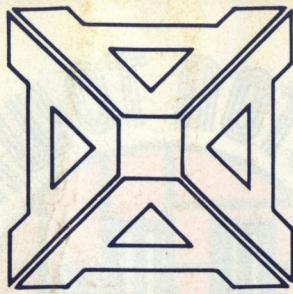

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# HARRY'S TOWN



What a great Christmas the lads gave me—or perhaps I should say gave us all. I have been praying for that little bit of luck since things started going sour for us back in the early autumn, and it came at long last in the match against Derby just before the festivities started. With only about ten minutes to go Colin Todd tripped Peter Spiring and the referee gave us a penalty. I could hardly believe it. We have had so many turned down that we should have been given. Some people suggested that Peter had taken a dive. He collected a fractured toe in the tackle, and you don't get those by tripping over the line.

Then we went to Ipswich, fought like blazes to contain the top club. In injury time we won a corner. Over it came and there was Ronnie Fletcher to head it in.

Then the lad goes and thumps in a hat-trick against Wolves. Things are looking up. I had a few nasty letters when I forked out that big fee for the Fletcher twins. People said I was mad paying £125,000 for a couple of Fourth Division players—one of them a reserve. It's easy to be wise after the event, but I knew I was right. The worst thing was that I had to bring them on slowly. If I had chucked them into the first-team too soon they could have come out of it badly. Some young players never get over the shattering experience of being expected to perform at your best when you are not ready for it. I played my cards close to my chest. When we were losing week after week I had to ignore the wrath of the fans who shouted for the Fletcher lads to be put in.

On reflection I think we did it just about right. Coach Roy McCrohan had brought them on well, and when Paul made his debut at Chelsea he fitted in superbly. Three weeks later Ronnie was ready. I think he proved that to everyone against the Wolves.

But don't let us get carried away. There is still

a long way to go. I would dearly love us to beat Chelsea today. We have a point to make to them. At Stamford Bridge I thought we should have won, but we missed a couple of easy-looking chances and paid for our mistakes by losing. I want to put that right today.

It's a funny old life. Just when things start to look as if they are bucking up, they go wrong in another way. On Christmas Eve I moved quickly to catch a friend who stumbled on the stairs—and whack—my cartilage went.

It's an old footballer's injury I know, but my playing days are long over, and so I hope I don't have to have an operation. The club doctor has given me some exercises, and I'm working on it. But it isn't half sore. I think I'll have a bit more sympathy with players with the same trouble from now on.

Things never go wrong in ones. I got home from Ipswich on Boxing Day full of the joys of spring, only to find my 83-year-old mother had fallen down the stairs and broken a hip. If we are not careful we'll have the whole family in hospital. But you can't have everything, and I couldn't be more delighted with the way things are going on the field at the moment. Our revival has come about by sheer fighting spirit. The lads won't give in, and I am more than happy with the way Alan West is leading the side while Bobby Thomson is out.

It's not an easy thing to step into the captain's job half way through the season—especially when you are bottom of the table. It all adds to the pressures of the game.

Bobby, you will be pleased to know, is doing a marvellous job in the reserves where he is helping the younger players with the example of his experience and ability.

Just one last word—to the fans I'd like to say thanks for the support you gave the lads against Wolves. I am sure that the atmosphere you created helped them to win.

# FACE TO FACE

## Gerry Harrison of Anglia TV talks to Ron Futcher



### What were the circumstances behind your signing for Luton, Ron?

I was in Rhyl when I had a 'phone call from my dad telling me that I should come home immediately. When I arrived there it was to discover that I had been asked to go on tour with Luton to Majorca. I did so, and played a couple of games there. Then I signed in the June and both Paul and myself came down to Luton ready for the first day of pre-season training. We are now living in digs together. It is not true that I was signed simply to keep Paul company, although he did cost more than me. Neither of us care what people think about it; it's what Harry Haslam thinks that really counts. I don't go back home to Chester as much as Paul does. Mind you, he has a girlfriend up there which is his main reason for going back home. Anyway, I am quite happy down here.

### Why is it that if you and Paul are supposed to be identical twins, you are nearly a stone heavier than Paul?

Well, I don't really know the answer to that. I suppose it could be because I eat more than he does, but I have always been a bit heavier than Paul. It's funny because we are both very fussy about our food. Neither of us eat greens or foods like that. We do like steak, and chips too—plenty of those. I can't drink tea—only coffee, and when we go away with the team I can't stomach anything elaborate. I mean, if we are offered something like prawn cocktail I just can't eat it. Also, I can't eat very much before a game. The only food I can take just before a match is a couple of slices of toast with jam on.

