Viv was one of my 'finds' when I was Alec Stock's chief scout here at Luton. He was playing for that fine amateur side Wycombe Wanderers in those days. You could see then that he was going to be a good player. He had a lot of bad luck when he was loaned to Newcastle to team up with Malcolm Macdonald.

Viv had the rotten luck to be involved with Newcastle just when they were going through a bad time. Remember they were knocked out of the

F.A. Cup by Hereford United? Had that not happened I am sure Viv would now have been doing the job John Tudor does at St. James' Park—and just as successfully.

When Alec went to Fulham he took Viv and Alan Slough with him, and both lads are having a fine season. I wish them luck in the next round at Carlisle.

When you think about it the Isthmian League has done us a lot of favours over the past few years. We got Peter Anderson from Hendon, and, of course, John Faulkner was an amateur with Sutton before he went to Leeds, from where we bought him.

It is with justification that the Isthmian's claim to be the best non-League league in the country. Our nearest Isthmian club is Hitchin, and I often go over there with my coach Roy McCrohan to look at promising young players.

Today's match should prove quite an attraction. Stoke City are top of the table, and we are down near the bottom, but that won't make any difference. We'll be after 'em. We have had a marvellous run in the past few weeks, and our recent form is just as good as that of Stoke.

We owe them a bad turn anyway. When we went up there earlier in the season we were beaten 4-2 after looking as if we might win. After Peter Anderson had just missed a goal Stoke threw everything at us, and we conceded three daft goals. I can promise them we won't be doing anything like that today.

Slowly, but surely, we are battling our way back to survival. Look at the League table on the back page, and you can see we have a game in hand on the teams immediately above us. It's so close it's not true—even at the top. As I have said before—we can get out of this mess. I am sure of that.

## Gerry Harrison of Anglia TV talks to Graham Horn

**Arsenal figured largely in the early part of your career, Graham. Looking back on your time there, what are your thoughts about Highbury?**

It's a fine Club, no doubt about that. In hindsight, it might have been better for me to have joined a smaller Club first. When I first signed for Arsenal it seemed a tremendous step for me but one or two things went wrong. Nobody's fault—just circumstances. I signed Associated Schoolboy forms for them as soon as I was old enough. One problem that came up was that I was selected for London Schoolboys at the same time as going on an Arsenal Youth Tour. Anyway, that was a long story, but it meant in the end that although I only played two halves of two exhibition games on the tour, I didn't do my chances of Schoolboy honours any good. At Arsenal I played in the England Youth Trials, but there was some fierce competition there too. When I was at Highbury it was very hard to make an impression. I was competing against names like Bob Wilson and Geoff Barnett. This was the Arsenal era of the 'double' and, at that stage, young players were not getting much of a chance. They were doing well enough, of course, without bringing others through.

**What sort of a break was it for you when you went to Portsmouth?**

The all-important one, really. They gave me my first big break and I shall always be grateful for that, to my Club and to Ron Tindall who was the Manager at Fratton Park then. I went originally on loan for one year but, after nine months, Luton came in with a direct offer. Portsmouth were asked whether they could top it, but they couldn't, so I signed for Luton and was very pleased to do so. I needed that chance at Portsmouth to show myself. It was a very enjoyable nine months. My first game was at Nottingham Forest and we drew 0-0.

**Are there any particular problems a big fellow like yourself has to face as goalkeeper, Graham?**

Not particularly. It is certainly no disadvantage. Perhaps the opposite. It is difficult to be a goalkeeper in this class of football if you are not pretty big. I am big-boned rather than a heavyweight. I am 6' 1½" and 14 stone. Keeping my weight in check is not a problem. I am careful what I eat but I am not particularly strict about diet. I have been this size and weight since I was seventeen or so and I have been put through goalkeepers specialized training since I was a kid and joined Arsenal as a Schoolboy, so although it might be a bit harder for a big man to be agile, I do not find there is any overall disadvantage.

