

HALF-WAY OUT . . . OR IS IT HALF-WAY HOME?

HALF-WAY out . . . or half-way home. That, dependent upon which way you look at things, is the progress report, as we go into our 21st League game of the season. With up to a dozen clubs still rated in the title race, some people reckon 60 points too high a target now. But we'll have to wait and see.

A look back over the past two seasons shows some interesting facts and figures. In season 1972-73, after 19 games, we topped the table with 28 points, followed by Leeds (26), Arsenal (25), Spurs (22), Chelsea, Ipswich and Norwich (21 apiece).

After 20 games, we had 30 points; Arsenal had 27, Leeds 26, Spurs 23, Chelsea and Ipswich 22 apiece, and West Ham 21. And at the half-way stage, it was Liverpool 31, Arsenal 29, Leeds 28, Ipswich 26, Chelsea 24, Spurs and Derby 23 each. The gap was showing . . . and at the finishing post, it was Liverpool 60, Arsenal 57, Leeds 53.

Last season?—Apart from a brief challenge by Burnley, Leeds and Liverpool made it a two-horse race. After 19 games, Leeds had 32 points, we had 26, Burnley and Newcastle each had 24. Twenty games, and it was Leeds 34, Liverpool 27, Burnley 26, Everton and Southampton 23 apiece.

Twenty-one games?—Leeds had 36 points, Liverpool 29, Burnley 26 and Derby 24. And at the end, it was Leeds 62, Liverpool 57, Derby 48. And did you notice that Southampton and Norwich, each of them at one time highly placed during the past two seasons, finished up in Division 2?

That, perhaps demonstrates dramatically just what can happen in a season—or even half a season. The F.A. Cup apart, we have four tough games ahead—Birmingham, Manchester City, Newcastle and Derby County . . . then Coventry, Arsenal, Ipswich, West Ham, and Everton.

Maybe, by then, we will be half-way home; but the finishing post may still not be visible until the last Saturday in April.

HARRY'S 'DEBUT' AT ANFIELD



MEET the man who always seems to be able to keep on smiling . . . Luton Town manager Harry Haslam. Harry, like Liverpool's Bob Paisley, is in his first season as team boss of a First Division club, and—again like Bob—he's facing a challenge. But while Bob is striving to steer Liverpool to the title, Harry's aim is to take Luton clear of a return to Division 2.

Harry was a player with Manchester United and Gillingham, then he moved into non-League management with Barry Town and Merthyr Tydvil. Next, he spent nine years as the manager of Tonbridge, then joined the scouting staff at Fulham.

He joined Luton in a similar capacity, and when Alec Stock resigned as manager, Harry was offered the

job. That was just over two years ago . . . in which time he has seen Luton climb out of the Second Division, and now, like Harry, they're making their "debut" at Anfield.

When the wages were 25p . . . and the players wore caps on the field

IN THESE days of massive transfer fees and substantial rewards for playing success, it is worth recalling that Luton Town, our visitors this afternoon, became the first southern club to pay wages—5s. (25p) . . . and this to only the three best players. That was in 1890.


When the season ended, it was decided to pay every player 2s. 6d. (12½p) plus 6d. (2½p) for away games, and an allowance for working time lost. And, as Luton's funds and prestige grew, so the wages were doubled, and further increased.

In those early days, also, Luton's team attire was colourful, indeed: the players first wore navy-blue and pink halved shirts, with caps to match—an edict being that caps must be worn on the field. Soon, the caps were cast aside and the colours changed to "cochineal" for Luton's entry into League football.

Luton greeted the new century with sky-blue shirts and white shorts, then switched in 1920 to white shirts and black shorts. And in their promotion season of 1973-74, Luton changed again—to orange shirts with navy and white vertical stripes down the left-hand side, navy shorts and orange stockings.

But, whatever the colour of their strip, Luton have never changed their nickname—which is, of course, The Hatters.

THIS IS LUTON TOWN

LUTON TOWN come to Anfield in search of their first victory away from home this season—in fact, they are the only First Division club without a win on tour, and their meagre total of points underlines the fight they face to retain their top-flight status.

Luton have put a brave face on things, though, despite predictions that they are the team in most danger of relegation, and they have courageously proclaimed their belief that they can climb away from trouble, with half the season still to run.

They gained promotion as Second Division runners-up, with 50 points, and they have done a fair amount of speculating in the transfer market, in recent seasons, although the total cost of the signings has barely exceeded the £330,000 reputed to have been paid by Stoke for Peter Shilton.

At the same time, Luton have spent £100,000, or close to it, on several players, and only last month they turned to Liverpool and signed forward **Peter Spiring**, who had joined us some 18 months ago. Peter says he's looking forward to playing against his old club.

In goal Luton, are likely to have

WHO THEY ARE...

