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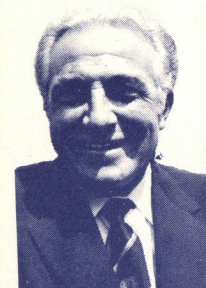
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HARRYS TOWN



We went to Leeds last week and won a point. I was very impressed with the way the lads played. They gave just as good as they got. It is good to see them learning new things every week.

And I was ever so impressed with the facilities at Leeds. I kept trying to imagine that sort of set-up at Luton. If we are to become a big club we must get down to it. Remember, Leeds were once a little club.

Look at it this way, if Leeds had to play in our set-up, would they have won all those awards? I don't think so. Just what can we do about it?

It's clear to me that we have to build. That's not fantasy, it's fact. Offer a man in a mini a Rolls Royce and he'll jump into it. And the first time he goes out in it he'll notice that the man in the street who only looked at him before will wave.

It has to be our aim to build Luton. I'd love to see big stands and the sort of facilities Leeds have. We will never get it by fighting it on our own. It's got to be a team effort—then I think it can be done. But it's going to need everyone's total effort—the player's, mine, the directors and the fans. Once we are all pulling in the same direction I think we can start going places.

I think we are starting to find our feet. Nobody gave us a cat in hell's chance of getting a point at Leeds. Yet we came home with one. I honestly think we were better as a team than Leeds were at times.

But we didn't get a lot of credit for our display in the national press. You would have thought there was only one team out there at Elland Road. They can't seem to accept that Leeds can be beaten or held to a draw.

Whatever the papers said, I know how well Luton played.

And I think we are going to grow, and grow and grow. I can see players improving all the time. We really played as a team at Leeds.

Although we are not scoring many goals, we are not letting many in. Remember it's much harder to score in the First Division than in any other. Marking is tighter, thinking quicker. It'll take time, but I'm sure it will come.

Our fans will have noticed that we have changed our game quite a bit since last season. We have cut out the long ball and prefer to play it upfield, keeping possession. For possession is what the First Division is all about.

And since Allan Garner was injured and out of the first team we have lost our long throw expert. So we are playing it different. You have to be adaptable.

The team is still learning, but after a couple of months we won't have to tell them things. The big thing I have to do between now and the end of the season is to build them for next season while making sure we stay in the First Division. You could call this a season of consolidation.

So just keep thinking of those big stands and posh facilities. If we all work at it, we can have them at Luton one day.

Two news items this week have given me great pleasure. The first is that Andy King and Paul Fletcher have been selected to take part in the England Youth trials at Lilleshall during the latter part of this month. I would like to offer the lads my congratulations and I am sure they will rise to the occasion admirably. The second item again calls for my congratulations this time it's Peter Burrows our club doctor whom the F.A. have appointed team doctor to the England Under-23 side. Well done Doc we all agree here, you thoroughly deserve this honour.

A special welcome to Bobby Robson, manager of Ipswich today from myself and Roy McCrohan for this is one day we have looked forward to. It is a nice feeling to get together in Division One for the last time we were together was at the Labour Exchange.

