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personality



This week's club personality is Dr. David Iven, Burnley F.C. medical officer for many years and a director of the club for the past 12 years.

Dr. Iven first came to Burnley in 1945 after serving as a medical officer in the R.A.M.C. during the second world war. He considers himself "an adopted Lancastrian".

His early education and medical studies were in London, where he first took an interest in professional football.

He says: "At the age of seven I played on the left wing. Then I became a striker, but I soon realised that watching others play was less strenuous than actually playing yourself".

Dr. Iven's wife, Lynne, was born in Burnley and her parents were the late John and Anne Bailey. Dr. Iven is keenly interested in music and classes himself a "middlebrow" in this respect. "Fiddler on the Roof" suits him fine.

Other hobbies? "Well" says the doctor, "I can't often achieve my main one because of shortage of time. But quite honestly, I enjoy nothing more than doing nothing!"

His most memorable moment as a member of the Burnley board was seeing the team play at Wembley in the 1962 F.A. Cup final. "A great day even though we lost", he recalls.

meet the visitors



JOHN RYAN, full-back: Formerly with Fulham and Arsenal, John has now made more than 200 appearances for Luton. Played in 34 League and Cup games last season. John is a water-skiing enthusiast of international standard.

BOBBY THOMSON, defender: Signed on a free transfer from Birmingham City after making his name with Wolves for whom he played more than 270 League games. A former England international, he has since topped the 100 mark for Luton and has proved an influential figure in their progress in recent seasons.

PETER ANDERSON, midfield: Signed for Luton as an amateur from Hendon, Peter has developed into a First Division player of the highest class. He was recently the subject of a £150,000 transfer bid by Newcastle. Was voted the supporters' 'Player of the Year' last season, when he scored 14 goals. He is a qualified chartered accountant.

JOHN FAULKNER, centre-half: Signed from Leeds for £6,000, John first hit the headlines when playing for amateurs Sutton United against the Elland Road team. Plagued by a serious knee injury at Leeds, John is now fully recovered and missed only two matches last season.

ALAN GARNER, centre-back: Signed on a free transfer from Millwall, Alan has established himself as a cool, reliable player. Was the regular No. 6 last season and scored two goals.

JIMMY HUSBAND, forward: Joined the Hatters midway through last season for a fee of £80,000 and netted two hat-tricks to help in the promotion push. A former international, he has scored more than 60 goals in his career. Born in Newcastle.

ALAN WEST, midfield: Left Turf Moor in a £100,000 deal shortly after the start of last season, after a previous transfer to Sunderland had broken down on medical grounds. A former England Under-23 international, Alan was an ever-present from the time of his arrival until the end of the season.

JOHN ASTON, winger: Made his name with Manchester United, particularly during their European Cup winning season in 1967-68. Moved to Luton for a £45,000 fee and scored six goals in 39 League appearances last season.

PAUL FUTCHER, defender: Signed during the close season from Chester for a large fee and although only 17 has recently been given his chance. Luton beat several other First Division clubs for his signature and he's rated a top prospect.

RON FUTCHER, forward: Signed for a small fee from Chester a few weeks after his twin brother Paul. Made a sensational impact in the First Division this season, scoring the winning goal against Ipswich and then notching a hat-trick in the victory over Wolves.

PETER SPIRING, forward: Formerly with Bristol City, Peter was signed for £70,000 from Liverpool this season. He was a useful goalscorer at Bristol, but failed to break through into the first-team while at Anfield.

NOW WE WANT THAT PLACE IN EUROPE!

Losing to Wimbledon in the F.A. Cup was the biggest upset and disappointment we have had at Burnley Football Club for a long time. It was a shock for the fans – and believe me, a bigger one for the players, staff and officials. It was made even harder to bear because of all the success in the competition last season when of course we reached the semi-finals.

We offer no excuses for one of the biggest surprises in the history of the F.A. Cup. We blame nobody but ourselves. The effort was there, the attitude was right – but our skills were off. The result is history now and we must buckle down to the task of picking up as many First Division points as possible in the games which remain. We have had a good run in the League recently, only losing once since November 2nd, and obviously our target is to finish high enough to qualify next season one way or another for a place in one of the European inter-club competitions. We have tasted the European Cup and the Fairs Cup in the past – now we fancy another excursion into "Common Market" territory.

TRIBUTE

I want now to pay a tribute to our playing staff as a whole for the general way they have gone about their work over the past few months and in particular the last few weeks. Through a suspension for our club captain, Colin Waldron, which he completes this afternoon, and also because of several injuries, I have had to ask certain players to turn out in a number of

different positions. Not an ideal situation, but circumstances demanded that it just had to be. The players I refer to have never made any complaints about this – their attitude has always been that they are prepared to play in any position so long as it is beneficial to the club. This applies in particular to Peter Noble, Keith Newton and Billy Ingham, but to other players as well to a lesser extent and I thank every one of them for fitting into the scheme of things so wholeheartedly and so utterly professionally.

