

DOOLEY ON WEDNESDAY



The tremendous efforts which Sheffield Wednesday have produced in recent weeks has earned us deserved success.

To summarise the situation, we find that the first team are today lying in a healthy position among the second division leaders.

And in Brian Joicey we have the division's leading goal scorer.

GOALS

Our Reserves are playing with great skill and determination. Four more goals against Coventry City, whom we beat by four goals to three in mid-week, gave them an overall tally of 25 goals, and young Roger Wylde scored all four against our visitors on Wednesday evening.

He is the Central League's top marksman with twelve goals — a splendid performance for this youngster, who is developing into a very fine player indeed.

And our juniors are following the example of the others, with consistent performances which has seen them score twenty goals in just five matches, with only three conceded.

FLAIR

Here again we have young David Herbert with a flair for finding the net. He scored five against Doncaster Rovers and another against Leeds United last week-end.

While I have mentioned outstanding individual performances, I would like to stress that the accent here is always on team work and it has been team performances which have enabled us to get results.

SUCCESS



Luton Town

Luton's emergence as a powerful challenger for promotion has surprised many people. When the club released such outstanding players as **David Court**, **Don Givens** and **Chris Nicoll**—following the departure, a year earlier, of **Malcolm Macdonald**—it appeared that the Hatters might be in for a bit of a struggle.

But manager **Harry Haslam** also went into the transfer market as a buyer—and came back with some astute new signings. He bought two defenders, **Bobby Thomson** and **John Faulkner**, and two new forwards, **John Aston** and **Rod Fern**.

Thomson won eight England caps, and made 15 appearances for the under-23's, in his Wolves' days. It was in 1961-62 that he made his way into the Molineux club's senior eleven and he made over 300 appearances for the club before joining Birmingham City, in 1969. Towards the end of last season he spent a few weeks on loan to Walsall.

John Faulkner first sprang to national fame as the centre-half of amateurs Sutton United, who met Leeds United in the F.A. Cup three seasons ago. He played so well that Leeds signed him shortly afterwards, possibly as a replacement for **Jack Charlton**. But when **Charlton** went on and on, **John** dropped out of the reckoning for a first-team place so he linked-up with Luton last season.

Luton paid £30,000 for left-winger **John Aston**, who had starred in so many games for Manchester United—none more so than in the 1968 European Cup final. After breaking his leg, **John** never really re-established himself in the United side but is certainly enjoying his new lease of life at Kenilworth Road.

Rod Fern rose from the juniors to make his League bow with Leicester

City in 1967-68 and two years later he was their top scorer. He didn't find the net so often in subsequent seasons but he, too, is revelling in his new surroundings.

The new defenders have been lining up with **John Ryan** and **Alan Garner** in the back four. **Ryan**, a Fulham regular in their First Division days, joined Luton in 1969 and has been ever-present for the past two seasons. **Garner** made his League debut with Millwall two seasons ago, signed for Luton in 1971 and is now playing regular League football for the first time.

Goalkeeper **Keith Barber** was signed from Southern League Dunstable Town in April, 1971, and was quickly plunged into the bustle of League football. **Peter Anderson** also made a quick conversion from non-League circles. Signed from Hendon in 1971, he went immediately into Luton's first team and last season was their top scorer.

Alan Slough, who has now made over 250 League appearances for the club, and **Viv Busby**—who was disappointed not to have been signed by Newcastle last season after completing a successful loan period with them—are both Luton discoveries.

Vic Halom, who earlier played for Charlton and Orient, joined Luton last season from Fulham for £30,000. **Jimmy Ryan**, who made several First Division appearances for Manchester United, has been with the club for three years.

Last season's game with Luton produced four goals, **Anderson** and **Givens** netting for Luton, **Craig** (penalty) and **Holsgrove** for Wednesday. Wednesday will be endeavouring to collect two points this year, but they face a tough proposition with Luton in their present mood.

Hart

This, the latest in the Hart to Heart series, features a talk with Gordon Hill, a headmaster, who is now in his seventh season as a league referee. Mr. Hill has refereed in Europe and is one of the most respected officials in the game.



ALAN HART

HART: I have been asked many times just what makes an otherwise sane human being want to don a black uniform and become the subject of a stream of unwarranted abuse whereby his mental state, eyesight and parentage are brought into question. I'm not a referee, so can you provide the answer?

HILL: It has been called, "suffering from the narcissus complex" — and indeed there must be a 'performer' inside each of us. But, there is also the realistic, genuine desire to be totally involved in top-class football.

Plus the fact that I am NOT sane!

HART: Do you have a special message for players before the start of a match?

HILL: No! Over the years I have built up a reputation that is recognised by the players as 'being fair and understanding'. That is the main aim of us all, that our reputations go before us — with respect. I'm glad to say that I've never had to send a league player off the field.

HART: There is much talk of a decline of discipline among players in recent years. Do you think this is so?

HILL: Yes — until the last two years. Our efforts to tighten up discipline are beginning to have effect.

HART: Have you ever come off a football field knowing that you've had a rotten game, or does a referee always have to convince himself that he has made the right decision every time?

HILL: We are human and we do fail. After my bad games I am very disturbed because almost certainly when a referee has a bad game — so do the players and the spectators.

HART: There have been suggestions that future referees should be recruited from the ranks of retired professional footballers. What is your view?

HILL: By all means — providing they prove themselves as we have to do. All referees on the Football League List are professional, fit, knowledgeable, always available and paid.

HART: In what way do you think the general standard of refereeing could be improved?

HILL: I would plead for a closer alliance between referees and players. We have a responsibility to know the game. The Football League has recognised this and encourage League Clubs to offer full facilities to referees.

HART: What personal ambitions do you have for the future?

HILL: A referee is lying if he fails to answer that question with "to do a Cup Final at Wembley" — that will always be my ambition.



THE STARS OF THE SHOW



Two special guests helped us to celebrate our victory over Bolton in the second round of the League Cup competition on Wednesday, September 6th. One needs little introduction. She's the ebullient pop star, Lulu, who's as famous a Scot as our own Willie Henderson and Tommy Craig. Lulu poured the tea for the boys after the match which was watched by 82-year-old George Anderson, a Scotsman who emigrated to Canada many years ago.