### Ron, I suppose you will remember those first four goals—the one at Ipswich, the winner in fact, and the hat-trick against Wolves for a long time to come. As they say in television circles, talk us through those goals.

That one at Ipswich was rather strange really. From a corner I was standing just around the penalty spot. John Aston and Jimmy Husband were mucking around with the ball out on the wing for what seemed like ages to me. Then the cross came over and I went up for it, jumping just for the sake of jumping really because I couldn't even see the ball. The goal-keeper came for it, didn't get it and it was a bit of a surprise that it came out to me. I hit it and in it went. They couldn't catch me after that!

The hat-trick? For the first one I was on the penalty spot and our kid chipped the ball over Munroe's head to me. The second—I was on the far post for a great cross from John Aston and I couldn't help scoring from about six yards. The third—on the penalty spot again and a great little floater from Alan West. Nobody was marking me. You don't miss those, do you?

### You have collected your fair share of bookings since you have been at Luton. Has this always been one of your problems, Ron?

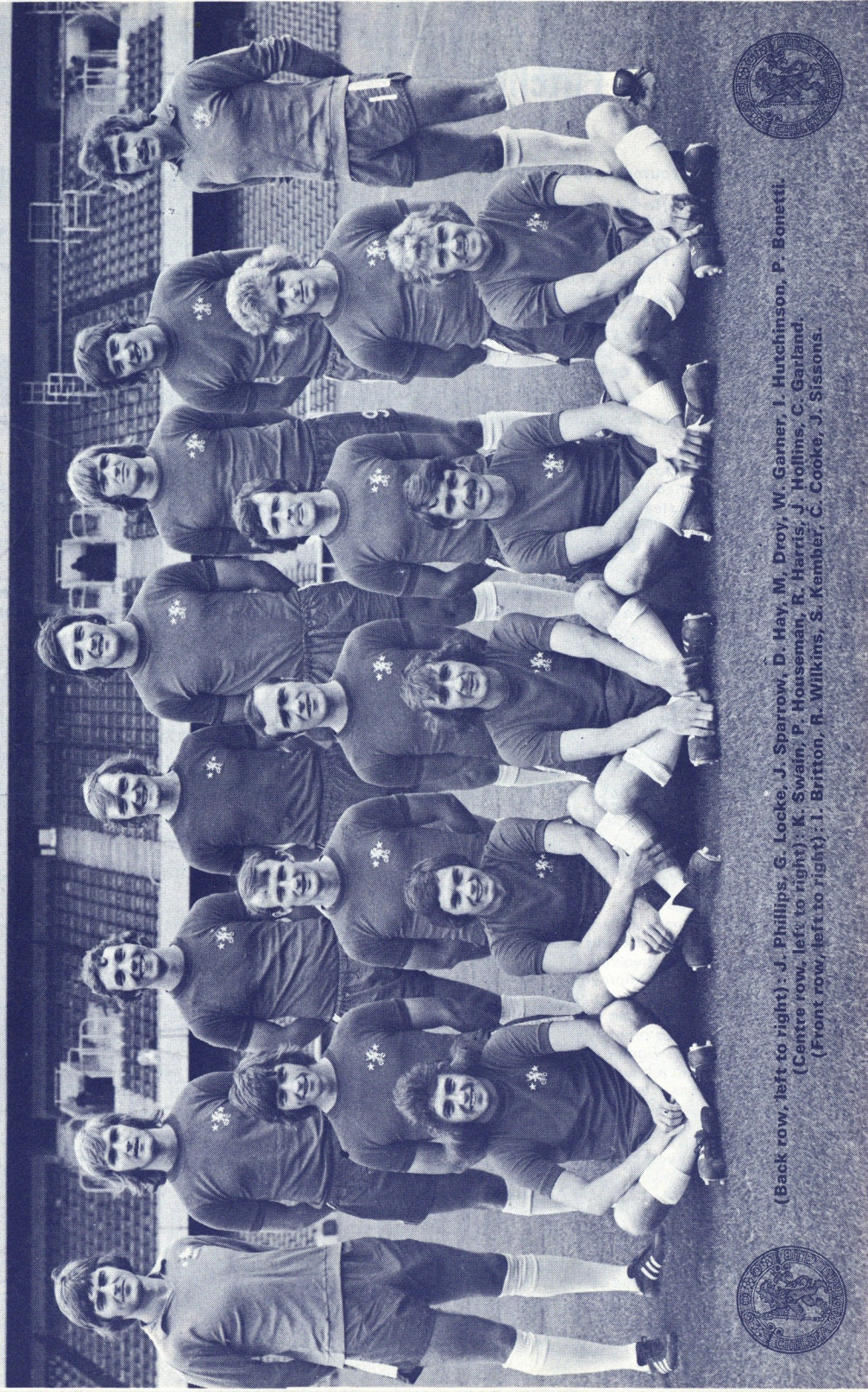
I am afraid it has. I have appealed against the one at Ipswich otherwise I should have started a suspension by now. It is something I have got to try and conquer. The Gaffer is always having little talks with me about it and I know he hates the Club's name being involved in anything like that. I am naturally aggressive but have got to keep myself in check more. I do feel that things are improving a bit. It was even worse at Chester. In my first season I was booked three times and sent off twice in the space of a week. The first time was daft. We were winning 3-0 and I had been doing these sliding tackles which the referee had warned me for, then sent me off. The next time it was for swinging at somebody, but in the next season I only had one booking and I thought I was getting over this problem. I have always had a bit of a temper and have found that I wanted to argue although I knew that when I did I lost concentration on my game. In the reserves at Luton I picked up a couple of bookings, but in the First Division I have found there is no time for me to argue or get involved in issues as there is too much to worry about in my game and, consequently, I have found that I can keep on the straight and narrow better, but the 'Gaffer' still wants to see an improvement.

