While it was a matter of disappointment that the Town ended their away season at Oxford on Wednesday with a defeat, there can be no doubt that generally, their record on opponents' grounds is meritorious.

In twelve of the twenty-one matches, they have avoided defeat, gathering eighteen points in the process, and one can recall without difficulty when valuable points, which might have made a difference in the last run in, were lost in the closing minutes.

Not that this was the case at the Manor Ground, Headington, this week, because the damage was done in the opening phase when, in a tearaway start, Oxford were two up in twenty-five minutes.

Defence took time to settle down

This was a time when the Town defence which has been so steadfast and consistent during the greater part of the season, was much at sixes and sevens and, by the time they had managed to settle down to any marked extent, the team was in a parlous position.

Indeed, it could have been worse because they did not have to pay fully for several defensive errors, but they fought back and were put back into the

game five minutes from half-time by Viv Busby, following up his two goals at Orient on Saturday.

Unlucky break for David Court

Unfortunately, in doing the work that led to the goal, Court pulled a muscle and was replaced by Jimmy Ryan for the second-half.

Certainly, this was a pity because Court, since his recall to the team and the chance to play on the right flank in

midfield, has revealed form more in keeping with that for which he was noted when with Arsenal.

Almost certainly, he was ruled out for today's meeting with Swindon and there must be a wide measure of doubt about him being available for the closing game of the season against Cardiff City here next Tuesday.

Tension that might have been has gone

Hopes were, of course, that the promotion issue would depend on the result of this encounter but, unfortunately, this is not the case.

A pointless Easter blighted the Town's chances and Cardiff more or less had theirs blasted to smithereens when they crashed 5-1 to Sheffield United on Tuesday.

Any slight hope that Cardiff may still retain will disappear this afternoon if Sheffield United, as expected, beat Watford at Bramall Lane because they will then accompany Leicester City into the First Division.

In this respect, I feel that justice has been served because I regard United as the best equipped team in Division II this season, and their manager, John Harris, made a shrewd entry into the transfer market at a vital time.

Win at Orient was well deserved

With the victory against Orient at Brisbane Road last Saturday, there were hopes that the Town would stage a grandstand finish and so alleviate some of the disappointment faced by the fans.

This was a game largely ruined as a spectacle by the wind, but the Town were deserved winners, though, having the worst of the elements in the second half, there were times when they had to hold on grimly.

Two goals came in injury time

This they succeeded in doing until, in the first minute of injury time, Busby scored a brilliant goal, his second of the afternoon, and that seemed to have sewn up matters.

However, that was not the case because the extra time ran into four minutes, at nearly the end of which Orient pulled a goal back in somewhat freakish circumstances, but by then, it was too late to matter.

Chance of a place in Watney Cup

Now, the only important thing facing the Town as the season draws to a close, apart from trying to clinch a place in the top half-dozen, is the matter of the Watney Cup.

Assuming that Cardiff City beat Wrexham in the final of the Welsh Cup and so qualify for Europe, the Town certainly have a chance of slipping into one of the two places in this lucrative competition which will be staged between 31 July and 7 August.

Could bring them some consolation

That, at least, would be some measure of consolation for the otherwise meagre reward for what has largely been a successful season.

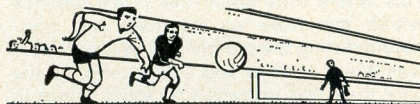
Though the last weeks have provided an anti-climax, the fact remains that the Town have done well in their first season in Division II and that few would have predicted that they would be in the promotion hunt for so long.

Amidst all the talk there has been about Malcolm Macdonald leaving the club, a 'king-sized' transfer slipped through quietly this week when three Luton players went to Cambridge United to join John Collins, who joined the newcomers to the League earlier this year.

Outward transfers make elbow room

They were Peter Phillips, who had been on loan to Cambridge for a month, defender, Alan Guild, and full-back, Jack Bannister, who has given the club some splendid service since he joined them from Crystal Palace.

This is part of the long-term plan with next season in mind and there is no doubt that Manager Alec Stock is making elbow room pending the arrival of newcomers.

