gates will have to be closed on both occasions.

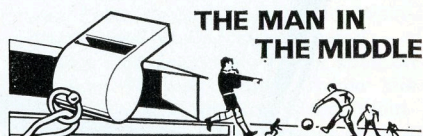
So, if our supporters are wise, they will not leave their arrival at the ground until the last moment on either occasion.

TOMMY DAWES (Norwich)

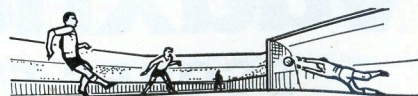
Began his refereeing career in 1949 with the Lancashire Amateur League and the Lancashire Combination.

Three years later, he moved to Norfolk where he progressed through the Norfolk and Suffolk League, the Eastern Counties and Midland Leagues to the Football League's linesmen's list in 1954.

In 1957, he was promoted to referee and has since become to be regarded as one of the most capable officials in the game.

Apart from officiating in European Cup games and Under-23 Internationals, he had appointments in the FA Cup quarter-finals in 1958 and 1966, a Football League Cup semi-final in 1966 and the FA Youth Cup final of 1969. In addition, he took the 1960 Channel Islands Cup final.

An area sales manager, he is married with two children, a girl aged 9, and a boy of 6 and he is interested in tennis, badminton, swimming and gardening.



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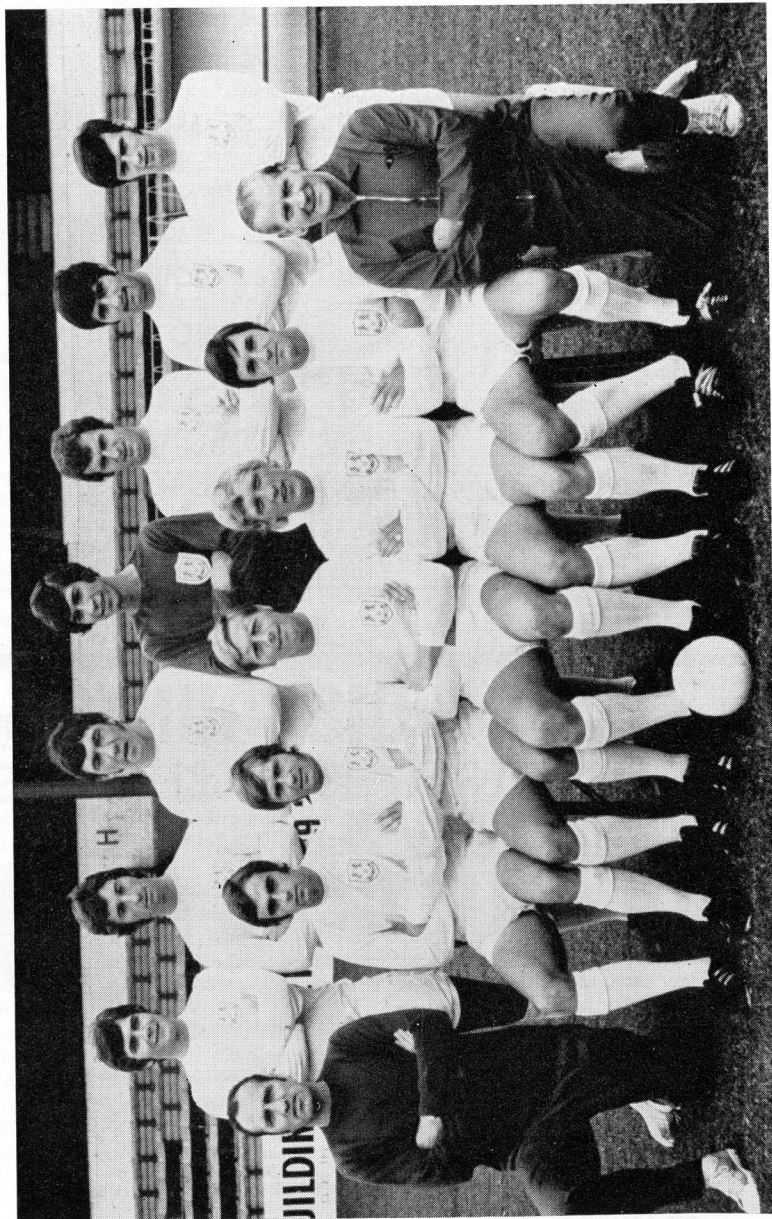

First team squad has remained virtually unchanged for several months *by Tony Pullein*

Millwall have kept together virtually the same squad of twelve players for several months with only the odd changes caused by injuries.

BRYAN KING (Goalkeeper). A former Chelmsford City goalkeeper, Bryan was promoted to Millwall's League side three years ago, holding his place — apart from a few absences due to injury — most of the while since.

BRIAN BROWN (Right-back). Brian came through Chelsea's junior set-up but didn't make their senior team. Millwall gave him his initial chance in 1968-69 and brought him back as a permanent member of the defence last season.