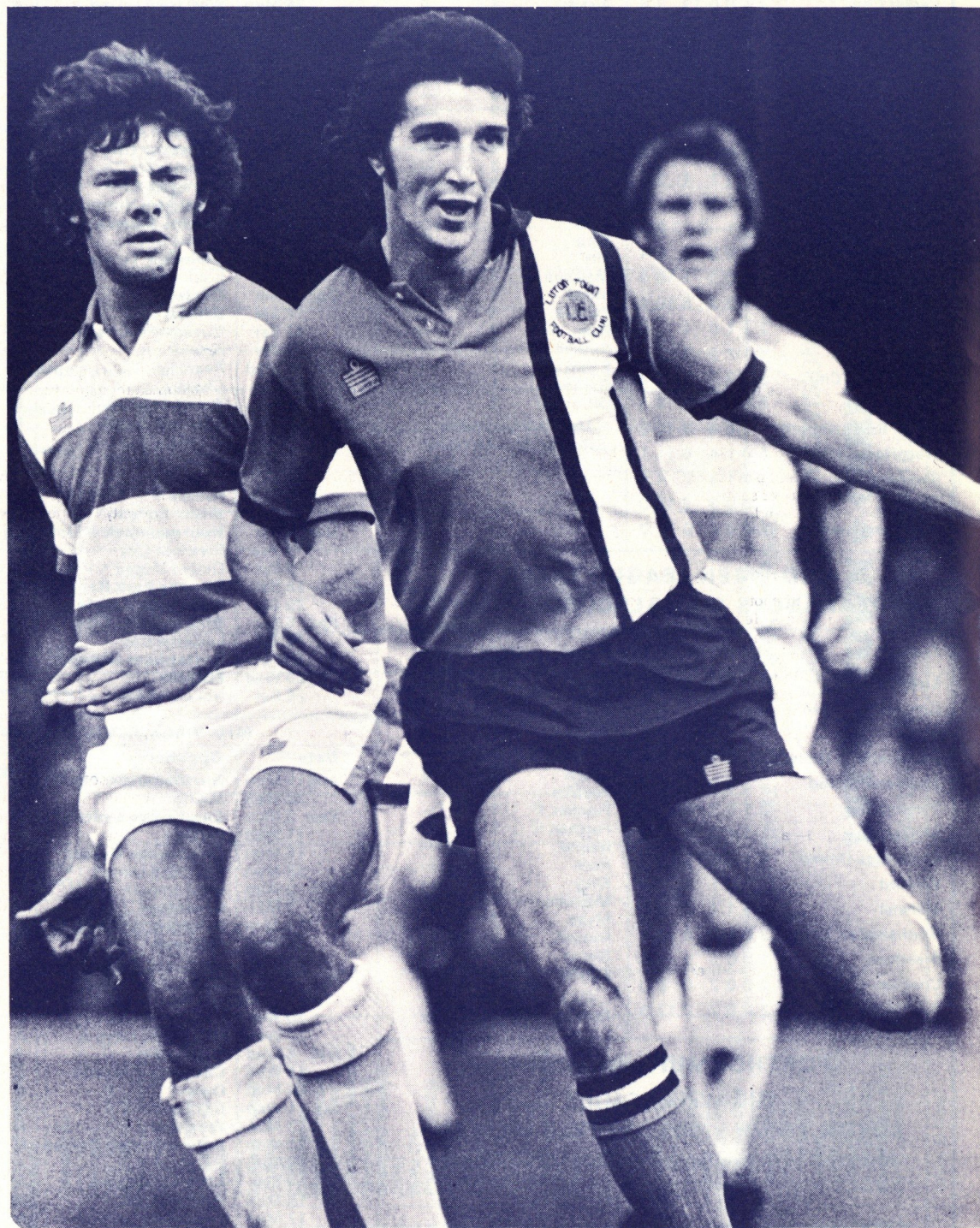

Adrian, for what reasons did you decide to emigrate to Australia in the first place?

I was a Junior with Preston North End, working for an egg-packing firm, playing as an amateur in the A and B Teams without much prospect of furthering my ambitions. I had eight or ten games with Fleetwood when Jim Kelly asked me if I was interested in trying my luck in Australia. I was eighteen years old at the time and I thought that I would give it a go. My first club out in Australia was South Coast United, then, after two years, I was transferred to a Sydney Club. Eventually, I returned to my original Club which had then changed its name. By this time, I had decided that I liked it in Australia. My fiancée came out to join me and we became married.

As a Member of the Australian National Team, where did your travels take you?

Almost everywhere. I played for Australia for five of the six years I was out there. I have practically been around the world twice. Let me think of some of the countries... Indonesia, Japan, Korea, Mexico, Turkey, Iran, Hong Kong, Singapore, Vietnam, New Zealand, Germany, Switzerland—and the British Isles, of course. It was a great opportunity for me, and gave me the chance to develop as a player.

