Quite often, the last match of the season when no promotion or relegation problems exist, is fought out without much interest being evinced, but there is something at stake for the Town against Cardiff City this evening.

Beckoning them is a place in the highly lucrative Watney Cup competition, reserved for the two teams in each of the four divisions who score most goals, excluding those who have won honours, or qualified for admission to one of the several European competitions.

Three goals are needed tonight

Carlisle United have already qualified from Division II and the Town can join them by scoring three times tonight, providing that Cardiff win through their two-legged Welsh Cup final with Wrexham and so go through to the European Cup-winners' Cup competition once again.

Cardiff had to struggle against both Newport County and Chester in the earlier rounds but, once tonight's match is over, they will be able to give their undivided attention to their national competition and they should make no mistake.

Will be all out for necessary goals
Immediate problem for the Town, of course, is to get enough goals tonight to edge ahead of Swindon Town whose tally is 61, even though they have finished only twelfth in the League table.

After last Saturday's game which was somewhat disappointing from the point of view of goal production, Manager Alec Stock said, 'It will be all stops out on Tuesday and the instructions will be to go all out for goals.'

So, we may well see a much more thrilling game than is usually associated



with the season's close-down, and the Town forwards will be hoping to regain the shooting form that has been eluding them for some matches.

Popularity of the Watney Cup

There is certainly considerable attraction about the Watney Cup which has quickly established itself in the football calendar and, should the Town qualify, the hope would be a plum home draw against a First Division club in the first round.

That takes place on 31 July, with the semi-finals on the following Wednesday and the final on 7 August, providing quite a pipe-opener to the new season.

Pleasant break for Town in Portugal

First though, the Town face a pleasant break from what has been a routine full of tension when they leave tomorrow week for a twelve-day stay in Portugal.

Their headquarters will be at Monte Gordo on the exotic Algarve coast in the south of the country, and they have two fixtures to fulfil.

One is against Sporting Farense, of Faro, who last Sunday forced a goalless draw with Setabul, who figured in one of this season's European competitions.

One of the games is in Spain

For the other, they cross the Spanish border to take on Seville, members of the First Division of the Spanish League, who finished in a comfortable midway position.

Both these matches are likely to provide a severe test for the Town who will be without their skipper, Mike Keen and Malcolm Macdonald, who will be preparing for their visit to Australia with the FA party.

Despite their absence, a solid nucleus of players is available to the Town and they should be able to give a good account of themselves.

Youth team will face famous clubs

Also next month, the youth team, reinforced by some 21-years-old players who have had considerable League experience, will spend the best part of a week in Brussels, taking part in a youth international tournament.

This will be spread over the three days of the Whitsun weekend and, apart from the Town, representing England, the

youngsters of world-famous teams like Wacker (Austria), Reims (France) and Borussia (Germany) will also be taking part, along with four Belgian clubs.

Cardiff were well in title fight

We welcome tonight's visitors, Cardiff, whose promotion aspirations finally disappeared only last week when Sheffield United, after beating them, clinched second place by scoring the only goal against Watford.

For them, as it has been with the Town, the season has been full of interest with both clubs having been intimately concerned in one of the most exciting fights in history at the top of the Second Division table.

Town can finish in sixth place


Apart from the Watney chance, the Town need both points tonight in order to make their final League position even more respectable than it is at the moment.

Victory would lift them above both Middlesbrough and Millwall, enabling them to take over sixth place which would be accounted a very fine feat indeed during their first season in Division II.



There will be slight increases in the price of season tickets for the 1971-72 campaign, with those for the centre stand going up to £16 from the old £14.70 and the wing stand will be £12.50 against the old £11.55.

Old age pensioners will also have to pay slightly more at £9.50 and this price will apply to those who are already the holders of tickets and not to new applicants.

Seats for individual matches will up by 5p, with those for the centre stand costing 75p and for the wing stand, 60p.

No increase for standing places

No increase is being made for standing accommodation, including that under cover, for the whole of the ground.

Existing holders of season tickets must renew by Saturday 12 June, otherwise their seats will be put at the disposal of new applicants.