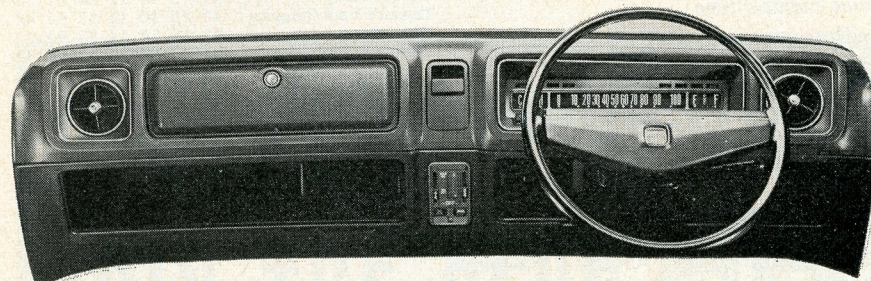


OUR COVER PICTURE

With one season ending, thought has to be given to preparations for the new one which will begin in something over three months' time.

This morning, there was a Board meeting at which a discussion was due on the matter of season tickets for 1971-72 and details of the decision taken will be given in next Tuesday's Cardiff programme.

Our players are much in demand

Several of our players are in demand for close season tours. Already, Malcolm Macdonald and Mike Keen are due to go to Australia with the FA party at the end of the month, and there is a place for our young full-back, Don Shanks in the England youth party.

This leaves on 20 May for Czechoslovakia to take part in the 'Little World Cup' and, as we saw when they met Spain here last week, they have much talent on which to call.

Once again, Eire require Don Givens, this time for three separate matches and he has been given permission to play, subject to him being made available for our own tour, details of which had not been finalised when these notes were written.

