Town Focus continues its great new series by turning the spotlight on wing-half ALAN GARNER.

Ironically, Alan got his big break in football when he took over in midfield from Chris Nicholl who had been transferred to Aston Villa.

It was his one big chance - and he took it brilliantly by winning a regular place in the Town side; a place he has kept throughout this season.

Now, after establishing a place in the first team, this 22 year old Lambeth lad has two not so secret ambitions.

"One is to play at Wembley and the other, like most of my Luton team-mates is to play for England."

Alan, who was born in Lambeth was educated at Beaufoy comprehensive school and played for South London Schoolboys before joining Millwall, and making his League debut against Blackburn Rovers.

"Obviously making my League debut against Blackburn was one of the most thrilling events of my footballing career, but even better was scoring the only goal against Bolton in the fifth round of the F.A. Cup last season."

Like so many of the Luton players, Alan's favourite colour is blue and his favourite clothes are casual.

His hobbies are cars while his favourite singers are Neil Diamond and Melanie.

When it comes to films and television Gerald Harper and Susan George top his list.

Not unnaturally, Alan rates Johann Cryuff as the World's No. 1 soccer player.

His vote for the top pop group goes to Rod Stewart and the Faces.

Eating out means a meal of steak, chips peas and tomatoes for Alan while lager and lime is his favourite drink.

As well as eating out, Alan likes to visit foreign countries. And his pet hate is impatient drivers.

Bolton Wanderers, who returned to the Second Division this season after two years in Division Three, have slumped after an outstanding start and, it is beginning to look as if manager Jimmy Armfield could have a relegation fight on his hands.

The Trotters remain very sound in defence, but they have a few problems up front. To try and alleviate these, Mr. Armfield signed Malcolm Darling from Rochdale and has given young Neil Whatmore his head.

Darling opened his career with Blackburn, twice topping their scorers' list. Norwich signed him in 1970 but he moved on to Rochdale two years later. While at Blackburn, Darling formed a prolific scoring partnership with John Byrom which he hopes to repeat at Burnden Park.

With seven goals, Byrom is once again Bolton's leading scorer, a position he has held for three of the past four

seasons. It was at Blackburn that he first came into prominence, winning England Youth honours. Bolton signed him in 1966. In some games Byrom has had to make way for Neil Whatmore who made his senior debut as an apprentice last season, scoring twice in two games. He hit his first goal this season against Aston Villa. Garry Jones, Ron Phillips and Freddie Lee are Bolton's other strikers. Jones enjoyed a highly successful time last season when he hit 20 goals. Injuries have kept him out for several weeks this term. Phillips has been a regular member of the Trotters' League

team for five years and last season celebrated his 100th League appearance.

Lee shot into prominence last season when he netted 15 goals. He has scored five times this season.

Peter Nicholson, Alan Waldron and Roy Greaves are the usual midfield players.

Nicholson was a playing colleague of manager Jimmy Armfield at Blackpool. He moved with the manager during the 1971 close season and has been in the first team ever since.

Waldron's first appearance in the League team was in 1970/71 which had the unhappy ending of relegation to Division 3. But Alan played a big part in helping the club back into the Second Division last season.

Greaves emerged as a striker in 1967/68, to lead the Trotters' scoring list that season and the next. He also has spent a considerable period of his career as a midfield player.

John Ritson, Warwick Rimmer, Paul Jones and Don McAllister have established themselves firmly in defence.

Ritson has been in the Bolton Defence for over five years,

completing his 200th first-team appearances last season. Rimmer, a former England Schoolboy international, comes from a football family. His father Sid was a familiar figure in Third Division circles with Tranmere and Watford while his uncle Ellis was a Sheffield Wednesday and England star of the 'thirties'.

Jones is yet another player who has come through from the juniors. He made his first League appearance three seasons ago and was ever-present when they won the Third Division championship last season. McAllister, who made his League debut four seasons ago,

has held his place for the past three years.

Barry Siddal was in goal for the England youth team which won the U.E.F.A. Youth tournament for a record-breaking third season in a row this year. Now he is playing regularly Second Division soccer for Bolton after being understudy to Charlie Wright last season.

It is two years since we last met Bolton in the League. Then we beat them 2-0 here in Kenilworth Road. Chris Nicholl and Don Givens scoring our goals, after losing 2-4 at Burnden Park on the opening day of the season.