What sort of experience was it for you to play in the world Cup Finals in West Germany this summer?

Fantastic. I learned a lot, playing against sides like West Germany, the eventual champions, and East Germany. The game in Australia is more defensively-minded—a lot of players in mid-field. In club football, I had always played a sort of attacking-midfield role, although for the National side I was a centre-forward. In Germany we came across different styles and techniques. The game was much faster—the West Germans could change the pace of the game when they felt like it... a ten minute spell flat out, then slow it down. I suppose some people would regard the preparation and discipline of the Australian Team as pretty tough, but I enjoyed it. I like that approach.

It was reported that you were going to join a German Team after the World Cup. How close were you, in fact, to doing this?

Very close. I had already signed a Contract with Hertha of Berlin, but this only covered the financial side of the deal, confirming that I could not ask for any more money than had been agreed and that they could not pay me any less than agreed, but the Clubs had still to sort out their side of the transfer so in no way was it final. There were three German Clubs interested—a Berlin Club, Eintracht Frankfurt and a Hamburg Club. I heard also that Malcolm Allison and Bobby Charlton were making enquires. It wasn't until I was back in Australia that I had the phone call from Harry Haslam, fixed up, as you probably know, by Don Shanks recommendation. I had heard that Luton had shown some interest in me when I played at Kenilworth Road in 1970 and scored the winning goal against them. I remember Malcolm MacDonald, Don Givens and Chris Nicholl playing that day. However, if Harry Haslam had not asked me to sign for Luton I would certainly have gone to Germany.

Do you think that you will ever go back to Australia?

I doubt it. I enjoyed it there as did my wife, Doreen, but I feel that I want to settle in England now.

How have you found life in the First Division so far, having played two full games?

It is a lot faster than Australian football, of course. Probably about the same as the World Cup. However, full-time training is going to make a lot of difference to me. The lads here have been marvellous helping me to settle in, but I feel that I can do a lot better than I have shown so far.

How much do you think your attitude has changed since your early days at Preston?

Well a lot has happened since then. At Preston I was on the fringes, not getting very far with a lot of players competing for very few places. In Australia I was able to develop, but I was still on the field with the idea of enjoying myself. Now that I am a Professional footballer I must think like one—not like a Sydney Car Salesman who plays football in his spare time—but that suits me. I have always wanted to give my whole life to the game and now I can.

It has been openly admitted on several occasions that there is only one road to success—work, method, discipline.

These three ingredients, plus an added one of fitness, make up the formula used so effectively by our East Anglian visitors today, Ipswich Town, who are managed by former West Bromwich Albion, Fulham and England half-back, Bobby Robson.

Ipswich have been tipped by quite a number of leading soccer writers up and down the country to be bang there among the honours this season, and from what we've heard of their displays already, the forecasters could be so right. The Portman Road club have probably packed more excitement and entertainment into their 28 seasons of League soccer than some original members have managed in almost three times that period. In fact, the success of the club is truly a modern footballing fairy tale.

Until 1936, when they became a professional organisation and gained entry into the Southern League, very few people outside the Eastern Counties had heard of Ipswich Town, although it had, in amateur circles, been of extremely high standing since its formation in 1880.

The club's 8,000 strong Supporters' Association raised some £13,000 towards the expense of modernising the Portman Road ground, which today can house 36,000 fans, although the record, set up v Arsenal in a First Division match in March, 1973, is 34,636. And then, in 1938, Ipswich were elected to Division Three (South) in place of Gillingham.

Excluding the war, nine seasons were spent in that section, and they finished 7th, 5th, 4th and 7th again in four of them. A slump then set in, but in 1953-54 they leap-frogged from 16th to 1st place and won promotion to Division Two, only to have the hard disappointment of being relegated within 12 months.

However, the team had learnt an awful lot in that short time, and under the shrewd guidance of Chairman, Mr John Cobbold, and manager Alf Ramsey, Ipswich were soon back, greeting the 'Sixties by becoming Second Division Champions. Then only a year later they astounded the entire footballing community by capturing the Division One title at their first attempt, in what was only their 17th season in League competition—a marvellous record.