**Yourself and Keith Barber have always competed fiercely for the First Team spot. Does this make life harder in any way?**

It keeps you on your toes, but we are not the only ones who compete for places. With the number we have in the Squad now there is hardly anybody who is not under immediate pressure for a First Team place. Perhaps it is a little bit harder for goalkeepers because there is only one position for them to play in. You are either in or out. Some of the lads outfield can fit in to various permutations. No, it doesn't make life any more difficult but it is always miserable when you are not in the First Team. Since I have been at Luton I have improved all the aspects of my game, I think. I am learning all the time and experience is half the battle for goalkeepers. The first division is a lot quicker and you very rarely get a second chance if you make a mistake.

**Has there been much of a change in atmosphere since the results have improved?**

The atmosphere has always been good. Early on there was a lot of frustration about because we did not seem to be getting the results our play deserved. Others have said this and I agree that only one or two sides have really outplayed us. From my own viewpoint, since I have been back in the side, we have played really well. It is just a case of knocking in the chances.

**Graham, give us your view on how you picked up those seven stitches against Newcastle?**

It was about mid-way through the second half, I think. Someone cut down the left—I don't remember who it was—and as the cross came over, Paul Futcher mis-controlled it and it deflected off my back towards the far post. As I turned and dived for it Steve Buckley, who was covering on the other side, came in to clear it and whacked me one in the face. When I saw it on the television the day after I realised that I was quite lucky. It could have been more than just the cut and stitches. Steve seemed to pull out a bit as he made contact, otherwise it could have been a broken nose and one or two other things as well.

**What other sports do you play?**

People are always asking me how my golf is but, in fact, I haven't really played for two years although I have been down the driving range recently trying to improve my swing. I have played a bit of golf and enjoyed it but I am not in the John Ryan class, not by any means. I have taken up squash and I play with my wife, Judy. I am the beginner in fact; she has played before, so I am learning the ropes with that one.







# INTRODUCING STOKE

**One of the founder members of the Football League (September, 1888) and the second oldest club in the land. They were formed in 1863, the same year as the F.A.—Stoke City have contributed a lot to our great national game, although their playing record doesn't seem to give you that impression.**

Down the years—and to date there have been 112 of them—many famous men have donned the distinctive red and white stripes of the Staffordshire club, notably Stanley Matthews (now Sir), Jimmy Broad, Bob McGorry, Freddy Steele, Frankie Soo, Neil Franklin, Leigh Richmond Roose, Joe Johnson and latterly Gordon Banks, George Eastham and Peter Doherty. Yet, and indeed quite unbelievably, it was not until they defeated Chelsea 2-1 in the 1972 League Cup Final that Stoke City were able to celebrate their first major domestic honour.

**In the 109 years prior to that event, the 'Potters', making headlines only occasionally, just eased along as best they could, picking up the odd minor prize here and there. (They were Division Two Champions in 1933 and 1963 and Division Three (North) Champions in 1927). They had an 'up and down' period right at the start of their League career—getting whipped out of the Division after only 44 matches!**

But they pulled themselves together, won back their League status and subsequently have served up some delightful football, especially between the wars, when one S. Matthews, was just commencing a magnificent existence as a magical outside-right.

Reverting back to three years ago, however, it must be said that the main spring behind Stoke's belated success was their long-serving genial manager, Tony Waddington, who had taken over from Frank Taylor in 1960. Working on a shoe-string budget, the ingenuity and creative powers of Waddington have been stunning, considering that many of the men he has lured to Stoke looked past their best—or so people thought—when he signed them. Yet gradually and methodically he blended the 'veterans' with local found talent and got together, in turn, top-notch sides, which first won promotion (1962-63 and then a big Cup competition, with the latter guaranteeing a place in Europe for Stoke City F.C. via the E.U.F.A. Cup.

Now manager Waddington is aiming at capturing the elusive First Division title—and at the moment his team is well in touch with the League leaders.

**The best placing for Stoke so far in Division One has been fourth (in 1935-36 and 1946-47) . . . but 1974-75 could easily see them better that position.** The signing of £325,000 goalkeeper Peter Shilton from Leicester City has enhanced Stoke's chances immensely, for this fellow must surely be the best in the country. Capped 20 times by England already, he has appeared in some 300 League and Cup games for both the City clubs, and he is still only 25!