HARRY CRIPPS (Left-back). Harry didn't make the senior team at West Ham but has proved a sound defender since making his League debut with Millwall in 1962. He has been on the goals trail this season.

ALAN DORNEY (Right-half). Alan completed his apprenticeship in the printing trade before signing professional for Millwall. He had his first taste of League football two seasons ago and has now settled well into the side.

BARRY KITCHENER (Centre-half). Barry fought his way from the ranks of Millwall's junior teams to make his senior bow four seasons ago. He has been ever-present for the past three-and-a-half seasons.

DENNIS BURNETT (Left-half). Another consistent performer, Dennis has missed only one League game since joining Millwall from West Ham in 1967. The Hammers gave him his League chance in 1965-66 and, for two seasons, he was a fairly regular member of the team.

BARRY BRIDGES (Outside-right). Millwall signed Barry from Queen's Park Rangers for £40,000 earlier this season. Last season he was Rangers' top striker with twenty-five goals. Rangers paid what was then a club record £55,000 fee to Birmingham City for him in 1968. He first broke into the big-time with Chelsea in 1958-59 and it was during his stay at Stamford Bridge that he won his four England caps. Birmingham paid £55,000 for his transfer in 1966 and in his last full season at St Andrews (1967-68) he was the Blues' top League scorer with twenty-three goals.

EAMONN DUNPHY (Inside-forward). Eamonn, a Republic of Ireland full and Under-23 international, started his professional career with Manchester United, found the other stars shone too brightly for him at Old Trafford, so he made his entry into League football with Fourth Division York City in 1965-66. He moved to Millwall before that season ended and has been a regular ever since.

GORDON BOLLAND (Inside-forward). Gordon started with Chelsea but really made his mark in League football with Orient, where he was leading scorer in 1963-64. He moved to Norwich, topping their list the following season, and then linked with Charlton during 1967-1968. Millwall signed him two seasons back and he scored thirteen times for them last season.

DEREK POSSEE (Inside-left). When Millwall sold striker Keith Weller to Chelsea for £100,000 in May it left his 'twin' Derek bearing a double responsibility. In three years together at The Den this pair had scored eighty-two League goals, almost equally divided, between them. But double pressure fell on Possee to round off the Lion's attack, until Barry Bridges arrived. Weller and Possee were together at Tottenham but they left in 1967 because they couldn't get into the first-team. They soon became stars in Division II with Millwall. Last season Derek was the Lions' top scorer with nineteen goals. He recently crashed three goals into Charlton's net.

DOUG ALLDER (Outside-left). Doug was still an apprentice when introduced to the League team last season. He made a big impression, held his place and was rewarded with a full-time professional contract.

STEVE BROWN (Substitute). Young Steve, who is still an apprentice, must be one of the League's most consistent substitutes. He made his League bow as a sub last season.

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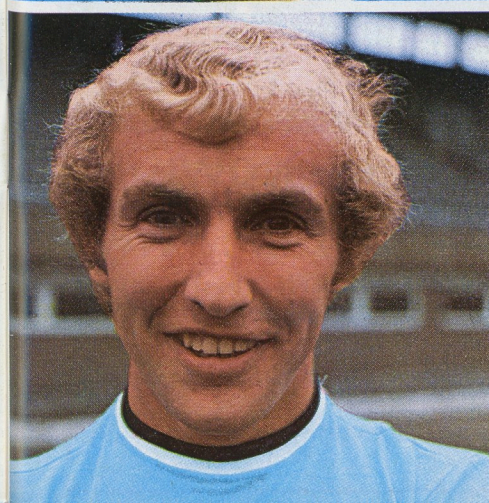
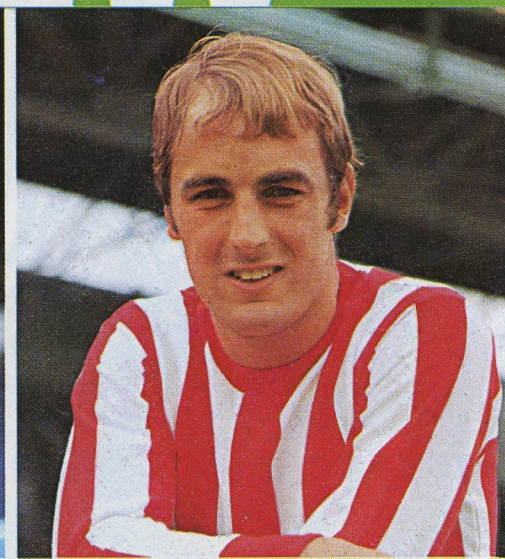

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Barry Bridges has brought Millwall new-found consistent form

Early in October Millwall were bottom of the League and playing badly enough to be earmarked as favourites for relegation. Now, following a tremendous revival, they are half way up the table.

Millwall's revival coincided with the arrival of former England striker Barry Bridges, a £40,000 signing from Queen's Park Rangers. He brought more power to the attack, took pressure off an over-worked defence and consequently the team discovered a new confidence.