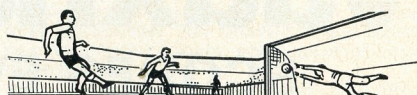

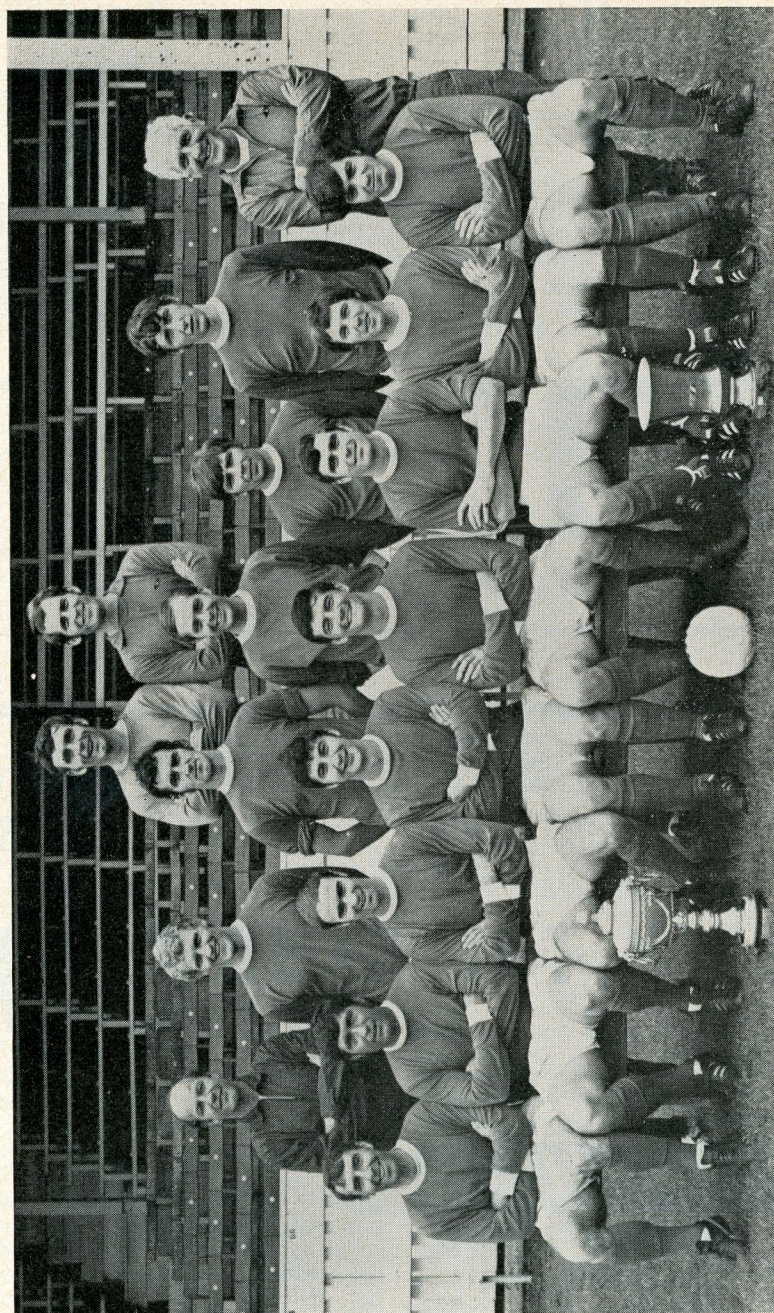

Swindon seem to be partial to players from clubs in the north

Even though three local products are included in their current team, Swindon Town have shown a liking for players with northern clubs.

They seem to be particularly partial to those from the north-east and they have three ex-Newcastle men on their books.

PETER DOWNSBROUGH (Goalkeeper). Peter was still an amateur when introduced to League football with Halifax Town. He turned professional in 1960 and joined Swindon for a nominal £3,000 fee five years later. Has been a magnificent performer in recent years.

League Cup winners' medal (1969).

League record: Halifax 148 aps; Swindon 212 aps.

ROD THOMAS (Right-back). Rod is now first-choice at full-back for Wales. He is the only player in post-war soccer to win his first seven full caps while playing in Third Division football. Swindon picked Rod up from Gloucester City and put him into the senior side in 1965-66. He helped them back into the Second Division in 1969.

Wales 13 aps; Wales Under-23 6 aps.

League Cup winners' medal (1969).

League record: Swindon 203 aps, 2 gls.

JOHN TROLLOPE (Left-back). A Swindon discovery, John made his League debut in 1960 and remained in the side for an incredible run of 360 consecutive League games, the sequence ending when he broke an arm at Hartlepool in 1968. He returned as soon as he was fit again and was ever-present last season.

League Cup winners' medal (1969).

League record: Swindon 457 (1) aps, 14 gls.

JOE BUTLER (Right-half). Joe entered League football with Newcastle in 1963-64, but was not fortunate enough to get many chances in their first team so he joined Swindon in 1965. He was originally a defender but has switched, with considerable success, to a mid-field role.

League Cup winners' medal (1969).

League record: Newcastle 3 aps; Swindon 198 (1) aps, 8 gls.

FRANK BURROWS (Centre-half). Frank left Raith Rovers to try his luck in English football with Scunthorpe in 1965. In his last two campaigns, before joining Swindon in 1968, he missed only five League games and he has continued to perform consistently well since his move, only injuries keeping him out.

League Cup winners' medal (1969).

League record: Scunthorpe 106 aps, 4 gls; Swindon 119 aps, 4 gls.

STAN HARLAND (Left-half). Stan was an amateur at Burnley, turned pro with New Brighton then had a go with Everton - but he didn't make the League side. Bradford City gave him his League debut, then he spent two seasons at Carlisle before joining Swindon four years ago.

League Cup winners' medal (1969).

League record: Bradford City 120 aps, 20 gls; Carlisle 77 aps, 7 gls; Swindon 219 aps, 6 gls.

STEVE PELOW (Outside-right). Steve developed in Liverpool's junior teams and got a

couple of League games for them last season when their rebuilding programme began. He joined Swindon last May, but had to await their visit to Bristol City in March before getting a first team game for them.

League record: Liverpool 2 aps; Swindon 9 aps, 3 gls.

ROGER SMART (Inside-right). Roger is a product of Swindon schools' football who got his first taste of League football in 1961-62. He helped Swindon into the Second Division for the first time in 1963 when he really began to establish himself as a regular. He has now regained his place after being left out of the team.

League Cup winners' medal (1969).

League record: Swindon 298 (4) aps, 42 gls.

CHRIS JONES (Centre-forward). Chris kicked off with Manchester City but was kept out of the senior side by their established stars. He joined Swindon in 1968 and celebrated with a hat-trick in one of his early games. He spent months in the reserves but, after recently being recalled as substitute, he is now on regular duty again.

