◀ **TERRY NEILL says . . .**

This attitude
is such a
disappointment
to us all

NATURALLY enough, I was pleased with that excellent win on Wednesday night, but rather than say a lot about the Swindon game I would like to continue along the theme in the previous programme.

The British character is such that it tends to be very reluctant to change. We had, in fact, that soccer defeat by the Hungarians at Wembley in the 1952-53 season before we realised we had lagged behind our European counterparts in the game we had presented to the world.

As a manager I have always got to back my judgement and try to prevent a similar thing happening in its own way at Boothferry Park.

My judgement may not always be right. But as I have said so often before, everything I do is for the success of the side . . . and for the enjoyment of you, the fans.

All I can say is that everything I have done this season, and every decision I have made, has been with this in mind.

IT IS, OF COURSE, EASY TO SAY THAT A PERFORMANCE LIKE WEDNESDAY NIGHT'S WAS MERELY A MATTER OF TIME, BUT THE THING THAT DISAPPOINTED ME WAS THE ATTITUDE OF SOME FANS WHO SEEM TO HAVE BECOME SO LACKING IN UNDERSTANDING IN SO SHORT A PERIOD.

I felt almost that I was being accused of being dishonest and this, I can truthfully say, hurts.

All along the lads in the side have worked so hard and it is galling at times to find that they receive such scant acknowledgement for their great efforts.

But one thing I can be very happy about is that through it all no one at Boothferry Park has lost faith or stopped giving their all. As long as this continues to be, I will be a very happy man — despite what anyone else feels or says.

It simply remains for us to continue along the same lines as Wednesday night. I imagine then even the worst Doubting Thomases will return to the fold.

TALK-IN

TOMMY DOCHERTY says . . . ▶



AFTER four defeats in a row, it was good to see the ice broken so well against Swindon. What was particularly pleasing though, was the way that the side refused to let the setback at Carlisle upset them.

On the day, the better side won at Carlisle, but we played some good football there and the side showed against Swindon that they were still capable of producing it despite that defeat at Brunton Park.

It was a fine, all-round team performance against Swindon, but you could not help but admire the way that Frank Banks played against Don Rogers and, of course, the way that Stuart Pearson continues to improve.

Goodness knows what this lad will do when he is 100 per cent fit. At no time this season has he been more than 75 per cent fit and even in pre-season training he could do only a restricted amount of work because of stomach muscle trouble.

When he is really fit, watch him go. It is frightening to think what he can do and he ought not to have languished in the reserves for so long. That is beyond me.

No one could have been happier than I was to see Mally Lord get our second goal against Swindon. He deserved it and he got it because he did not give up and chased for a ball which some players might have given up as lost.

True, it was a gift, but it was still necessary to weigh up the possibility and chase in for the ball that became loose after the 'keeper had mishandled.

What is more, that goal came just at the right time, because we had lost

some of our control in midfield and it was at this time that Swindon could have come back into the game.

THAT GOAL SETTLED IT, THOUGH, AND I WAS DELIGHTED TO SEE THAT THE FANS GAVE MALLY MUCH BETTER TREATMENT THAN IN THE LAST GAME AT BOOTHFERRY PARK.

I think that one of the reasons we lost some of the grip we had in midfield was that Ken Knighton put 100 minutes' work into the first 45. He was absolutely tremendous in that first half, but nobody could expect him to keep up that pace and work rate.

His performance and the display of the side as a whole brought Hull City out in their true form and though that will be used as a standard it will be difficult to maintain. But it was a good performance to beat an experienced side like Swindon who can be so compact in defence and have the players who can break away on the counter-attack.

I am sure that looking at the record of Luton, our visitors this afternoon, that we will face a similar task today. Let's hope that it is tackled as successfully and skilfully as it was on Wednesday.

Billy Best went to Southend from
Northampton Town in 1968 and if all goes
well this season he should top the personal
milestone of 100 League goals.