This is the time of the year when we thank everyone who has helped the club during the season in any capacity. These include the stewards, gatemen, bar staffs and anyone else who has done anything to assist.

Have had a good team behind the team

Not only is it necessary to have a good team on the field, but the smooth running of a club depends largely on the efficiency of the 'team behind the team', and I can safely say that we have had this in large measure.

A word of praise here, too, would not come amiss to the Oak Road choir who, although they may be raucous at times, at least give the team their whole-hearted support.

Better than the vocal criticism

This is a good deal better than the highly vocal criticism which comes from some quarters, often from where one would least expect it.

Now that the season is at an end, we thank the fans in general for the way in which they have given their support, not least those who have travelled thousands of miles for away matches.

I am certain that the knowledge that hundreds of loyalists are rooting for them

has given the team encouragement in a long succession of away games.

Home defeat was the means of putting Cardiff into the promotion fight by Tony Pullein

Despite that crushing defeat at Bramall Lane, Sheffield, last week, Cardiff City can look back on a successful season and that they were in the promotion fight, was probably prompted by a home defeat.

That was by 4-3 at the hands of Middlesbrough way back on 3 October. Until then, Cardiff had consistently fielded an unchanged team but after it, manager Jimmy Scouler made drastic changes.

Against Middlesbrough he detected weaknesses and was quick to effect alterations.

Allowed Toshack to go for £100,000

Many of us wondered if they had sold their promotion chance when they accepted £100,000 from Liverpool for Welsh international striker John Toshack, a man who had scored 87 goals for them in just over four years as a first-teamer.

And there was surprise when Brian Clark, Cardiff's other high-scoring forward, was dropped. Yet the Bluebirds continued to pick up sufficient points to keep them up with the leaders.

At Christmas, Mr Scouler invested a large chunk of the Toshack transfer cash in Sheffield Wednesday striker, Alan Warboys, – and drew quick dividends. Despite bad luck with injuries he has been well among the goals and is well into double figures.

Failed to score only against Luton

While Middlesbrough and Watford are the only visiting teams to win a League game at Ninian Park this season, only one other club has stopped Cardiff from scoring at home – that was Luton! We drew 0-0 there in November. Our League record against them now reads:

Cardiff have become Britain's top cup experts. They fight more cup-ties in a season than many clubs do in a decade, participating each year in the FA Cup, the League Cup and the Welsh Cup.

And, for the past few years, they've been Wales's permanent entry for the European Cup-winners' Cup. They were beaten this year in the quarter-final by Real Madrid.

Nearly reached a European final

And they've either won, or gone close to winning, all four trophies. They beat Arsenal in the 1927 FA Cup final and last season won the Welsh Cup for the 14th time. Three years ago they almost made the final of the European Cup-winners' Cup but a tragic slip in the dying moments of the second-leg home semi-final cost them the tie.

Their best League Cup performance was in reaching the semi-final in 1965-66, but they were well beaten 3-10 on aggregate by West Ham.

First Welsh club in Football League

The Cardiff club started as River Side FC in 1899, turning professional – and adopting their present name – in 1910.

Three years later they joined the Southern League until they became the first Welsh club elected to the Football League in 1920.

They were admitted to Division II just a few minutes before Merthyr, Newport and Swansea were accepted among the founder members of Division III (South).

Near to winning the championship

They shook everyone by winning promotion to the First Division at the end of their first season in the competition.

In 1924, a missed penalty in their final game cost them the League Championship, but they did win the FA Cup in 1927.

Later, they dropped way down into the Third Division then rose back to Division I in 1952. Relegated in 1957, they rose up again in 1960 only to drop out again two years later.

Now their prime objective is to take First Division football back again to Wales without further delay.

Scotsmen Eadie, Murray and Gibson have settled down in South Wales

Three Scots are figuring in Cardiff City's first team squad – not surprisingly because Manager Jimmy Scouler himself comes from over the Border.

JIM EADIE (Goalkeeper). Jim got a surprise recall to first-team duty this season following a lapse in form by Frank Parsons, formerly of Crystal Palace. Previously he had made only two League appearances, since being spotted by a Cardiff scout in Scottish junior football, and he thought Parsons's arrival last summer would leave him languishing in the reserves for another year or two.

