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


GOOD AFTERNOON, and welcome to more F.A. Cup action at Carrow Road. I know Luton's visit means "All our Yesterdays" for many of our fans, but I hope we will be looking forward around tea-time today!

As I said before we eventually disposed of Fourth Division Rochdale, a couple of home draws out of the bag should have prompted real hopes of going through to the Fifth Round at least.

I was pleased with our point-earning performance at Everton last week, and, although we must guard constantly against any complacency, we appear to be pulling clear of the danger zone in the First Division.

It follows, then, that we ought to be in the right frame of mind to meet Luton's challenge today. Despite their financial problems, they have enjoyed a grand run of victories in recent weeks. We can't afford to take them lightly. There were enough lessons in the Rochdale serial to ensure a whole-hearted

approach against Second Division opponents. We became involved in that three-match marathon, with extra time in Lancashire, simply because we neglected our chances in the first place here at Carrow Road.

There is always room for some confidence while we keep on creating, but we do need to show more sharpness in the penalty area.

I was delighted a few days ago to meet a group of Norfolk games-masters during a training session at Trowse. Forging better links between this club and local schools is of the greatest importance, and I am sure that our first session will lead to regular and fruitful liaisons.

There is no doubt that clubs such as Norwich City must put more emphasis on finding and grooming young talent of their own. It is in the schools that the potential is first spotted, and we must make use of it.

Keith Barber (goalkeeper). Signed from Southern League Dunstable and is now first-choice keeper. At under six feet tall and weighing in at under 11 stones, he is small by normal standards for goalkeepers,

but his lack of bulk is certainly no handicap.

Stephen Buckley (defender). Tall full-back signed from Burton Albion. His brother Alan is striker at Walsall.

John Ryan (defender). Full-back who has interested a number of clubs since joining the Hatters from Fulham. He made 41 appearances for Fulham, and has already made more than six times that for Luton.

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Paul Fletcher (defender). His £100,000 signing from Chester equalled the club record fee paid for Alan West. Made his move in 1974 with brother John.

John Faulkner (defender). His rise to fame reads like a story from "Roy of the Rovers". Starred for Sutton in their F.A. Cup duel with Leeds — and was promptly signed by the Yorkshire side. Competition for first-team places at Elland Road was too fierce, however, and he moved south to Luton. Scored his first goal of the season in last week's 3-1 win over Portsmouth.

Brian Chambers (midfield). Born in Newcastle, made his League debut for Sunderland and played over 50 games for them. A move to Arsenal saw him make only one appearance for the Gunners before leaving for Luton.

Andy King (forward). Local teenager making a big impression up front during Hatters' recent run of victories.

Alan West (midfield). Former Burnley star, he became one of the Lancashire club's big-money exports when he joined Luton for £100,000. Skilful and creative.

John Aston (midfield or forward). Hero of Manchester United's European Cup Final win over

Benfica in 1968. His left-wing runs caused constant problems for the Portuguese side, and despite sparkling performances by Best, Charlton, Kidd and Co., many made Aston the man-of-the-match that memorable night at Wembley. His role at Luton is no less important than it was to Matt Busby's men that night.

Ron Fletcher (forward). At £25,000 he was the "cheap" part of the deal which brought him and brother Paul from Chester, but this has not prevented him from becoming a Kenilworth Road favourite.

Jimmy Husband (forward or midfield). Born in Newcastle, he made his name at Everton, for whom he made over 150 appearances. After his £80,000 move to Luton he was unable to establish himself as a regular first-team player and appeared at Carrow Road in a Combination fixture in September. His close control can still be a match-winning factor, however, he is a player who should not be underestimated.

Jim Ryan (forward). Like Aston, he is a former Manchester United player. Has made over 160 appearances for Luton, but has recently been regular choice as substitute.

LAST TIME WE MET

Luton Town were at Carrow Road on October 16th, 1971, for a Division Two fixture. It was our promotion season, and we had already drawn 1-1 at Luton in the first game of the campaign, but the visitors that day in October went ahead after 28 minutes through Alan Slough, and it was not until Kenny Foggo's 57th-minute equaliser that we started to put our game together. Foggo hit another in the 76th minute, and Trevor Howard scored a minute from the end to give us a 3-1 victory.