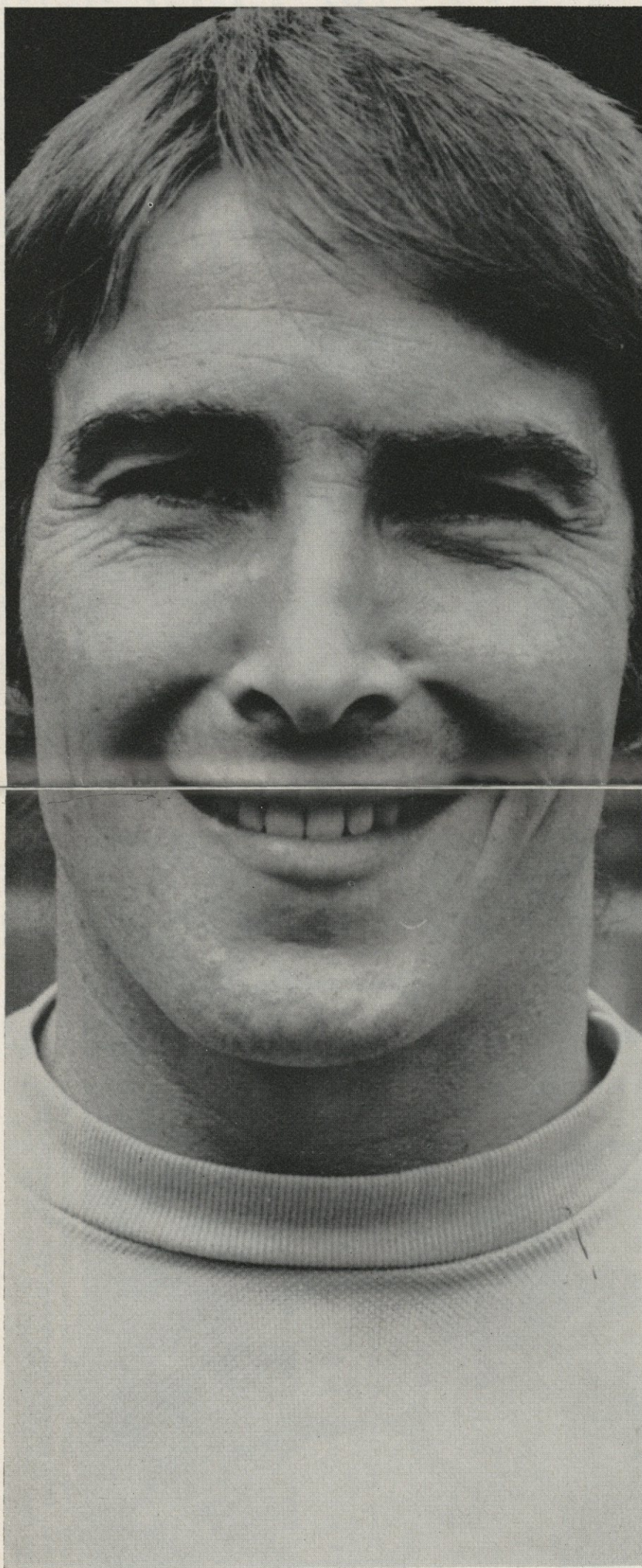
BIGGEST THRILL: Scoring goals — and playing well.

IN TOWN TODAY...

IT BECAME clear from opening results that Luton were missing their ace striker **MALCOLM MACDONALD**, sold to Newcastle for £180,000 this summer.

In pre-season they were beaten by Colchester in the Watney Cup and they scored only six goals in their first seven League games, drawing six and losing the other.

In his two seasons at Luton, Macdonald scored 58 goals and with so many First Division clubs showing interest in him it was inevitable — when Luton's own promotion bid failed — that he would move.

Manager **ALEC STOCK** tried several players in Macdonald's position. **DON GIVENS** was first in the No. 9 shirt but when goals failed to come, **ROBIN WAINWRIGHT** was promoted from the reserves and defender **ALAN SLOUGH** switched to a mid-field role to lend support.

Finally, Mr. Stock spent £30,000 of his reserves to sign Fulham's **VIC HALOM** — no doubt hoping he might repeat the feats of the last forward Stock got from Craven Cottage — Malcolm Macdonald!

