

After last week's game at Queen's Park Rangers I went into the press room with their manager Dave Sexton. We had a quick general chat about the match, and then the boys began to load their questions in my direction about relegation. One went as far as to ask me if I'd given up the ghost.

Well I can tell you here and now that I haven't. I haven't given up a little spook. I thought we were dead unlucky to lose at Loftus Road, and I saw enough in our performance to give me hope.

Our old friend Bruce Rioch did us a favour by scoring the first goal to boost Derby to a 3-0 win over Tottenham. And Arsenal lost at home to Everton. That makes our defeat at Goodison last week a little easier to accept.

Don't forget that we still have to play all the other clubs in a position like ours. If we can lick Coventry today we will make the long trip north to Carlisle next week full of confidence. Arsenal still have to come to Kenilworth Road. So have Leicester. And we still have to go to Tottenham and Birmingham.

That's what I told the press lads last week. I think it prevented some of them writing Luton off too soon. Anyway, what sort of a manager would I be to accept defeat when the players are fighting so damned hard and with such great spirit?

As the 'Evening Post' said a couple of weeks ago, the other managers are calling me 'Perry Mason', for the way I'm managing to lift players off the disciplinary hook. I admit I can see the funny side of it, but really it's no laughing matter. Had it not been for players from other teams

coming to speak up for Ronnie Futcher (twice) and John Faulkner, we would have been without both of them for a couple of weeks.

That's why we can't afford to have any more players booked for 'mouth'. I told the lads early in the season that they would be fined £50 each time they were booked for dissent. I still mean it. We just don't have the depth of staff to keep replacing first-team players who are missing because of needless backchat to referees.

And that's why nobody argued when Don Rogers scored Q.P.R.'s winner last week from what could quite reasonably have been an offside position.

I admit that from where I was sitting I couldn't tell whether it was or it wasn't, but a couple of the lads told me afterwards that it definitely was. And some of the reporters agreed.

But none of us had a go at the referee. That's the way it's got to be.

I believe there will be some fun and games in the next few days on the transfer market. The deadline for deals is next Thursday, and I know a lot of managers are treading carefully, waiting for the right psychological moment to step in.

We all know the players we would like. It's just a matter of them becoming available at the right time and at the right price. I'm in there with the rest. Whether my intended deals come off or not depends entirely on availability and finances. But I can assure you, I'm still in business—keeping my fingers crossed and my wallet hidden.

Gerry Harrison of Anglia TV talks to Steve Litt

What was your football background before you joined Luton, Steve?

Well, I came from Keswick in Cumberland and I played for my county at school as a sweeper. I was signed by Carlisle on schoolboy forms but when they cut down on their staff I was released. A local referee had seen me play and he recommended me to Blackpool. For five or six months I used to travel down there and play for them on Saturdays in the Lancashire League. Bob Stokoe had been the manager at Carlisle in the time when I was there, and he also became the manager at Blackpool. It was Mr Stokoe, in fact, who signed me on at Blackpool as an apprentice. I stayed there for a year. I was seventeen then, and as I came up to the age of eighteen the club had to decide whether I should be signed as a full professional or released. It was apparently between me and another defender who was a bit older than I was and had more experience. I can remember the manager calling me in and saying that there wasn't room for me and that he was letting me go. It was very disappointing, although looking back on it, it might have done me a good turn. I had been getting games in the Central League and was doing well, receiving some good reports, but this came as a real shock. In retrospect, it might have put more fight into me. Anyhow, the player they signed on instead of me didn't make the grade and I believe that he is in non-League football somewhere now, but that is the way things go. After they had released me, I went back home for a short time and worked as a trainee manager in a supermarket. They were very kind to me there and allowed me away to play football whenever the opportunity arose. I wasn't there very long before Paddy Sowden, who was about to join Luton, recommended me to Harry Haslam and Luton signed me on as a professional on a year's contract. So that was how I came to Luton. On more than one occasion things looked gloomy as far as a full-time career was concerned, but now I am in my third season here and I would like to think I am making steady progress.

What stands out most about your first games for the first-team?

