## ERIC PUGH'S PAGE



Preparation of a programme for a holiday period, especially when the match concerned is the third to have been played in four days, presents its own problems and pitfalls.

In this case, these notes have to be written without knowledge of what happened in the Town's away games with Bristol City and Millwall, results of which, of course, had a vital bearing on the Town's promotion chance.

In fact, with printers as much entitled to an Easter break as anyone else, this programme had to be printed before the start of the holiday.

### Alterations become unavoidable

So, if major changes have become necessary in the teams, as printed on the back page, I can only say that such happenings at holiday times are unavoidable, and to apologise in advance.

Through force of circumstances, comment on matches immediately past, has to be confined to the one with Birmingham City and, certainly, such was its nature, that it gives plenty of scope.

### Tribute to character of the team

That the Town should be able to come back so completely from a position of apparent disaster is a tribute to the

character that has been developed in this team, basically young as it is and well deserved the description from Manager Alec Stock, 'a thoroughly professional performance'.

Those two points enable the Town to go into this weekend's tough sequence of matches still holding a great chance of promotion and, at the same time, it served to blight the outside chance that Birmingham were cherishing.

In this column, it is not my custom to single out individual players, but, on this occasion, one must hand out praise to Viv Busby, whose two goals brought renewed hope to the Town and provided

the launching pad from which they went on to victory.

### Capacity crowd expected today

Defeat, of course, would have been a disaster, and would have mitigated against what is now expected to be a capacity crowd this afternoon.

To club officials, the fact that the 25,000 mark was passed for the first time in a League match last Saturday, must have been a matter of some satisfaction because it is this sort of target regularly at which they have been aiming.

Unfortunately, the measure of support has fallen considerably below this figure and, for this, various reasons could be advanced which would be subject to argument.

### Club deserve this measure of support

I will content myself with saying that, on last Saturday's display, the Town deserve this measure of support and this, from the club's point of view is an economic necessity because various officials have gone on record in the past, saying that they barely cover running expenses with a 20,000 crowd.

Now, enthusiasm should be at its peak, especially if the two away results of the weekend have been anything like favourable, and it is hoped that this target will be reached, or exceeded, in the three remaining home games against Sheffield Wednesday, Swindon Town and Cardiff City.

### Leicester looked set to go back again

This afternoon's visitors, Leicester, before this hectic period began, looked all set to regain the First Division place they lost two years ago and, for them, today's game is not the end of the holiday story.

Tomorrow, they are at home to Blackburn Rovers in a match that will have serious repercussions for the losers because the Rovers seem in dire danger of slipping into the Third Division.

There have been some epic struggles between the Town and Leicester in the past, none more so than soon after the war when they came here to draw 5-5 in an FA Cup-tie, their final equaliser coming in the last minute.

### Big reputation as cup fighters

In those days, replays took place on the following Saturday and there was another dramatic struggle at Filbert Street which

ended with the Town making their exit a trifle unluckily, by 5-3.

Through the years, Leicester have earned the reputation for being most successful cup fighters and, this time, they were eliminated at the quarter-final stage, only after a replay with Arsenal at Highbury.

### Wednesday have had a disappointing time

Next Saturday's visitors are other comparatively recent members of the First Division in Sheffield Wednesday, who have had a thoroughly disappointing season, as a result of which their attendances have come down to their lowest level for years.

Now, their former centre-forward, Derek Dooley, whose playing career was ended in such tragic circumstances, has taken over the task of trying to revive the fortunes of this famous club. They are the possessors of one of the best equipped, modern style stadiums in the country, as is indicated by the fact that they have been chosen to stage the replay of the Cup Final if one becomes necessary.



Today's mascot is Craig Daly and a point of interest is that he is the son of the former Pauline Kenny, who was an important member of our office staff in the period before and after our 1959 FA Cup Final appearance.

## Youth International an attraction

Looking to the future, I would remind supporters that there are stand tickets left for the visit of Sheffield Wednesday next Saturday and would bring to the notice of our supporters a most interesting match taking place here a week on Tuesday (7.30 pm).

Then, England take on Spain in a Professional Youth International. In the first meeting in Spain recently, the home team won 2-1, so England will be all out to turn the tables on them in the return.

## Shanks almost certain to play


Our own player, full-back, Don Shanks, had a very good match in Spain and will undoubtedly be retained in the squad for the match here.

## MALCOLM SINCLAIR (Guildford)

Started to referee in the Isle of Wight in 1949, and graduated through the Hampshire League, the Surrey Senior League and the Football Combination.

Became a Football League linesman in 1963-64 and was promoted to the referees' list for the season 1966-67.

Was linesman in the FA Cup semi-final between Everton and Leeds United in 1968 and refereed the England v Iceland Amateur International two years later.

Married with two daughters, Mr Sinclair is a bricklayer. His main hobby is cricket and he is Chairman of Guildford Referees' Society.

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
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

## Six remain of Leicester's Cup final team of two years ago

Even though there have been considerable comings and goings at Leicester in recent times, six members of their Cup final team of two years ago, are still commanding regular places.

**PETER SHILTON (Goalkeeper).** A former England schoolboy and youth international, Peter took over the Leicester goal from Gordon Banks three years ago and this season replaced Banks in the full England team against East Germany. He was picked for England's forty-strong World Cup squad but didn't make the final twenty-two. Peter has now settled his differences with the club after asking for a transfer.

**STEVE WHITWORTH (Right-back).** A local discovery who gained his League debut when replacing Welsh international Peter Rodrigues at the beginning of this season. Steve signed professional for Leicester in November 1969 and last season played four times for the England Youth XI.