In front of Shilton will be John Marsh, Denis Smith, Alan Dodd and Mickey Pejic. Marsh joined City on leaving school in 1966. A regular first-teamer for the past three and a half seasons, he has over 250 senior outings in his locker.

Centre-half Smith, recently passed the '200' mark in League games for City and he, too, came to Stoke right made his debut in 1973. A versatile performer, 'Doddie' appeared in five different positions last term.

Pejic won four full England caps in 1974 to go with the eight he gained at Under-23 level. Son of a Polish miner, he was born at Chesterton and has made over 240 first-team appearances for City since 1967.

The midfield trio consists of John Mahoney, Alan Hudson and Geoff Salmos. Welshman Mahoney originates from Cardiff yet he joined Stoke from Crewe for £15,000 in 1967. Has 12 full caps to his credit plus over 200 League outings—and there are more to come in both fields.

Chelsea sold Hudson to Stoke for £240,000 in January, 1974. The holder of ten Under-23 caps, this highly-skilled Londoner could well play a prominent part in the 1978 World Cup. Is nearing 200 League appearances. Operating on the left flank for Stoke will be the ex-Sheffield United star, Salmos, whom City bought for £180,000 eight months ago—and this after he had totted up some 170 (plus ten sub) League games for the 'Blades'. Mexborough-born, he is now rapidly becoming a big favourite with the Stoke fans.

Jimmy Greenhoff, Geoff Hurst, Sean Haslegrave, Terry Conroy and Ian Moores share City's striking duties. Greenhoff, a native of Barnsley, started his career as a wing-half with Leeds United for whom he made over 100 first-team appearances. He then moved to Birmingham City (1968) and joined Stoke from them for £100,000 in August, 1960. Jimmy, brother of Manchester United's Brian, is a prolific goalscorer and has netted over 60 times for City. Club skipper, he has four Under-23 caps. The 33-year-old Hurst was signed by Stoke from West Ham for £80,000 in 1972. Rated one of the finest for-

wards in the 1966 World Cup Finals, this six-footer has over 450 League and Cup games for the 'Hammers' and has played in another 100 or so for City. Scorer of over 210 League goals in his career to date, he received 49 full England caps (24 goals); four at Under-23 (1 goal), and won F.A. Cup and World Cup Winners' medals in 1964 and 1966 respectively.

Local lad Haslegrave had his baptism with Stoke in 1971-72. He is only 22 but has considerable first-team experience (over 80 games) and is equally at home on either wing.

Conroy is the 'singer' from Glentoran, who moved to Stoke in 1967 for a modest £10,500 fee. An Erie international 17 times, this slim-framed red-head has sung *Danny Boy* from Miami to Accra; he has a superb body-swerve and packs a fierce shot. Has made over 200 appearances for City.

Like team-mate Pejic, the 6' 2" structure of Moores comes from Chesterton, and already he has come under the eye of England boss, Don Revie, who has named him in two Under-23 squads. A promising future is forecast for Ian!

These men then hope to see Stoke City to that Division One Championship crown.

No doubt their players possess remarkable ability and skill—and of course, the game's know-how—but the problem is can they maintain the form which has helped them rise to the position they now hold in the table?

## Dates in Stoke City's history . . .

1863—Club founded by ex-Charterhouse Schoolboys. 1878—Moved from first ground (Sweeting's Field) to their present Victoria Ground.

1885—Club became a professional organisation.

1908—Registered as a Limited Company.

1937—Recorded best win—10-3 over West Bromwich Albion, home in Division One on 4th February.

And a 51,280 record crowd packed the Victoria Ground for the League game with Arsenal on 29th March.

1947—Stanley Matthews sold to Blackpool for £11,500.

1961—Stanley Matthews re-signed, for £2,500, and Stoke's home gate rises from 8,000 to 35,000 when he makes his 'comeback' appearance.

1964—Runners-up in the League Cup—beaten 4-3 on aggregate by Leicester City.

1972—Record gate receipts taken—£20,580, against Manchester United, F.A. Cup, Round Six. Replay on 22nd March.
