Let's be honest and admit that Tuesday's game against Middlesbrough was the type of non-event which loses friends and discourages people. Rangers, thank heaven, figure in less 0-0 draws than most other clubs in the Football League and our opponents really must shoulder rather more than 50% of the responsibility for Tuesday's stalemate. All credit to Middlesbrough for acquiring with such single-minded efficiency the solitary point for which they travelled to London. However, it's worth remembering that the game of football originated in bygone years as a pastime in which two teams attempted to score goals against each other. If our forefathers had attempted to introduce a game which was primarily concerned with the prevention of goal-scoring, our national sport would now be table-tennis (and England would be playing Scotland at Wembley this year at hop-scotch).

We are optimistic that this afternoon's match will offer far more entertainment than Tuesday's encounter. Our visitors, Luton Town, need only a couple of wins to achieve First Division security and such a modest ambition must make them go all out for a victory at this ground today. We trust that we are able to welcome a large number of Luton Town supporters to Shepherds Bush for a match that is so crucial to their club. If one thinks about it, the situation is very similar to that in which a team approaches promotion to the First Division—if this were the case, this afternoon's match would be an all-ticket sell-out! It will be interesting to see what the attendance for this game will be.

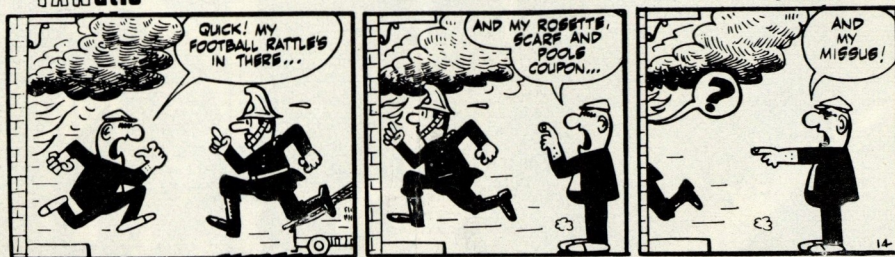

A special feature in which Michael Wale reports on the tensions, strains and after match feelings of the Rangers side when he travelled with them to West Ham for the recent F.A. Cup game. The photo below shows Dave Sexton briefing Phil Parkes on the team coach.



Dave Sexton and the physiotherapist Richard Roberts were sitting in the lounge at Whites Hotel, just past Queensway, on the Bayswater Road. The rendezvous where the team meet before any game played in London.

The time is 11.15 a.m. and Dave and Richard are sharing a pot of tea. Frank McLintock, who is to replace the injured Gerry Francis that day as captain, is the first player to arrive. "It's the Cisco kid", jokes Dave as Frank enters wearing an open necked red shirt, Don Masson arrives after him more soberly dressed in a brown three piece suit, and almost immediately vanishes causing Dave to say "It's the scarlet pimpernel".

At 11.30 'lunch' is served and the rest of the team are arriving to sit at one end of the deserted dining room. Everyone seems to eat something different. For some there are steaks, and for most scrambled eggs, which Don Masson covers in brown sauce. For almost everyone there are peaches, which seem a

particular favourite with the team, Phil Parkes actually emptying his on top of his cornflakes and adding honey.

The talk is fairly general, about anything in fact except the afternoon's match. Earlier Frank McLintock had borrowed Dave Sexton's Guardian and discovered scrawled all across the Arts page various diagrams and plans of what Dave hoped would happen on the pitch that afternoon. Frank had also read an article in the Daily Mail by Brian James and noted aloud: "That must mean he's left The Sunday Times".

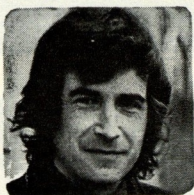
'Lunch' is a leisurely affair. At the far end Dave Webb and Ronnie Abbott are in conversation. Stan Bowles is sitting opposite Frank McLintock and Don Masson. Dave Sexton is next to Richard and the club doctors. Dr. Carne amazes us all by calling for a Cassata ice cream to finish his meal.

Afterwards the players straggle upstairs to the television room and a glimpse of the day's soccer previews.



# THE MICHAEL

# WALE REPORT



*Michael Wale's very interesting article on the events surrounding the F.A. Cup game at West Ham continues on these two pages.*

But just as Rangers are due for dissection it is time for the pre-match team talk, and Dave Sexton switches off the television.

The players have motored separately to the hotel, but now they are to travel to Upton Park on the team bus, all except for Don Rogers who is driving Mickey Leach, because Leach is visiting friends that end of London after the game with his wife.