League record: Manchester City 6 (1) aps, 2 gls; Swindon 37 (16) aps, 14 gls.

ARTHUR HORSFIELD (Centre-forward). Swindon's leading scorer with twenty-two League and Cup goals last season, he has fourteen this term, but has recently lost his place. Middlesbrough spotted Arthur in Newcastle junior soccer and gave him his chance in the League team in 1963-64. He started a short stay at Newcastle in January 1969, moving to Swindon only four months later.

League record: Middlesbrough 107 (4) aps, 51 gls; Newcastle 7 (2) aps, 3 gls; Swindon 73 (1) aps, 29 gls.

PETER NOBLE (Inside-left). A native of the North-East, Peter started with Newcastle and cost Swindon £10,000 in January 1968. Last season he bagged hat-tricks in successive games against Charlton (League) and Swansea (League Cup) and has netted fifteen times this season.

League Cup winners' medal (1969).

League record: Newcastle 22 (3) aps, 7 gls; Swindon 135 (4) aps, 44 gls.

DON ROGERS (Outside-left). An England Under-23 international. Don has been a regular for seven seasons and top scorer for three of the past four campaigns. Leading again with twenty, he seems certain to come out on top yet again. But he was put out by an ankle injury last month and missed three games.

Englan Under-23 2 aps, 1 gl.

League Cup winners' medal (1969).

League record: Swindon 341 aps, 133 gls.

Swindon, confident at home, seem to lack flair on opponents' grounds

Swindon manager Fred Ford has spent many perplexing return journeys from away games wondering just what comes over his team when it leaves the County Ground. Though the Robins were well nigh unbeatable at home, they have one of the worst away records in the country, having won only twice away in League games.

So it's just as well they maintained respectable home results, otherwise they would have been deep in relegation trouble.

Swindon's away form has been most disappointing to fans who were looking forward to another promotion drive this season. When the final tables were compiled last April, Swindon were seen to have missed promotion to the First Division by only three points.

Awarded the Anglo-Italian Trophy

Further encouragement for Swindon fans was their showing in the first Anglo-Italian tournament last summer.

They reached the final of the twelve-club tournament and were awarded the trophy after the final against Napoli in Italy was abandoned, because of riots, when they were winning 2-0.

This was their second great victory over Italian opponents - last season they defeated AS Roma 5-2 on aggregate in a challenge match between the Italian and English League Cup winners.

They are hoping to make it an Italian hat-trick this summer when they defend their Anglo-Italian trophy.

Club was formed by a clergyman

The Swindon club was formed in 1881 by a clergyman. They were one of the original members of the Southern League in 1894, later winning the championship on two occasions, and it wasn't long before they won national acclaim.

In 1910 they fought their way to the semi-final of the FA Cup defeating First Division Spurs (3-2), and two Second Division sides Burnley (2-0) and the divisional champions-to-be Manchester City (2-0) on the way, before succumbing to the reigning Football League champions, Newcastle United, 0-2 at Tottenham. Two years later they made a second semi-final appearance.

Did not maintain a flying start!

Swindon became members of the Third Division (South), along with all the other Southern League first division sides, in 1920. And they made a flying start to their career, finishing in fourth place - a position they were unable to improve upon until being promoted forty-three years later.

They moved into Division II in 1963 with a star-studded team of youngsters, many of whom went on to win fame with bigger clubs.

Won promotion and the League Cup

After only two seasons, Swindon slipped back into the Third Division remaining until 1969 when they won promotion plus the Football League Cup in a Wembley game that will long be remembered.

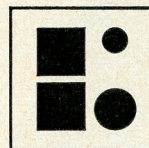
Arsenal, their lordly opponents, were well beaten 3-1 after extra time.

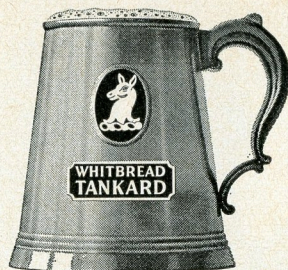



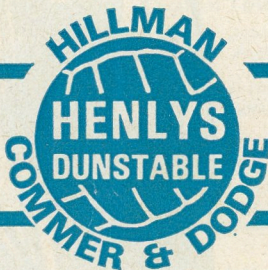
