



HONOURS: Football League Division II runners-up: 1954-55. Division III (South) champions: 1936-37; runners-up: 1935-36. Division III runners-up: 1969-70. Division IV: promotion (third place) 1968-69. F.A. Cup: beaten finalists 1958-59.

PROMOTION to the Third Division in 1968-69, promotion to the Second Division last season, a spirited challenge to reach the First Division this season—that's the Luton Town success story under manager Alec Stock, the man from North Somerset who has one of the best managerial records in the country.

Mr. Stock, working in perfect partnership with coach Jimmy Andrews, has bought and sold shrewdly to make Luton a force in football again after several lean years.

Here are the details of today's players:—

Tony Read (goalkeeper)

Last season had some outings in the reserves at inside-forward. When Starling was injured Read was preferred to the former Scottish under-23 international Sandy Davies, now with Southampton. Born at Haydock, Read's first club was Sheffield Wednesday and he joined Luton from Peterborough United.

John Ryan (right-back)


A free-transfer bargain from Fulham nearly two years ago, although he had considerable first team experience at Craven Cottage. Last season he made 36 League appearances. Was born at Maidstone and had spells with Tonbridge and Arsenal before joining Fulham.

Peter Anderson (Outside left)

Signed professional 5 weeks ago after taking his accountancy examinations. Originally an outside right with Hendon, a former England amateur international, now 21 years old.

Mike Keen (midfield)

Had 10 years with Q.P.R. before moving to Kenilworth Road for £18,500. During his spell with the Rangers he led them into the First Division and was skipper when they won the League Cup. Was born at High Wycombe where he still lives and he joined Q.P.R. as a junior.

Roger Hoy (wing-half)

Cost £20,000 from Crystal Palace. He began his career with Tottenham before moving to Selhurst Park and can play in midfield or the back four.

Chris Nicholl (centre-half)

A 23-year-old 6 ft. 2 in. player signed last season from Halifax Town for £30,000, then a record fee for the club. Yet, Nicholl had barely a season in League football, having gone to The Shay from the Cheshire County League football, Witton Albion. At one time, he had a trial with Burnley, but was turned down.


Alan Slough (defender)

A local-born player, he has long been wanted by several First Division clubs, but two years ago he signed a three-year contract with the option of a further three. Missed only one match in the promotion drive last season and has the added value of being able to play equally well in midfield or as sweeper at the back.

Jim and John — the two Ryans

John, a Londoner, played for Arsenal and Fulham before joining Luton on a free transfer.



Don Givens (utility player)
Signed a year ago from Manchester United. Born in Dublin, he followed the well-trodden path to Old Trafford and, at 21, is regarded as a very promising prospect. Has already been recognised by the Eire selectors and went with the national team on their summer tour.

MAN IN THE MIDDLE

Derek Nippard

BOURNEMOUTH

Started refereeing in September 1949. Progressed from Bournemouth Leagues, Hampshire League and Football Combination to the Football League four years ago.

Refereed Football Combination Cup Final in 1966/67. Was a linesman for the European Fairs Cup match in Lisbon 1969/70 and the F.A. Cup semi-final replay between Manchester United and Leeds United the same season.

Mr. Nippard is married, and is employed as an installation supervisor for the Southern Gas Board. Has very little time for hobbies other than work to be done around the home, but does play a little cricket in summer.

Currently president of the Bournemouth Referees' Society for the third time.

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CITYVIEW

ON Sunday afternoons I invariably watch the ITV filmed recording of one or two of the previous day's matches. Last Sunday our match at Cardiff was "on the box"—and I had difficulty believing that this was the game I had seen only a few hours before.

The camera positions were on the opposite side of the ground to the main grandstand at Ninian Park where I was sitting. But the more I saw of the game on television, the more I have come to believe that it is a poor substitute for the real thing.

I don't think this edited film showed how well we played. I'm not criticising Roger Malone or H.T.V.—they give us good coverage on television and I'm a great believer in publicity on any medium being good for this club in particular and the game of football in general.

I'm just trying to point out the difficulties of the people responsible for cutting the film and piecing together 90 minutes of football into a condensed version lasting probably half an hour.

