HARRY'S TOWN

WHERE does one start to write a programme column after all that has happened at this club since our last home match? In my last column I was mourning the passing from the board of Eric Morecambe.

Now we've lost Mr Reggie Burr, Mr Richard Banks and our chairman, Mr Len Hawkins. And it's all happened in a blaze of national publicity that I don't think has done the club any good at all.

Now Mr Denis Mortimer is the club's new chief executive, and I wish him all the luck in the world. While it is my job to put the playing side right, it is Mr Mortimer's unenviable task to try to balance the books.

I may well have to help him by selling players. If this is the case I assure you I will be wheeling and dealing in the wisest possible way to leave us with the best players and a winning team. I am also looking for new players, make no mistake about that. I know which players I want, and it's all a case of availability and price.

We are in no worse a position than a lot of other clubs, and as I have said before, there just isn't any money around in the game any more. It's simple economics. It's like house-keeping at home. You don't buy smoked salmon and steak when your purse is empty.

Without wanting to make excuses for our defeats at home to Oldham and at Fulham last week, I must defend the players. All the upheaval in the background must have affected them. It's like trying to watch television with somebody hammering nails into the wall next door. It distracts you.


But I do not believe my players will go under. They have too much character for that. They are all behind me 100 per cent. You, the fans, must have patience. The new board must be given the chance to get into and sort the club's problems out in their own way.

Mr Mortimer said in the press last week that he would not try to interfere in the management of the club. I am grateful to him for saying that. For I still believe that Luton can fight back.

When I took over three years ago I said it would take five years to accomplish what I had in mind. I still think so. Okay, we got into the First Division in my first year. Perhaps it was a bit too soon. Who knows?

But I am still team-building in my own way. The youngsters are coming along well, and I have the backing of a fine coaching staff. We have to have a good team at Luton—both on the field and off it. That's why I am convinced that the sun will be shining at Kenilworth Road again. Soon.

To finish I would like to say how disappointed I was to read Mr Alan Hardaker's comment on Don Revie's handling of the England team. Whenever Alan makes a statement it usually reads, "The Football League Secretary states", and I feel he did not represent the Football League in that statement and should have said so. For personal views at this time help no-one, now is the time for people to get together, especially at that level and discuss the future of the game to benefit all. May I add also that this is my personal opinion.





LAST SEASON, Orient, besides averaging just 7,604 at their home League games, managed to score a mere 28 goals in their 42 Second Division fixtures—17 at home.

That created a new club record for low scoring—and really speaking, it's not one to be proud of! But it's a fact, and so far this season Orient's scoring feats haven't improved a great deal—15 in the League to date.

Yet the team, as a whole, isn't playing at all badly. A good defence is a necessity, we all know this; a good midfield trio is also a major priority; but it's goals that win matches, and unfortunately Orient just can't score enough!

Looking back to 1973-74, a couple of extra goals then would have certainly given Orient a First Division place . . . as it was they missed promotion by a single point!

No-one can put a finger on why the 'O's' lack a consistent marksman. **Gerry Queen**, in a long career, has scored over 100 times at senior level; **Derek Possee**,

too, has passed the 'ton' mark; **Mickey Bullock** is another centurian, and **Peter Allen** and **Doug Allder** aren't mugs around the penalty-area. But this term all five are finding it tough to bulge that net. Orient manager, George Petchey, has been in the game donkey's years, and he knows what it means to bang in goals. Right now he's busily trying to remedy this point, and a couple at Carlisle last week means that he is gradually succeeding.

Orient have scored six away goals this season in picking up five points. They're above us in the League at this moment, so today's battle could be a good 'un . . . and let's hope it produces a flurry of goals.

A professional since 1965, he was with Spurs as a schoolboy, and operates in midfield for the 'O's'.

Peter Bennett—Joined Orient from West Ham five years ago. Was a member of the 'Hammers' Youth side in 1963 and won five England School-boy caps in 1960-61. A pelvic injury kept him out of the action for almost a year (1972-73) but he's now back in business, and performing exceptionally well.

Mickey Bullock—Born at Stoke, he started his career with Birmingham and was transferred to Orient via Oxford United in October 1968.

Laurie Cunningham—Originate from Archway, he became a 'pro' 20 months ago after coming through Orient's youth teams. Made his League bow v West Ham in the 1974-75 Texaco Cup.

Bobby Fisher—Born in sight of Wembley Stadium, he has been a full-time Orient player since 1973. Now a regular in the team, he was an ever-present last season and is proving to be a very fine full-back. He isn't a Chess fanatic, by the way!

Tony Grealish—A product of West London's School's football, who signed apprentice forms for Orient in mid 1972. Graduated through their Youth scheme, he's played for the Eire Youth side and is currently enjoying a successful run in the senior ranks.

Ricky Hepplestone—An Indian from Bhusawal, he spent his childhood in Bolton, signing for P.N.E. in the mid 1960's, making his debut in 1968. Had 154 outings for North End prior to joining Orient.

Phil Hoadley—A former Youth International who gained considerable experience with Crystal Palace before transferring to Orient four years back for £30,000. Plays centre-half and teams up brilliantly with Tom Walley.

John Jackson—Another ex-Palace player who was sold to Orient two years ago. He made his initial appearance for the 'O's' v Luton in 1973-74. Voted the club's 'Player of the Year' last season.

Derek Possee—Started his professional life at Tottenham, moving to Millwall for £25,000 in 1967. Scored 79 goals in a stay of six years at The Den (a club record) and after 223 Second Division games, left for Crystal Palace in January 1973 for £118,000.

Gerry Queen—A Scot from Glasgow, he was a St. Mirren player first of all, then a Kilmarnockian; he had 108 League games for Crystal Palace after that, and signed for Orient in October 1972 for a club record fee of £60,000. Won an Under-23 cap in 1967.

Glenn Roeder—Represented Essex and London Schools as a boy and was connected with Arsenal before signing apprentice forms for Orient three years ago. He plays at either midfield or centre-back.

Bill Roffey—Was originally a Crystal Palace junior and had 19 First Division games with them prior to

joining Orient in 1973. Injured in 1974 and made only six appearances last winter.

Tom Walley—A Welshman who made his entry into League Football with Arsenal ten years ago. Capped by his country at both Under-23 and full team levels, he is Orient's skipper and came to Brisbane Road via Watford for whom he made over 200 appearances.

A BRIEF HISTORY . . .

The club was founded in 1881 by Clerks of the Orient Shipping Company, later to become the P & O Group. The first home matches were played at Millfields Road, Clapton, and later at 'Whittles Whippet' where two railway carriages provided the changing facilities.

From 1896 Orient played in the London League and turned professional in 1901. They were members of the Southern League then, and the club gained entry to the Football League in 1905, playing initially in Division Two, with their home at Millfields.

Another move took them to Lea Bridge in 1930, and Brisbane Road followed in 1938.

During their existence, our opponents have played League soccer under three titles: Clapton Orient (1881-1946), Leyton Orient (1946-66) and Orient. In 1961-62, the 'O's' as they are commonly known, gained promotion to Division One for the first time in their history, and stayed there for just 42 matches. Then they slipped straight through into Division Three, returning to their present status in 1970.

Points of interest:-


In 1930 Orient played two Home League games at Wembley Stadium.


