

What with not scoring enough goals, and having people injured, the whole job's a nightmare. It's a funny old game. Just three weeks ago we were on the top of the world, winning at Portsmouth and poised to take over the leadership.

Now we are in the middle of the table, searching about like explorers to find our way back up there. I am convinced we have the players here to do it, but that doesn't stop me looking about for others. I have a crowd of players on my wanted list, and several of them are in the First Division. But again it is a case of availability and price.

Football management is rather like a game of chess. You make your move, and then you wait for the other side to counter-move. Everyone is as



Only then can we start talking money, and if the two clubs involved want to pay our price for the two players, I can tell you we can do with the money. Who can't?

But our immediate priority is to beat Blackburn today. We haven't met this famous old club for some five years in either the League or the Cup. I hope for our sake it is a happy meeting today. We can do with the points.



In the late 1880's there was no more accomplished team around when it came to the F.A. Cup than Blackburn Rovers, our guests at Kenilworth Road this afternoon.

In those yesteryears Rovers won the knockout trophy on five occasions—three times on the trot from 1884-86—and finished as runners-up once, in 1882 a marvellous record.

Performing in their ranks then were such great players as Fergie Suter, Jimmy Forrest, who lined up in those five winning finals and the man who became the first professional to win an England cap (1884), Joe Lofthouse, Jack Sowerbutts, goalkeeper Herbert Arthur, the Southworth brothers, James and John, Bill Townley who scored a hat-trick v Sheffield Wednesday in the 1890 Final and Jack Strachan.

And, although not a fashionable club, Rovers seemed to breed loyalty in their players and deep devotion in their administration staff.

In fact, back in 1896 the proud, distinctive figure of Bob Crompton started to wear the familiar blue and white quarters of the Rovers, and he went on to play in over 400 League games for the club. Bob also won a record 41 England caps, setting up a brilliant full-back partnership with Jesse Pennington of West Bromwich Albion.

When he finally hung up his boots in 1920, Bob was elected a director of the club and later he became its secretary/manager.

However, Blackburn, situated in the mirk of mid-industrial Lancashire, have virtually always been an

average League side. Division One Champions just twice—in 1911-12 and 1913-14—Division Two winners in 1938-39 and Third Division victors last term, they are currently in their 77th season of League action, 54 of which have been in the top section, four in the Third and this is their 19th winter in Division Two.

The famous Rovers were founded by two old Boys of the Blackburn Grammar School in 1874, namely Arthur Constantine and John Lewis. The club's first major ground was a field with a pond in the middle, and players couldn't very well paddle through it, jump or run round it, so to counter this, planks of wood were laid down with sods of grass on top of them. As a result, Rovers were undefeated for two years, 35 times on their own ground!

In 1882, after having acquired different headquarters, Rovers became the first club outside the London area to play in the F.A. Cup Final. They lost to the Old Etonians but two seasons later they were back—to begin that 'famous hat-trick'. And for the record, seven players appeared in all of those three finals.

As founder-members of the Football League, Blackburn share with fellow initiators, Aston Villa, the honour of the longest run in Division One from the start in 1888-89—staying put in the top bracket until 1935-36, when they were relegated with the Villa!

Rovers were back though before World War Two. They 'dropped' again in 1948, came up ten years later, dived back down again in 1966, had a spell in Division Three from 1971 to 1975, and they are now hoping to climb back to where they commenced their League Footballing exploits over 87 years ago. The players who brought Second Division soccer back to Ewood Park last season are still with Rovers, and there are some highly experienced ones among them at that.

For instance, goalkeeper Roger Jones, ex-Bournemouth, has around 250 senior outings to his credit; Yorkshireman Andy Burgin, formerly of Sheffield Wednesday and Rotherham, had 243 League games with Halifax prior to joining Rovers; Graham Hawkins, a native of Darlington and once of Wolves and Preston North End fame, has a career record of some 320 League appearances; local 'find' Stuart Metcalfe has played in more than 230 League matches; striker Don Martin in nearly 350, for Northampton Town and Rovers; ex-Reading and Charlton winger Jim Mullen in 200; forward Ken Beamish in 300 plus (including 176 for Tranmere and 96 for Brighton) and Mike Hickman, another former Brighton man, is also nearing the 300 mark, including 253 for Grimsby

Town. Martin and Beamish have each scored over 100 goals in competitive football.

Preston-born defender, Dick Fazackerley, is also becoming an 'old' campaigner having already played over 180 times for Rovers; so too is Mike Heaton, the full-back who was signed from Sheffield United. He has 170 first team games in his locker, while Tom Parkes recently chalked up his 175th senior outing.

If one were to add together the aggregate career total of League appearances made by the present day Rovers' players, the figure would be in the region of 3,500 which spells EXPERIENCE.

As mentioned previous, Blackburn Rovers have always believed in engaging local-born players—and this season is no exception with eleven on their books right now. Most of them are in the first team pool, and Rovers' new manager Jim Smith, who took over the football 'hot seat' when Gordon Lee moved up to Newcastle United earlier in the year, thinks they can do a lot towards getting the Ewood Park club among the pace-makers heading for Division One. Time will tell, of course.

Most League Appearances: 580, Ronnie Clayton (1950-69). Clayton also played in 57 F.A. Cup-ties and won 35 England caps.

Ground: EWOOD Park. Record attendance there: 61,783 (Rovers v Bolton F.A. Cup 1929). Record receipts: £13,280 (Rovers v Man City F.A. Cup 1969). Present capacity: 47,500 (seats 7,118).

POINTS OF INTEREST

- In 1890 Blackburn took a ten-year lease on Ewood Park, spent £1,000 on improving it—and four years later bought the freehold for £2,500!
- In 1954 Rovers centre-forward Tommy Briggs hit seven goals against Bristol Rovers to equal the Second Division scoring record for most goals in a match by one player.
- Blackburn finished third in Division Three in 1972-73 season, yet still made an annual net loss of £111,135, despite average home gates of almost 10,000.