My debut was in the F.A. Cup against Crewe and we won 2-0, but I can't remember much about the opposition. In that game I played in midfield, although now it is accepted that I am an out and out defender. I enjoy myself in that position because it means that you can get involved and, also, I score the odd goal or two. Before that game I was really nervous. I didn't play as well as I could, but I put that down to nerves as much as anything, although it was a high standard of course. The next time I played in the team the following season I was not as nervous but I can still remember the jittery feeling of that first game. I feel apprehensive and nervous before every game, no matter what level it is, but that Cup match was something special. The other games I remember particularly are the matches against Leicester and Manchester City. In the game against Leicester I had to mark Frank Worthington. I had seen him a lot on television and he is a player of great skill, but I was well pleased after the game when the lads said that I didn't give him a kick. That was a great compliment. In the game against Manchester City, I put a header against the bar; it was a John Aston corner which he drove over and I got up well for it and it hit the bar and went over the top. If it had gone in, I think we would have picked up at least a point. In fact, although that game was televised, I have never seen it again, but my Dad has because he lives in the Granada television area.

Steve, how hard is it having tasted first-team football to be mostly on the fringes of the team?
It is pretty hard, but nobody can deny that John Faulkner is playing extremely well. I have just got to keep soldiering on and, as the Boss says, if anybody asks him about me he tells them that I am a first-teamer and can go in any team. I suppose it is frustrating for myself having played in the First Division; I now find it harder to play in the reserves. I am not quite sure why. I suppose it is something to do with motivation and concentration. Perhaps I feel that I have got to do really well at this level. As a defender you can get yourself in trouble if you try to do too much. Some games I find easy, some games very hard; not necessarily because of the quality of the opposition.

Are there any other professional footballers in your family background?
Not really. I have one sister, and my Dad used to play for a local side and I gather he had trials for his county at one stage. Somewhere along the line there is a great uncle called Percy Litt from Plymouth who was a footballer but there is not much football background in our family.

What's your main interest outside football and Luton Town, Steve?
I am pretty keen on cars, particularly custom cars; you know the ones, those which are specially made and have bits and pieces all over them, looking rather like a Christmas tree! I wouldn't say I am an expert on cars at all, but I like tinkering around with them. I go down to a pal's garage and help out a bit. The car I have at the moment is a 2.3 Firenza SL Sports. Putting business to local industries you might say! The car I would like, although I have no immediate plans to get one is the new Lotus or something like a Lamborghini! But mine is hard enough to run as it is. It only does nineteen miles to the gallon so I don't think I could cope with one of those at the moment.

What other sports do you play?
Well, on the social side I quite like squash and badminton. I am not exactly an expert at either of the games but I enjoy them, although playing squash recently I did myself no good by being hit in the eye with the ball. I will have to avoid that. I quite like weightlifting, but I don't do it as a hobby, just as part of the Club's training. It seems an excellent way of building yourself up and I can feel it doing me good. I have given up cricket after all the accidents I have had over a period of time. I have been bashed over the head with a bat, hit with the ball and, on one occasion, when I was fielding in the slips, the wicket was knocked out of the ground and it eventually stuck in my ankle. No, I don't think I am accident prone but I shall not be playing much more cricket!



Coventry City are currently three quarters of the way through only their eighth season in Division One, having reached the top sphere in 1966-67 when, for the first time in their 92-year existence, they won promotion as Second Division Champions.

Since their arrival among the elite, however, the overall playing performances of the 'Sky Blues' have been somewhat 'ordinary' and 6th, with 49 points, is the highest placing the club has achieved—and that was in 1969-70. Their other final finishing positions have been: 20th in 1967-68, 20th in 1968-69, 10th in 1970-71, 18th in 1971-72, 19th in 1972-73 and 16th last season, when they were only two points from relegation.

At present Coventry are sitting pretty comfortably in the table—not the least concerned about winning the title nor worried about the fear of the dreaded drop. Yet, as we all well know, football is a very funny business and things can change so dramatically when all seems to be running along smoothly.

Coventry's recent 3-1 home triumph over title contenders, Ipswich Town, was described by one local reporter as 'an exceptional display—one worthy of a side challenging strongly for honours'. And, indeed, two men who shone that day were City's Scottish internationals, **TOMMY HUTCHISON** and **WILLIE CARR**. Both it is hoped will be in action this afternoon.