Millwall were then playing with some consistency, after confounding their fans with some topsy-turvy results. They recovered from a 0-2 deficit to take a point from the then League leaders Cardiff on their own ground.

Yet they collected only one point from three home games versus Oxford, Portsmouth and Norwich but held First Division Stoke City to a 0-0 draw on their own ground in the League Cup and beat them in the replay!

Such erratic form made Millwall one of soccer's great unpredictables. How can anyone explain, for instance, how in 1968-69 Millwall very nearly gained promotion to Division I, yet last season - with virtually the same team - they struggled desperately to keep out of Division III.

Sold Keith Weller for £100,000

This season, Millwall are without striker Keith Weller, who was transferred to Chelsea for £100,000 in May, and so we shall no longer have to face the dual threat of Weller and his 'twin' Derek Possee.

In three years together at The Den this pair had scored eighty-two League goals, almost equally divided, between them. Manager Benny Fenton quickly spent £40,000 of the Weller cash on former England striker, Barry Bridges, who has filled the void left by Weller's absence with such distinction.

This is our first League meeting with Millwall for seven years. Our complete League results against them are:

Were early pioneers in football

The club was formed as Millwall Rovers in 1885, they were one of the prime movers behind the formation of the Southern League in 1894 and won the championship the first season without losing a game.

They topped the table again the following season and, during their membership of the Southern League, they twice reached the semi-finals of the FA Cup: in 1900 and 1903.

Later, in 1937, Millwall became the first Third Division side to battle its way into the FA Cup's last four, beating First Division opponents Chelsea, Derby County and Manchester City - League Champions that season - before losing 1-2 to Sunderland at the penultimate stage.

Founder members of Division III

They became founder members of Division III (South) in 1920 and their forty-three seasons of League football have been divided between Division II (13 seasons), Division III (3), Division III (South) (22) and Division IV (5).

Millwall's honours include the championship of Division III (South) in 1928 and 1938 and the Fourth Division title in 1962. In 1937 they shared the Division III (South) Challenge Cup following two drawn games with Watford in the final. They won promotion in successive seasons as runners-up of Division IV in 1965 and Division III in 1966.



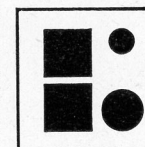

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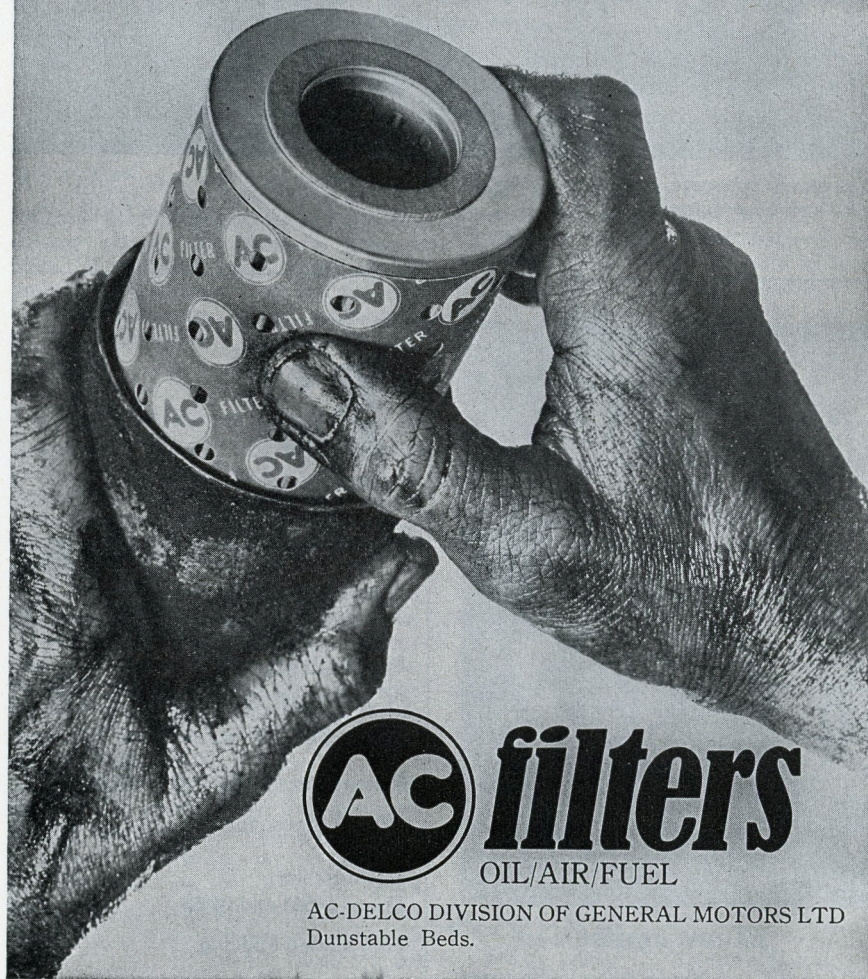