Luton's magnificent bid to clinch promotion last season for the second year in suc-

cession finally exploded at Easter when they lost two games in as many days. Until then there had been a distinct possibility they would regain the First Division place they lost in 1960.

The Luton club has had a varied history, sometimes hitting the highest spots, often sinking to the bottom of the pile.

The club was formed in 1885, playing friendly matches until being accepted by the Southern League nine years later. They maintained a good position, gathering sufficient support to gain admittance to the Second Division of the Football League in 1897.

Things didn't go well, though. Serious financial problems arose and, when they finished second from bottom in 1900, they didn't bother to apply for re-election.

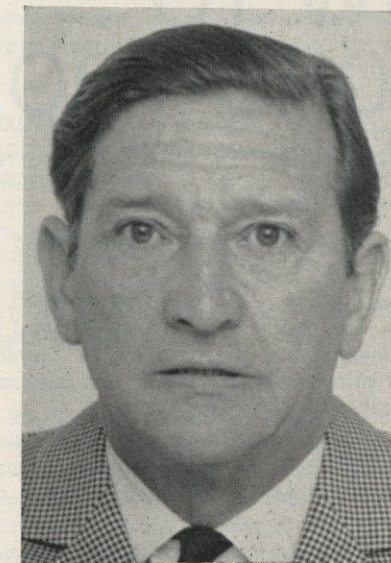
So it was back to the Southern League where they remained until the first division was taken over en bloc to form the Third Division (South) of the Football League in 1920.

They had to wait until 1937 before they regained Second Division status which they held until a fantastic finish to the 1954-55 campaign saw them scrape into the First Division on goal-average.

Contrary to most people's expectations, Luton made a good impression in the highest sphere and by 1959 they were good enough to earn themselves a Wembley visit to meet Nottingham Forest in the F.A. Cup Final.

Unfortunately, they struck a complete off-day and, though Forest played most of the game with only ten men, Luton were still defeated 2-1.

Luton's fortunes took a dramatic turn from that day at Wembley. Twelve months later they were relegated to the Second Division, in 1963 they sank into Division Three and two years later — disaster, disaster! — they plummeted into the Fourth Division.

Spirits were so low that no one believed the club could ever pick itself off the ground. But they put their backs to the wall, former manager **ALLAN BROWN** picked up the fragments and restored some semblance of order about the team.

In 1968 they were walk-away champions of the Fourth Division. Oozing with confidence, they strode like a Colossus into the Third, only narrowly missing promotion in their first season. Alec Stock was then in charge.

In 1970, when they finished runners-up in Division Three, they became only the second club in Football League history to reach the 60-point mark for three consecutive seasons.

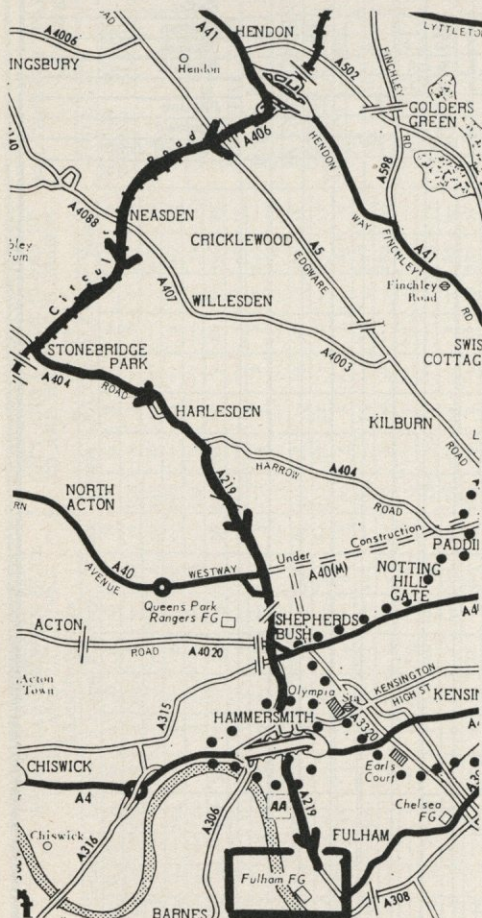

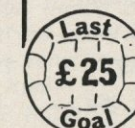

FLASHBACK

TIGERS' fans will have no complaints if today's game ends as the first meeting between City and Luton did in November, 1949, though they will be unhappy if they see as little of the match as the gate of 22,269 saw at Kenilworth Road.