★ **LUTON** were elected to the Second Division when it was five years old, taking the place of Bolton in 1897—but the turn of the century spelled their exit in favour of Blackpool, and they had a long association with the Southern League before becoming a League club again in 1920. Since then, they have sampled the ups and downs of all four divisions, and their post-war story has been one of joy and disappointment.

HATTERS FACE RETAIN THEIR

Keith Barber, who played most of last season in the Combination side, when **Graham Horn**, a former England youth international from Arsenal, became one of the youngest 'keepers to play in First Division football, at the age of 19. Horn, who cost a reported £25,000, played 44 first-team games last term; this time, Barber, who has played more than 100 senior games, has been the man mainly in possession.

Another player who was with Arsenal—and Fulham—is full-back **John Ryan**, who made 34 first-team appearances last season, while left-back and skipper **Bobby Thomson** was rated the greatest free-transfer capture for a long time, when he joined Luton from Birmingham. Thomson, an ever-present last season, has been capped by England.

At centre-half, Luton have **John Faulkner**, a bargain buy from Leeds at around £6,500. Faulkner, who

How they began... What they've won

★ **IN 1955**, after 11 seasons in Division 2, Luton gained promotion—goal average decided the first three places—by finishing second. Four years later, Luton went to the F.A. Cup final, after beating Leeds, Leicester, Ipswich, Blackpool and Norwich. But they lost the final against Nottingham Forest... and 12 months later, were relegated, sliding to Divisions 3 and 4.

★ **LUTON** made the long haul back in season 1967-68, equalling the record of 66 points for the division, regained Second Division status in 1969-70 season, as runners-up, and—again as runners-up—became a First Division club last spring. A long journey, indeed, since the days of 1885, when Luton were formed by the amalgamation of the local Wanderers and a team named Excelsior.

A BATTLE TO TOP STATUS

hit the headlines when he played in the F.A. Cup for Sutton United against Leeds—that game led to his signing by the Elland-road club—was plagued by a knee injury for a long spell, but he is now firmly established at top-class level.

An ever-present last season was midfielder man **Alan Garner**, signed on a free from Millwall, and another midfielder player, **Peter Anderson**, who was an amateur with Hendon, has made a reputation for himself as a marksman—he scored 14 goals, and was voted Luton's Player of the Year.

John Ryan is at full-back... **Jimmy Ryan** is a forward, and he joined Luton from Manchester United, where he graduated to first-team football along with George Best. Jimmy scored 10 goals last season.

Another Jimmy is well-known to Liverpool fans, from Merseyside

derby games—**Jimmy Husband**, transferred from Everton to Luton last season for close on £100,000, and he also scored 10 goals for The Hatters, including two hat-tricks.

Lancashire provided Luton with two or more players from the top flight—former Manchester United winger **John Aston**, who made his name with a great display in the 1968 European Cup final, and **Alan West**, signed for around £70,000 from Burnley in October of last year. West, an England Under-23 international, became an ever-present with Luton, while Aston, who scored eight goals, missed only four games through the season.

Equally at home as a forward or in midfield is **Gordon Hindson**, signed from Newcastle in 1971, and an established member of the first-team squad, though his main role last term was as substitute. And another player from the north-east is **Brian Chambers**, who arrived as a close-season signing from Arsenal, after a spell with Sunderland.

And from Chester, Luton signed the Futcher twins, defender **Paul Futcher** and **Ron**, a forward,

Tetley Bittermen. You can't beat 'em.







RAY CLEMENCE MAINTAINS A TRADITION

TOMMY LAWRENCE was seldom absent, during his reign as Liverpool's first-team goalkeeper during the 1960's; and his successor, Ray Clemence, is maintaining the tradition. The game against Derby County at Anfield was his 200th in the League for Liverpool.

Liverpool's last line of defence—and he's currently the No. 1 choice for England, don't forget, too—has now totalled 284 games for us, and 334 in his career.

Furthermore, he has made a habit of being an ever-present, virtually season by season, since he broke through to first-team football. He played 42 League games for Liverpool in season 1971-72, along with Chris Lawler and Emlyn Hughes, and—like them—appeared in 10 other matches.

In season 1972-73, when we won the League championship and the U.E.F.A. Cup, Ray played 41 League games and 22 other other matches. That season, the ever-presents were Chris Lawler, Ian Callaghan and Larry Lloyd—and remember, Liverpool equalled a record set up by Leeds and Tottenham, by playing 66 competitive matches altogether.

Last season, when Liverpool called upon 21 players, five of them were ever-presents in League games. They were Emlyn Hughes, Peter Cormack, Kevin Keegan, Ian Callaghan and . . . Ray Clemence.

