Birmingham City F.C.

Known as the Blues, Birmingham City commenced operations as long ago as 1875, becoming a professional outfit in 1885 and a limited company three years later. During their life the club has had three grounds and three names, initially being known as Small Heath Alliance becoming Birmingham in 1905 adding City to the name in 1945. Never first division champions, the Blues finished 6th, their best position in season 1955/56, although they have been 2nd division champions on four occasions. F.A. cup success has eluded them although the reputation as dour fighters has enabled them to defeat many a higher placed club over the years and they are well respected. Success has come to the club in the Football League Cup competition when they ran out winners in season 1962/63, when Aston Villa were defeated 3-1 at St. Andrews' and a 0-0 draw resulted at Villa Park. Ken Leek was the Clubs and the competitors top scorer that season with eight goals in the seven rounds. Birmingham have ventured into Europe being finalists in the European Fairs Cup on two occasions. The record transfer fee paid

is the £80,000 Carlisle United received for Ex-Cobbler, Bob Hatton.

The present Manager is Fred Goodwin who will be well remembered as a player with Leeds United and Manchester United; Alan Instone is the Secretary and Willie Bell, also ex-Leeds, the club Coach.

LATCHFORD, Dave. One of three famous brothers all playing in 1st Division. Brum his only club.

CARROLL, Tommy. Born in Dublin; previously with Ipswich Town. Now in his second season with club.

PENDREY, Gary. Local lad. Very consistent performer. Made over 100 appearances.

CAMPBELL, Alan. Scottish born player who has previously served Charlton Athletic.

HYND, Roger. Tall defender, came from Crystal Palace. Previously in Scottish Football with Rangers.

PAGE, Malcolm. Welsh International, now back in the side following illness.

BURNS, Kenny. A Glaswegian recently invited to join the Scottish international squad yet only 18.

FRANCIS, Trevor. Young striker subject of many headlines. Born at Plymouth. Shows abundant promise.

LATCHFORD, Bob. Recent scorer of hat-trick against Manchester City. One club man.

HOPE, Bobby. Close season signing from West Bromwich Albion. Another Scotsman.

HATTON, Bob. Bought from Carlisle for £80,000, also with Wolverhampton and Northampton.

Luton Town F.C.

Luton Town were formed the same year that saw Brum turn professional - 1885 - and in turn they too became professional five years later. Known as the Hatters because of the local industry the club has played on three grounds during its career. Luton can possibly lay claim to being champion runners-up for they have occupied such a position in Divisions 2, 3 and 3 (S.) also the F.A. Cup as well as topping Division 4 in 1967/68 and Division 3 (S.) way back in 1936/37. Best 1st Division place of 8th was in season 1957/58. Again success has not come Luton's way in both Cup competitions, although they lost narrowly to Notts. Forest by 2-1 in the Final of 1958-59. Joe Payne who is well-known locally, holds the club's record for the most goals scored in a season finding the net 55 times the season Luton won the Third South Championship.

Malcolm Macdonald figured in the highest transfer deal the club receiving a reputed £180,000 for the services from Newcastle United in May 1971, Eric Morecambe, who really needs no introduction, is a

member of the Hatters Board, and is a man, who, despite his accepted humorous background, is very serious as regards his football in general and Luton Town more particularly. Harry Haslam is the Club's Manager and Bob Readhead, the Secretary.

BARBER, Keith. London born, Keith was with Dunstable Town before joining Luton 5' 11" tall, weighs 10st 12lbs.

RYAN, John. Another Londoner. Free transfer from Fulham.

THOMPSON, Bob. Ex-English International. Previously with Birmingham. Player with wealth of experience.

ANDERSON, Peter. One time forward. Previously an amateur with Hendon. Luton his only professional club.

FAULKNER, John. Amateur Cup winner with Sutton United who then joined Leeds, thence to Luton replacing Chris Nicoll.

GARNER, Alan. Came to Luton on a free transfer from Millwall. Like Faulkner a six-footer.

RYAN, Jim. Bought from Manchester United for £20,000. No relation to John. Scottish by birth.

FEARN, Rodney. Luton's Costliest buy from Leicester for £50,000. Played in Leicester's losing Cup Final in 1969.

BUSBY, Viv. Born at High Wycombe for whom he was an amateur. Had spell on loan to Newcastle.

HALOM, Vic. Now with his fourth club. Bought from Fulham for £30,000 following MacDonalds transfer.

ASTON, John. Ex-Manchester United. £30,000 secured his transfer for whom he made more than 150 appearances.

SLOUGH, Alan. (Substitute). Local born. Alan cannot get back into side following injury. Made 250 plus appearances.