In fact the club is fighting for its life. With huge debts their recently started lottery and other fund-raising schemes will not help much — but are still essential.

Their plight shows the other side of "life at the top", for there are many clubs in the top two divisions who, while not quite on the breadline, have got to watch the pennies.

The Liverpools and Manchester Uniteds can cruise along, secure in the knowledge that the turnstiles will keep clicking, but for the Chelseas and the Portmouths a few hundred more — or less — on the gate makes a lot of difference.

And in the lower sections of the League bankruptcy is a constant threat, and cash considerations override all others — witness Fourth Division Rochdale's decision to come here for their F.A. Cup Third Round second replay.

LIFE AT THE TOP

Whatever the reason for the crisis — and it's clear that there are not enough teams putting entertainment high enough among their priorities — football is in danger.

A Super League may be around the corner — not because it's necessarily a good idea, but because

there may only be the big clubs left in a few years. Where will players like Kevin Keegan and Alan Taylor learn their skills then?

It is in this context that the current debate about freedom of contract for players must be considered. It is difficult to make out a case for treating footballers differently from other professions, but it is equally hard to argue that letting players join whichever club they want would be good for the game.

It would be fine for the big-money clubs. They would win every time a star put his skills up for auction. But the little clubs — and that includes some in Divisions One and Two — would lose their best players and be unable to attract replacements.

Clubs like Norwich and Luton will be in trouble if freedom of contract comes about.

Football needs a new approach to many subjects, but in my opinion freedom of contract, far from being the kiss of life, would be the game's kiss of death.

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Bobby Brennan celebrated his 35th birthday at White Hart Lane on March 14th, 1959. Canary fans in a crowd of 63,500 sang their greetings before the kick-off.


Bobby collected the best possible present — a 65th-minute equaliser against Luton in the F.A. Cup Semi-Final. Reflecting on that golden day, one of the heroes who saw Wembley looming 17 years ago, pointed out that he had joined Luton after travelling over from Ireland in 1948.

"But I had never played against them until that Semi-Final. It had to be the happiest birthday of my life at Tottenham when I scored. The fans were marvellous in those days, and I felt I owed them something after their song for me at the start."

Four days later, City's great trek ended in the replay at Birmingham. "We should have sewn it up at St. Andrews. Errol Crossan had a 'goal' disallowed when the referee ruled the keeper had been obstructed — but it looked good enough to me.

"Billy Bingham's goal? He just smashed in a shot that could have gone anywhere. Luton's real hero was centre-half Syd Owen

A place at Wembley was at stake, and the great Norfolk trek turned towards White Hart Lane. Brown put Luton ahead after 35 minutes, but Bobby Brennan made it a marvellous birthday with his 65th-minute equaliser.

On to St. Andrews, Birmingham, for the replay — and the end of City's Cup Final dreams as Bingham scored the only goal after 56 minutes.

City have been to Wembley twice since, for League Cup Finals, but those stirring exploits of 1959 still make up the proudest chapters in their history.

Canary faces Canary — in the Fourth Division! That was the soccer twist thrown up by last Saturday's Newport v Bournemouth fixture.

The story involved goalkeeper Mervyn Cawston, on loan for a month at Newport, and midfield man Billy Steele, on loan at Dean Court for similar period.

Bournemouth's promotion hopes took a jolt with a 3-1 defeat. Former Canaries Trevor Howard and Clive Payne were also in their line-up, and Payne scored Bournemouth's late consolation goal.

There was an even bigger reunion on Monday night when John Bond took his team to Dean Court for Arthur Cunliffe's testimonial match. Cunliffe, former Aston Villa, Blackburn and England winger, was trainer at Bournemouth for 24 years, including Bond's reign, until his retirement at

the end of last season. Steele, however, watched as City won 3-0.

John Miller's bad-luck story continues. The Canary winger, in the reckoning for a return against Rochdale in the second Cup replay at Carrow Road, pulled his right thigh muscle again in training. He is unable to do any running for at least another fortnight. Miller was anxious for action after two months' absence through injury.



The midfield man made his debut last week at Newport, who had the other Canary on loan, Mervyn Cawston, in goal.
