# The Alan Dicks Page

SUPPORTERS have a vital part to play in the prosperity of a football club. We were pleased with the near-14,000 turn-out for the last home match against Nottingham Forest and delighted with more than 12,000 who turned up for Gordon Parr's testimonial match against Chelsea.

But the lads are becoming increasingly aware of the following we are now getting for away matches. It's never easy to estimate exactly how many supporters travel, but the volume of noise generated at Oxford last Saturday was exceptionally high.

When we scored our goals and again at the final whistle, the City fans made themselves heard. We were pleased they had come to share in our success.

On behalf of the players, I want to thank every fan who makes the effort to see us away from home. The players are fully aware of the support and it goes without saying that they respond to the encouragement they are given.

Although it helps, I don't think that is the real reason for the sharp contrast in results we have experienced this season. But don't ask me why we fail to win at home yet win away. I just don't know the answer to that.

We've had four games since my last notes—two of them friendlies. Against Forest we reserved our best form from the final 10 minutes or so when we overcame our period of frustration and built up intense pressure.

This was rewarded by an equalising goal from Gerry Gow and, in the last seconds, Danny Bartley made a good run down the right and set up a great chance which wasn't accepted.

So we went to Oxford after yet another home draw. The game was full of stoppages and five of our players had to receive treatment at one time or another. Brian Drysdale, Trevor Tainton and David Rodgers couldn't travel to Scotland for our friendly at Morton on Monday.

The second-half was the longest I can remember with 11 minutes added on. As a manager, I feel the referee is always right to stop the game if a player goes down injured. This didn't happen in every instance at Oxford and Brian Drysdale, whose injury turned out to be the worst, had to wait a couple of minutes before help could be given.

Some referees get the feeling that some players feign injuries or make knocks appear to be worse than they actually are. Unfortunately one or two players do this, but I'm all in favour of referees halting the game and then adding the time on afterwards.

There was no doubt that we were the better side at Oxford. An early goal is always a great incentive to any side—I wish we'd grabbed a few at Ashton Gate!—and we took the lead from a penalty after only 10 minutes.

Gerry Gow had missed two of his three spot-kicks this season but I still believe him to be the best player for the job. He proved me right by scoring when he must have been under a lot of pressure himself after his two earlier misses.

There is no shortage of players willing to take the responsibility, I might add. Half-a-dozen hands shot up when I asked who would like to take penalties a few weeks ago. It ought to be the easiest job in the world, but it can be a great ordeal in tight matches and there's no worse feeling for a player than missing a penalty.

When John Galley scored the second goal with a magnificent diving header just before half-time, we were well on the way to our fourth away win of the season.

But it needed two fine saves by Ray Cashley to prevent Oxford getting back into the game in the second-half. And no player defended more impressively than David Rodgers whose knee injury came in about the ninth minute of injury time.

Ray gave us a few anxious moments before this game for he spent most of the week in bed with an infected leg. I tried hard to borrow a goalkeeper as a safeguard, but without success. As it turned out, Ray came through well.

We were grateful to Gillingham and Mike Gibson for helping us out in the Chelsea match. It was good to see Mike at Ashton Gate again.

I want to thank all the fans for coming along to make the night such a wonderful success for Gordon Parr. Everyone was pleased with the end product.

In the other friendly at Morton we gave the younger players a chance to come into the team because of the injuries. Steve Ritchie played alongside his brother in a first-team match for the first time and David Bruton was at centre-half. Gerry Sweeney switched on his old club's new floodlights—and then scored the only goal of the game.

## The Young Ones



BILLY MILNE is one of the young Scottish contingent at Ashton Gate. He comes from Glasgow and was signed as an apprentice in July last year after taking part in trials in Scotland.

Billy, who is 16, started off at outside-left but this season has been switched to left-back with considerable success. Several useful matches in the Western League team earned him a place in the Combination side earlier this month.

Several clubs were interested in signing him after his selection as substitute for Scotland against England Boys at Maine Road, Manchester, two years ago—among them Leeds, West Bromwich, Celtic, Rangers, Morton and Dundee. But he chose City and hasn't regretted it.

He played for Glasgow Schools and in his first season at Ashton Gate, played four reserve matches and was a regular in the youth team.

Billy, who stands 5ft. 10in. high, lists fishing as his one hobby outside football, but he hasn't done much since moving to Bristol. His favourite player is Eddie Gray of Leeds United.

**L**UTON Town have dropped only four points in six away games and have four away victories to their credit so far.

Their two most recent away fixtures have brought 2-0 victories, at Swindon and Sunderland, but they have failed to win in their last four home games. Sounds a familiar story to City fans!

They slumped at home to Hull City, 2-1 last Saturday, although they were below strength because of injuries.

Luton, who appointed Harry Haslam as manager in the summer when Alec Stock resigned, spent £80,000 on two men to give their forward line a boost. Rodney Fern came from Leicester City and John Aston from Manchester United.

### **KEITH BARBER (goalkeeper).**

A late-entry into professional soccer, he was spotted in London senior football. After trials with Luton, went to Dunstable Town and was recalled last season to replace Tony Read.

### **JOHN RYAN (right back)**

Released by Fulham two seasons ago and is now one of the steadiest defenders in the Second Division. Was at one time on Arsenal's books.