On the bus a cassette tape plays middle-of-the-road-type music with a preponderance of The Carpenters. I also recognise Viva Espana. At the back I sit with Don Masson who keeps his legs stretched out up on the seat; David Webb and Dave Thomas. The seat is a U-shaped bench which curls around the back of the bus until it reaches a coffee making machine and cupboard. Further down the bus Frank McLintock sits opposite Dave Sexton with John Beck and Dave Clement. Dave Sexton is soon moving around the bus chatting to a player here and there as he goes. At one time in earnest conversation with Don Givens, at another sitting here between Dave Thomas and myself his pen continually tracing patterns of play on pieces of paper. And the name most overheard in the opposition's team is Robson. In fact the Rangers side don't at this point, as we drive down the Euston Road even know the final line-up of the West Ham team.

By now Dave Webb is proving that should he ever be out of a job the British Tourist Board would welcome him. There seems to be no fact that he doesn't know about London as he guides both Don Masson and Dave Thomas on their journey. It's all very odd for Don, who has only just got a house fixed up recently and still commutes back to Nottingham: "This is the Angel", says Dave Webb, "And just up there is the Arsenal". We pass an orange fronted transport cafe further down the East End and David notes that it is one of the few transport

cafes in Egon Ronay's Good Food Guide. "I come from Stratford, just near where the theatre is, if you know it. It was very tough down there".

As we plunge past Canning Town there are cars with Rangers fans waving behind and besides us. David Webb seems the calmest man on the bus, and Dave Sexton the most tense: "You always get that bit more tense before a Cup game because it's sudden death isn't it? It has that ingredient of gambling in it". He came up an hour later this morning on the 9.5 a.m. from Brighton and aims to go back on the seven-o'clock. "It's nice to wake up on a Sunday away from everything. Some people couldn't face all the travelling but I think there's something of the gypsy in every footballer. I'll use the time going back tonight working over what we should have done. What went right, what went wrong".

Don Masson notes that West Ham's midfield doesn't seem too disciplined: "They all go up and come back together".

In the opening half hour of the game his prediction is proved incredibly right as Rangers rip West Ham apart and Dave Clement puts the side ahead. But by halftime Holland has headed an equaliser.

Then in the first 45 seconds of the second half comes that mis-kicked cross that reaches the eager head of Robson and Rangers, despite their battling, are out of the Cup for another year. Drama is added by Stan Bowles being deputised by Don Rogers 14 minutes from the end.

Now all is gloom. In the players lounge along from the dressing room the upraised eyebrows of the Rangers players says everything they are thinking. So near, but so far! John Beck says that the mud had been worse than when the two teams drew 2-2 here a few weeks before. "You didn't know whether to drive it or lob it". The West Ham crowd and players are very pleasant. They know how we feel. Over the radio comes the news that the winners are away to either Leicester

or Arsenal. For Rangers it's all might-have-been and the players are on the coach by half past five. As it slowly joins the traffic jam leading from the East End there is a stunned silence on board. No-one speaks at first, and then come a few words, gradually voicing thoughts.

Frank McLintock is sitting at the back now. He has his legs straight out in front of him on the table. Don Masson is beside him. The two Scots. They reflect each others attitudes. Frank says: "It's a real sickener losing like that! I'm going out to the Talk of the Town tonight to see Lena Martell with the wife and friends. I'll get really smashed, and I'll have a hangover tomorrow morning and it'll all keep coming back. When you lose like this I keep thinking about it for two or three days. We're out now, and we've got to wait another year".

Don Masson has to drive back to Nottingham. "I wouldn't fancy that", says Frank. Don says: "I wish the next match was on Monday. You really want to get on with the next match after something

like this. Instead, you've got to wait a whole week".

Although originally upset at his substitution Stan Bowles is seen to be a lot happier than the next day's papers are to report. Another team coach draws up beside us as we're driving into the City. Someone sees Rodney Fern on board. And for a few moments the gloom is dispelled as we all try to work out which team it is, because he is on loan at present. The talk is coming more freely now, but whereas before the match it never involved the game ahead, now the match is the sole topic. "He didn't mean that as a cross, you know, it was a shot and he miscued it". That was the phrase almost everyone said before we arrived back at Whites Hotel. It's by such vaguaries that football matches are won and lost, but that's not much consolation if it's your livelihood and you're out of the Cup.

## THE VISITING TEAM ARE PUT UNDER THE MICROSCOPE BY

examines the past playing history and achievements of today's opponents

The odds are still stacked heavily against Luton making a sensational escape from relegation, but manager Harry Haslam and his team are making a brave bid even now to try and avoid the big drop only 12 months after gaining promotion. Last week they held leaders Stoke to 0-0 to give supporters hope that a miracle could yet occur.