At the same time they became only the second club who had commenced their career in the Third Division to do it (Portsmouth) being the other. They became only the fourth team ever to win the Second and First Division titles in successive seasons, joining the elite of Everton, Liverpool and Tottenham Hotspur in this field. And they also equalled Wolves' record in taking the Championships of our top three Divisions.

Sadly though the joy of premier League status was short-lived, and Ipswich went back down a rung after three seasons.

Bill McGarry, the present boss at Wolverhampton, had by now assumed command of the team (June, 1964), having taken over from 'Wor' Jackie Milburn who himself had earlier replaced Ramsey in 1963 when the ex-Spurs and Southampton full-back was given the England job. And in 1967-68 Ipswich yet again bounced courageously back into the top flight.

They've stayed there ever since, playing the 'cream' as one says, and there is surely no doubt that this season the 'Blues' will be going flat out in an effort to bring further glory to the town of Ipswich.

In their line-up this afternoon, Ipswich are likely to include eight 'home bred' players—men who've come up through their nursery team. And they have in goal, 5' 8" Laurie Sivell, perhaps the smallest goalkeeper in Division One, England Under-23 cap Kevin Beattie, a virtual certainty for the 1978 World Cup; winger Mick Lambert, one of the fastest 'line' players in the game, and ace-striker Trevor Whymark, another England Under-23 star. Of the Players recruited to Portman Road there is centre-back, Alan Hunter, the former Blackburn Rovers and Oldham Athletic pivot who is the current Northern Ireland number five; skipper Mick Mills, who joined Town in 1965 when Portsmouth did away with their youth policy, and centre-forward David Johnston, an expensive buy from Everton, who forms a splendid twin-striking force with the promising Whymark.

In midfield there will be the South African, Colin Viljoen, Irish international Bryan Hamilton and the up and coming Brian Talbot, another local product.

Scot, George Burley will wear number two and the substitute role might well go to the skilful Norwich-born, Clive Woods.

These then are the men who form an outfit which plays good, smooth, attacking football—football of the highest quality, and football which must surely bring back the missing fans.

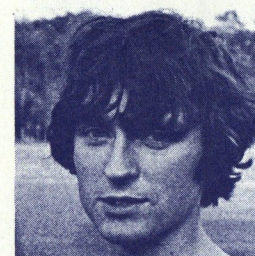
CHARTER TRAINS

After talks with *British Rail*, it has been decided to continue running the trains for an experimental period subject to the following conditions . . .

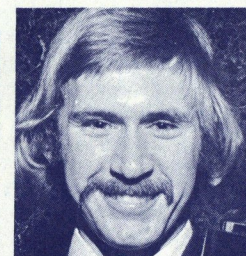
- 1—No tickets will be sold at the Station on the day of departure.

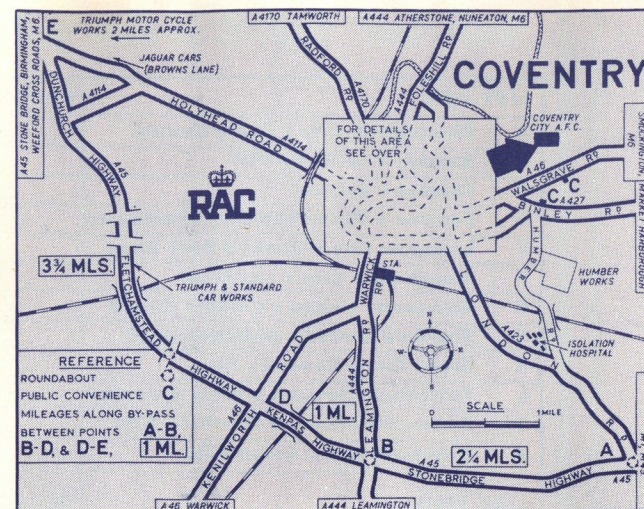