### Well, Ron, you have come a long way since you signed for Luton. What do you think of your progress so far?

Not too badly really, but there is still a long way to go yet. I started off as substitute for the reserves but got in at the last minute. Then I had a great patch in the reserves when I was scoring plenty. There was talk then of possible promotion to the first-team but, unfortunately, it didn't come off. When I got into the side I was surprised, but injuries to other players made it easier for me, of course. But I know what the score is. If I am not scoring goals then I have no chance. However, the one thing that I do have on my side is that I am a lot younger than most of the other forwards which is obviously a great help. But I really am enjoying playing here at Luton. It is great that both Paul and I are together here playing in the first-team, with Paul playing so well particularly. After all, you can only be really happy if things are going well for you and, luckily, they are at the moment.

**It seems strange that Chelsea, despite the many famous players who have graced the club, have only ever won the First Division title once... and that was some 20 years ago, in season 1954-55, when they were preparing to celebrate their Golden Jubilee.**

When you think of names like Fred Rouse—Chelsea's first £1,000 transfer, Willie 'Fatty' Foulke—that huge and hefty goalkeeper, Ben Warren, Viv Woodward, Davie Copeland, George Hilsdon—who once scored six goals against Glossop in 1906, Jim Windridge, Jackie Kirwan, Andy Wilson, the flying Scot Alex Jackson, wee Hughie Gallacher, the four Tommys, Law, McDermott, Walker and Lawton, Harry Halse, Jack Cock, Len Goulden, goalkeeper Vic Woodley—who won 19 England caps, long-throwing Sam Weaver, goalgrabbers supreme Joe Bambrick and Joe Payne, and Willy Steffan, the Swiss international full-back, one would surely have expected Chelsea F.C. to have joined the ranks of Champions long before they did!

Even some great amateurs like Woodward, Nils Middleboe, Howard Baker, 'Baich' Bower, Max Woosnam and Steffan, could not bring the League-winning flag to London's S.W.6—as much as they all would have loved to. Yet, except for an appearance in the 1915 F.A. Cup Final when they lost to Sheffield United, and three promotions seasons in Division Two, namely 1906-07, 1911-12 and 1929-30, things haven't always been rosy for Chelsea—especially down Stamford Bridge way. **Money has never been a problem with Chelsea—not even in the past. And during the period from 1920 to 1939 something like £80,000 was spent on players—and in those days that was an awful amount of money.**

But, as stated, things did not go altogether too smoothly for the 'Pensioners', and for long sequences the team's performances lacked just that little bit of finesse.

Then, ten years after World War Two, the picture began to change and soon Chelsea hit the top, thanks to the shrewd, virile management of former Arsenal and England dreadnought centre-forward, Ted Drake.