Most Hatters' fans had abandoned all hope by mid-December when, with half their fixtures completed, Luton had managed only one solitary victory. Then, surprisingly and mysteriously, they won three games in a row!

Now the Hatters look back on a run of only one defeat in eight League games.

As one would expect, in their circumstances, the Luton team has undergone many changes since the opening of the season as Mr. Haslam tried to adapt it to First Division requirements.

Graham Horn lost his place to Keith Barber for a while but has now returned to the team.

Youngsters Steve Buckley and Paul Fitcher have now been drafted into the back four, with considerable success. Buckley has taken over at left-back from former England international Bobby Thomson with Fitcher and John Faulkner closing things up in the centre. John Ryan continues in the right-back position he has held for six years.

Up front another youngster Ron Fitcher—Paul's brother—has been holding his place since hitting four goals in his first two games at Christmas time. He took over from the injured Peter Spiring and now usually plays in a striking line with Jimmy Husband and John Aston.

Peter Anderson, Alan West and Jimmy Ryan have been holding down the midfield positions all season.

Luton Town earned themselves a unique place in football's history books when they gained promotion last year. The Hatters are the only club relegated from the First to the Fourth Division ever to regain their place at the top. In the early 'sixties they dropped through all four sections in five years.

The man responsible for creating the new Luton is manager Harry Haslam. He has signed players of the calibre

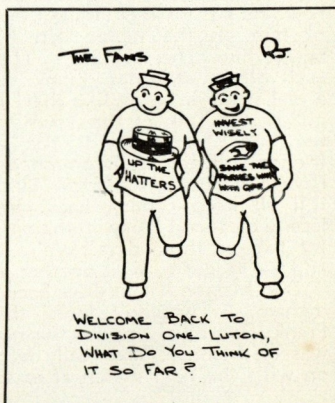
of Bobby Thomson, a former England defender, and winger John Aston. He also risked a then club record fee of £50,000 in a reasonably unknown player, Barry Butlin, who proved a big success and has now moved on to Nottingham Forest.

Mr. Haslam last season raised the record payout of £80,000 when he secured the transfer of Burnley's mid-field player Alan West, then expended a further £70,000 in return for the experience of striker Jimmy Husband. During the summer Australia's World Cup star Adrian Alston joined the club and the fee record was broken yet again with the arrival of £100,000 Paul Fitcher from Chester.

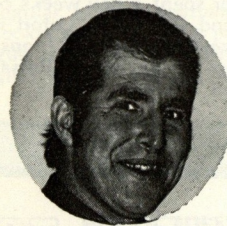
It's scarcely three years since Luton, fearing they had lost their chance of First Division football started to sell off their best players for economy reasons. Malcolm Macdonald (Newcastle), Don Givens (Q.P.R.) and Vic Halom (Sunderland) are now scoring goals with gay abandon—they hit 61 between them last season!—for rival clubs.

Viv Busby (Fulham) and Chris Nicholl (Aston Villa) were other stars to leave the club.

When put into its true perspective, Luton's promotion achievement was quite spectacular.

our statistics wizard, looks back on the other times we have played today's visitors

Today's meeting between the two sides will be the 89th since 1899, and the 44th on QPR's grounds.

QPR have a pretty good home record against Luton. We have won 28 times, drawn 7 and lost 8 and have scored 89 goals to Luton's 43.

The first meeting between the two sides took place at Luton, on 9th December 1899—QPR's 13th professional game. In the 5th qualifying round of the F.A. Cup the sides drew 1-1 at Luton, and two days later QPR won the replay at Kensal Rise 4-1, watched by 2,000 spectators.

Luton won the first League match played between the two sides, winning the match at Kensal Rise on 6th October 1900—by 3 goals to 1.

It took us 5 more league matches to gain our first success when on 31st January 1903 we won 3-1 at home.

Both sides became Founder Members of the Third Division in 1920 and QPR won the first league match 4-1 on 25th September 1920, watched by 20,000 spectators.

Although Luton won at Loftus Road in 1924 (0-2), this was their only success on QPR's grounds between 1919 and 1948 in 19 visits.

Luton won the first Second Division League match played on 18th December 1948, but then had to wait until 1970 for their next, and last win at Loftus Road, when they won 1-0.

The last match to be played down here between the two sides took place on 14th April 1973. Terry Mancini opened the scoring in the 26th minute when he headed in a Dave Thomas free kick, and in the 36th minute Don Givens scored his 25th goal of the season when he converted a pass from Gerry Francis.

