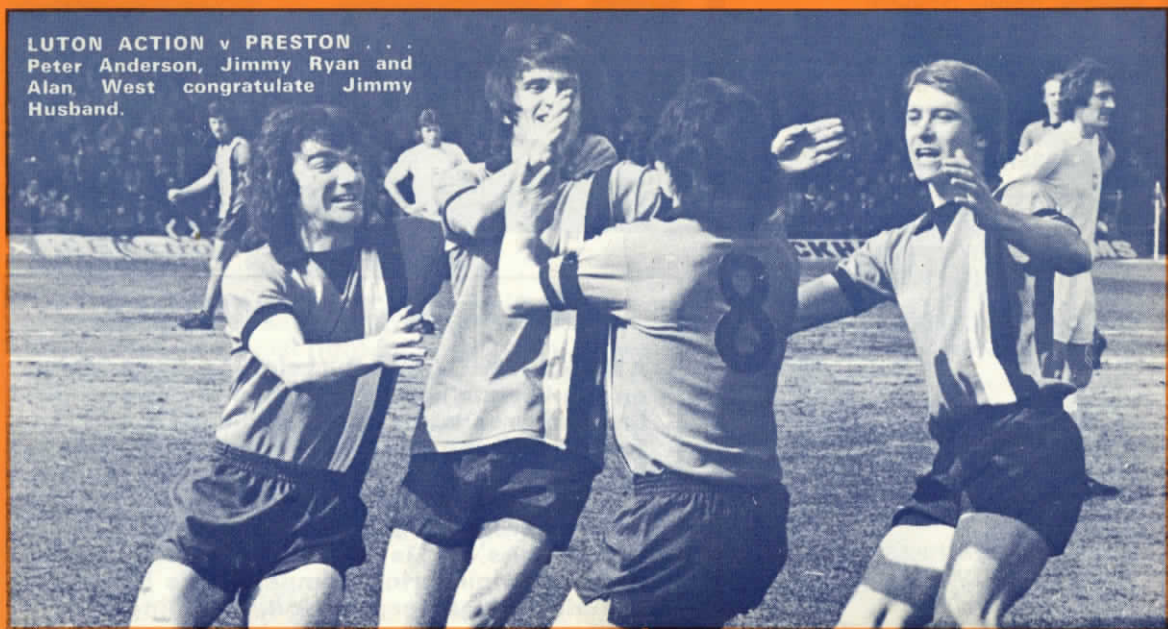

HARRY'S TOWN

The holiday period has made it necessary for me to compile this column before the start of perhaps the most crucial Easter programme for the club since they were last promoted to the First Division at the end of the 1954-55 season.

We had successive away trips on Friday and Saturday, the first to Oxford, to whom we play hosts today, and then at Sheffield Wednesday in a 48-hour period where the points involved were invaluable.

Unlike us all reading these notes now, I had no idea of the outcome of the two matches when writing, but what I did appreciate was that we realised that both Oxford United and Sheffield Wednesday would be fighting just as hard—but for entirely different reasons.

Our situation demanded the points just as much as the opposition, and the fact that we are at opposite ends of the table, with over 15 clubs between us, could not be considered a measure or guide to our chances of beating them.

The Second Division is the most cramped affair I can ever remember it being, a 'sardine' situation outside of Middlesbrough for most of the time.

I was pleased at the way the lads reacted to a half-time chat against Preston North End and then went out to beat them 4-2 to establish that three-point gap to the team below us. Some effective work up front had been nullified by a certain 'looseness' in defence, resulting in expensive slips which cost us goals. I knew that we hadn't really put our game together in the first-half, and if we could show a fundamental improvement, we would win.

The general improvement came, cutting down the possibilities for Preston, and it was good to see the players up front responding by shooting more often.

As we are essentially an attacking side, it is not unthinkable that we should concede goals, however tight and responsible the defence might be. It might be nice to think that we could switch from our natural approach and outlook and swing into a defensive pat-

tern for the remainder of the season, chipping out odd points to guarantee our objective. But after dictating a style and method of play into a squad for nearly two years, it cannot be policy to try and alter it—only as I see it improve and better the quality of the production we have persevered with.