DAVID CARVER (Right-back). David scored the first League goal of his career recently – a vital last-minute effort which took a point from Leicester. Rotherham gave David his League baptism in 1961-62 and he spent four seasons as a fairly regular member of their side. Cardiff paid £11,000 for him in February 1966.

GARY BELL (Left-back). A Stourbridge lad who developed in Cardiff's junior teams. Came in for his initial taste of League football in 1966-67 and made a handful of appearances the following year until, in 1968-69, he claimed a permanent place in the line-up which he has held since.

MEL SUTTON (Right-half). Mel was originally on Aston Villa's books, but didn't break into League football there. Since joining Cardiff over two years ago, he has had more luck and it's rare these days to find a Cardiff team lining up without him.

DON MURRAY (Centre-half). Ever-present for the past two seasons, Don has been Cardiff's centre-half for seven seasons now. Six years ago he captained the Rest of the World Youth XI against England at Wembley. Later he won Scottish Under-23 honours. A very strong and reliable defender, Don scored his first goal of the season in January when he put Cardiff one up in the third minute at Portsmouth.

BRIAN HARRIS (Left-half). Brian is the most experienced player in Cardiff's side, opening his League career with Everton in 1955. For many years he was a regular member of the Toffees' senior team, helping them to success in both Cup and League. He moved to Cardiff in 1966.

BRIAN CLARK (Inside-right). Though he has hit several goals this season, Brian has had spells as substitute. Brian started with Bristol City, twice led their scorers in five seasons, then moved to Huddersfield. He was unhappy, so he joined

Cardiff in 1968 and was top scorer with twenty last season.

LEIGHTON PHILLIPS (Inside-forward). Recently restored to the side, Leighton scored his first League goal against Hull and followed with another a week later. A former Welsh schoolboy international, he joined Cardiff from school and is one of many youngsters to rise to League status with the club in recent years. He got his chance in the senior team two seasons back. Won a Welsh cap recently.

ALAN WORBOYS (Centre-forward). Alan has made a sensational start with his new club. He joined them from Sheffield Wednesday at Christmas and scored twice in each of his first two League games for them. The first was against his old club Sheffield Wednesday. Doncaster gave him his chance in League football in 1966-67 and he signed for Wednesday in 1968.

IAN GIBSON (Outside-right). Ian, who joined Cardiff from Coventry last summer, kicked off his League career with Accrington when he was 15. Following a couple of seasons at Bradford, he stopped off for five seasons at Middlesbrough prior to commencing service with Coventry in 1966. Won two Under-23 caps for Scotland.

BOBBY WOODRUFF (Inside-left). Cardiff paid Crystal Palace £25,000 for Bobby in November 1969. He opened his League career with Swindon in 1958-59 and commanded a £35,000 fee when Wolves signed him in 1964. He spent just over two years at Molineux before joining Palace where he twice led their scoring list.

NIGEL REES (Outside-left). A Cardiff discovery who has made a rapid rise to first-team status. He signed professional in August last year and made his League debut against Sheffield Wednesday in January. When he was at school Nigel played Rugby for Wales. Is out of action because of injury.

PETER KING (Outside-left). Discovered with Worcester City in the Southern League, Peter enjoyed his first taste of League soccer with Cardiff in 1961-62. Originally used as a striker, Peter reverted to a mid-field role before resuming up front last season.





PAT PARTRIDGE (Middlesbrough)

First appointments came in the Northern League in 1953, after which, he was a linesman in the North Regional Northeastern, Northern Counties and Midland Leagues.

Became the youngest man to referee the Northern League Cup final in 1963-64 and the first to have charge of it twice three years later.

In November, 1969, he refereed the Football League Cup semi-final between Carlisle United and West Bromwich Albion and the following February, the amateur International between Scotland and Ireland.

Last May, he had charge of the play off for third and fourth places in the FA Cup between Manchester United and Watford.




Don Shanks, the Town's reserve full-back is included in the England Youth squad to take part in the 'Little World Cup' series in Czechoslovakia later this month.