In recent years QPR have done quite well at Luton. The 1-1 draw earlier in the season was the 4th consecutive time that the sides have drawn there, and since 1935 Luton have only managed to win 2 of their last 11 fixtures at home to QPR.

Their biggest win at home was in 1931 when they beat QPR for the 11th time in 12 meetings—they won the match 5-1.

Between 1920 and 1935 we only won once and drew once in 17 visits during which time we scored 13 goals to Luton's 43.

The one match excluded from these figures was the 1st round F.A. Cup match played at Luton on 30th November 1929 when QPR won 3-2.

Although the sides have met many times in league matches, they have only been drawn against each other twice in cup competitions since 1901—the other time being on 7th February 1948 in the 5th round of the cup when a record crowd of 30,564, paying £2,844 saw them win 3-1.

Since 1931, 235,978 have watched QPR's home fixtures against Luton. The biggest league attendance was 24,000 in 1936, whilst the smallest was 2,800 at the White City in 1931.

Of the current playing staff, Don Givens has scored twice against his old club. Mick Leach, Gerry Francis, Dave Clement, and Stan Bowles all have one to their credit.

Strangely enough, although QPR have scored 134 goals against Luton—only 2 QPR players have recorded hat tricks—and both in the same match. On 6th November 1964 Brian Bedford and Mike Keen both scored 3 in our record 7-1 home defeat of Luton.

**GRAHAM HORN** (Goalkeeper)

Luton paid Arsenal £25,000 for Graham and, though he had not played in the Gunners' first-team, he played several League games for Portsmouth while on loan to them in 1972/73. He has now established himself as first-choice at Kenilworth Road. **League record: Arsenal nil aps.; Portsmouth 22 aps.; Luton 54 aps.**

**BOBBY THOMSON** (Defender)

Bobby won eight England caps and appeared in 15 under-23 games, during his Wolves' days. He transferred to Birmingham in 1969, later spent a few weeks on loan to Walsall and signed for Luton in 1972. **League record: Wolves 277 aps., 2 gls.; Birmingham 62 (1) aps.; Walsall 9 aps., 1 gl.; Luton 101 aps., 1 gl.**

**JIMMY RYAN** (Midfield)

Jimmy was for several years a Manchester United player but it was after his transfer to Luton in 1970 that he began to play regular League football. Last season he took over as Luton's penalty taker. **League record: Man. United 21 (3) aps., 4 gls.; Luton 136 (9) aps., 17 gls.**

**ADRIAN ALSTON** (Striker)

Adrian hit the summer headlines as one of Australia's World Cup stars. Though he was ready to sign for Hertha Berlin, he changed his mind to join Luton. His club—Safeway United (Sydney) received a £12,000 fee. Adrian was born in Lancashire. **League record: Luton 3 (2) aps., 3 gls.**

**JOHN RYAN** (Defender)

John, a Fulham regular in their First Division days, joined Luton in 1969 and has been a permanent member of the Hatters' senior squad ever since. **League record: Fulham 41 (4) aps., 1 gl.; Luton 216 (3) aps., 8 gls.**

**JOHN FAULKNER** (Defender)

John first sprang to national fame as the centre-half of amateurs Sutton United who met Leeds United in the F.A. Cup five seasons ago. He played so well that Leeds signed him shortly afterwards. When he dropped out of the reckoning for a first-team place at Elland Road, he linked with Luton. **League record: Leeds 2 aps.; Luton 89 aps., 3 gls.**

**PAUL FUTCHER** (Defender)

Luton paid Chester £100,000 for Paul last summer, at the same time paying a further £25,000 for his twin brother Ron. Paul, tipped for top honours, gave a good account of himself in the pre-season Texaco Cup ties and has now established himself in the senior side. **League record: Chester 20 aps., Luton 9 (1) aps.**

**STEVE BUCKLEY** (Defender)

Steve joined the Hatters from Burton Albion and made his League debut in the 0—0 draw with Leicester in October. Now he has taken over the left-back position from former England international Bobby Thomson. **League record: Luton 10 aps.**

**PETER ANDERSON** (Midfield)

Peter made a quick conversion from non-League circles. Signed from Hendon in 1971, he went immediately into Luton's first-team in 1971/72 and was their top scorer. **League record: Luton 147 (3) aps., 26 gls.**

**ALAN WEST** (Midfield)

Luton paid a then club record £80,000 to sign Alan last season. He developed in Burnley's juniors and, when he lost his first-team place last season, he had apparently signed for Sunderland. But the Roker club called off the deal on medical grounds. **League record: Burnley 41 (4) aps., 3 gls.; Luton 61 aps., 1 gl.**