CHECKS

I am sure that all our followers will be delighted with the latest medical bulletins on Mick Docherty and Frank Casper. Both made a visit to London last weekend to see a specialist for further checks on the knee injuries which have troubled them for so long.

Both were given the green light to resume training. This is great news and I feel absolutely certain that all supporters will join me in wishing these two talented footballers God speed towards full match fitness once more. No players in the country have had more trying times in the last year than these two, believe me, and it is high time that their luck changed in the way it now appears to be doing. Players of their calibre are essential to our first team squad when we are going places.

Welcome to Luton Town. We are pleased to see Alan West back at Turf Moor for the first time since his transfer. We hope his team soon start collecting lots of points – after this afternoon's game, that is.

This is the page on which each week we meet one of the Turf Moor stars. Today we talk to Mick Docherty, who like Frank Casper, has had some very bad luck with knee injuries over the past 12 months – and longer.

Mick, what's the latest news about when we might expect to see you back in action?

Well, along with Frank, I consulted a specialist in London a few days ago. He was the same doctor who performed my second knee operation last year and I was eager to have his opinion on my knee as it is at the mo-

ment. He told me that everything is fine again or at least my knee is 98 per cent right – and I am aiming to be playing again in the next two or three weeks.

You have been dogged by these injuries off and on for a long time.

Yes, 21 months to be precise – and it seems like 21 years sometimes. But Eddie Gray made it back to full fitness with Leeds after a very long lay-off and what he can do I can do just as well.

How did you feel watching the Wimbledon match? Frustrated?

I certainly was. But not half as frustrated as the players on the field! Everything went WRONG, and at the finish I just felt really sorry for the lads.

And being in London for your visit to the specialist you saw the win at Queen's Park Rangers?

Yes – everything went RIGHT in that one! Everyone worked hard and it was one of our best results of the season. The First Division title is wide open, we are in a great position but we need to keep on winning. Quite honestly, I don't believe there is a better team than us around.

What do you expect today in the game against Luton?

Well, Luton being here means a return for Alan West – the first time he has played at Turf Moor since his transfer. Alan has been a very close friend of mine since we played together in the Burnley team which won the F.A. Youth Cup in 1968. So I am obviously looking forward to seeing him personally and seeing him play. We understand they are putting their game together better just now than was the case before Christmas and their results indicate there has been a definite improvement. They are low in the League but I forecast a tight match again. Luton would no doubt be happy with a point – and we will be delighted to get two! But who genuinely knows what any match holds in store?

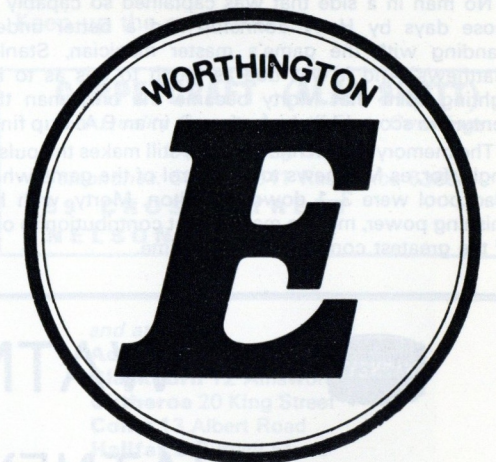

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THE UNTOUCHABLES COURAGE WAS MORTY'S TRADE-MARK

Every year when Wembley looms up on the horizon and ties in our premier knock-out tournament whet jaded Soccer appetites our thoughts turn to great cup-fighters of the past.

And among the greatest of them there was none braver than a Blackpool and England star of the immediate post-war era — the man we used to know as 'Morty'.

Stan Mortenson's indomitable nature was one of the outstanding qualities of the Blackpool side that battled through to the F.A. Cup final three times in five years before its perseverance paid off with a Wembley triumph against Bolton.

After he had joined Blackpool from South Shields in 1938 his career had hardly got off the ground when he was wanted for a tougher conflict than cup-fighting. And when, in his new role of wireless operator and air gunner, he crawled out of the wreckage of a crashed Wellington bomber past the bodies of the other members of the crew, it seemed for Morty that the game had ended . . . with no chance of extra time.

His head wounds were severe and he was told that he must never even think of playing football again. But, as opposing defenders were to find a few years later, this resilient character was the man who always came bouncing back, no matter how desperate any situation might seem for him or his side.

No man in a side that was captained so capably in those days by Harry Johnston had a better understanding with the game's master magician, Stanley Matthews. And it was due as much to this as to his fighting spirit that Morty became the only man this century to score a hat-trick of goals in an F.A. Cup final.