**He succeeded Billy Birrell as team-boss in the summer of 1952 and within three seasons he led Chelsea to their first League crown with this record:**

They were four points clear of second-placed Wolves and 26 ahead of bottom club, Sheffield Wednesday. At a Luncheon given by the Directors to the players and staff at Stamford Bridge on Monday, 25th July, 1955, Mr J. H. Mears, the Club's Chairman, presented Football League Championship medals to the following: Roy Bentley (captain), Eric Parsons, Derek Saunders, Johnny

McNichol, Ken Armstrong, Stan Willense, John Harris, Les Stubbs, Bill Robertson, Frank Blunstone, Ron Greenwood, Peter Sillett, Stan Wicks, Jim Lewis, Chick Thomson, Seamus O'Connell, Ted Drake, and trainer Jack Oxberry.

**And to complete their preliminary '50 years' celebrations Chelsea's reserves won the Football Combination Championship, their third-team captured the Metropolitan League title and their juniors took the South Eastern Counties League honours.**

**Since those palmy days Chelsea have added the F.A. Cup to their list of achievements, winning the coveted silver prize in 1970 at the expense of Leeds United whom they beat 2-1 in a replay after four goals had been shared at Wembley.**

A year later Chelsea collected the European Cup Winners Cup when in another all-action replay they pipped the Spanish aces, Real Madrid, 2-1 in Athens.

Earlier, in 1965, the League Cup found its way to the Chelsea Boardroom after Leicester City had been defeated 3-2 on aggregate in the two-legged Final, while in 1965 Chelsea won the Charity Shield by crushing Cup winners Newcastle United, 3-0 in London. And in 1967 neighbouring Tottenham Hotspur beat Chelsea 2-1 in the F.A. Cup Final which was, incidentally, the first all-London clash since the 1880's.

Chelsea's League record, following their Championship winning campaign of 1954-55 has not been all that bad—and, indeed, its not been too good either. Admittedly they suffered relegation from Division One in 1961-62 (and returned 42 games later), but otherwise their 'bread and butter' performances have been slightly above the standard level.

**In 18 full seasons of top grade soccer since 1955, Chelsea have totted up 802 points—an average of 44.5 per 42 matches. They came third in the table in 1964-65 and 1969-70; finished fifth in 1963-64, 1965-66 and 1968-69; took sixth spot in 1967-68 and 1970-71.**

**Many star players have given Chelsea sterling service since the hostilities of the 1939-45 War, just as those before them had done, and six who perhaps deserve a special mention more than other, must be:**

**Bobby Tambling**, whose 202 goals for the club at senior level is now a record. **Jimmy Greaves**, the goal-scoring prodigy of the 1950's who hit 124 goals in 157 League games for Chelsea and no fewer than 492 in his professional career, in all competitions. Capped 57 times for England, 'Lord Jim' netted 44 international goals, and in 1960-61 set a club record of 41 League goals in a season. **Peter 'The Cat' Bonetti**, the goalkeeper who recently played in his 500th League game for the 'Blues'.

A Chelsea man since 1960, Peter has over 600 first-team outings to his credit. **Roy Bentley**, scorer of 128 goals in 324 First Division matches for the club between 1948 and 1957. Winner of 12 England caps, he started life with Bristol City and joined Chelsea from Newcastle United in January, 1948. Hard-man, **Ron Harris**, has been a Chelsea man for 14½ years and is now well on the way to topping the 500th League appearance. He has won four England Under-23 caps, six Schoolboy caps and eight Youth caps, and made his senior debut in 1961-62. Finally there is midfield grafter, **John Hollins**, a 'Blue' since 1962 who has won England honours at Full, Under-23 and Youth levels.

Bonetti, Harris and Hollins, might be in action this afternoon, for current Chelsea boss, Ron Stuart, who took over from Dave Sexton some four months ago, maintains that experienced players can play a big part in vital matches—and with this fixture a four-pointer, his team line-up could easily feature these 'old' campaigners.

**Football, though, is a funny business. Anything can happen. So we'll leave it at that!**

**Most goals in a season:** 98, in Division One, season 1960-61.

**Most points in a season:** 57, in Division Two, season 1906-07.

**Record Attendance (League):** 82,905, against Arsenal, Division One, 1936.

**Youngest first-team player:** Ian 'Chico' Hamilton, aged 16 years, 4 months, 18 days when playing against Tottenham Hotspur, away, in Division One on 18th March, 1967.