The 27-year-old Hutchison, a £145,000 buy from Blackpool in 1972, is rated as one of the trickiest wingers in the game. Born in Cardenden, he began his career with Alloa before moving to the Bloomfield Road club, for whom he made 164 (plus 2 sub) League appearances.

A member of Scotland's 1974 World Cup squad, "Hutch" has caps at Full and Under-23 levels and undoubtedly is a most exciting player.

Fellow countryman, Carr, who was turned down by Wolves earlier in the season after medical advice, is now right back in form.

Only 5' 6" tall, this Glaswegian joined City straight from a Cambridge school and made his debut as a 17-year-old in 1967-68. He underwent two cartilage operations last term and subsequently only turned out on 12 occasions in the League, after missing only seven games in the previous three seasons. Now back to peak fitness, "Wee Willie", has a dual aim—to add to his six Full caps and to help City win a major trophy. He has, incidentally, over 250 League outings behind him.

Another Scottish cap in the Coventry camp is the big bustling striker, **COLIN STEIN**, a native of Philipstown, who cost £140,000 when signed from Rangers around the time when Hutchison was bought. Four years earlier he had left Hibernian for Ibrox Park in a £100,000 deal. Had an unhappy season last winter as injury caused him to miss several games which jeopardised his chances of winning back his Scottish place. Has some 260 League outings to his name.

BRIAN ALDERSON and **DAVID CROSS** share the striking duties with Stein. The former has been City's top League scorer for the past two seasons—nine goals in 40 games last term and 16 in 54 overall. Yet another Scot, "Aldy" has won Under-23 recognition and is in his sixth season at Coventry, having joined them from Lochie Harp Juniors for £200. Has made over 150 first-team appearances to date.

Norwich City transferred Cross to Coventry for £150,000 in November, 1973. Born at Bury, this aggressive six-footer started off with Rochdale. He is exceptionally good in the air and has netted over 70 goals during his career.

Centre-back **LARRY LLOYD** became Coventry's highest priced player when they signed him for £250,000 from Liverpool shortly before Christmas. An England international, Lloyd made nearly 200 senior appearances for the 'Reds' and hopes to better that with City.

Lancastrian **ALAN DUGDALE** assists Lloyd in the middle of Coventry's defence. He came up through the club's nursery scheme and was a member of England's successful 'Little

World Cup' side in 1971. He is one of the club's most improved players, having made his debut in 1972-73.

Flanking Lloyd and Dugdale will be **GRAHAM OKEY** and **CHRIS CATTLIN**.

Young Okey at 19 is a star of the future, having already settled snugly into City's League side. Although only 5' 6" tall he seems to grow in stature every time he plays.

Cattlin played Rugby League as a boy but turned to soccer when he became an amateur with Burnley, joining Huddersfield Town as a 17-year-old. Moved to Coventry in March, 1968, for £65,000. Capped twice for England Under-23's, he lost his place to Jim Holmes last season but is now playing really well at number three. Has a career appearance record of 245 games to date.

Former Blackpool and Crystal Palace player **JOHN CRAVEN** operates in midfield and he came to Coventry in May, 1973.

from the London club. Originally a forward, he now prefers to make goals rather than score them. Has made over 300 appearances for his three clubs.

City's goalkeeper is **NEIL RAMSBOTTOM** who took over from long-serving Bill Glazier at the turn of the year. Now regarded as 'number one choice', he made 174 League appearances for his first club, Bury, had 12 with Blackpool, three on loan with Crewe Alexandra and was ex-manager Noel Cantwell's last signing for Coventry early in 1972.

In reserve for City will be Welsh cap **LES CARTWRIGHT**, former Nottingham Forest defender **PETER HINDLEY**, strikers **ALAN GREEN** and **MICK FERGUSON**, who both did wonderfully well in that win over Ipswich, and **JIM HOLMES**, not forgetting **BILL GLAZIER**, who has made well over 400 senior appearances for the Sky Blues'.

Their manager, **Gordon Milne**, has seen virtually all

there is to see in the soccer world, having served Liverpool and England admirably. Now he wants Coventry City to get around and win a few things, see a few countries (via the European competitions) just has he had done at Anfield.







Our passing from midfield and our defensive covering left room for much improvement.