The memory of that final of 1953 still makes the pulses tingle, for, as Matthews took control of the game when Blackpool were 3-1 down to Bolton, Morty, with his finishing power, made a magnificent contribution to one of the greatest come-backs of all time.

Both men as well as some of their team-mates got the winners' medals that had eluded them in 1948, when Blackpool were beaten in a classic final against Manchester United, and in 1951 when they went down to Newcastle.

But when success came at last no man had fought more valiantly for it than Morty. In the 1947-48 tournament he had become only the fifth man in the history of the F.A. Cup to score in every round. And, while most people regard the 1953 final as the high peak of his prowess, I recall another of his hat-tricks that was just as devastating and every bit as dramatic.

It was in the semi-final against Spurs at Villa Park in 1948. With 20 minutes left and the London team leading, their supporters were almost ready to celebrate. But they reckoned without the unconquerable Morty. First he struck for an equaliser with a terrific drive. He then headed Blackpool into the lead and went on to make it a three-goals personal triumph that put his club in the final for the first time in 60 years.

Morty's international career was just as colourful. In his very first game, when he lined up with great contemporaries such as Matthews, Lawton and Finney, he hit four goals against Portugal. In the next two he also scored in overwhelming victories against Belgium and Wales. Morty was an instant success, and he continued to be such a consistent scorer in his 26 games for his country that he finished up with 26 goals — a record until men like Nat Lofthouse, Tom Finney, Jimmy Greaves and Bobby Charlton overtook him.

As a centre-forward or inside-man Morty was quick on the burst and brilliant in his positional sense. Fear didn't figure in his vocabulary and I often saw him injured when going in for the low, diving header. Yet, apart from his courage, there was another quality that endeared him to team-mates and opponents alike. That was his dry, deadpan Geordie wit. They don't come any more fearless or any funnier than Morty.

press on clarets

The win at Queen's Park Rangers last Saturday was a big boost for the morale of players and fans alike, coming so quickly after the shock F.A. Cup exit.

Ray Hankin got the goal which put the Clarets into joint third place in the First Division after a splendid attack involving four other players.

Keith McNee, in the *Evening Star*, described it like this: "Doug Collins, standing in as captain for Colin Waldron, who was suspended, began the move with a square pass from the left to Billy Ingham. Debut boy Colin Morris took over and from his pass Leighton James got to the line before teeing up a chance which Ray Hankin took with ease at the far post."

McNee said the 1-0 win over formidable opponents was "a triumph for a defence well marshalled by Jim Thomson and Billy Rodaway, with Keith Newton superb at left-back and Alan Stevenson making three of the sort of saves one has come to expect of him".

He added that the main aim for the season of a place in Europe was realistically possible

after winning a dozen points in the last eight games.

Burnley Express sports editor Peter Higgs also made the long trip to Loftus Road. He summed up the victory over a team who had been unbeaten in their previous six games, winning five, by saying: "Determination and good luck in large quantity gave Burnley one of their most welcome wins of the season. It wasn't great football by the Clarets, but heroic defence and non-stop graft brought its full reward."

● Footnote to the Wimbledon match — we've had a letter signed "five Wombles fans" paying a tribute to the sportsmanship in defeat, not only of the Burnley team but of the fans as well.

And there was a police tribute to Burnley supporters at Loftus Road last Saturday. "No trouble at all," said a senior police spokesman, "but then, there never is any here when Burnley are the visitors."

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do you remember?

The only season that Burnley met Luton Town in the first fifty years of the Football League was in 1897-98 in the Second Division. Burnley had been relegated the previous season and they bounced right back the next season. Under their trainer, an ex-professional runner called Stuttard, the team played their first eight League games without defeat. By the end of the season, they had won 20 of their 30 games, scored 80 goals in the process, and only lost twice. (Luton were one of the two teams to beat them, 2-0, but Burnley easily won the return at Turf Moor, 4-0).

After five seasons at Turf Moor, Teddy Hancock left Burnley in 1936-37 and moved to Luton. Whilst in 1938-39, George Bray made his League debut in the Division Two fixture against Luton Town. The team that day read: Adams; Robinson and Chester; Gardner, Johnson and Bray; Taylor, Rayner, Brocklebank, Miller and Hornby. What memories some of those names recall; the popular and whole-hearted captain, Alick Robinson (he came from Bury for nearly £5,000 in 1933); Tom Gardner of the blond hair and prodigious throws who had arrived from Aston Villa the previous season; Bob Johnson, still living in the Burnley area; George Bray himself, who made 241 first team appearances; Freddie Taylor, Bob Brocklebank, "Golden" Miller, and "Dipper" Hornby - some of the popular names at pre-war Turf Moor.

FOUR TIMES IN ONE SEASON!