### **BOBBY THOMSON (left back).**

Played eight times for England when he was with Wolves. Was transferred to Birmingham City for a big free but never really settled. Was loaned to Walsall last season and given a free transfer in the summer.

### **JOHN FAULKENER (centre-half)**

Signed from Leeds United last season after Chris Nicholls was transferred to Aston Villa. Had to wait until this term for his chance. Formerly an amateur with Sutton United, he missed last week's game because of injury.

### **ALAN GARNER (centre-half)**

Earned his regular place last season when Nicholl left. Previously with Millwall, but played only two first team games for them.

### **ALAN SLOUGH (half-back)**

Now back in the side after being sub for the early games this season. Can play in either the back four or midfield. He joined Luton from school and became a first team player two seasons ago.

### **JIMMY RYAN (forward)**

A Scot who started his career with Manchester United and cost Luton £20,000. Missed most of last season because of injuries but has played in every game this term.

### **RODNEY FERN (forward)**

Was in Leicester City's F.A. Cup final side in 1969 and cost Luton £50,000 during the summer. Scored 27 goals in 149 appearances in League games with Leicester, but has scored only once so far this term.

### **VIV BUSBY (forward)**

Has not quite captured the form which made him such a target for League clubs last season. Spent part of last term on loan with Newcastle United but they decided not to pay Luton's asking price of £50,000 for Busby to stay with his former colleague Malcolm Macdonald. Has netted only twice this season, and, like Faulkener, missed last week's game with an injury.

### **VIC HALOM (forward)**

The man-in-form at the moment. Has scored nine goals already this season including six in the last six games. He cost £30,000 when he was signed from Fulham last season as Macdonald's replacement. Last Saturday's goals against Hull was his 50th in League soccer.

### **JOHN ASTON (forward)**

Only 25, he had considerable First Division experience with Manchester United appearing in more than 150 League games and scoring 25 goals. His transfer fee of £30,000 is already looking to be a bargain. Has scored a total of six goals this season.

### **GORDON HINDSON (forward)**

Came into the side for the injured Busby last week. Luton paid Newcastle United £25,000 for him, although he had played in only seven League games.

Others in the Luton squad are **WILLIE CARRICK**, a goalkeeper signed on a free transfer from Manchester United; and full back **DON SHANKS**, an England youth international who started with Fulham.



## ALAN KING'S SECOND DIVISION SURVEY

**L**UTON and City fought two goal-less draws last season. But Luton will be well remembered for their Easter visit to Ashton Gate the season before which City won 3-2. Two of the goalscorers that day are now among the country's top first division strikers. Chris Garland scored twice for City and Malcolm Macdonald once for Luton. Other goals came from Dickie Rooks (City) and Viv Busby of Luton.

Luton forward JOHN ASTON is the son of the former Manchester United and England full-back. John senior is now chief scout at Old Trafford.

Comedian ERIC MORECAMBE is a director of Luton Town.

The £50,000 Luton paid for RODNEY FERN during the summer was a club record. The previous highest amount was the £35,000 paid to Arsenal for David Court in July 1970. The biggest fee collected by the club is, of course, the £180,000 Newcastle United paid for Malcolm MacDonald.

Former Tottenham Hotspur forward TERRY MEDWIN has been appointed chief scout at Fulham. Bill Taylor is the new first team coach.

Queen's Park Rangers broke the Second Division transfer record last week when they paid £165,000 for Burnley's DAVE THOMAS.

Earlier in the week Rangers' midfield star MARTYN BUSBY broke his leg playing at Fulham, putting him out of action for the rest of the season. He is the brother of Luton's VIV BUSBY.

London-based lawyer David Goldstone was named the new chairman of Cardiff City just twelve days after resigning the same position with Swansea City.

Incidentally, Cardiff manager Jimmy Scoular has just signed a new five-year contract.

There has been plenty of transfer activity involving Second Division clubs during the past two weeks. Moves include — JOHNNY VINCENT from

Middlesbrough to Cardiff City for £35,000; TOMMY HUTCHINSON, Blackpool to Coventry City for £90,000 plus BILLY RAFFERTY; ALAN MOODY from Middlesbrough to Southend £15,000; BRIAN TILER from Aston Villa to Carlisle for £15,000; STAN WEBB from Carlisle to Brentford for £10,000 and JOHN SAUNDERS from Mansfield Town to Huddersfield Town for £20,000.

Brighton and Hove Albion have taken two players on loan . . . JOHN MOORE from Luton Town and STAN BROWN of Fulham.

Burnley's PAUL FLETCHER notched all three goals in the 3-0 home win over Cardiff City. Burnley are the only unbeaten side in the Football League.

Nottingham Forest's game a Ashton Gate a fortnight ago was their last with manager MATT GILLIES in charge. The former Leicester City boss resigned five days later.

Forest failed to win again last Saturday, drawing 2-2 with Swindon, and have had only one victory in their last ten League and League Cup games.

John Dungworth made his League debut for Huddersfield Town against Middlesbrough and scored . . . but Huddersfield lost 2-1.

Orient's crowd for last Saturday's home game with Carlisle was only 4,695. The only lower gate in the section this season was the 4,482 for the Orient v. City match on September 9th.