**PETER SPIRING** (Striker)

Luton paid Liverpool £70,000 for Peter early this season but he lost his place, through injury, after only five games. He spent almost two years at Anfield, following his transfer from Bristol City, but didn't get into their first-team. **League record: Bristol City 57 (5) aps., 16 gls.; Liverpool nil aps.; Luton 5 aps., 1 gl.**

**RON FUTCHER** (Striker)

Ron made a sensational start to his First Division career, scoring on his debut against Ipswich on Boxing Day then claiming a hat-trick against Wolves two days later! Luton signed from Chester last summer. **League record: Chester 4 aps.; Luton 6 aps., 5 gls.**

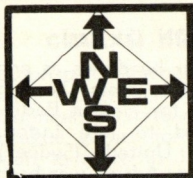
**JIMMY HUSBAND** (Striker)

Jimmy's transfer cost Luton £70,000 when he left Everton last season. He made his League bow for Everton in 1965 and later won five England under-23 caps. Earlier he had played in school and youth internationals. **League record: Everton 158 (7) aps., 44 gls.; Luton 44 aps., 9 gls.**

**JOHN ASTON** (Striker)

Luton paid £30,000 for left-winger John who had starred in so many games for Manchester United—none more so than in the 1968 European Cup final. He was Luton's top scorer with 12 goals two seasons back. **League record: Man. United 139 (17) aps., 25 gls.; Luton 102 aps., 16 gls.**

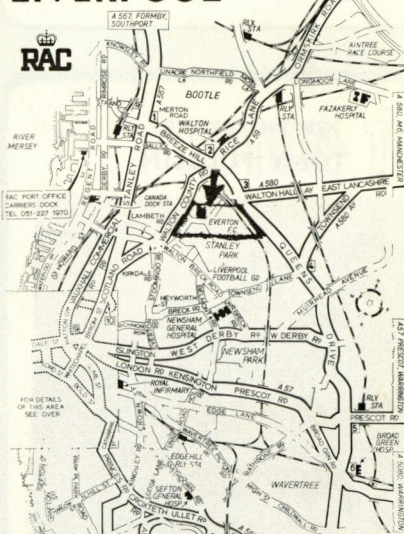

Carlisle is distinctly becoming one of Rangers' favourite away grounds. A particularly good result in view of our injury-hit side.

Two superb goals from Givens sank Carlisle further into the quagmire of relegation and revitalised Rangers after the disappointment of their 0-0 defeat at West Ham the previous week. The harder Carlisle struggle the worse it gets for them and on their superb pitch they gave an outstanding display of spirited football, but fell to a brace of goals which their sweeper Parker described as sucker punches. Certainly they deserved a little bit more than they got. They went behind in the 12th minute when a corner from Thomas was accurately placed to the near post and Eire international Given knocked the ball home from six yards. It was all so simple, but Carlisle responded and within five minutes had snatched a merited equaliser. In the second half, Carlisle set about reasserting their authority and for 20 minutes they succeeded. Then the Londoners escaped the siege and broke upfield. McLintock released a fine pass to Masson, who helped the ball on its way across field and out to the left where Thomas saw his shot blocked and go wide for a corner. From the flag kick the ball was half cleared and Givens quickly shot home from 20 yards. ("Sunday Telegraph".)

Middlesbrough's defensive blanket effectively smothered the action and made this a difficult game in which to play and watch.

The system that has given Middlesbrough as good an away record as any team in the First Division—apart, ironically, from Queens Park Rangers—yielded another capital gain last night. The smothered everything Rangers could produce in a match that made both club's European ambitions seem optimistic. Middlesbrough, F.A. Cup quarter-finalists, are both mean enough and patient enough to get to Wembley. But they are neither skilled enough nor positive enough to make friends and influence this season's championship race. Rangers have both the flair and the ambition. But they lack the physical strength in attack that could win them a major prize. Eire international Don Givens—18 goals this season—is the man Rangers look to for the breakthrough in games like this. And Givens came closest to breaking the barricade, thundering a 72nd minute drive against a post before Stuart Boam scraped the rebound across the face of his own goal and out for a corner. Rangers set the pace for most of the first half and all of the second. Yet always Middlesbrough had men behind the ball to absorb the danger. ("Daily Express".)

The oddest thing happening at Loftus Road? Firstly the longest slide on a muddy pitch I have ever seen by Albert Smith a Rangers wing half near the end of the war years. Secondly a goal scored by Arthur Longbottom (who, for some reason, changed his name to Langley after leaving Rangers.)