I have always maintained that it's the only kind of presentation the public want and if we achieve what we set out to do this season, I shall consider there's none better. I have set no rigid point-collecting finish to the season, our final tally is a wide open figure—but it would be nice to end our campaign as we started this year.

If my arithmetic is right, Luton will certainly be in the First Division once they touch 54 points. I was hopeful before Easter, when we had six games left, that we could take nine points from them to get us to the guaranteed figure. We have matched such a spell before, when we started a six-match run on 12th January against Portsmouth and had nine points from it when beating Swindon Town 2-0 on 26th February.

But if the Second Division continues right to the end of the season in the way it's gone for most of the term, with about ten potential candidates taking a step forward and then two back, Luton could have a lot to celebrate sooner because 51 points might well be enough.

But there is no way of convincing us that we have reached our goal until it's certain. It's certain that there are no chickens being counted at Kenilworth Road. All I hope is by now the position is clearer, and that after today's second game in five days against Oxford United we are nearer to the prize we have all worked so hard to grasp.

Peter Cruse

TOWN FOCUS

One thing we quickly discovered when catching up Peter Cruse—he's not the superstitious type. Granted, like the majority of us, he thinks twice before taking a chance under a ladder. But it ends right there.

And that's just as well, otherwise Peter may never have made this season the success it's been—but the converted, may argue that it would have been better for him if he had dodged an injury which hit him six weeks ago and is now only just clearing up.

Checking on Peter's record with him, it transpired that after making his breakthrough to the League side, on the opening day of the season, against Nottingham Forest, the name Cruse has been number 12 and substitute for . . . 13 matches.

But that's a number which hasn't worried Peter and his parents since they moved into Regents Park, London, at . . . number 13, just, as you might guess, 13 years ago. It needs ice-cool nerve and split second timing to make goals out of 'nothing' situations, and when you have 18 to your credit, the only 'number' on your mind, is the next one in the goals race. "I couldn't care less about superstitions, the only thing I'm interested in, is a regular first-team place. It's been difficult this season because the boss has got a winning formula which has put us bang in line for the First Division.

"When I got in at the start of the season there was no happier man in the rest of the four Leagues. But it brought the biggest football disappointment in my life when Luton were beaten 4-0—but perhaps it

proved a blessing in disguise for the club."

On the face of it, it cannot be considered to have accelerated the progress of this England Amateur international, who has tasted Luton's League Two demands since, without without being able to really sink his teeth in to a spot.

Part of Peter's special conditioning for that place involved a planned month's term with Shrewsbury Town. But Peter was only on loan for two of the scheduled four Saturday's, when he crashed into big Jim Furnell, the veteran Plymouth Argyle goalkeeper, who was also once an Arsenal player, and that was the end of the loan and Peter's playing days until last week.

"I tore the ligaments in my ankle and it's been a slow and tedious trail back. It's involved hours of treatment with 'physio' Reg Game and at first, when I thought I was ready, the ankle used to blow up every time I put it to the test."

Peter was hoping there would be no reaction to his first competitive action when turning out last week, the first step, he trusts, on the way back to a first-team place.

After 18 months at Arsenal, its rather inevitable that some of the call of glory and glamour will rub off and add drive to players ambition of enjoying it before its too late. "I began this season in the senior side—and if I'm lucky, that's where I'll finish."

"I don't think the promotion issue will be clinched for anyone, except, of course, Middlesbrough, so the final fixture this month could be the crucial one. I'm not superstitious, but if anyone told me to carry a rabbit's foot between now and the end of the

season, and I'll enjoy a hat-trick in that last game—Davey Crockett would look like a well dressed politician!"

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What went wrong? That was the question still bugging Oxford United as a season which started with promotion hopes eight months ago became a tense battle for survival in the three-match Easter programme. The original optimism stemmed from last term, which was their best since being up-graded from the Southern League 12 years ago. Gerry Summers, an astute manager from the younger 'track-suit, school, took them into eighth place and felt that he had reasonable grounds to believe in a further improvement throughout this campaign. It was not to be. Oxford scraped together only two points from the first five matches setting a pattern of struggle for the long winter months—and Mr Summers soon realised that he had problems in what was always recognised to be the strongest part of his team. The 'Iron Curtain' defence lost its 'super security' appearance, especially in a 5-0 defeat by Cardiff City, and the Oxford chief was reported to be unhappy with the number of bad goals conceded. Victories over the two Nottingham clubs were the only positive results they had to show with a quarter of the season gone and it was decided that the time had come for changes.