That was a season in which Liverpool played 61 competitive games, and four players—Ray, Emlyn, Ian and Kevin—did not miss a single game in Europe, the League Cup or the F.A. Cup, as well as in the League.

This season, Ray has been an ever-



present again, so far, which means 20 League matches and eight other games, taking in European and League Cup-ties. Matching him in this respect are Tommy Smith and Emlyn Hughes.

Tommy Smith needs only 11 more matches to take his total of League appearances for Liverpool to 400—he's well past the 500 mark overall—and 11 more games will see Peter Cormack hit the century mark for League games with us.

Well before the end of this season, all being well, Emlyn Hughes will have played 450 games for Liverpool, and Kevin Keegan will have topped the 200 mark, while Steve Heighway needs 11 more matches to total 250 games.

Now that Phil Thompson is back in action, too, after his cartilage operation, he's within striking distance of a landmark—for he's only 16 games short of 100 appearances.

And although Ray Kennedy is a comparative newcomer to our ranks, 14 more games will give him a career total of 250 appearances in first-class football.

When it comes to goals, by the way, Chris Lawler and Ian Callaghan have scored 61 apiece which makes them leading marksmen for us—but Kevin Keegan's 55 goals for Liverpool (he's scored 77 in his career) show that he's heading for the title of top scorer. And it's a race between Emlyn Hughes and Tommy Smith as to who hits the 50 mark first—Emlyn has 44 goals, Tommy 45.

THEY'RE SLOGGING IT OUT IN THE CENTRAL LEAGUE, TOO

THE battle for the championship of the Central League is becoming as fierce as the contest for the First Division title—and, by an odd coincidence, five or six of the contenders are the same clubs as those involved in the bid to capture the First Division prize.

Liverpool—of course!—are going strongly for a repeat of their finish to last season; and slogging it out with them are clubs such as Manchester City, Derby County, Newcastle United, Everton and Stoke City.

With the season coming up to the half-way mark, Manchester City and Derby took the lead over Liverpool, West Brom. and Aston Villa—a single point separated them, though City had played a game more than Villa, Derby and ourselves, and two matches more than West Brom.

Four points behind City were Coventry, while Newcastle had a five point gap to bridge, with Everton and Wolves then on the 21 point mark, though having games in hand.

But all these challengers must be keeping a wary eye on Stoke City, for just as Stoke's seniors inched their way to the top of the First Division table on the last day of November, so City's reserves are still threatening to come from behind and make a takeover bid for the leadership.

Stoke slipped a bit, with a draw last week, but they have games in hand. Manchester City took their points tally to 29, after 21 games, with Derby also on 29, after 20 games. Then came Liverpool (28-20

games), West Brom (27-19), Aston Villa (26-20), Coventry (25-20), Everton and Newcastle (23-19), Wolves (21-20) and Stoke (19-17).

Liverpool have maintained their challenge, despite the fact that more than two dozen players have been used in reserve matches during the first half of the season.

This has been for a variety of reasons, of course—there have been transfers in and out, players have been given outings to regain form or fitness, after service with the first team, and so on.

Some players, such as Ray Kennedy, Phil Thompson and Peter Cormack, for example, have had but a handful of games in the reserves, and for them, it has been a break from First Division duty.

Half a dozen or so players such as Brian Kettle, Kevin Kewley, Alan Waddle, Tommy Tynan, Jimmy Case and John McLaughlin—have played well over a dozen matches, and formed the backbone of the side, generally speaking.

But although the changes have been rung, the goals have been coming, without too many being conceded, and the reserves have shown their mettle when under pressure—against Manchester United, for instance, they fought back in the last six minutes to turn a 2-1 deficit into a 4-2 victory. And at the half-way mark, there is plenty of reason for optimism that 1975 will see Liverpool reserves bringing yet another Central League championship to Anfield.



IT'S A 99-mile drive to Birmingham, for the game at St. Andrew's next Saturday, if you're going via the A580 (East Lincs Road) and the M6 (intersection 23 at Haydock—18 miles). Then southbound on the M6 to intersection 6 (following Birmingham North signs at M6/M5 junction), junction with A38(M) Aston Expressway to Birmingham.

WIRRAL supporters take the M53/A41/A5117 to Hapsford junction M56 (mileages start at Hapsford), and M56 to Preston Brook junction A56 (nine miles), A56 to Daresbury junction B5356 (10 miles), then B5356 via Stretton and Appleton to High Legh junction M6 (16 miles). After that it's the M6 southbound route, as above, making a total of 79 miles.



Leave M6 at Expressway (A38(M)) and continue with Expressway to first exit (Dartmouth Circus), turning left into Dartmouth Street and straight on into Lawley Street. At end of Lawley Street continue ahead into Watery Lane, and at the end turn left into Coventry Road (A45), forking left into Cattell Road (A47). The ground is on the left.