Both Burnley and Luton were still in Division Two after the war, and in 1946-47, the clubs met four times. In the first game, played at Turf Moor, Jackie Billingham scored in the 1-1 draw. Reg Attwell made his debut for Burnley in that game. The next time they met was at Luton in the Fifth Round of the Cup, when the clubs drew 0-0. In the replay, Ray Harrison notched up a hat-trick as the Clarets won 3-0. And in the fourth game that season, Burnley won at Luton, 3-0, in a blizzard. Harry Potts (2) and Ray Harrison were the scorers that day.

5 feet 6 inches tall centre forward Peter McKay was brought into the first team for the game against Luton in 1955-56. The diminutive McKay scored a hat-trick as the Clarets won 3-1. The forward line that day was surely one of the smallest ever to play for any Football League team - Billy Gray (5 ft. 6 in.), Jimmy McIlroy (5 ft. 8 in.), McKay (5 ft. 6 in.), Albert Cheesebrough (5 ft. 7 in.) and Brian Pilkington (5 ft. 6 in.).

In 1957-58, Luton Town performed the double over the Clarets, 2-1 at Turf Moor and 3-2 at Luton, for the only time in their history. In the League Championship season, 1959-60, the Clarets drew 1-1 at Luton and won 3-0 at Burnley, with goals from Jimmy Robson, Ray Pointer, and a penalty which Jimmy McIlroy "ghosted" past England goalkeeper Ron Baynam.

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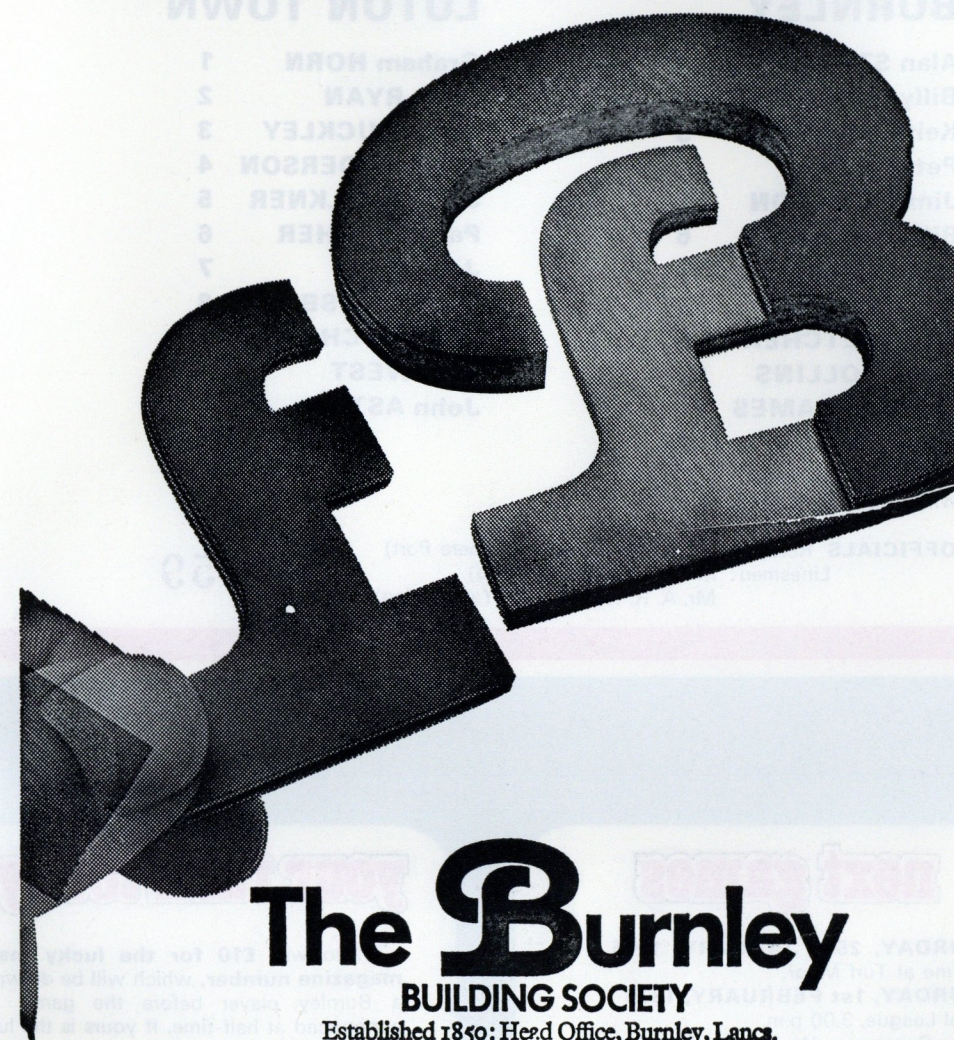