**DAVID NISH (Left-back).** David became the youngest captain to play in the FA Cup Final when he led Leicester out at Wembley in 1969. He was 21. A former England youth cap, he has now risen to under-23 level. He prefers mid-field but plays in defence when Leicester need him there.

**ALAN WOOLLETT (Left-back).** A local product who has spent the whole of his career at Filbert Street, Alan was a member of City's 1969 Cup final team beaten 1-0 by Manchester City and last season, he made twenty-seven League appearances, but has had to wait for a regular place this time.

**BOBBY KELLARD (Right-half).** A £50,000 eve-of-season signing from Bristol City, Bobby is one of those fellows who revels in hard work in mid-field. He was 16 when he entered League football with Southend United. He then served Crystal Palace, Ipswich and Portsmouth before joining Bristol City in 1968.

**MALCOLM MANLEY (Right-half).** One of many players to develop with the club, Malcolm made his first senior appearance in 1967-68 and won a regular place the following season. Last term he wasn't so lucky — he got only nine full League outings. Has recently been selected as substitute. Was substitute in the Cup Final.

**JOHN SJOBERG (Centre-half).** John has played in three cup finals for Leicester — FA Cup (1963), League Cup (1964 and 1965) but missed the 1969 Wembley game through injury. John originally joined the club from Scottish junior club Banks O'Dee when he was 17 and got his chance in the League team in 1960-61.

**GRAHAM CROSS (Left-half).** Graham, an England youth and under-23 international, has played cricket for Leicestershire and has appeared in four of Leicester's FA Cup and League Cup finals in the last nine years. He won his way into their League eleven in 1960-61, and has now topped 330 League appearances.

**JOHN FARRINGTON (Outside-right).** John joined Leicester from Wolves last season and quickly made a hit at Filbert Street with his exciting wing runs and one or two magnificent goals. At Molineux he had been given only rare opportunities in the first-team but he is revelling in his new surroundings. He is currently second highest scorer with ten goals.


**MALCOLM PARTRIDGE (Inside-right).** A sensational start to this season — when he hit six goals in five games for Mansfield — put Malcolm in the big-money transfer bracket. Leicester paid £50,000 for his signature in September but, unfortunately, he has been hit by injuries which have limited his appearances. Recently he has been acting as substitute. Mansfield gave him his League debut in 1967-68.

**ROD FERN (Inside-forward).** Top scorer last season with seventeen goals, Rod lost his edge this term and lost his place in the team but now he has re-established himself. A Leicester discovery, Rod rose to first team status three seasons ago.

**ALISTAIR BROWN (Centre-forward).** Alistair, one more example of the efficiency of the Leicester scouting system, made a sensational League debut in May 1969. With three games to play, Leicester had to get five points to avoid relegation. He came in against Sunderland and scored two goals in a dramatic 2-1 win. He is now Leicester's top scorer with thirteen goals.

**WILLIE CARLIN (Inside-forward).** When Leicester paid Derby £40,000 for Willie this season, they bought one of the tiniest, but trickiest, players in the game. A former England schoolboy and youth international, wee Willie stands only 5ft 4in and, soon after starting his professional career with Liverpool, he was discarded by manager Bill Shankly as 'too small'. He went to Halifax, then to Carlisle before joining Sheffield United in 1967. Derby paid £60,000 for him two years ago and his latest move brought his aggregate transfer value up to £117,500.

**LEN GLOVER (Outside-left).** Len joined Charlton as an amateur in 1959, rising to League status with them in 1962-63. When Leicester signed him from Charlton in November 1967, the £80,000 fee was a record for a winger but he has now repaid them with some scintillating wing displays — and quite a few goals.



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
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# Leicester spent £200,000 to try to ensure promotion this time

After missing promotion by only two points last season, Leicester spent heavily in the transfer market in a bid to make sure this time. Something like £200,000 has been invested in new players.

Bobby Kellard, Malcolm Partridge, Joe Joplin and Willie Carlin were the new men in whom Frank O'Farrell placed so much hope. He received a serious set-back when full-back Joplin and forward Partridge were injured, but the competitive spirit at Filbert Street is now so high that these problems were quickly overcome.

They were divisional leaders for several weeks during the first half of the season, then a five-game spell without a win knocked them off their perch. Now they are back in tip-top form again so we can expect an exciting tussle this afternoon.

## Reached quarter-final of FA Cup

In addition to their excellent League performances, Leicester enjoyed a fine run to the quarter-final of the FA Cup, taking Arsenal to a replay before going down. Their full results this season:

## Lost by the only goal at Leicester

When we visited Filbert Street in September we were beaten 0-1, but we have won our last three home League games against Leicester, our full League record against them reading:

The club was founded as Leicester Fosse FC in 1884 and accepted into the Midland League seven years later. They moved to their present headquarters at Filbert Street in 1891 and gained admittance to the Second Division of the Football League in 1894. They gained promotion to Division I in 1908, but were relegated a year later.

## When they became more streamlined


Leicester Fosse FC was disbanded in 1919 to make way for a more streamlined Leicester City FC which, in 1925 regained First Division status and clung on to it, this time, for ten years. They reached the semi-final of the FA Cup for the first time in 1934 but, one year later, went down into the Second Division.

It took them only two years to regain their place but, within another couple of years, they found themselves back once more in the lower section. Then came the war.

## Division II Champions for fourth time

In 1949 they got to Wembley and very nearly dropped into Division III. After that, fortunes changed and Leicester found themselves back in the First Division in 1954 but, as had occurred on a previous occasion, they lasted only one campaign.

In 1957, they were Second Division champions for the fourth time and this time they remained in the top section until their decline in 1969.





Malcolm Macdonald tries to control an awkward ball as burley Birmingham centre-half, Roger Hynd, comes in to challenge.