We have a very close relationship with H.T.V. and they very kindly put their facilities at our disposal when we want to take a second look at a match of ours they have televised.

This has proved most beneficial to manager Alan Dicks and the players, for they can see any mistakes which are made leading to goals and it is a marvellous way in which to iron out faults.

A few months ago we were given the opportunity of buying our own video-tape machine to film our own matches and then show them afterwards for this very purpose. But the cost was prohibitive.

Television can give a much closer look into incidents and show exactly what happened at a particular moment. But it cannot give a complete picture of any match — no matter how skilful the editing.

Even a match televised "live" in its entirety—like the Cup Final and those wonderful matches in the World Cup in Mexico—is no substitute for actually being present.

Important aspects of the game like running off the ball tend to be missed on television.

But, having said that, the value of television to football has reached enormous proportions. Many millions of people now know the names and faces of the majority of today's star players as well as they know politicians, royalty and entertainment personalities. And that, surely, is good for football.

THERE is nothing more frustrating in football than losing 1-0 because there are so many moments during a game when an equalising goal could come—and you sit and think about them afterwards and wonder why you lost.

Unfortunately our last two games have both ended in 1-0 defeats—and this scoreline always reminds me of those three away games in eight days in October when we lost 1-0 on each occasion. That, I feel, was our worst part of the season when the troubles really started.

Both results were disappointing, particularly so at Cardiff last Saturday night when we were very unlucky not to come away with a result after playing some of our best football away from home this season.

I believe we played as well at Ninian Park as we did at Watford when we won 3-0. But a marvellous save by Jim Eadie from Trevor Tainton and a couple of misses by John Galley and Les Wilson meant we suffered another defeat.

The goal that decided the match in the fourth minute was a tragic affair when Ken Winshurst got his head to a cross with Mike Gibson off his line and the ball went into the empty net.

It was good to see Dickie Rooks back in the side after his injury but

he shook his left knee up again in the match. Mike Gibson was another casualty, dislocating his finger in making a second half save.

But, despite the defeat, it was a good all-round performance by the lads. They all gave 100 per cent effort and the work-rate never flagged.

We played with spirit and determination and didn't let that soft goal upset our confidence. We had more than enough chances to win the match which I thought was a most entertaining one considering the windy conditions. I'm sure the 25,000 crowd enjoyed it.

The Sheffield United match ended our unbeaten run of four games. Tony Currie scored a very good goal for Sheffield, but I thought we scored an equally good "equaliser" when Gerry Gow tackled Len Badger and hooked the ball into the net. But a linesman thought otherwise.

But full marks to Sheffield for the efficient way in which they closed the game up. They had the confidence to do this and we badly needed a goal to get back into the match.

Having played two of the teams chasing promotion, it shows just how tight the Second Division is this season. So little separates the top-placed clubs from those near the bottom—and all you really need are the breaks which unfortunately, we haven't been getting.

Today we play another side aiming for the First Division. Luton are a good side and played well against us earlier in the season. We badly need to gain revenge this afternoon.



THIS week's picture from the past comes from the 1959-60 season. The date was Saturday, September 27th, 1959 at Ashton Gate when Middlesborough were the Second Division visitors.

For four days prior to the match the City team went to Sidmouth for a brief stay. They returned to beat Middlesborough before a crowd of 21,413.

Manager Peter Doherty caused something of a surprise by including Alan Williams at centre-forward for his first-ever League game in attack.

The move paid off for Williams, pictured here beating goalkeeper Taylor for an "offside goal", scored one of the two goals which counted. Jimmy Rogers netted the other.

Williams, who later went to Oldham, is still playing Third Division football for Swansea City.

Flashback

Luton Town's last visit to Ashton Gate was in our promotion season 1964-65 when a Tony Ford penalty — his sixth of the season — brought a slender win.

That season both games were disappointing in quality. The game at Kenilworth Road ended in a goal-less draw before a mid-week evening crowd of just over 5,000.

Only a fine display of goalkeeping by Colin Tinsley, signed from Exeter to take over from former England 'keeper Ron Baynham, prevented us winning the match.

This season Luton were a far tougher proposition. A brilliant hat-trick by Malcolm Macdonald brought Luton a 3-0 win on October 3rd.
