

Jack Charlton talks to . . .

IVOR BROADIS

Sunday Sun

Broadis: "Functional" and "Boring" are two of the terms used to describe Boro' this season. Any comment?

Charlton: People must get their priorities right, whether they want to stay in the Second Division and be entertained or go into the First Division. They can't have both. But I feel that in the process of being functional we've been entertaining.

Broadis: Home gates suggest that you haven't yet convinced your own supporters.

Charlton: I said after our defeat by Fulham that the players had to work hard and earn the respect of our fans. If they haven't convinced anybody now then there's no way we're going to improve our gates. All we've lacked in some home games is in taking our chances and we've got a bit anxious. But I'll start worrying when we stop making the chances.

Broadis: Do you get tired of people maintaining your style is that of Leeds a few years ago?

Charlton: I get sick to death of people complaining. What do they want from Middlesbrough. It all follows from the fact that I was at Leeds for so long, but nothing in our play stems from what we did there. I concentrate on getting the lads to play how I think they play best.



Broadis: What about the allegation that the Second Division quality is getting poorer not better?

Charlton: You've only got to look at the First Division and see how the two promoted teams Burnley and Q.P.R. are doing to get the answer to that question.

Broadis: What is your opinion of three up and three down promotion and relegation?

Charlton: If I've learned one thing in football it is that people will watch if there is something to watch that has a bearing on honours. They'll stay a lot longer while the chance of doing something is still there and three places involves a lot more clubs for a lot longer.

Broadis: Would your belief change if you became a First Division boss with Boro?

Charlton: No it wouldn't change. Falling attendances has been the big worry for years and something had to be done to maintain interest. We aren't feeling the benefit of three up and three down now, but in the last quarter of the season it's going to make a big difference.



INTRODUCING...

LUTON TOWN

Luton Town have emerged as one of the most surprising runners in the promotion race. Over the past couple of seasons, manager Harry Haslam has sold half his first-team yet, amazingly, he has kept the Hatters close to the top all the while.

Mr. Haslam seems to have a Midas touch when buying players. He discovered young Tom Finney in Irish football, paid Crusaders £20,000 for him shortly before this season opened—and Finney scored five goals in his first four League games!

Last season Mr. Haslam paid a then club record £50,000 for centre-forward **Barry Butlin** and now he is their level top scorer with six goals. Butlin had spent several years with Derby County yet never really made good at the Baseball Ground.

Now all eyes will be on Luton's newest signing—**Alan West**, for whom Luton paid a new record £80,000. Alan attained star status at Burnley two seasons ago but lost his place last term. Is he about to become another discard to make it big at Luton?

Another of Mr. Haslam's signings, at £30,000, was **John Aston**, who had starred in so many games for Manchester United—none more so than in the 1968 European Cup final. After breaking his leg John never really re-established himself in the United side but he has certainly enjoyed his new lease of life at Kenilworth Road where he was top scorer with 12 goals last season.

The arrival of West will have brought about some team-shuffling which could affect the midfield section in which Peter Anderson, John Ryan and Jimmy Ryan had been operating. Gordon Hindson was another player to appear here.

Anderson made a quick conversion from non-League circles. Signed from Hendon in 1971, he went immediately into Luton's first-team and in 1971/72 was their top scorer. John Ryan a Fulham regular in their First Division days, joined Luton in 1969 and was ever-present for two years until missing a few games last

term. Jimmy Ryan, who made several First Division appearances for Manchester United, has been with the club for four years.

Hindson was signed from Newcastle two years ago and has been a first-teamer for most of the time since.

Barring injuries, or other causes, the back four will be Don Shanks, John Faulkner, Alan Garner and Bobby Thompson.

Shanks had hoped to make the grade with Fulham, who signed him as a schoolboy. He later became an apprentice at Craven Cottage but he was released in January, 1970 when they didn't feel he would make the grade. Luton took a chance on him, soon he was in the England youth team and two seasons ago he got his chance in their League team.

John Faulkner first sprang to national fame as the centre-half of amateurs Sutton United who met Leeds United in the F.A. Cup four seasons ago. He played so well that Leeds signed him shortly afterwards. When he dropped out of the reckoning for a first-team place he linked with Luton two seasons ago.

with Luton two seasons ago. Alan Garner made his League debut for Millwall against Blackburn in October 1970 but he got only one further chance in the Lions' team. Luton signed him in 1971 and last season he became a regular member of the defence.

Thomson won eight England caps, and made 15 appearances for the Under-23s in his Wolves days. It was in 1961/62 that he made his way into the Molineux club's senior eleven. He joined Birmingham City in 1969 and towards the end of 1971/72 he spent a few weeks on loan to Walsall. Luton signed him at the end of that season.

Luton paid Arsenal £25,000 for goalkeeper **Graham Horn** and, though he had not played in the Gunners first-team, he played several League games for Portsmouth while on loan to them last season.

Barry Butlin scored the only goal of the game when Luton came to Ayresome Park last season.