★

City won that game 3-0 to end the unbeaten record Luton had on their own ground at that time, but the whole game was shrouded in fog. Indeed, it was so thick at one stage that reporters thought the players had left the field and the game had been abandoned.

★

Clearing up the doubts and confusion afterwards referee J. G. Williams (Arnold) said that the players had mistaken one of his signals and thought that he had called time. In a bid to beat the fog the game had started five minutes early and the teams changed straight round at the interval.

★

But conditions were so bad that when they saw players filing to the tunnel following Mr. Williams mistaken signal, reporters went to the dressing rooms to find out if the match had been abandoned. There was no one there, for the referee had called the players back and the match had proceeded.

★

Many spectators had left, too, having seen little of the game anyway. Those in the most advantageous positions had seen Luton's one-time England keeper **BERNARD STREten** have "a tottering time".

★

He was beaten after 19 minutes by **CARTER** and after 23 minutes by **MELLOR**. Ten minutes from the end **HARRISON** got City's third. In the meantime City keeper **BILLY BLY** had saved a penalty from **STOBART**.

★

Because of the difficulty there had been in distinguishing between friend and foe, referee Williams was asked for his impressions and he said that the City side did not have a weak point.

The Tigers at that time were in second place to Tottenham in the Second Division, having gained promotion in the previous season when record gate receipts of £102,809 helped to boost the club's profit to just over £20,000.

★

It is a commentary on the extent to which the game and its administration has changed that City's wage bill in a promotion season amounted to only £23,763.

★

Talks were going on between City and the railway authorities about building a station at Boothferry Park and, all over the country, fans were pressing for kick-offs to be brought forward to avoid the "gathering darkness." These were pre-floodlight days, of course.

★

The Tigers' **GERRY BOWLER** had just played for Ireland against England at Maine Road and a comparative newcomer in the City side was **DON REVIE**.

★

MR. RON BUTTERY had just been appointed the Tigers' vice-chairman (a position he still holds, incidentally).

★

Denis Compton's face was beaming brightly from the hair-cream advertisements and Rugby League was having one of those seemingly interminable debates about two divisions.

★

The 12-month old National Health Service was under fire from no less a personage than Lord Horder, the King's Physician, who forecast that it would founder on the rocks of economics.

★

And the politicians were providing the music-hall comedians with a great source of jokes with their arguments about the East African groundnuts scheme.

★

But on Humberside, the only topic was soccer and the side which put City in No. 2 spot in the Second Division was: **Bly; Jensen, Berry; Greenhalgh, Meens, Mellor, Harrison, Revie, Moore, Carter, Shepherd**.

★

Luton, managed by former City player Dally Duncan, lined up like this: **Streten; Cooke, Ahearne; Watkins, Owen, Gardiner; Waugh, Stobbart, Walsh, Glover, Wyldes**.

★

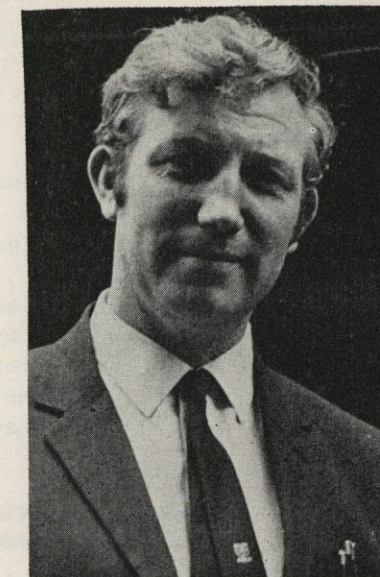
Cardiff were beaten again, this time at home by **Swindon Town**, and now they are right down in the relegation zone.