Colin Clarke, a good signing from Arsenal's reserves when Oxford climbed into the Third Division in 1965, was dropped from the centre-half position and handed over the captaincy to Welsh international Dave Roberts, himself a product of London reserve football with Fulham. Nick Lowe, a local youngster who had played for amateur stars Oxford City, had an eight-game spell in the number five spot and Jimmy Light, another Oxford-born apprentice discovery, came in at right-back in place of the experienced Dick Lucas. But problems bugged Oxford's hopes right through to Christmas, which arrived with United deeply in the relegation zone after recording just four wins—including one away success at Sheffield Wednesday in November. It was then that things started to swing their way for the first time. Graham Atkinson, a survivor from the

INTRODUCING OXFORD

Southern League days and younger brother of former skipper Ron, announced his return to the first-team after a long injury battle by scoring twice in the 5-0 trouncing of Bristol City on Boxing Day. Then he scored one of the goals which beat his first club, Aston Villa, on 29th December. Hard-earned away points at Nottingham Forest and Sunderland, plus a home draw against Hull City, then stretched Oxford into a promising unbeaten run of five games. "I though we had got on the right lines then," said Mr Summers, but he

knew that relegation worries would be with him for the rest of the season when United suddenly lurched into three successive defeats. However, a 1-1 home draw against doomed Swindon Town knocked Oxford back into the trouble zone and was followed by defeats at Middlesbrough and at home to Bolton Wanderers. The latter game was especially disappointing to Mr Summers, who was driven to criticise members of his team. He said in a subsequent programme article: "I could have forgiven our

supporters for feeling, during the opening half, that apart from Colin Clarke, Dave Roberts and John Shuker, our players didn't look too interested. This is something I have never said about my players before." It appeared that the hard-hitting words had worked a week later when they met fellow-strugglers Sheffield Wednesday in a 'make or break' game at The Manor Ground. Hugh Curran, the former Scotland and Wolves striker, once more underlined the value of his club record transfer by scoring the single goal which dragged Wednesday back into the fight to escape the Third Division. Now Oxford are geared for maximum effort to make amends for a season which has brought so much disappointment on the field and financial worries from poor attendances. They went out of the League and F.A. Cups at the first stage and

even the gate of 13,435 against Manchester City was not the pay-day envisaged before the three-day week hit soccer gates. Because of this experience United wanted to be Sunday pioneers, but they were constantly refused by opponents and had to soldier along. The good points of the season include above-average consistency from such players as home-produced goalkeeper Roy Burton and Dave Roberts. John Shuker, a long-serving defender who has also appeared in most other positions, has held down the left-back spot with authority, while Colin Clarke came back from the reserves in his old-style form. Hugh Curran and ex-Wolves teammate Derek Clarke have shared the main striking roles with support from Keith Gough, a free transfer capture from Walsall last season, Geoff Bray, another 'free' signing from Gillingham, and Ken Skeen, a lengthy servant who was formerly with Swindon Town. Among the midfield contenders, Oxford have used John Fleming, a Nottingham man who was signed four years ago, Steve Aylott, once a deputy for Bobby Moore at West Ham United, and Billy Jeffrey, a young Scot who made his debut while still 16 earlier in the season.

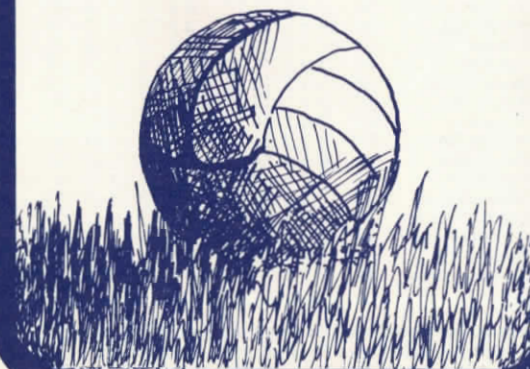
